There are menus hanging in picture frames on the walls of the Schneider House advertising complete dinners for 75 cents.

The luxury hotel turned apartment building used to have a five-star restaurant on its ground floor. But that was many decades

You'd be hard pressed to find any place in town where you can order a decent meal for nearly that cheap — unless you show up for lunch on Saturday at HeardJones Health Mart.

Every Saturday for the past year or so, the locally-owned store has served hamburgers with a side of chips for only 99 cents. Add cheese and it will set you back an extra 50 cents.

Fifty or 60 years ago, it was common for pharmacies like Heard-Jones to have a lunch counter or "fountain."

Downtown office workers would come in to eat lunch while treat their kiddos to an ice cream cone or root beer float.

Even Walgreens, the mega

chain that now competes toe-totoe with that other mega chain, CVS, had soda fountains.

Sadly, those days are gone for-But in Pampa, the tradition

not only lives on, but thrives thanks in large part to Heard-Jones owner Bill Hite. "I don't know of any other

pharmacy in West Texas that has a fountain," Hite said.

Shamrock man killed when truck ran off road

STAFF REPORT

A Shamrock man was killed Monday morning in Gray County when the truck he was driving went off the roadway and into a ditch, according

to the Department of Public Safety. John William Breeding, 35, was traveling north on State Road 273 a half mile north of County Road X when the 1998 Ford F150 truck he was driving veered off the road into the east barrow ditch.

The vehicle traveled for approximately 1/8 of a mile straight and then went off a water culvert with a six-foot drop. The truck went nose first and then came to rest on its top, according to the collision report.

The vehicle was pulling a horse trailer loaded with household goods that then landed on top of the truck. The trailer had no tag, the report

Breeding was pronounced dead at the scene.

He was wearing a seatbelt and his next of kin has been notified.





Listen to the doctor: weed really can heal

ta admitted earlier this month that he had been wrong in his opposition to medical marijuana

during the rollout for his documentary "Weed." Gupta reported on research that demonstrated the proven benefits

of marijuana in treating neuropathic pain. Medical marijuana was the only drug that helped a 5-year-old girl with Dravet syndrome live without constant seizures. It calmed the constant hiccuping of a 19-yearold. Israelis use it to treat Parkinson's disease and other ailments.

Gupta took on the federal government's classification of marijuana as a Schedule I drug, which has no accepted medical use but has a high potential for abuse. (Heroin also is a Schedule I drug. Methamphetamine is Schedule II.) Gupta now believes that classification is an outrage.

The doctor didn't say

marijuana is all good. He cited research that found that regular use by teens can lead to a permanent decrease in IQ. But Gupta could find no documented case of a death from a marijuana overdose, whereas someone dies every 19 minutes from a prescription-drug overdose. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that 80,000 Americans die each year from excessive alcohol use.

Last week, Gupta's sentiments were echoed on the right when columnist Charles Krauthammer, a former psychiatrist, told Fox News that alcohol is much more harmful than marijuana. Quoth Krauthammer: "If I were starting a society from scratch and had to choose the intoxicant, I would outlaw alcohol and I'd allow marijuana." (Side note: But seeing as he can't reset the world, Krauthammer said he wouldn't legalize pot.) Gupta's about-face

CNN's Dr. Sanjay Gup- change in how this country looks at marijuana. Gupta told CNN's Erin Burnett that he used to look at medical marijuana advocates as "malingerers" who are "just looking to get high." But he came to see that cannabis not only helps severely ill people but also averts the dangerous side effects of more potent pharmaceuticals.

Senate Judiciary Chairman Pat Leahy announced Monday that his committee will hold a hearing Sept. 10 about the correct federal response to state laws legalizing the use of medical marijuana and, in the cases of Washington and Colorado, recreational use of marijuana.

Is President Barack Obama paying attention? Reporter Jessica Yellin asked White House spokesman Josh Earnest last week whether the administration was considering changing marijuana's Schedule I designation. Earnest responded with a longwinded no.

Before the American Bar Association recently, Attorney General Eric Holder delivered a speech that was supposed to signal big changes in the administration's approach to nonviolent drug offenders.

But he didn't mention marijuana enforcement, even though his Department of Justice has waged a ruthless war against medical marijuana dispensaries. Federal prosecutors have not only sent registered California dispensary operators to prison but also gone after their landlords, their bankers and contractors.

Listen to Gupta and Krauthammer and it's fair to surmise that marijuana is the least harmful of all controlled substances. It's less toxic than alcohol, which is legal. It's less lethal than prescription drugs.

So why is Washington still waging a war on weed?

Museum Musings

Every artifact tells its own story

Education is powerful. In these times when there are so many ways to gain an education, there really is

no excuse not to seek one. But, think past schools and classrooms and texts books. Think about the things that are available to you without standardized testing, grades or age limits. Here in Pampa, you can learn anything you'd like to know.

The first library arrived in Pampa around 1907. It was not the library we would imagine of today, but a group of women whose love of reading, stories and learning had formed a group. This all took place about the same time that schools were trying to organize and open in Pampa and the library group was the center of attention in most town activi-

It wasn't until 1910 that the funds were donated for a library in Pampa by the London proprietors of the

White Deer Land Museum. Still, not the sort of library we have access to today, but they were getting closer and had actual library equipment to work

The group of women had a library in the basement of the bank building, until it grew and was moved to the second floor of the building. Still growing, the library moved to occupy one shelf at the First Methodist Church. By 1932 the library had more than 700 books and was moved again to the second floor of city hall, then to the southeast corner of the basement where it expanded to include the entire south half of that floor. It wasn't until 1955 that dedication ceremonies were held for the Lovett Memorial Library building. In this building the collection of books and resources and technology continues to grow today.


The people of Pampa have always thrived at creating an educational space for the community. The library, museums and schools are all places that provide opportunities to better oneself and educate oneself on the past

and present.

The White Deer Land Museum currently houses more than 20,000 artifacts. Each of these items tells a story of a place or a time. Rather than reading about it, you can put yourself back into a time where real people used these items. The museum gives more than 20,000 unique opportunities for taking away a piece of history which has molded your life.

Just as the library creates a place to go and learn the stories, fact or fiction, of someone, the museum has created an atmosphere where you can relate to these stories in different ways. The White Deer Land Museum has been designated as a museum since 1970. The mission for the museum was to provide a trusting and comfortable opportunity to preserve the story of the land and the people who formed the community of Pampa. The building was originally used by the White Deer Land Company and the funding and staff from M.K. Brown and his foundation.

forward by dozens of Times editorials and op-ed columns, distracted the nation for years, harmed many innocent people besides the Clintons and cost the Treasury more than \$50 million a troubling episode for a great newspaper. Now the Times is suggest-

ing that the Clinton Foundation, a charitable organization responsible for saving and improving millions of lives every year, has been financially mismanaged and misused for personal enrichment, among other problems. And those accusations have been amplified not only by the Clintons' traditional enemies on the Republican right, who mortally fear a Hillary 2016 electoral juggernaut, but in a rather deranged column by Dowd, as well.

The article that the Times published on Aug. 13 provides an ample target for jumbled together a string of alleged concerns and anonymous accusations, largely lacking in substance. The story indicated, for example, that Douglas J. Band, former counselor to President Clinton who has since left the foundation to build a consulting firm, is guilty of serious conflicts of interest — without specifying a single actual conflict.

A number of companies impressed by Band's creation and management of the Clinton Global Initiative — one of the premier venues for corporate social responsibility on the planet today — have hired his firm to advise them. He has also apparently persuaded companies to support CGI

journalistic disgrace, spurred with money and other commitments. Exactly how did such activities compromise CGI or the Clinton Foundation, or harm anyone at all? Readers would find no clear answer in the Times. Instead, its reporters dished out unflattering, largely irrelevant anecdotes about Band and Ira Magaziner, whose work at the Clinton Health Access Initiative has provided vital drugs, tests and medical services to millions of patients across Africa and around the world.

Furthermore, someone told the Times reporters that Band and Magaziner had quarreled about various issues. Plainly, the notion that personal or professional conflict might occur in a worldwide organization with thousands of employees shocked the Times. (But when similarly nasty and pointless newsroom gossip about Jill Abramson erupted in Politico, the top Times editor and her friends felt

deeply offended.) Worse than the reliance on backstairs gossip, however, were the factual errors featured in the Times story, particularly concerning the Clinton Foundation's finances. As President Clinton himself noted in an open letter posted on the foundation website, the article incorrectly described the foundation's financial condition and history — because the reporters didn't understand how nonprofits are required to report their cash flows on IRS document. In his letter, which will interest anyone who wants to understand what he has been doing for the past decade, the former

president explained: When someone makes a multi-year commitment to the Foundation, we have to report it all in the year it was made. In 2005 and 2006 as a result of multi-year commitments, the Foundation reported a surplus of \$102,800,000 though we collected nowhere near that. In later years, as the money came in to cover our budgets, we were required to report the spending but not the cash inflow. Also, if someone makes a commitment that he or she later has to withdraw we are required to report that as a loss, though we never had the money in the first place and didn't need it to meet our budget.

So the foundation budget deficits reported by the Times in 2007 and 2008 were at least partially offset by earlier commitments. Moreover, as President Clinton also notes, he had set aside substantial cash reserves which hedged against the financial crash and recession — leaving him able to maintain the foundation's service to HIV AIDS patients, mothers and children and other vulnerable groups despite an economic slowdown that proved devastating to many charities and businesses.

Such facts scarcely concern Dowd, whose habitual tic is to exaggerate any canard against the Clintons. Inspired by the Times probe, her latest column spilled forth one bizarre assertion after another. "If Americans are worried about money in politics, there is no larger concern than the CLINTON cont. on page 5



Hot fences and little boys!

I only remember visiting greatgrandma Brown 2 times as a kid. She lived in Ravanna, Mo., population 98 (when I was a kid and the

same today). Visiting her was very different from my normal life in Pampa, Texas.

She didn't have any indoor plumbing, so the bathroom facility was the old outhouse behind the house; water had to be hauled from the outside pump on the side of the house; the stove was a

wood stove, no electricity or gas. To be honest I thought all that was way cool when I was a kid. There was one very real downside when we visited Grandma Brown: spankings were with switches from the many trees in her yard. OUCH!

One of my favorite parts of visiting her was lunch. Almost every day we were there I would ask for 50 cents from mom and dad and go to the café on main street; one of only 3 business buildings in town. They served pork tenderloin sandwiches that were AMAZING. I never understood with them tasting so good, why they weren't on the menu of every restaurant, especially those in Pampa. The 50 cents got the sandwich, fries and a Coke.

There were a few kids in town so I didn't have to play by myself. And back in the late 50's you didn't have to worry about kids running all over town playing without adult supervision. That brings me to my most vivid memory at Grandma Brown's.

I think I was about 7 or 8 years old. I was out playing one day with a few of the town kids. We were running all over town, not a great distance in a town with only 98 people. About a block from Grandma Brown's house was a multi-lot place with plush grass and a horse. We always spent a lot of our time watching the horse, feeding him and wishing we could ride him.

One day as supper time grew near I headed out for Grandma Brown's

house. I hadn't been paying very close attention to the tiny wire fence located between me and Grandma's house. As I got close to the fence, I decided I'd just jump over it. As I got to it I put my hand out to push the fence down as I jumped. BAM! The next thing I knew I was on the ground on the other side of the fence and my hand stung bad. Being a town boy, I didn't have much experience with "hot electric fences". I knew what they were, but I wasn't thinking straight that day. I rubbed my hand for a few moments

and then I got this INSANE idea.

I'll bet you know where this story is

I had heard stories about peeing on electric fences, but just thought they were made up to scare little boys and keep them away from the fences. I first looked around to make sure no one was standing near my location, I certainly didn't want any spectators. The coast was clear, I unzipped my jeans, scooted up close to the fence and BOOOM! I was down on the ground again only hurting way more than when my hand got bit. That one brought a bunch of tears to my eyes. I wasn't sure if it really hurt worse, or if the location made it hurt way worse in my mind. I waited until the tears went away and then walked home. I don't remember when the hurting stopped, but it wasn't until later that evening. I never told mom or dad.

What did I learn? 1. Foolishness truly is bound up in the heart of a child. Prov. 22:15 2. Sometimes scary stories that we hear as a kid really are true.

3. If you have a crazy idea, try to get someone else to test it out.

4. Some things hurt so much that not even a pork tenderloin sandwich can make it feel better. And just in case you were wondering, I never tried that experiment again. One time was plenty for me; still hurts to think about it. LOL!
