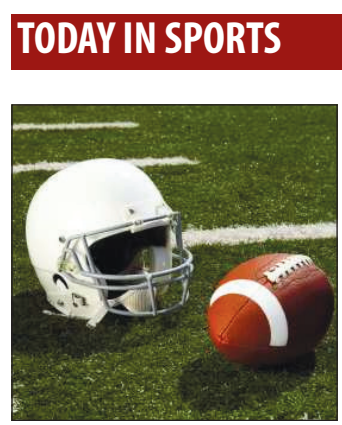

## School board cuts ribbon for new admin building

### New football coach hired, facility fees approved on historic day for school district.

 Superintendent David Young quipped about the board room in the Pampa Independent School District's new administration building Thursday night.

"We built a new place for everyone to have a place to sit and now at the first meeting it's standing room only." Each school board meeting begins with Spotlight on Excellence, where students throughout the district are recognized for achievements in academics, sports and citizenship by the board. The students are usually accompanied by the parents, so it's a pretty big crowd at the start of the meeting. After the awards are presented, most of the parents and students leave, freeing up more seats for everybody else.

However, the difference now is the board meetings are held in pleasantly decorated a room with a capacity of 120 people that has good acoustics. That's a big difference from when meetings moved around from one school library to another and it was often difficult to hear unless you were sitting one table away from the board.

"We are extremely proud of this new facility," PISD board president Lee Porter told the crowd before the ribbon cutting ceremony. It took about a year to convert the monstrous building on North Hobart Street, formerly an Albertson's supermarket, into a new **ADMIN** cont. on page 2

## Altrusa 'Lunch With Dignitaries' event teaches select Pampa 4th graders about law

 The goal of international women's service organization Altrusa has always been to "make our communities better through leadership, partnership and service." Women began working outside the home in record numbers during World War I, contributing heavily to the war effort, but had no civic organization in which to participate. A Kiwanis member assisted early efforts to organize the first Altrusa clubs in Nashville, Louisville, Dayton and then Indianapolis. This is also where Mamie Bass, architect and Superintendent of the Women's Division of the United States Employment Services, decided that Altrusans should serve a higher purpose in society. Bass held the first Altrusa convention in 1918 and developed the "Principles of Altrusa" that define Altrusa as "a builder of women" and an organization based on merit and accomplishment. Since then, Altrusa has served communities across the globe, with Altrusa women giving their time and resources to areas deemed most important in their local communities. True to its heritage, one exemplary service and education effort based on merit and accomplishment that Pampa's local Altrusa chapter provides is its "Lunch with Dignitaries" program. This educational program honors fourth graders recognized for good behavior, and teaches them about their community. **ALTRUSA** cont. on page 6

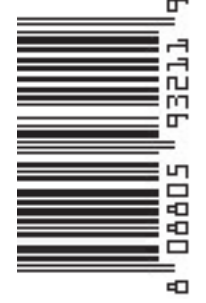

administration building and warehouse facility for the school district.

The renovation, inside and out, cost \$3 million and was approved by voters in 2006.

The total bond issue was \$47 million and, along with the admin building, paid for construction of the Pampa Junior High School on Perryton Parkway and improvements at Pampa

High School.

Before the board meeting, a reception was held and cake and punch were served.

One of the those attending was Barry Haenisch, who was PISD superintendent from 2003 to 2012.

"I was here when they passed the bond and it (the design plans) has gone through some different looks," he said.

Asked if he likes what he sees in the new building, Haenisch said, "Oh yes. This is way beyond what I'd hoped it would be."

Speaking before the ribbon cutting were Mayor Brad Pingel and Judge Richard Peet.

"What a great day for Pampa and especially for the school district," Pingel said. "Each of us in Pampa should be proud."

Peet asked the crowd to reflect on the progress Pampa has made over the last five to 10 years.

Along with new school facilities, Pampa now has some new banks, a new airport terminal and medical helicopter port.

"Look at what has transpired in Pampa," he said. "You can't have progress

with a poverty spirit."

Porter said it took considerable time and patience for the new admin building to become a reality.

He said other locations had been considered, like the new junior high school and the old middle school.

However, once it was proposed that the old Albertson's was the best choice, the project finally moved forward.

"This was a hard project," he said.

After the ribbon cutting and Spotlight on Excellence, the board went

into executive session for about an hour to discuss a "personnel matter."

Of course, it was no secret to everyone in the room on what the personnel matter was about — hiring a new head football coach for Pampa High School.

Once back into open session, the board unanimously approved hiring Lubbock-Roosevelt coach Greg Poynor, who will begin his new job on Monday.

Poynor was selected from more than 100 applicants.

He has a wife, Leah, and two sons, Brett and Brad.

In another action, the board approved updating its facility use to include the new administration building. Groups such as churches can rent out PISD rooms and facilities for set fees. However, there is no charge for any event that benefits students.

The cost to rent the board room for up to three hours is \$150. Young said that cost is the same as other facilities in the district, like the Commons at the high school.

## Bouncin' Around My post-graduation trip

When I graduated from high school in the mid-1960s, my gift from my family was a vacation. It wasn't the grand and glorious vacation to sunny beaches or romantic

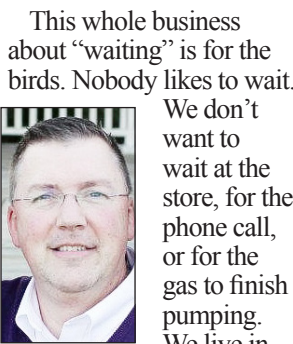
European cities; it was a bus trip from Los Angeles to Klamath Falls, Oregon to visit my Uncle Bob and Aunt Bee. The first leg of the trip was uneventful as I took my seat on the Trailways Bus and settled in for what was to be about an 18-hour trip. We arrived in Redding, Calif. around noon and I made my way to a local soda fountain to find something cool to drink and get out of the 110-degree heat. After a two-hour wait, we were back on the bus and headed to Oregon. I saw scenery I had never seen before, and I was really enchanted by my first view of Mount Shasta, a dormant volcano that last erupted in 1786.

My aunt met the bus at the station, and I was soon settled in my own room at their little house, which had a spectacular view of Hogback Mountain. Living in the smoggy Los Angeles area, we rarely had a good view of the nearest mountains, the San Gabriel range, so seeing these mountains so near and clear was a real treat. Uncle Bob had an Akita dog (whose name I have forgotten) who was not a friendly dog. I really missed the collie they used to have, Lassie, whose friendship I had enjoyed for several months while my aunt and uncle were in Japan. Uncle Bob was sort of a hero to me, as he had been in the Air Force and had been stationed on Greenland for a while. What I didn't realize before I made this trip, was that he was also a devoted alcoholic, and my aunt suffered bouts of what was then called manic depression. Aunt Bee was pretty stable while I was there, and we took several day trips to see the surrounding countryside, including a picnic in an area

surrounded by towering fragrant pines. Then came the day on which I would prove to myself that I had more courage than I ever thought. Uncle Bob invited me to go with him to visit a friend who had just lost her husband. He said I could have the run of her ranch, and spend time with her horses while he spent time consoling her. After about five hours of spending time with horses that really weren't interested in me since I knew nothing of riding horses, I began to wonder when we would be going back to their house. I was hungry, bored, and it was getting dark. Finally, Uncle Bob came out and we hopped into his beat-up old Cadillac for the drive home. I must insert here that at that time I had just turned 17, and though I had my learner's permit to drive, I was not a confident driver. OK, back to the drive home — and my first hint of something wrong was the overpowering smell of

This whole business about "waiting" is for the birds. Nobody likes to wait. We don't want to wait at the store, for the phone call, or for the gas to finish pumping. We live in a fast food, microwave, high speed culture and waiting is a bad word! One of the most difficult places to wait is the hospital waiting room! I've been in more hospital waiting rooms than anyone should ever have to experience. Check out this list: Scott and White in Temple, Tom-ball Regional Medical Center, St Joseph's Hospital in Houston, Conroe Medical Center, Texas Children's Hospital, St Luke's Hospital Houston, Plano Medical Center, Presbyterian Hospital Plano, Dallas Children's Medical Center, Baptist St Anthony's in Amarillo, Oakbend Hospital Sugarland, Memorial Herman Katy, Memorial Herman Sugarland, Methodist Hospital Sugarland, Methodist Hospital Houston Medical Center, Kerrville Peterson Medical Center, and McKinney Medical Center. And to make matters worse, these 17 are just for my own wife and children — and some of them have been multiple hospital admissions. In those hospital waiting rooms, we are either awaiting good news like the

birth of a child, uncertain news like the outcome of an operation, or bad news such as the notification that a loved one's physical life has ended. In every case, we try to fill our time with small talk, book reading, people watching, and tv viewing. All of those are distractions to keep our minds off of the "wait." Jesus had a waiting room experience as well. On the night of his betrayal Jesus waited in the Garden of Gethsemane. He demonstrated to us the best thing to do in order to occupy our time. He prayed. His prayer was in a place of privacy, apart from distractions of other people. His prayer was for the Father's will and not his own. In his waiting room prayer, Jesus received strength. The aspect of Jesus' prayer in the Garden that may be similar to our own is that God did not make the challenges he faced disappear. We hope that in prayer God will hit the "delete" button and the hardship we face will all go away. But in reality, He never promised that. He does promise that we will receive strength, and that He will be with us through whatever the hardship may be. Do you need to get alone with the Lord in the waiting room of prayer? Don't try to carry your burden alone. Seek Him, trust His will, and receive strength for the journey.

## No one is fired in the Obama Administration except generals

The list of political scandals runs long in the Obama Administration, unusually long, the multi-year fast and furious botched gun-running operation in the Justice Department, the IRS wasting obscene sums of money on staff parties, also its having targeted Tea Party organizations for extra scrutiny, the Benghazi affair in which Ambassador J. Christopher Stevens and three other Americans were killed during a terrorist attack in Libya, government's monitoring of Associated Press phone records, the NSA collecting and storing electronic messages on all U.S. citizens, the disastrous health care roll-out and etc. One thing is common. No one is fired! No heads roll! Those at the top are protected, defended and sometimes even promoted. Critics see a pattern in Obama's management style — no one is punished. Not so with the military. The president with probably the highest record in avoiding self blame, or holding his leadership accountable, also has the highest record for firing his generals. Something does not feel right. This story broke in mid-October all over the Internet but was largely neglected by the establishment

press. Dianne Sawyer of ABC News had the most complete report of the few that even covered it. She reported that two-star Maj. Gen. Michael Carey, with 35 years of commendable service and responsible for 450 intercontinental ballistic missiles in silos in the northern plains, was fired for "loss of trust and confidence" and "personal misbehavior." No further details were provided. He was the ninth general axed by the Obama administration in as many months. About the same time President Obama relieved of command the second in command at U.S. Strategic Command, Vice Admiral James Giardina, "following a criminal probe into his potential use of counterfeit poker chips at an Iowa casino." The firing of both generals was confirmed in short stories ran by both AP and Fox News but few additional details were provided. As reported by ABC "these officers have some of the highest security clearances you can get and have been in charge of the nation's most sensitive nuclear arsenals." Certainly Congress should be asking some big questions of the Administration respecting both generals sudden, and strange, fall from grace. Three of the nine generals relieved of command have expressed opinions opposite the Administration's on Benghazi. Gen. Carter Hamm, U.S. Army in charge of the US African command, stated that the

Administration "lied about not having reinforcements in the area on that night." Rear Admiral Charles Gaouette, U.S. Navy, was in charge of the Air Craft Carriers in the Mediterranean Sea with respect to the Benghazi debacle and in testimony, upon cross-examination, admitted that he could have had the aircraft launched had he been told to do so. He was removed for making "racially insensitive comments and abusive leadership." Maj. Gen. Ralph Baker, U.S. Army, commanded the Joint Task Force-Horn at Camp Lamar, Djibouti, Africa said that his attack helicopters could have made it from his location to Benghazi in time. He was relieved of command "for groping a civilian." According to the Free Patriot no assault charges or sexual misconduct charges were filed with JAG. Brigadier General Bryan Roberts, United States Army was relieved of command for adultery. Sources suggest that while adultery "is still on the books in the United States Code of Military Justice, it has rarely been used since President Bill Clinton's indiscretions." In early spring 2013, two Marine Corps generals were relieved of command for "not providing proper force protection" in Afghanistan from a Taliban attack in 2012. They were Maj. Gen. Gregg A. Sturdevant, and Maj. Gen. Charles M.M. Gurga-

nus. No explanation was given for what consisted of proper force protection. Lt. Gen. David Holmes Huntoon Jr., United States Army was forced into retirement for an "improper relationship" according to The Department of Defense. Nothing was released as to the nature of the improper relationship. The Navy, alone, has fired at least 16 commanders of less rank in 2014 alone. The ABC Sawyer report saw this as good as it improved the moral character of the military. Missed completely is the point that the Obama administration may have other motives — especially Benghazi — for these early retirements. Some critics see this as Obama weeding out commanders less friendly to his purposes — in short a purge. In light of the observation that no heads roll in the numerous Obama scandals why are so many rolling in the military where no serious wrongdoing can be documented? Reasonable people ask why? As in George Orwell's "Animal Farm," Napoleon may be building his own loyal army. Where is Congress and the establishment media on this story?

## 'Windfall' explores climate change

"Windfall: The Booming Business of Global Warming" (The Penguin Press), by McKenzie Funk

Apparently, if you look at climate change the right way, it looks like money instead of disaster — if you're looking at it from a corporate boardroom, for example, and not, say, coastal Bangladesh. Journalist McKenzie Funk spent six years traveling the world to report "Windfall," his account of how governments and corporations — many of whom heavily contribute to the problem of global warming but balk at mandates to cut greenhouse gas emissions — are confronting climate change with engineering, money and lawyers. Funk has written a fun book humanizing the prob-

lems of climate change, focused on the colorful entrepreneurs who see in an increasingly inhospitable world golden opportunities for indoor skiing, firefighters employed by insurance companies, Dutch-made seawalls and floating beaches for South Pacific resorts that otherwise might disappear. He finds that, for those who can afford to adapt, things will be fine, probably. Then he investigates what will happen to everyone else — the Bangladeshis stuck on the wrong side of an Indian border fence, the Africans frantically trying to build a wall of trees to keep the Sahara from expanding, the proudly independent island nations told to consider merging since they're all losing land anyway.

## Employers add 17,600 Jobs in Texas

AUSTIN — The Texas economy saw positive job growth in December 2013 with the addition of 17,600 seasonally adjusted total nonfarm positions over the month. Over the year, employers added 252,400 jobs, according to the Texas Workforce Commission.

The state's unemployment rate decreased for the fifth consecutive month, down to 6.0 percent in December. It remained below the national unemployment rate of 6.7 percent.

"We continue to see growth across major indus-

tries in Texas, with all of them adding jobs over the year," said TWC Chairman Andres Alcantar. "I encourage everyone who is looking for work in Texas to visit one of our local Workforce Solutions offices across the state."

Over the month, nine out of 11 major industries in Texas added jobs. Trade, Transportation, and Utilities expanded by 8,100 positions, more jobs added than any other major industry in Texas. This industry also added more jobs over the last year — 68,200 — than any other major industry, and had an annual

growth rate of 3.1 percent.

"I'm glad to see expansion in Manufacturing, which added 6,600 jobs, and Construction which added another 3,400," said TWC Commissioner Representing Labor Ronny Congleton. "Growth in these industries means more goods are being made in Texas and built in Texas, and that's good news."

Other industries that expanded over the month included Education and Health Services, with 4,400 added jobs; information, which added 1,600 jobs; and mining and logging, which added 1,100 jobs.

"Our year certainly ended on a positive note, with private-sector employers adding 243,200 jobs over the year, and 18,900 jobs in December," said TWC Commissioner Representing Employers Hope Andrade. "It is another positive sign that Texas is a top choice for business!"

The Midland Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) had the lowest December unemployment rate in the state at 2.8 percent. The Odessa MSA came in second at 3.4 percent and the Amarillo MSA third at 4.0 percent (not seasonally adjusted).

Each month throughout the school year, teachers from Lamar, Travis, Austin and Wilson elementary schools in Pampa select 14 different fourth grade students based on excellent conduct and cooperation in the classroom. Altrusa picks them up at their respective schools and brings them together for a fun lunch consisting of pizza, soda and cookies with a different "dignitary" at a different location each month. Past visits include the airport, the hospital, Clarendon College, the post office, a veterinary clinic, the museum, the radio station, the fire department, the police station and City Hall.

Altrusa President Kitty Hall, along with members Julia Sparkman, Allison Watson, Cheryl McFall and Kerrick Horton,

recently brought fourth graders to have lunch in downtown Pampa with attorney Tom Kokoska at the John W. Warner law firm. Kokoska shared with the group of fourth graders the purpose and development of laws and the legal system, noting different types of laws and behaviors they regulate and their importance to orderly and safe society.

Kokoska explained that laws are actually the lowest acceptable level of behavior, while ethics are higher principles to live by that define a person's character, and ethics are moral principles applied within a particular system. As an example, he said that while murder is against the law and the lawyer's personal morals should find it to be evil and wrong, the lawyer's professional ethics require him or her to put aside personal beliefs to defend an accused person as vigorously as possible in

order to ensure that they have a fair trial

Attorney Kokoska then led the group on a journey to trace how society resolves legal disputes, starting with walking in the door of a law office to seek help from a lawyer, a professional specially trained to assist with legal issues. Administrative assistant Barbie Munier joined the group to explain mechanics of how a law office meets with people to help with legal issues, and how it becomes a lawsuit if the people and their attorney need a court's assistance to resolve an issue.

The group then visited Gray County District Clerk Sandra Burkett's office and staff to see where people file a lawsuit. The fourth graders were particularly enamored with the office's fireproof walk-in safe, and the rapid-fire machine the clerks use to affix a time and date-stamp to all papers filed.

The final stop was the District Court courtroom to see where lawsuits are resolved. To the students' surprise and glee, it was not simply an empty courtroom. They were met

by District Judge Phil Vanderpool and his staff, including administrative assistant Krissie Dudley, Bailiff Clark Teague, and court reporter Karen Morrison, each of whom explained to awestruck students their important roles in the courtroom and legal process. The students particularly enjoyed bantering with Vanderpool, ogling the odd little box with apparently indecipherable markings and codes that Morrison uses to type court testimony, and of course, Teague's big shiny badge.

Vanderpool invited the kids to sit in the jury box, attorney tables and even the witness stand. He had fun with them while explaining his role and responsibility in deciding lawsuits. Vanderpool cajoled several shy fourth graders to act as lawyers and ask questions of a fellow student in the witness stand. All performed admirably, and could perhaps become the next generation of Pampa attorneys.

All those involved enjoyed the gathering immensely, and took a photo to commemorate yet another successful Altrusa effort to serve its community by educating the youth of Pampa.

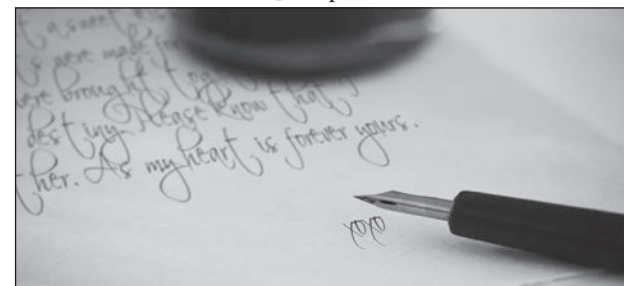
- Visit a stationery store and find a nice piece of stationery and envelope

## W.Va. teen to plead guilty in friend's killing

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. (AP) — A West Virginia teenager pleaded guilty to a first-degree murder charge Friday in the stabbing death of her one-time best friend.

Shelia Eddy entered into a plea agreement Friday in Monongalia County Circuit Court in the July 2012 death of 16-year-old Skylar Neese. Eddy's trial was scheduled to start next week.

Under the agreement, prosecutors agreed to recommend mercy, meaning that the 18-year-old Morgantown woman would be eligible for parole after serving 15 years. In return for Eddy's plea, a kidnapping charge and two counts of conspiracy will be

dropped.

Eddy, wearing glasses and an orange prison suit with her hair pulled into a ponytail, was visibly upset after entering the courtroom and her voice broke when giving short answers to Judge Russell Clawges, who then asked her how she pleaded.

"Guilty," Eddy said, her voice cracking.

Prosecutors say Eddy and another friend, Rachel Shoaf, lured Neese out of her ground-floor bedroom in Star City in July 2012, drove her to a secluded spot near the unincorporated West Virginia community of Macdalia, then stabbed her to death at an agreed-upon moment.

Authorities said the

girls covered the body of the University High honors student with branches when they couldn't bury her, and it lay in a wooded area across the Pennsylvania border for months.

The break in the case came in January 2012. Prosecutors say that's when Shoaf finally cracked and told investigators the truth — and where to find the body.

Shoaf pleaded guilty last May to second-degree murder and is awaiting sentencing. Prosecutors have said they plan to recommend a 20-year prison sentence for Shoaf and will oppose any move to have her sentenced as a juvenile. But she could get as many as 40 years under the law.

Prosecutors never divulged a motive. Shoaf told police the girls no longer wanted to be friends with Neese.

Though Eddy's name was no secret in the community, authorities didn't make it public until September, when they transferred her case from juvenile to adult court.

Skylar Neese was initially considered a runaway and no Amber Alert was issued to publicly notify people of her disappearance. Last year, the Legislature tweaked the state's Amber Alert process that had limited it to cases where a child is believed to be abducted. The revised law now requires law enforcement to relay initial reports of any missing child to state police, regardless if the person is a runaway. Amber Alert personnel would then decide whether or not to issue an alert.

## Pregnant, brain-dead Texas woman's case in court

FORT WORTH (AP) — Attorneys for a pregnant, brain-dead Texas woman's family will ask a judge Friday to let her be removed from life support, despite hospital opposition.

State District Judge R.H. Wallace will hear arguments in a lawsuit filed by Erick Munoz against John Peter Smith Hospital in Fort Worth.

His wife, Marlise, has been on life support there since he found her unconscious in their Haltom City home Nov. 26.

Her family says the exact cause of her condition isn't known, though a blood clot is a possibility. Erick Munoz said his wife, a fellow paramedic, had clearly told him: If she ever fell into such a state, she was not to be kept alive.

Hospital officials contend they're bound by a state law prohibiting withdrawal of treatment from a pregnant patient. Several experts interviewed by The Associated Press have said the hospital is misapplying the law.

The case has raised questions about end-of-life care and whether a pregnant woman who is considered legally and medically dead should be kept on life support for the sake of a fetus. It also has gripped attention on both sides of the abortion debate, with anti-

abortion groups arguing Munoz's fetus deserves a chance to be born.

Munoz is carrying a fetus, now believed to be at about 22 weeks' gestation, that is "distinctly abnormal," attorneys for Erick Munoz said in a statement earlier this week, based on medical records they received from the hospital.

"Even at this early stage, the lower extremities are deformed to the extent that the gender cannot be determined," Heather King and Jessica Hall Janicek said, also noting the fetus has fluid building up inside the skull and possibly has a heart problem.

Spokeswomen for the hospital and the Tarrant County District Attorney's office, which is representing the hospital in the lawsuit, have declined to comment on the attorneys' statement.

Munoz previously told the AP he wasn't confident about the fetus' health. His wife was 14 weeks pregnant when he found her unconscious and is believed to have been without oxygen for some time.

"You know what kind of damage my wife sustained, and what kind of possible damage the baby inside her sustained," he said during an interview earlier this month.

Not much is known about

fetal survival when mothers suffer brain death during pregnancy. German doctors who searched for such cases found 30 of them in nearly 30 years, according to an article published in the journal BMC Medicine in 2010.

Those mothers were further along in pregnancy — 22 weeks on average — when brain death occurred than in the Texas case. Birth results were available for 19 cases. In 12, a viable child was born. Follow-up results were available for six, all of whom developed normally.

In refusing to remove Munoz's life support, John Peter Smith Hospital has cited a Texas law that reads in part: "A person may not withdraw or withhold life-sustaining treatment under this subchapter from a pregnant patient."

But experts say the hospital is incorrectly applying the statute because Munoz is brain-dead and beyond any chance of recovery.

## 'Something is wrong' with nuke force

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vowing to look hard at signs of trouble inside the Air Force's nuclear missile corps, Defense Secretary Chuck Hagel said Friday it's clear "something is wrong."

Hagel told reporters that he is confident the problems will get fixed and that the nation's arsenal of nuclear weapons will remain safe and secure. He said he will convene a high-level meeting soon to probe the problems.

At a Pentagon news con-

ference, Hagel said the issues are complex and derive from a post-Cold War mindset that has reduced the focus on the nuclear weapons mission and led people to "just take for granted" that it will function correctly.

"This is cultural," he said, noting that the U.S. military has been intensely involved in fighting wars in Iraq and Afghanistan for more than a decade — conflicts with little direct relevance to the mission of nuclear warriors.

"Over the years I do think we have taken some focus off of the responsibilities of these very dedicated, very bright young officers" who operate intercontinental ballistic missiles, or ICBMs, stationed in five U.S. states, he said.

Hagel was commenting on the Air Force's dual investigations of drug use and exam cheating within its nuclear missile force, as well as a series of disclosures last year by The Associated Press about security lapses, leadership

failures and other problems among those who operate and protect the Minuteman 3 missile force.

On Thursday, he announced that he also will assemble a small group of outside nuclear experts to study personnel problems within the nuclear force and to recommend remedies.

Hagel has not yet said who will serve on that panel.

Change the NFL Pro Bowl, but not like this.

The NFL's all-star game, the Pro Bowl, has been scrutinized by not just fans, but the commissioner of the NFL, Roger Goodell, himself.

I personally have enjoyed watching the Pro Bowl over time usually because it is an all-star game. Granted, it is pointless and is a watered-down version of an NFL game since blitzing and other habitual play-calls are not allowed, but I have always

Criticisms of the Pro Bowl are anywhere from the players don't care to "not a football game."

These criticisms have plenty of merit. Players drop out of the game just because they don't want to play it. This year a handful of Conference Weekend losers declined to play because of "minor" injuries or the dissatisfaction from not making it to the bigger game in New Jersey the following Sunday.

The NFL has been toying with the Pro Bowl's format for years now. Like, changing the time played to the week before the Super Bowl. One year they decided to put it in the same location as the Super Bowl. That didn't go over well with the players and the NFL quickly fixed their "mistake."

This year they rid the game of the conference alignments and just had a draft from a pool of Pro Bowl-selected players. The colorful red and blue uniforms that brings back

happy memories for me are no longer existent. The new uniforms are atrocious.

So what do I suggest to fix the Pro Bowl? Move it back to one week after the Super Bowl. Have a skills challenge involved, too. Have the best receivers face-off against the best corners (i.e. Calvin Johnson versus Richard Sherman).

They should also find something to play for. What that would be is kind of hard to determine. My only idea is probably the winning conference in the Pro Bowl gets an extra draft pick or something to that nature.

All-in-all, the Pro Bowl is exactly what it is, an all-star game. Unlike Major League Baseball's and National Basketball Association's all-star games, there is nothing to play for in the Pro Bowl, and that ultimately hurts the game and its ratings. Even something as trivial as low-round draft picks wouldn't make the players try harder because a lot of draft picks end up being traded, sometimes on draft day itself.

Ex-Cowboy  
Brent gets  
180 days in  
jail, probation

DALLAS (AP) — Former Dallas Cowboys player Josh Brent avoided prison Friday and instead was sentenced to 180 days in jail and 10 years of probation for a drunken car crash that killed his friend and teammate, Jerry Brown.

Brent was convicted Wednesday of intoxication manslaughter for the December 2012 crash on a suburban Dallas highway that killed Brown, who was a passenger in Brent's car. Brent could have been sentenced to up to 20 years in prison.

Brent, who turns 26 next week, closed his eyes when the judge read the jury's verdict. He remained in custody after the hearing.

One of his attorneys,

Kevin Brooks, described the former tackle as "somber."

"I'm really kind of overwhelmed with the results," Brooks said. "It's kind of what we've been fighting for from Day 1. I'm happy for Josh. Josh is still sad and grieving and that's something he's going to carry with him the rest of his life."

Brent's family members cried and hugged as the courtroom emptied after the hearing. His mother, LaTasha Brent, spoke briefly as she left the courthouse, saying she was there to support her son.
