IT'S RAINING CATS AND DOGS
 Friday's storms bring 2 inches of rain

■ But still in severe drought condition.

Although Friday night's intense thunderstorm brought two inches of rain to Pampa, we are still about three inches behind what would be considered normal accumulation for this time of the year, according to the National Weather Service.

Though yearly averages are not kept for Pampa by the NWS, Amarillo has received 14 inches of rain since Jan. 1.

However, we are still better off when compared to last year when Amarillo only had 11 inches of rain by this date, which was six inches behind the normal yearly rainfall.

In 2011, Amarillo had the lowest yearly rainfall ever recorded in that city — 7 inches.

Despite the growth of weeds everywhere and the breeding of those pesky mosquitoes, we are still in the grips of a "D2," or a severe drought, said Tabitha Seymour, the observing program leader for the NWS in Amarillo.

"As of Sept. 24, nearly all of the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles are under a severe drought," she said. "Some parts of the northwest Panhandle, like around Dalhart, are in an extreme drought. That section hasn't received as much rain as other parts of the Panhandle."

The drought is now in its third year. Friday's thunderstorm brought lots of lightning and wind dust. Flash floods were reported in Gray, Wheeler and Donley counties, Seymour said. "There were motorists stranded in road ways."

PAMPA UNITED WAY: At Work!

While most elementary-aged children consider their school days over at 3:30 p.m., there are those who are enrolled in the Gray County Latchkey program, which is one of 17 Pampa United Way agencies. There is a Latchkey program at each of the four elementary schools that runs from 3:30-5:30 p.m. on school days.

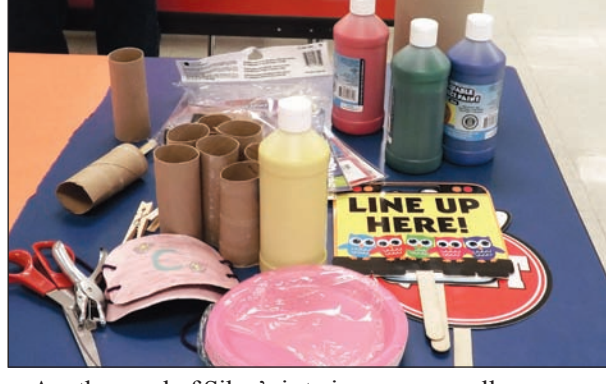
Program Director Chrissie Silva said the program has been in Pampa for more than 20 years.

"I started out as a site director at Austin Elementary last year, and this year they asked me to be the program director," she said.

Now, Silva spends her time throughout the week at each site, making sure they are run as similarly as possible.

"Sometimes I miss seeing the same kids every day, but now I have more kids that I get to see, which is good, too," she said.

On Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, Silva spreads enrichment by spending 40 minutes at each of the four elementary schools. "Deeper enrichment for the students is my goal."



Another goal of Silva's is to increase overall awareness of the program, and she has made a Facebook page in order to raise awareness. Although the program does not currently run through the summer, it is something she has considered starting as well.

When they get settled after school, the students have play and homework centers and a structured project. The project is either art, music or theater and lasts from 30-45 minutes. During this time, children can also get homework help and get some extra practice for the STAAR tests as well. The centers and project are then followed by a 4 p.m. nutritious snack with juice or water. After the snack, the children get to go play outside and then pick-

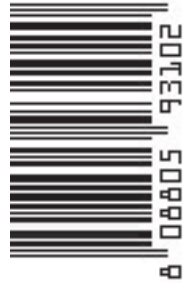

up is any time from 5-5:30 p.m.

Latchkey's mission statement says, "We are ready to help your child grow academically, socially and emotionally. We are here to keep your child safe and learning — even after school hours. The Latchkey staff has been and continues to be committed to the children of Pampa."

The program is based on five platforms: safety, care, socialization, health and enrichment. United Way funds the socialization, health and enrichment platforms by donating \$14,000 to the program each school year. Silva is grateful for the support from United Way, and said that she strives to focus on all five of Latchkey's platforms and believes that they are equally important and beneficial for the children in the program.

For instance, to practice safety, the students enrolled in the program have monthly fire and intruder preparedness drills as well as bi-monthly tornado drills. The 10:1 student to teacher ratio ensures that children are safe. Many days, this ratio is even smaller. This ratio makes all aspects of the program run

smoothly and enables each child to be looked after the way he or she should, Silva said.

On occasion, Latchkey also has guest speakers and talent shows.

When it comes to the care platform, each participating teacher in the program must have 15 hours of training per year outside the program to remain active. Each site director for Latchkey is required to have 30 hours of outside training, and the program director must have 250 hours per year.

Silva said that the teachers for the program are very active with the kids, which builds their socialization skills, another Latchkey platform. Supervisors encourage appropriate behavior and are able to monitor it in a cooperative environment. Silva also said that she thinks it's beneficial for the children to build these skills in the school building because they are still in the mode to learn after the school day is over. Also, the school is where they will be practicing the social skills acquired from the program.

The health platform of the program is enforced by spending at least 20 minutes a day exercising, weather permitting, and healthy snacks are provided for the children as well.

Latchkey promotes enrichment because all teach-

ers and supervisors have some type of background in the activities, whether it be art, music or theater. Silva said that those kids enrolled in the program performed two songs at the interactive United Way Kickoff earlier this year, and she hopes to have them perform again at the Autism Awareness fundraiser in April.

"The kids really enjoy performing, and they did a great job at the United Way Kickoff, so I want to try and get them to perform again," she said.

Enrollment for the Latchkey program has no deadlines, so students can join at any time in the school year. Latchkey currently has 70 children enrolled total at the four elementary schools, and Silva hopes to see this number continue to grow. The enrollment fee for Latchkey is \$25, and daily tuition fees are \$8 a day for one child, \$14 a day for two children, \$18 a day for three children and \$24 a day for four children. Enrollment scholarships based on need are available for those who meet the requirements as well.

Each elementary school has a site director (Austin has two), an assistant, and supervisors to help run the program. There are ten Latchkey employees total.

At Austin Elementary, the site directors are Con-

nie Fulton and Cecilia Kennedy, and they are assisted by Aaron Rodriguez. At Wilson Elementary, Darlene Vickery is the site director and she is assisted by Wandra Coyla. Vicki Blackman is the site director at Travis Elementary, and Rosanna Lewis and Audine Biligri are her assistants. Lastly, at Lamar Elementary, the site director is Mary Denhem, assisted by Lorie Caswell.

There is an executive board for the program, headed by President Judge Kurt Curfman. The board meets the second Tuesday of each month and consists of four parents, four city or community officials and four teachers. Latchkey is still looking for two teachers and two parent volunteers for the board.

Prairie Plains Perspective

There's nothing more valuable than a good teacher

Reading Mattie Wave's obituary stunned me. I thought she had died many years ago, but that was not the case, for this past Sept. 18 she passed away at the age of 99 out California way where she was living close to

her son and one of my best childhood through high school friends, Doug.

At age 64 I can get away with calling her Mattie Wave, whom I have known since my earliest years here in Pampa. Growing up, respectfully she was Mrs. Morgan, and the same when she taught yours truly and others Spanish at PHS

back in the late 1960s. Mattie Wave. What a beautiful name. Mrs. W. A. (Mattie Wave) Morgan, one of the best teachers, I feel, that ever graced the classrooms of Pampa High.

Reading her obit in our newspaper the other day brought forth memories of those days spent in her Spanish classroom where, to say the least, I struggled, and Mattie Wave persevered being the natural teacher that she was.

I recalled the more than one time she would personally call my parents to explain to them I wasn't performing up to snuff in her class.

By setting aside fun and games, learning could take place and my grades would improve.

I don't know if teachers do such today, but back

then they did make those teacher to parent calls, and of course by doing so, created some rather tenuous times between parents and their progeny.

I also recall when over to the Morgan's house doing extra curricular things with her son Doug, not once did she put me on the spot about my Spanish speaking abilities.

That was Mattie Wave Morgan, one of the kindest of teachers and parent of a friend I ever knew, however, if Mattie Wave got wind of us acting up, she was always forthcoming with advice on how a teenager should, in light of one Sheriff Rufe Jordan, stay away from trouble.

When starting my professional career in San Antonio I did not realize how much Spanish I learned

from her teaching (I took Spanish 1 and 2 over a two-year time frame) till being surrounded in a city where the population is 70 percent Hispanic and working a pharmaceutical sales territory that extended down to McAllen and the Rio Grande Valley that included Laredo and Del Rio where to this very day, doctors and nurses converse in Spanish first and English second.

For yours truly, it was sink or swim when in Rome do as the Romans stuff. I was surprised how Mattie Wave's Spanish classes had hung around my brain's cells. Suffice to say, understanding and speaking enough Spanish to aid in my sales calls made for a successful sales business. Muchas gracias, Mattie Wave.

During her memorial service while sitting and reminiscing, those days in Mattie Wave's Spanish classes, a thought occurred to me about teachers and their service to students, the thought being, if there is any national month or day of recognition.

I mean, for any man or woman to become a teacher in this day and time takes some chutzpah, and it takes even more grit and determination to make teaching a lasting career choice.

Of the 250-plus nationally named celebrations played out over 12 months of awareness and over 360 national awareness days for some type nonsense in 2013, there was none honoring teachers or the profession.

Somehow, that little

bit of knowledge gained by performing a tad of research does not surprise me in the aspect of the America I know today.

It is because of teachers and human beings made in the mold of Mattie Wave Morgan that there should be a national teacher awareness month or day, for as far as my thinking goes, nothing is more worthwhile and worthy of recognition than choosing to be a teacher.

'Welfare' for disabled rich kids

Q: I have a neighbor who is in his early 50s. He is a pilot for a major airline and makes pretty good money. He and his wife have several children, one of whom has a rather severe case of Down syndrome. I have heard that this 21-year-old son is collecting about \$2,000 per month in welfare benefits from Social Security. Don't get me wrong. I would never want to trade places with these people. But I am just wondering how rich people qualify for welfare benefits? And I'm also wondering why this kid is getting Social Security when his parents aren't even close to Social Security age?

A: Let me set you straight on a number of points. First, your neighbor's son is not getting Social Security. He is probably getting a Supplemental Security Income disability payment. Second, he is not receiving anywhere near \$2,000 per month. It might be as much as \$800, but is probably closer to around \$500 in monthly SSI payments.

Our country's primary safety net for low-income elderly and disabled people is the Supplemental Security Income program. SSI is managed by the Social Security Administration, but it is not paid for out of Social Security taxes. It is funded by general tax revenues. However, the fact that SSA runs the program, coupled with a confusing name that causes folks to believe it is a supplemental Social Security payment, leads most people to think of SSI as a Social Security benefit. I can't emphasize enough that SSI is NOT part of Social Security.

What SSI does is pay a small monthly stipend to folks over age 65 who are poor, and to disabled adults and children who are poor. While your neighbor's son was under age 18, he would not have been eligible for SSI disability benefits.

That's because the father's income would have been taken into consideration, and it would have prevented the child from qualifying for what is in effect a welfare payment.

But once the child turns 18, he is considered a legal adult. And as such, the parent's income is no longer considered when deciding his eligibility for SSI payments. So, assuming this 21 year old young disabled man doesn't have any other income and doesn't have much in the way of assets in his name, he would get a monthly SSI disability check. The amount of the check can vary from one state to another, but it is never much more than about \$800 per month. And based on my knowledge of the intricacies of the SSI payment structure, my hunch is your neighbor's son is getting about \$500.

I am not going to weigh in too heavily on the argument over whether or not the adult children of rich or even middle class parents should qualify for SSI (i.e., welfare) benefits - although I am inclined to believe that parents caring for severely disabled children should get some help from the government. But I can tell you that many people over the years have objected to these provisions of the law. And I would like to share the true story of one of those (maybe not so "conscientious") objectors.

About 30 years ago, I was working in the Social Security office in the biggest city of a large western state. It was one of the so-called red states. A certain Congressman from that state was as right-wing as a red-state conservative could get. He was popular

and was elected over and over again on what was essentially an "I will get the government off your back" platform. Or to put that another way, he was tea party long before there was a real tea party. When he mentioned government programs, he spewed out the words hand-out and welfare as though he was spitting snake poison out of his mouth. Even though I didn't agree with his politics, I respected his right to voice his opinions.

Tragically, his 19-year-old son was in a major traffic accident that left him a quadriplegic. And a few weeks later, one of the Congressman's aides was sitting at my desk in the Social Security office inquiring about any government benefits that might have been available for the paralyzed young man. I explained that he probably would be eligible for SSI disability benefits. I helped the aide fill out the forms, which he took to the father to sign. Several months later, the son of this wealthy and very conservative government-bashing Congressman was getting a monthly SSI, or welfare, check from the federal government.

Now, I normally would have been just fine with that. This man's family had suffered a crippling tragedy, and I'm sure their medical and other bills were piling up. And I would have guessed that the Congressman was very happy that not only was his son getting a small monthly cash stipend to help defray the costs of his care, but he was also getting Medicaid coverage. (SSI benefits come with automatic Medicaid eligibility.

Medicaid is our country's health insurance program for poor elderly and disabled people.)

But what happened next really surprised me. A couple months later, the Congressman was running for re-election. Almost everyone in the state knew that his son was paralyzed, but no one knew he was getting SSI/welfare. One might have hoped that the Congressman would have seen the light and perhaps told voters about the help his son was getting and explained how he now understood that sometimes government programs were necessary and were there to help people out in tough situations. But that's not what happened. Instead, he was out there on the campaign trail spouting his usual rhetoric about government waste and welfare fraud and promising that he would continue the fight to stop the growth of big government. And guess what? He was re-elected in a landslide!

Few snaps in 2nd half lead to Cowboys loss

SAN DIEGO (AP) — The Dallas Cowboys didn't score any points in the second half Sunday because they simply didn't have the ball enough.

Philip Rivers threw for 401 yards and three touchdowns, including a 56-yarder to Antonio Gates that helped the San Diego Chargers beat the Cowboys 30-21.

The Chargers (2-2) blew late leads in their two losses. On Sunday, they scored the final 20 points to beat Dallas (2-2).

"When you don't have a lot of possessions in the second half, it's not an excuse, but you have to capitalize on every opportunity we get," said running back DeMarco Murray, who was held to 70 yards after gaining 175 against St. Louis a week earlier.

"We knew they had a good offense. We knew they were a good team. We just have to get better."

San Diego trailed 21-10 when Nick Novak started the comeback with a 42-yard field goal as the first-half clock expired.

The Chargers took the

opening kickoff of the second half and Rivers moved them 80 yards, capping the drive with a 13-yard pass to Woodhead to pull to 21-20.

The way Rivers ran the offense, the Cowboys didn't have a chance to come back. They ran only seven offensive plays in the third quarter.

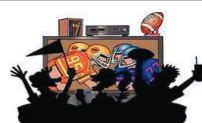

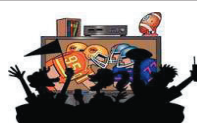

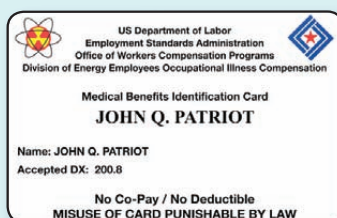

Manning leads Broncos' 52-20 rout of Eagles

DENVER (AP) — Forget fast-break football. This was steel-cold efficiency.

Peyton Manning made quick work of the Philadelphia Eagles in a warp-speed game between the NFL's top two offenses, both of which like to snap the ball quickly.

The Denver Broncos scored more points than they ever had in their 54-year history on Sunday, blowing out the Eagles 52-20 behind Manning's four touchdown throws and two special teams scores.

"Might have to give old Thunder an IV after this one," Manning said of the white Arabian gelding who trots around the Sports

Authority Field following touchdowns. If there's any IV bags left, that is.

With two TD passes each to Demaryius Thomas and Wes Welker, Manning completed all but a half dozen of his 34 throws for 327 yards.

He didn't even step on the field in the fourth quarter and cooled his cleats on the sideline for a 12-minute stretch in the first half, no less. Just another day in the life of Manning, whose 16 TD passes are the most in the first month of a season, besting the previous mark of 14 set by Don Meredith in 1966 and tied by Kurt Warner in 1999.

Manning also joined Milt Plum in 1960 as the only quarterbacks to throw that many touchdown passes without an interception.

"We have high expectations for ourselves and want

to go out there and score a lot of points," Welker said. "We were able to do that today."

Just as they have all season, piling up 49, 41, 37 and 52 points, thanks mostly to Manning, who's off to the best start of his storied career and helped Denver out-gain Michael Vick and the Eagles 472 yards to 450.

Rangers force AL wild-card tiebreaker, beat Angels

ARLINGTON (AP) — The Texas Rangers had to keep winning to keep playing.

After seven wins in a row, they have to do it one more time to get into the playoffs.

Craig Gentry had a key two-run single, Geovany Soto had a tiebreaking RBI double and a solo homer, and the Rangers beat the Los Angeles Angels 6-2 Sunday to force a one-game tiebreaker for the second AL wild-card spot.

"They showed heart, fight, gut — any other adjective you want to find," Rangers manager Ron Washington said. The Rangers (91-71), who

began September with the AL West lead before a 5-15 slide, added game No. 163 to the regular season.

They will host Tampa Bay on Monday night in baseball's first wild-card tiebreaker since 2007.

The winner plays two days later at wild-card leader Cleveland for a berth against Boston in the division series.

"You can't say enough. Just the fight, the character of this team," Gentry said. "From being about as low as we could possibly be and almost everybody probably counting us out, and to come home and play the way we have."

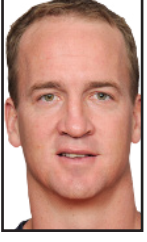
Rookie left-hander Martin Perez (10-5, 3.55 ERA) starts for Texas on Monday against Tampa Bay and lefty David Price (9-8).

About the same time Tampa Bay wrapped up its 7-6 win at Toronto to neces-

Los Angeles quickly tied the game in the sixth against major league strikeout leader Yu Darvish, but the Rangers went ahead to stay in the bottom half on Soto's two-out double.

AMARILLO — The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service has hired Jourdan Bell as a new agronomy specialist for the High Plains region and Tim Steffens as a new assistant professor of rangeland resource management.

Bell, who will replace longtime agronomist Dr. Brent Bean, has spent much of the past 20 years working at the Conservation Production Research Laboratory near Bushland, first as a student technician with Texas A&M AgriLife Research under Bean, and then with the U.S. Department of Agriculture-Agricultural Research Service. A native of Amarillo, Bell offers strong agricultural roots in the Texas Panhandle, as well as excellent training and practical experience in agricultural research, said Dr. Travis Miller, AgriLife Extension agronomist and Texas A&M University soil and crop sciences associate department head in College Station.

"We are excited to have her join the AgriLife team, filling a vital position for the Texas High Plains,"

Miller said. Bell will officially start Jan. 1, after meeting the qualifications for her doctorate from Texas A&M University in December. She will be an assistant professor and have a joint appointment with both AgriLife Extension and AgriLife Research.

"We believe Jourdan Bell is exceptionally well prepared to take on the role of research and Extension project leader in agronomy and soil and crop sciences at the Texas A&M AgriLife Research and Extension Center in Amarillo," said Dr. John Sweeten, resident director at the Center.

"As a lifelong resident of the Texas Panhandle, my research interests have been driven by challenges faced by local producers; specifically, soil-plant-water relationships with regards to efficient use of irrigation, rainfall and stored soil water in both irrigated and dryland crops," Bell said.

Dr. Tim Steffens will begin Oct. 1 as the new assistant professor of rangeland resource management, with a dual appointment in the West Texas A&M University department of agricultural sciences and the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service.

Steffens, a native of Slaton, will be located on the West Texas A&M campus, according to Dr. Dean Hawkins, the university's agricultural sciences department head.

In this newly created position, Steffens will teach undergraduate and graduate courses at WTAMU,

as well as deliver AgriLife Extension programs and conduct applied research to share with constituents in the Texas Panhandle, Hawkins said.

"We are excited to have Dr. Steffens join our faculty," he said. "His expertise in range science will expand our course offerings and form a platform of deliverable products we can offer the grazing-livestock producer. This partnership will further strengthen the working partnership between WTAMU and Texas A&M AgriLife Extension in providing resources for the students and industries

we serve."

Dr. Robert Lyons, assistant department head with the Texas A&M University department of ecosystem science and management, said, "We are very excited about having Tim as part of our unit to provide an Extension range presence in the Panhandle."

"My professional life has been devoted to integrated approaches to improve rangeland resources for livestock production, wildlife habitat and watershed function in different climates and rangeland types," Steffens said.

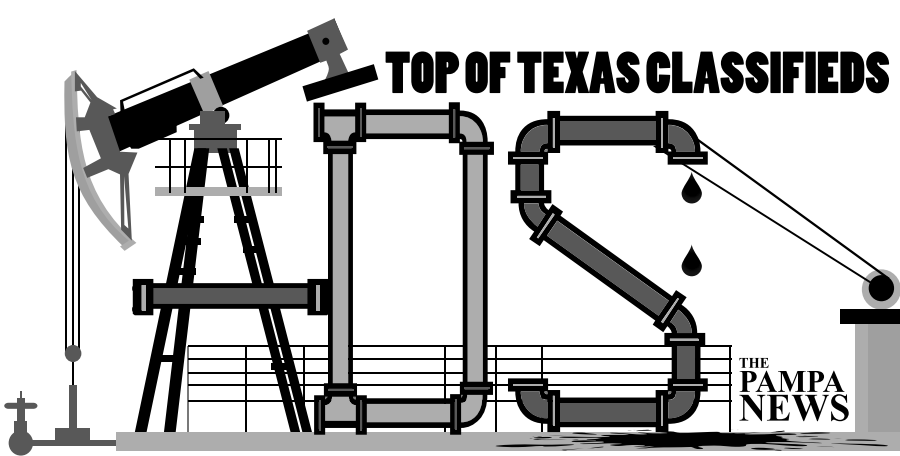

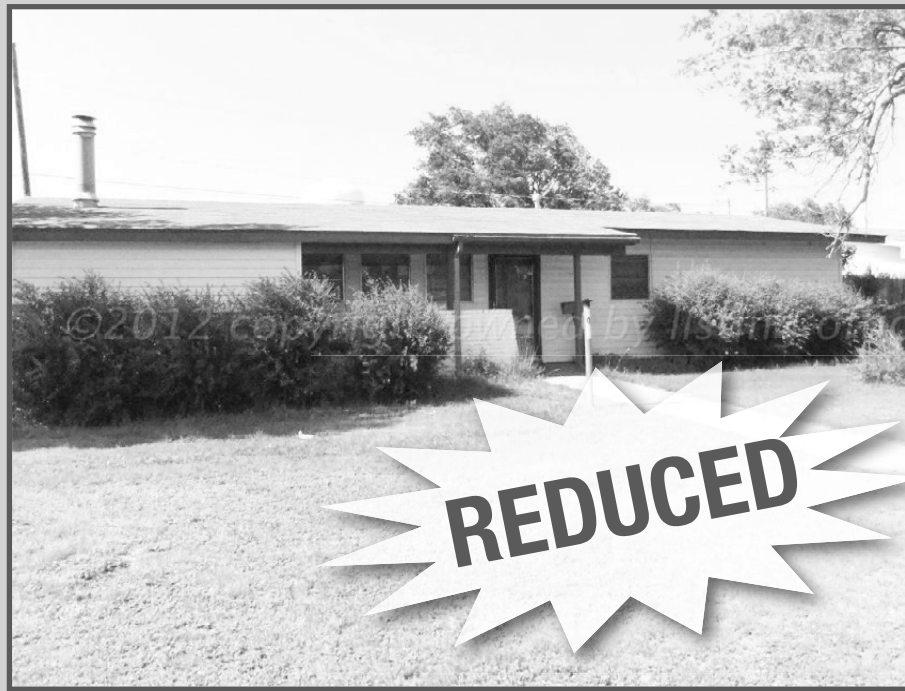

I am OUTRAGED by his insensitivity and lack of love. She says she doesn't want to leave him. My question to her is, why not? She deserves better.

I am a cancer survivor who was diagnosed with breast cancer seven months after I was married. Prior to my decision to have a radical mastectomy, I offered my husband the chance to leave. (After all, one doesn't expect "worse" to come so soon after the wedding.) The prospect of children, which we had discussed and was important to us, was uncertain because of my subsequent chemotherapy. My husband didn't hesitate. He said, "You would not leave me. We will adopt."

On our first wedding anniversary I was bald, and he treated me to a beautiful, romantic getaway.

Although I did have reconstruction, it was a long process. He was supportive from day one.

Fifteen years later, I was diagnosed with breast cancer again. I had another radical mastectomy followed by chemo and reconstruction. Abby, my husband again made me feel beautiful even when I didn't. There are men out there who define a woman not by the size of her breasts, but by the beauty of her heart. — SURVIVOR IN NATICK, MASS.

DEAR SURVIVOR: I want to thank you and the many breast cancer survivors who wrote me — and their supportive spouses — for telling me your personal stories. Readers, I am printing this to remind you that October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Read on:

DEAR ABBY: I had to write to "Anonymous." I kept hoping my husband of 20 years would change his mind and accept my new body.

However, because he could not, I chose to divorce him and it liberated me.

At first, I felt that if the one person who was supposed to care couldn't look at me, then no other man would either. I was wrong. After five years of dating, I never once encountered a man who was as insensitive as my husband had been. I have now found the man of my dreams.

In some respects, my "medical adventures," as I refer to them, were the best thing that ever happened. They enabled me to see my ex for who he really was, and find a man who truly IS a man. — GOT A NEW SET AND A NEW LIFE

DEAR ABBY: Breast cancer doesn't ruin your life unless you let it.

I am 66 years old. When I was in high school, my mom had a breast removed. My parents and I just took it in stride. It didn't define us. Dad adored her.

Mom would come in dressed up for whatever reason and ask, "Am I even?" because the "falsies" then were made of foam and were lightweight. She kept the vacation money pinned to it. She

made a few new friends faint when she used it as a pin cushion. Dad died at 90, and Mom died the following year.

Mom could have helped "Anonymous." She would have cut her a slice of homemade pie, poured a cup of coffee, sat down at the table and just talked to her. Women need other women. "Anonymous" should find a friend who has gone through the same thing and talk and pray. She needs both. — EARLENE IN TEXAS

DEAR ABBY: My wife went through a lumpectomy, chemotherapy, then radiation. During that time she went to work every day, except when she had a treatment.

Of course, I have a visual reminder of what she went through when we share an intimate moment, but she has had to deal with it every day of her life since then. USC fires Lane Kiffin; Orgeron is interim coach

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Lane Kiffin triumphantly flew in from Tennessee nearly four years ago as the unlikely choice to extend Southern California's football renaissance. When Kiffin's Trojans trudged home to that same airport early Sunday morning after another loss, athletic director Pat Haden couldn't wait another minute to end the divisive coach's tumultuous tenure.

USC fired Kiffin hours after a 62-41 loss at Arizona State that dropped the Trojans to 3-2 overall and 0-2 in the Pac-12. The loss was the seventh in 11 games for a powerhouse program still struggling under the cumulative effect of NCAA sanctions, but unwilling to accept such a dramatic decline.

Kiffin ran a competent program despite the loss of 30 scholarships over a three-season stretch that ends in 2015. But Kiffin even acknowledged he wasn't given a fair hand along the curve, but he failed on the curve, too." The Trojans are off this week before returning against Arizona, giving Orgeron time to evaluate what can be done to salvage the season with the toughest matchups on USC's schedule still looming.

"It's never the perfect time to do these things, but I thought it was the right time," Haden said.

Ed Orgeron will be USC's interim head coach for the final eight games of the season before Haden chooses a permanent successor for one of college football's highest-profile jobs. Orgeron, Kiffin's assistant head coach and top recruiter, is the former Mississippi head coach.

Haden broke the news to Kiffin in a 3 a.m. meeting at the Trojans' private airport terminal, but not before a 45-minute chat in which Kiffin tried to change Haden's mind. Haden didn't hire Kiffin, but had been firmly behind the coach in public until Saturday, when the Trojans matched the most points al-
