Abandoned vehicle catches fire in Borger

STAFF REPORT

Just after 1:30 Sunday morning, several crews in Hutchinson County were called to a car fire one mile south of Borger on State Highway 207. The Department of Public Safety, the Borger and Hutchinson County fire department and the Borger Police Department were called to the scene.

Officials said the vehicle was abandoned on the side of the road for several hours before it caught fire.

The incident remains under investigation as officials try to determine what caused the blaze.

The Borger Fire Department said Monday the vehicle was a Dodge Ram pickup truck and the owner was not with the vehicle when it burned.

BFD could not provide further details because the incident is still under investigation.

DPS seizes 100 pounds of marijuana near Conway

The Texas Department of Public Safety conducted a traffic stop Thursday on Interstate 40, yielding 100 pounds of marijuana valued at \$435,000.

At approximately 9:15 a.m., a DPS trooper conducted a traffic stop on a 2013 Ford Taurus traveling eastbound on I-40, for a traffic violation near Conway in Carson County.

The driver of the Taurus was identified as Douglas Lynn Peterson, 67, of American Fork, Utah. During the traffic stop, the trooper discovered 100 bundles of marijuana in the trunk of the vehicle.

Peterson was placed under arrest for possession of a controlled substance, a second-degree felony, and booked into the Carson County Jail. The illegal drugs were allegedly being transported from Arizona to Arkansas.

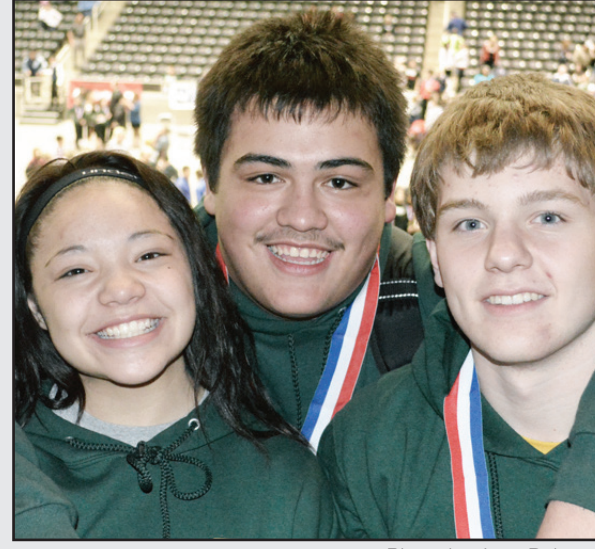

Advocates release maps of ACA enrollment efforts

To help uninsured Texans find coverage through the Affordable Care Act, the Get Covered America campaign is targeting Texas neighborhoods with a high rate of residents without health insurance. On Friday, the group released detailed maps showing the types of enrollment assistance available in Texas

metropolitan areas. "We know from both research and our work on the ground that one of the major factors that influences an uninsured person's decision to get enrolled is having a person nearby who can help support them in the process and answer their questions," Mimi Garcia, Texas state director of Get Covered America, said in a statement.

The maps show areas where resi-

dents are likely to be uninsured, and the locations of five types of enrollment assisters. Health care organizations across the state are relying on maps such as these to target their enrollment efforts, but as the maps indicate, many areas with a high concentration of uninsured residents do not have enrollment assistance nearby. For example, there are more than 60 locations in Houston where **CARE** cont. on page 2

a person can find in-person assistance, but only a handful are located east of Interstate 45 and north of Interstate 10, even though a high concentration of people without health insurance live in that area.

As of Feb. 2, only 207,500 Texans had selected a health plan on the federal marketplace. Texas has the nation's highest rate of people without health insurance at 24.6 percent, according to U.S. census data. About 48 million Americans — including more than 6 million Texans — were uninsured in 2011 and 2012. This Tribune interactive provides details on the state's uninsured residents, and enrollment efforts, so far.

The Affordable Care Act, also known as Obamacare, requires most Texans to have health insurance by March 31. Texas' Republican-led Legisla-

ture, which staunchly opposes the ACA, declined to establish a state-based insurance marketplace, so the federal government has done so instead. Texas Republicans have said that the insurance mandate is federal overreach and that the law could stifle Texas' economy.

The Texas Department of Insurance has also issued state regulations that added further training and other requirements for the navigators hired and trained by recipients of federal grants to help people enroll in the health marketplace. Although they're concerned the new regulations could impede enrollment efforts, government officials and community-based organizations are working together to incorporate the new rules, maximize their resources and educate uninsured Texans on how to take advantage of the federal law.

Prairie Plains Perspective

Are we alone in the universe?

The Fox News/Associated Press Internet headline last week read: "Humanity will detect aliens by 2040, researcher says." The researcher exclaiming such is from the institute SETI, in long form called,

Search for Extra Terrestrial Intelligence. The SETI researcher's conclusion is deduced from the fact Earth sits in such a vastly infinite space, surrounded by countless stars and planets, that it is only reasonable at a point of time in our future, humankind will pick up radio waves transmitted through space by another intelligence.

UFO's, however, there have been actual UFO sightings by those a tad more qualified than I and others to make the deduction. NASA and UFOs over the years have experienced quite the unique relationship. Following are two of many UFO sightings recorded by NASA astronauts.

Gemini 7 astronauts James Lovell and Frank Borman witnessed multiple UFOs. Following is their radio transmission with personnel at Gemini mission control:

Lovell: "Bogey at 10:00 high."

CapCom: "Say again 7."

Lovell: "Said we have bogey at 10:00 high."

CapCom: "Gemini 7, is that the booster or is that an actual sighting?"

Lovell: "We have several...Actual sighting."

CapCom: "Estimated distance or size?"

Lovell: "We also have the booster in sight."

There are more NASA and UFO encounters, some

beyond belief. Let your fingers do that (UFO sightings by NASA astronauts) Internet walk!

I was taken aback when I read "UFO Sightings by NASA." Simple deductive reasoning points out, again with infinite capabilities, that there has to be other intelligent beings out there. I think it rather naive of humankind to think we are alone. I think it's also very likely our government does possess positive information in regard to UFO and extra terrestrial existence, and contact with such.

What will humankind do? How will humankind react once an alien intelligence does make contact? Will it be a situation like alien Michael Rennie experienced in "The Day the Earth Stood Still," by being shot by a frightened soldier? Even worse, could another mass hysteria like that created by Orson Wells "War of the Worlds" occur? 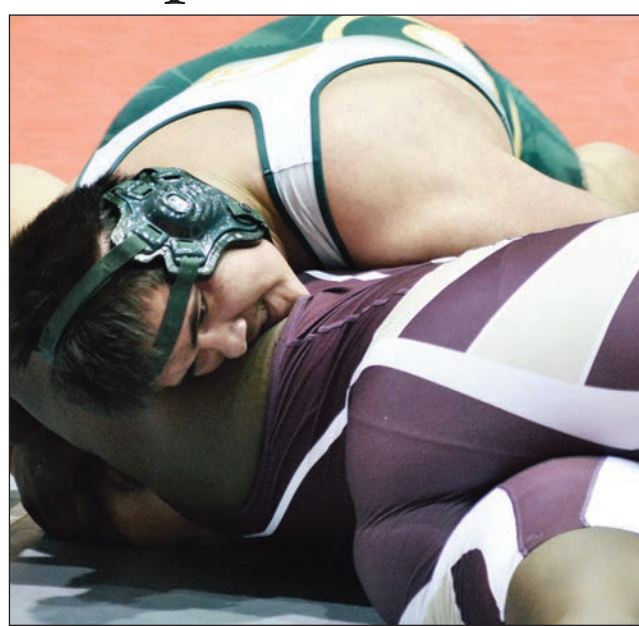

After a quick three-and-out, including O'Brien getting her fourth strikeout, the Lady Harvesters also were put out in five at-bats.

This was a continuing trend until the top of the sixth, when Celina tied the game with runs scored on two singles.

In the bottom of the sixth
