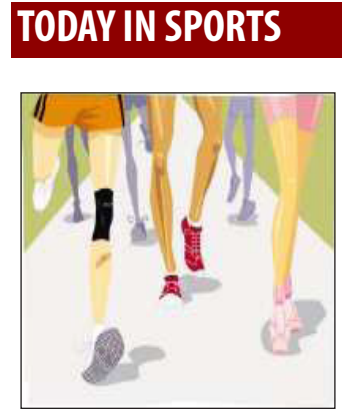

Most competitors rarely get a chance to meet an athlete who has reached the highest level in his or her respective sport. For the students at Madeline Graves Dance Studio and Gymnastics, the opportunity to work with a 2012 Olympian who finished sixth in the world came this past weekend.

When parents were dropping students off on Saturday, many would ask, "Where is the Olympian?" Everyone was expecting someone in Olympic or Team USA garb and fitting a "larger than life" description. But the trampoline competitor in the 2012 Olympics, Savannah Vinsant, was in a T-shirt and blue sweat pants. To Madeline Graves, her humility and "girl next door" appearance was one of the qualities which made her a great example for the young girls attending the clinic.

"Her sincere [acts], her moral standards, her excitement of just being a person and being able to accomplish [what she has]," Graves said. "To me having someone down to earth who will work with the children is amazing."

Vinsant's journey to the Olympics is what she drew from to teach the girls positive qualities. Believing in yourself and teamwork are just a couple of the attributes Vinsant described.

"I think just my Olympic experience," Vinsant said. "Just the journey, going from a young girl with a big dream and coming here. Just the whole journey has been so amazing. It has taught me so much as a person, and as an adult. Definitely some life lessons learned there that I can teach these young girls. Share with them to say 'Hey, no matter what you believe in, whatever dreams you have, go for them. You never know what's going to happen, you have to believe in yourself.' I think that is something they can get out of me, if nothing else this weekend. Just to truly believe in yourselves."

Vinsant started with the ba-

sics: stretching, balance drills and several different tumbling drills. But she did several other performance techniques.

"I am going to teach them some fundamentals of gymnastics," Vinsant said. "Of course, some trampoline skills since that is my sport. I am mostly going to teach them some leadership skills and how to take responsibility of a team and what it's like to come together and be a part of something that is so amazing. They are so lucky to have a facility like this here in Pampa and allow them to come together as a community. They need to build and learn leadership skills. Just teach them that when you're having a bad day or you have a dream or a goal, work for it. Don't give up. You have to keep working and keep pursuing."

Vinsant, who turned 20 years old in June, started training for the Olympics in 2000. By 2012 she competed in the Summer Olympics. Not only was she the first U.S. athlete to qualify for finals, but she was the youngest female competitor at the games and she finished sixth.

She told the students during the lessons that when she was asked if she was disappointed with sixth place at the Olympics, she said she was happy

just to do something nobody had ever done.

Vinsant's favorite Olympic memory, besides the day she competed, was opening ceremonies. Unexpectedly, she was the first of her group to go on the march out of the tunnel and she jests she had no idea what she was doing when she was told to "Go."

Graves would like to bring Vinsant back to Pampa next year and said she has other coaches in mind with expertise in different areas.

"Because we do dance, cheer and gymnastics, I bring in a cheer coach who was with the Dallas Cowboys cheerleaders," Graves said. "I have four coaches here who work with me. My granddaughter is moving back (here). So we have plenty of expertise to share the children."

A United Way agency

The Pampa Salvation Army receives funding from the Pampa United Way, which is in the midst of its 2013 campaign.

This year the Christian-based organization received \$22,500 and has applied for that much for 2014.

While the number of homeless people in Pampa is small compared to other communities, there are many families on the verge of becoming homeless, said Martha Higdon, who with her husband Franko is a co-captain for the local chapter.

"We do homeless prevention to try keep families in their homes," she said. "We can help with rent, utilities and prescriptions."

So that their resources are evenly distributed, the local Salvation Army can only provide financial assistance to a family once a year.

If an individual or family does become homeless, there is a shelter at the Amarillo Salvation Army, Higdon said.

The Pampa Salvation Army is partners with the Boys & Girls Club, providing within its four walls after-school programs during the school year and all-day programs for children in the summer.

The age groups range from kindergarten to age 12.

The cost for the after-school program for a child is \$30 per month, but arrangements can be made if a family cannot afford to pay.

Activities include arts, crafts, music, character building and fellowship.

Boat capsizes; 30 people rescued

MIAMI (AP) — A 45-foot boat capsized Sunday in waters near Miami, tossing 30 people into the sea during one of the city's busiest boating days, authorities said. All of those on board were rescued and no one was hurt.

The catamaran began taking on water near the Miami Seaquarium and Good Samaritans, the Coast Guard, state wildlife officials and commercial boats helped pluck people out of the water within minutes. A dog that was on the boat was also saved.

"It was an incredible effort," Coast Guard spokesman Ryan Doss said.

It wasn't immediately why the boat started taking on water. Doss said he didn't know how many people the boat could hold.

A preliminary investigation indicated the boat was privately owned by someone who may have been charging people to taxi them to a party on Nixon Beach, Florida Fish and Wildlife spokesman Jorge Pino said. The agency is investigating what caused the boat to capsize.

The catamaran is still partially submerged in 6 to 8 feet of water.

Will this season be another '0 and 10, do it again?'

Friday Night Lights! The decades-long tradition of home town high school football seasons still reigns

supreme all across this great state. When traveling Texas in my professional career, I always took note upon entering a town's city limit the ever present sign or bill board extolling that community's high school(s) winning athletic teams, of which, their school's number of football championships always headlining the marquis. It is still that way with me in my retirement, particularly when I travel by auto down to New Braunfels and pass through the heart of Texas with its tradition-rich small towns. I like reading such high

school accomplishments for one very prominent reason. My hometown of Pampa, in my 64 years of existence, has produced nary a one state championship high school football team. Am I jealous of other communities' high schools and their winning traditions? Damned right I am! And I know others are as well.

"0 and 10, do it again!" was the snickered and laughed at little "cheer" by many a student including yours truly from my senior year at Dear Ole Pampa High, where the 1968 fighting Harvesters football team did just that — racking up an 0 and 10 for the season.

The prior year 1967 had seen the Harvesters' football team go 5 and 5 from a group of players who produced five Division 1 college football scholarship offers, including two who went on to play

professionally in the NFL. Those were an impressive number of recruitments from a 5 and 5 team, and had it not been for the coach, could have, should have gone much farther in the playoffs. Course, back then, winning and losing was how it should be accounted for today, but isn't, for second place teams stayed home from district playoffs. Athletic competition should always be, first and foremost, about winning.

With much trepidation, I and others around Pampa are sensing another 0 and 10 football season for Pampa High School which ultimately, befalls a malaise upon the entire community.

It's the "tradition" word rearing its ugly head.

One of the questions floating around morning coffee groups about the 2013 Harvester football team is the apparent lack

of motivation from a team that has been walloped of late by schools from much smaller cities. A 3A team getting significantly thumped by a 2A team used to be an uncommon event, but not with Pampa High. At what point of time in a team's season does it take for the coach to realize his game plans aren't working, that change needs to come and come quickly?

Is it the student athletes who are to blame for Pampa High's dismal gridiron record? What is it from coaching that is not motivating these young men to give it all they have? Losing a game by a point, a field goal or a single touchdown is worthy of calling such a good game. But continuous losses by 20- to 30-point-plus margins are what they are, nothing but blowout routs. Again, the goal of any competition is to win, though that feat is a

tad difficult to accomplish when the home team is down by 40 at the half. To base an entire team's goal on winning one district game in order to make the playoffs, and to put a losing season of routs behind them just to move on to bi-district, is utter nonsense. That is the state of Texas high school football today when losing teams are able to go to playoffs. And, the nonsense of how you played the game is what matters, particularly in a total rout, is nothing but bilge.

The other question floating around Pampa is what does it take for a coach to look at himself and his staff and come to the realization that change needs to occur and occur quickly, that the needed change is the coach and coaching staff. Grant you, Texas high school football isn't

and should never be like college or the NFL where non producing coaches are let go by administrators weary of earfuls from alumna associations or an owner worried about empty stadium seats. However, Pampa High's football crisis in the aspect of coaching, is unique.

The past several years, Pampa High School football teams have progressively gotten worse. At what point in time does it take for a coach to realize it's not working and give up that duty?

Two in custody for shooting at Tulsa event

TULSA, Okla. (AP) — Gunfire that left five people injured at a traditional Hmong New Year's festival rattled a peaceful, tight-knit east Tulsa community, where some feared Sunday the rampage could deter others from attending upcoming cultural celebrations.

"It's really sad because a lot of people do not feel safe to go to the other New Year's celebrations. I know there are people who don't want to attend that anymore," said Joua Xiong, who attended Saturday's celebration along with hundreds of other Hmong people and heard the gunfire break out. "It's very sad because this is the only time we really get to embrace our culture and unite as one."

"And I know a lot of other people will not come (to the Oct. 26-27 event) because of that," she said.

Hmong are an Asian ethnic group hailing from countries including Laos, China, Vietnam and Thailand. The Hmong population in Tulsa is between 3,000 and 4,000. Many Hmong have traveled to Tulsa from across the country during recent years seeking jobs.

Two men have been taken into custody and face multiple charges in the shooting of five people at Saturday's festival, authorities said Sunday. Authorities were

holding 21-year-old Boonmee Lee and 19-year-old Meng Lee, both of Tulsa. Each faces five counts of shooting with intent to kill plus firearms charges.

It was not clear from jail records whether each had an attorney. An arraignment is pending.

Tulsa police spokesman Capt. Steve Odom said a gun was recovered but that it will have to be tested to see if it is linked to the Saturday night shooting. Odom said the alleged shooters and the victims were all Hmong and that there was "probably a relationship" between the men charged and the victims.

The suspects were arrested shortly after the attack, which happened about 8 p.m. A police helicopter that was in the area spotted a car driving away from the scene with its headlights off and notified officers on the ground, who pulled it over.

The suspects had thrown clothes and a semi-automatic handgun believed to have been used in the attack out of the vehicle, police said.

A witness at the party described the chaotic scene, as people lined up to get dinner were sent running and ducking for cover when the shots rang out. There were at least 200 people at the celebration, which festival-goers likened to a Thanksgiving

celebration in America.

For Xiong, who was walking with her family to get dinner Saturday night at the festival, she heard a loud 'pop' sound, but didn't think anything of it at first, believing it was a balloon.

"Then I realized we didn't have any balloons over there, and then everyone started standing up and taking cover," she recalled in an interview Sunday with The Associated Press. "Some people were crying already, and that scared us."

Xiong said Sunday she did not know the two alleged gunmen and questioned why they showed up at the party.

"I've never seen them in my life," she said. "They really don't have common

Hmong names, either," she said. "I don't know if they were from out of town or what."

Spokeswomen for the two Tulsa hospitals where the victims were transported said they could not release information on the condition of the wounded Sunday, citing the ongoing police investigation.

But Xiathao Moua, the president of the Hmong American Association of Oklahoma, Inc., said he visited the two hospitals Sunday morning and said even though the victims sustained injuries from the shooting, they are expected to live. He would not elaborate further on the nature of the injuries to the victims, citing privacy concerns.

Pasture, range, forage insurance deadline

AMARILLO — The deadline is nearing for Pasture, Range and Forage Insurance, designed to provide livestock and hay producers protection against acreage losses, said DeDe Jones, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service risk management specialist in Amarillo.

The 2014 sign-up and acreage reporting deadline for this program is Nov. 15, and notices of premiums due will be sent by July 1, Jones said.

“Insurance is a critical component in producers’ risk management portfolios during periods of drought or uncertainty,” she said. “This policy benefited many cattle producers around the Panhandle in 2011 and 2012 due to the low rainfall conditions.”

Payment is not determined by individual damages, but rather area losses based on a grid system, Jones explained. Producers can select any portion of acres to insure, but they must also choose a minimum of two two-month intervals or a maximum of six two-month

intervals per year to insure. Coverage levels between 70 and 90 percent are available, she said. Once coverage is selected, the producer chooses a productivity factor between 60 and 150 percent. The productivity factor is a percentage of the established county base value for forage.

The base value is a standard rate published by the Risk Management Agency for each county. It is calculated based on the estimated per-acre cost of grazing, Jones said. For example, Hansford County’s value is \$8.11 per acre.

She said Texas uses a rainfall index to determine the insurance coverage. The rainfall index uses National Oceanic and Atmospheric Climate Prediction Center data and a 12-by-12 mile grid system.

A timeless flick based on a best-seller

Two words; Tom Clancy. This movie was the result of Clancy's first writing effort that he began in 1984. "The Hunt for Red October" was released just eight years later in 1990; made on a budget of \$30 million and bringing in \$200,512,643 at the box-office.

Sean Connery stars as Soviet Submarine Captain Marko Ramius who has been given command of the brand new submarine with a super-secret propulsion system called the "Caterpillar Drive". The sub also has some 20 multi-warhead nuclear missiles aboard. Ramius, who is Lithuanian by birth, is horrified by the potential of the ship and the communist politics that control it.

The captain and his hand-picked officers decide to steal the submarine on her maiden voyage and make a mad run for freedom, to America. The entire Soviet Navy goes after them, trying to kill them and sink the submarine rather than letting it fall into Ameri-

can hands. The communists have their ambassador ask for the help of the U.S. Navy in tracking and destroying their erstwhile sub, saying that the rogue captain plans to attack the United States single-handedly.

Jack Ryan, played by Alec Baldwin, is a CIA analyst who has met Captain Ramius and believes he is a noble and good man who wants to defect. Ryan is given a small window of opportunity to prove his theory before the U.S. Navy joins in on the kill.

I asked ten of my movie making friends and actors to re-watch this movie and rate it on the five-star scale. I also asked several normal people and family, ten of them in total, to do the same.

Filmmakers and actors gave it five stars. Normal people gave it four stars.

Clancy was a master of the espionage thriller with 17 best-selling novels and over 100 million units in print. I've read several of his books and seen several of his movies. It doesn't get any better than Red October. I am particularly grateful for the way that we see good guys on both sides of the issue. The U.S. is portrayed in a favor-

able and patriotic light. How American filmmakers could do otherwise always confounds me.

Yes, the U.S. has a wart or two, but we are the standard and the bastion of freedom and liberty in the world. That was expressed eloquently by Sam Neill's character; the Soviet sub's first officer, who wanted to raise rabbits with a loving (and round) woman in Montana. He also had a dream to experience what it was like to be able to drive from state to state as one wished without having to have "papers."

About the time the movie came out it was pretty much a given that Ronald Reagan had beaten the USSR into submission and it was dissolving. The "Iron Curtain" was crumbling and satellite states were declaring their independence. This neces-

sitated a little clarification in the opening scene of the film "In 1984, shortly before Gorbachev came to power, a typhoon class submarine surfaced just south of the Grand Banks. It then sank in deep waters..."

I saw this movie when it came out, and I just finished watching it again about 20 minutes ago. It is as relevant and exciting now as it was in 1990. I give it five stars.

Harris, depleted D lead Dallas past Redskins 31-16

ARLINGTON (AP) — Dwayne Harris and a “no-name group” of Dallas defenders made Tony Romo’s job easy.

Harris returned a punt 86 yards for a touchdown and set up another score with a 90-yard kickoff return, and a depleted defensive line forced a key fumble from Robert Griffin III, leading the Cow-

boys to a 31-16 victory against the Washington Redskins on Sunday night.

Kyle Wilber was the name behind the biggest defensive play for Dallas. He hit Griffin from behind on a sack and took the

ball away, putting the Cowboys just 3 yards from a clinching score in the fourth quarter.

“The ‘no-name group.’ We’re talking about the defensive line,” said Cowboys owner Jerry Jones, who had plenty of reasons to cel-

brate his 71st birthday. “They fought all the way through it. As far as I’m concerned, they need a game ball tonight.”

Romo had just 170 yards passing a week after he threw a costly interception to end a 506-yard performance, setting up the winning field goal for Denver in a wild 51-48 loss to the

Broncos.

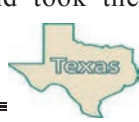
The Cowboys said all week they had Romo’s back as their quarterback faced another round of criticism over late-game flubs.

Harris showed it with 222 return yards, as did Wilber and the rest of a defensive line that lost DeMarcus Ware to a quad injury in the second

quarter.

“Dwayne did a great job and almost allowed us to kind of just sit over there as an offensive unit and rack up all his yards as if we did it without doing much work,” said Romo, who made Harris’ long kickoff return pay off with his only touchdown pass of the night a week after throwing five.

Pampa Harvesters finish third Saturday at West Texas A&M

CANYON — The Pampa cross country teams both finished in third place at the Lathrop Memorial Buffalo Stampede at West Texas A&M University in Canyon Saturday in the final regular season meet.

Senior Alex Maruffo, a former individual regional qualifier, led the boys' team with a third place individual finish in a field of 72 runners. Maruffo, who shared the lead with eventual winner Derek Wieck of Hartley and District 1-3A rival Emory Lobley of Dalhart

appeared destined for second before Lobley passed him on the final uphill with less than 100 meters remaining in the 5000 meter race.

Wieck won in 17 minutes 12 seconds with Lobley clocked in 17:23 and Maruffo in third in 17:24.

"We need to get him (Lobley) at district," Pampa coach Mark Elms said of Maruffo who hopes to win the district title in his final chance.

Bushland won the boys'

team title with 40 points followed by Dalhart with 51, Pampa 98, Friona 117, Ascension Academy with 125 points, Hartley with 125 and Texline with 197.

Nate Ferguson (19:15) and Jose Hernandez (19:18) finished in 21st and 22nd respectively for the Harvesters, and Luis Hernandez in 24th with a time of 19:48 and Tyler Whitson in 41st with a time of 20:33 completed the Pampa scorers.

In the girls race, district

Cards try to extend another city's October drought

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Los Angeles Dodgers are hoping to win their first World Series title in a quarter-century. To do it, they'll have to get past baseball's big roadblock.

In the past two years, the St. Louis Cardinals extended even longer droughts in Pittsburgh and Washington.

And in 2011, the Cardinals wrecked the party for the Texas Rangers, the franchise that moved from D.C. to the Lone Star State four decades ago.

Former St. Louis slugger Mark McGwire, now the Dodgers batting coach, said he wasn't surprised his old club stands in the way of a title for his new team.

"You know what? I think everybody figured you're going to have to go through St. Louis to get to the World Series," McGwire said before the start of the NL championship series. "Here we are."

And not doing too well, so far. The Cardinals led the Dodgers 2-0 in the best-of-seven matchup going into Game 3 Monday at Dodger Stadium.

To fans in other cities, it must seem unfair. While they've been waiting for generations in Kansas City, Seattle and elsewhere for that special season, the Cardinals seem to show up every October.

Making their 10th playoff appearance in 14 years, the Cardinals are in the NLCS for the third straight season. They're looking for their third World Series championship since 2006.

And along the way, they keep breaking hearts.

Meanwhile, the Pirates haven't won a World Series since 1979, when Willie Stargell and the gang grooved to the Sister Sledge disco hit "We Are Family" and defeated the Baltimore Orioles in seven

games. A victory by the Cardinals over the Pirates in the decisive Game 5 of the NL division series ensured that Pittsburgh will go at least 35 years between crowns.

Last year, the Nationals were hoping to bring a championship to Washington for the first time since the Jazz Age. But the Cardinals rallied from a 6-0 deficit to win Game 5 of the NLDS and prolong Washington's wait, which will hit 90 years next season.

Washington's first and only World Series championship came in 1924, when the old Senators defeated the New York Giants in Game 7. The winning run scored on a bad-hop grounder by Earl McNeely that bounced over third baseman Freddie Lindstrom in the bottom of the 12th inning. Walter Johnson, who had lost his first

two starts, won the seventh game by pitching four scoreless innings in relief.

The nation's capital didn't have a team from 1972-2004.

The Montreal Expos moved to Washington and began playing as the Nationals the next year.

Detroit Tigers bullpen fails starter in 6-5 Boston Red Sox win

BOSTON (AP) — One night after nearly preserving a no-hitter, the Detroit bullpen was far from flawless.

Max Scherzer took another no-hit bid for the Tigers past the fifth inning and left with a four-run lead before the Red Sox rallied behind David Ortiz's grand slam for a 6-5 win Sunday night that evened the AL championship series at 1-1.

"It's playoff baseball," Detroit manager Jim Leyland said. "Looked like we had one in hand and we let one

slip away."

Scherzer struck out 13, allowing one run on two hits and leaving with Detroit up 5-1 after seven.

The Tigers appeared headed for a commanding 2-0 lead in the best-of-seven series.

But the same four relievers who finished off a one-hit, 1-0 win in the opener after Anibal Sanchez pitched six hitless innings failed to protect Scherzer's gem Sunday.

Jose Veras, Drew Smyly, Al Albuquerque and Joa-

quin Benoit gave the lead back this time.

And now the series shifts to Detroit for Game 3 on Tuesday, with the Tigers' Justin Verlander set to face Boston's John Lackey.

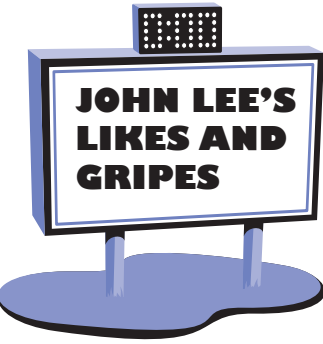

- Likes:**

Rams force 4 turnovers, down Texans 38-13

HOUSTON (AP) — St. Louis wasn’t surprised by anything the Houston Texans did on Sunday in the Rams’ 38-13 win. They were however, a bit taken aback that they were able to force four turnovers. “That was the big thing,” coach Jeff Fisher said. Indeed, it was. Houston’s turnovers, which included two fumbles and two second-half interceptions of backup quarterback T.J. Yates, resulted in 17 points for the Rams. St. Louis put the game away in the third quarter. Daren Bates turned a fumble by kick returner Keshawn Martin 11 yards for a touchdown to give St. Louis a 25-point lead with less than eight minutes left in the quarter. Alec Ogletree capped the Rams’ scoring with a 98-yard interception return with under a minute left in the third to make it 38-6. “Any time our defense creates a turnover, that gives us a spark on offense,” Rams quarterback Sam Bradford said. “Those were two huge plays in the game; (they) gave us a lot of momen-

tum and kind of sealed the deal.” The Rams benefited from Houston’s generosity early. A fumble by DeAndre Hopkins in the first quarter led to a St. Louis field goal. Houston’s biggest problem in its four-game skid has been turnovers. They also had four last week in a 34-3 loss to San Francisco. “We just seem to make too many mistakes, key mistakes,” Houston coach Gary Kubiak said. “Obviously a lot of stuff going on is good, but we can’t overcome the mistakes right now.” Five things to know about the Rams-Texans game: **SCHAUB’S STREAK:** Houston quarterback Matt Schaub entered Sunday’s game having thrown an interception which was returned for a touchdown in four consecutive games. Schaub did not get picked off by the Rams before leaving in the third quarter with an apparent right ankle injury. He was replaced by Yates, who made it five in a row for Houston when his first drive ended with Ogletree’s interception re-

turn for a score. Ogletree high-stepped his way into the end zone as the home fans serenaded the Texans with boos. Some fans cheered while Schaub was down after the injury, angering Houston’s players. “For them to cheer about something like that, it just shows they have no class,” Andre Johnson said. Fisher, who began his head coaching career in Houston with the Oilers, also criticized the reaction by fans. “It’s disappointing,” Fisher said. “It’s disappointing in that Matt’s won a lot of games here ... Matt’s a competitor, and he’s earned the right for people to respect him.” **RAMS STRUGGLE AGAINST RUN:** The St. Louis run defense entered the game ranked 29th in the league and those struggles continued on Sunday as Houston ran for 153 yards. “We knew we were going to have a hard time with the run game,” Fisher said. “Obviously that was evident during the first half. We did make some adjustments, however, and got things settled down.”

Rams defensive end Chris Long said improving the run defense is a priority and they have to be more disciplined in that area. **RED ZONE WOES:** Houston’s defense entered the game allowing the fewest yards in the NFL and held the Rams to 216 yards, which was a season-low for the Texans. It was seventh straight game Houston has held an opponent to fewer than 300 yards, which is a franchise record. But the unit continued to struggle in the red zone against St. Louis. All three Rams touchdowns on offense came on plays from inside the five-yard line. Bradford threw two touchdown passes of 2 yards and one for 4 yards. “We all made mistakes today that contributed to a shellacking, a beating by a team we really gave everything to,” safety Ed Reed said. “We have to execute better, and we will.” **RAMS ROOKIES ROCK:** St. Louis got big contributions from three rookies on Sunday. Running back Zac Stacy, a fifth-round pick made his second career start and fin-

ished with 18 carries for 79 yards. First-round selection Ogletree, who was chosen 30th overall, forced a fumble in the first quarter before his interception return for a TD in the third. Bates, an undrafted free agent, returned a fumble on a kick return 11 yards for another score. **ARIAN 5,000:** Houston had 20 carries for a season-high 141 yards rushing to pass the 5,000-yard rushing mark for his career. It was his 57th career game, leaving him tied with Emmitt Smith at 13th-fastest in NFL history to reach the plateau. Foster added 57 yards receiving on Sunday to give him the fourth-most all-purpose yards in his career.

Broncos lurch to 35-19 win over Jaguars

DENVER (AP) — This one turned out to be more about “if” than “how many” for Peyton Manning and the Denver Broncos. Derailed by their own

mistakes, to say nothing of an in-your-face Jacksonville Jaguars defense, the Broncos found themselves in quite a tussle through most of a surreal Sunday afternoon.

Not until early in the fourth quarter, when Knowshon Moreno ran for his third touchdown, did the undefeated Broncos have any sense of security against the winless Jags. Denver won 35-19 but fell well short of covering the record 27-point betting line in Las Vegas. “There was a lot of bad football out there,” receiver Wes Welker said. “We’ve got to correct that stuff and come out better next time.”

Manning went 28 for 42 for 295 yards, marking the first time he’s been held under 300 this season. His two touchdown passes gave him 22 on the year, a record for an NFL quarterback through six games. But he also lost a pair of fumbles on bad exchanges from center and threw his second interception of the season, which linebacker Paul Posluszny returned 59 yards for a touchdown to pull the Jaguars within 14-12 before the half.
