Overland to build affordable rentals in Borger

Developer had discussed alternate Pampa site with city, EDC, but said it backed out from lack of local support.

Pampa's loss may be Borger's gain. The Borger Economic Development Corp. approved on Feb. 18 a \$92,000 loan to Overland Property Group to build affordable rental housing similar to the project that was turned down in Pampa last year.

The loan fulfills the requirement of a local match for Overland to receive the federal tax credits it needs to build the apart-

ments.

The 48-unit complex, called The Reserves at Brookside, will be built at the intersection of South Florida and East Wilson streets.

Overland recently completed construction of a rental housing complex in Dumas and has plans to build another one in Lubbock.

The Pampa project died on the vine before the Pampa City Commission in August when no one on the commission made a motion to approve Overland's request for

\$34,500 in fee waivers.

Brett Johnson, a partner with Overland, had requested fee waivers associated with building construction, such as water and sewer lines, as a requirement by the state for a local contribution so that the developer could receive the \$5.2 million in federal tax credits that were approved earlier that month by the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA).

Pampa had received the highest scoring in TDHCA's District 1, which includes all of the Panhandle and goes as far south as Levelland.

Tenants in the rentals — called Section 42 — would not have received subsidies like with the much-maligned Section 8 hous-

ing program. However, there would have been a cap on household incomes. Nonetheless, entry-level police officers, firefighters and corrections officers all would have qualified. Salaries for first-year teachers at Pampa Independent School are above the income cap.

The Pampa apartments also would have included 10 "market-rate" units where anyone regardless of income could have lived. Those tenants would have paid higher rents.

Johnson said if the Overland project was approved it would have brought \$7 million in new construction to the local economy.

In July, the Pampa Economic Develop-

Abbott, Davis win in primaries

State senate race too close to call at press time.

As anyone whose read a newspaper or watched TV in the past six months could have predicted, state Attorney General Greg Abbott and state Sen. Wendy Davis will face off in the race for Texas governor on Nov. 4.

Both candidates easily beat their virtually unknown opponents.

While campaigning in Amarillo last week, Abbott told a crowd at a small restaurant to get out and vote.

As attorney general, Abbott has gained favor among state Republicans by declaring war on the Obama administration over the Affordable Care Act.

Davis rose to national prominence when on June 25 she held an 11-hour long filibuster to block Senate Bill 5, a measure that included more restrictive abortion regulations for Texas.

Probably the two most important races for Panhandle voters

ment Corp. denied Overland's request for a \$105,000 loan that would have met the requirement of a local contribution.

The Pampa EDC funds community and business development projects through local sales tax revenues.

In the past two years, the City Commission has approved hundreds of thousands of dollars in loans and grants at the request of the Pampa EDC for the Las Pampas Square, the Pampa

Mall, Cinema 4, the Pampa Energy Center and Hidden Hills Golf Course. The funds were used for everything from replacing old roofs at Las Pampas, to new golf cart trails at the municipal golf course, to digital movie projectors at the movie theater.

Another site proposed

The Pampa News has learned that Overland was in talks with the city and Pampa EDC about building on another site in Pampa as recent as last fall.

The property, owned by local businessman Jason Bagwell, is located on the north side of Harvester Avenue between Mora Wilks Park and Country Place East.

Bagwell told The Pampa News if he had the money he would love to build houses on the property, which is not far from the Pampa Country Club.

Bagwell said he was in discussions last fall with Johnson about building affordable housing units on the 13 acres.

He said in November he had talked to Overland, and

they still wanted to come to Pampa.

Bagwell said that he, Johnson, Mayor Brad Pingel and Kathy Cota, associate director of the Pampa EDC, held a conference call to discuss the possibility of Overland building on his land.

Bagwell said the day after the conference call he got an email from Johnson stating he didn't feel there was enough support from the city or community to proceed with the project.

Johnson explained why Overland had a change of heart.

"After a few discussions with both the EDC and city staff, we decided to wait until we had time to garner more support from both entities, which wasn't necessarily apparent during those discussions, as well as the community as a whole," he said.

Pingel said the talks about Bagwell's property were very preliminary and that there were not any particular concerns about the site.

Bagwell said the site is a good location because Harvester, with its four lanes, would be much less congested than the narrower residential streets in the first site proposed by Overland.

Bagwell said if the right location was picked, he thinks people in Pampa would support it.

Also, he said, the public still may be misinformed about the type of project Overland intended to build.

"It is not cheap, junk housing," he said. "I've seen some of their other properties."

The big picture

Bagwell owns the Pampa Mall and works aggressively to bring new tenants into the newly renovated mall, which was closed for nearly 20 years.

He said a large housing development of any kind can be a catalyst in attracting new business to the city.

"If you have housing going up — 60 new units, whether it's affordable or not — it's a given you will have national companies and national restaurants looking at that growth," he said.

Bagwell said with a combination of affordable housing and the higher-end housing proposed at the Edwin Park Subdivision on the grounds of the former Pampa Middle School, the city has an opportunity to draw in more business.

He said Borger has one-third the retail trade of Pampa, but the city has the enthusiasm to grow.

"We are not showing the desire to grow when we lose deals like this," he said.

Pampa is in a boom economy right now from the oil and gas industry, but that could all change March 31 if the U.S. Fish and Wildlife decides to list the lesser prairie chicken as a threatened or endanger species.

Johnson said taking into consideration the strong opposition raised to building on

the northeast side, Overland decided not to put any further pressure or negative attention on the city or the Pampa EDC.

"We will come back when people have had more time to understand affordable housing," he said. "All in all, it was in everyone's best interest to wait. However, I think Jason's site is ideal and we would very much consider looking at it if and when the climate for affordable housing changes."

Johnson said another complication was that state Rep. Ken King had indicated he would not support another application to TDHCA for Pampa due to the hundreds of letters, emails and phone calls his office received after he supported Overland's first application.

Growth in Borger

Johnson said Overland has not experienced community opposition in Lubbock or Borger.

"We attended two public meetings in Borger, one for (Borger) EDC loan approval and one for city council support two weeks ago and both were unanimously approved without opposition," he said. "They indicated a strong need for all types of housing and mentioned that the existing 2-year-old affordable housing property has been well received and has experienced none of the public-safety problems mentioned by Pampans at our meetings last year."

Dan Redd, CEO of the Borger EDC, said there has been no community opposition to either Adobe Ranch, the existing affordable housing complex, or Overland's plans to build 48 units at Wilson and Florida. He said the Overland site is two or three blocks away from the closest existing housing.

Redd said he would prefer that developers build market-rate apartments but is not against affordable housing, which he said is good for young people starting out.

"Borger needs apartments," he said. "I asked the first group that came in, 'Why don't you build market-rate apartments?', but they said this is what they do with the tax credits."

Redd doesn't believe that building more housing necessarily attracts new employers and national restaurants.

But what he does see is a lot of people who drive into Borger everyday from somewhere else to work.

He believes many of those people, who probably earn too much to live in affordable rentals, would move to Borger if only they could find a place to live.

He said the enthusiasm to grow in Borger is real.

The Agrium Inc. fertilizer plant has announced a \$720 million expansion, which will bring in 1,000 contract workers, and dirt work has started on a new Walmart Supercenter, he said.

were U.S. Congressional District 13 and State Senate District 31.

At 9:30 p.m. Tuesday, the race for state senator was close. Incumbent Kel Seliger held 52 percent of the votes over Mike Canon's 48 percent.

Neither Seliger's nor Canon's campaign offices returned phone messages before press time.

In the race for U.S. Congress, Mac Thornberry held 69 percent of the votes over Elaine Hays' 19 percent and Dr. Pam Barlow's 12 percent.

Thornberry was in session in Washington D.C. and could not be reached for comment.

Barlow, a veterinarian from Bowie who ran against Thornberry two years ago, was upbeat when contacted by The Pampa News despite the large gap in votes.

She said the early numbers mostly reflected the Amarillo vote and not the rural precincts.

"My numbers keep creeping up and Mac's keep creeping down. All we have to do is get Mac under 50 percent for a runoff."

Hays, a financial planner from Amarillo, also had hopes for a runoff but conceded the election to Thornberry shortly after 9:30.

"We were certainly hoping to keep Mr. Thornberry under 50 percent and have a runoff and have three more months to get our message out," she said. "We have encouraged a lot of people to get back into the process."

Asked if she planned to run again, Hays said, "I have no plans yet. I plan to sleep in at this point."

In Gray County elections, none of the Republican incumbents were challenged and there were no Democrats run-

ning in the primaries.

Jo Mays was the only Republican candidate who wasn't an incumbent. She replaces Sandra Burkett, who decided not to run for reelection, as the district clerk.

US Airways pilots sue counterparts at American

WASHINGTON (AP) — Pilots for US Airways are suing to have an arbitrator settle a standoff with American Airlines pilots over seniority rights as the two carriers are combined.

The US Airways pilots say they have been unable to agree with the pilots' union at American on how to combine their groups. They are trying to invoke a federal law that requires arbitration to settle seniority disputes. Seniority is crucial to pilots. Those with more seniority earn more by flying bigger planes on more lucrative routes such as international flights.

The US Airline Pilots Association sued US Airways, American Airlines, and the Allied Pilots Association at American. The new parent company of both airlines, American Airlines Group Inc., Fort Worth, Texas, declined to comment on the lawsuit Tuesday. The Allied Pilots Association said the two cockpit groups had an agreement last year on a process for combining seniority lists, and it accused the US Airways pilots of trying to break that deal. The lawsuit was filed last week in federal district court in Washington.

Betsy Ross, meet Cinco de Mayo

Live Oak High School in Morgan Hill, Calif., set out to celebrate Cinco de Mayo in 2010 in a “spirit of cultural appreciation.” It didn’t work out that way.

Some students decided they wanted to celebrate by wearing shirts with the American flag. Other students objected. A student warned an administrator she thought there would be problems. Fearing for the safety of students wearing red, white and blue, administrators asked those teens to turn their shirts inside out or go home under an excused leave.

Three students — minors known as M.D., D.M. and D.G. — have sued the district for violating their rights to free speech and equal protection. Last week, a three-judge panel ruled that the Morgan Hill Unified School District had not violated the students’ right to free expression, because the administrators’ goal was not to censor U.S. flags but to protect students whose safety might have been threatened.

What “a horrible lesson to teach the kids,” responded the plaintiffs’ attorney Robert Muise of the American Freedom Law Center in Michigan. According to Judge Margaret McKeown, some Live Oak students believed that it was racist or anti-Mexican for white students to wear American flags that day. Then, because school officials believed that those students might act violently, administrators inadvertently rewarded those who wanted to get rid of the American flag for a day. Now the notorious 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals has put its stamp of approval on the arrangement. It’s shameful. “This is a classic ‘heckler’s veto’ — thugs threatening to attack the speaker, and government officials suppressing the

speech to prevent such violence,” prolific law blogger Eugene Volokh wrote of the decision.

My guess is school officials meant well, are not hostile to the American flag and simply wanted to defuse tension.

Alyson S. Cabrera, an attorney for the school, reiterated: “The district did not impose any ban on the American flag or on any other flag on May 5, 2010. The American flag flew above the schoolhouse that day as it did on every day both before and after May 5, 2010. But for the information received from school administrators indicating that the safety of the student-plaintiffs was potentially in jeopardy, these students would not have been asked to remove their T-shirts or leave with excused absences for the day.”

For his part, Muise believes that if the American Flag Three had been allowed to remain in school, the flap would be over now.

But if school officials were right that M.D., D.M. and D.G. were in danger and they based that belief on a spirited altercation between wavers of Mexican flags and wavers of Old Glory during Cinco de Mayo 2009, maybe they should not have feted Cinco de Mayo.

But they did. And then they sent home the kids who wanted to wear American flags, but they didn’t identify and discipline students who ostensibly threatened M.D., D.M. and D.G. That is, they underreacted to a security threat and overreacted against the students who had every right to express their love of country.

I’m guessing that because they’re busy and stressed out, administrators resort to such expedencies all the time, but that doesn’t mean courts should sanction them.

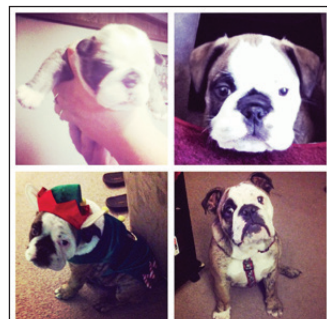
I haven’t weighed him for awhile, but I’m willing to bet that Humphrey is close to 50 pounds now, judging

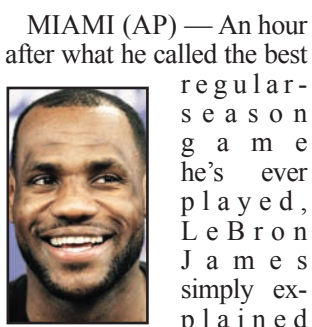
“The conditions improved greatly from Friday to Saturday, so it was a much more enjoyable day of golf,” Barker said. “I thought the girls played extremely well.”

Monday: James scores 61, setting career-high and Heat-best



LeBron James

MIAMI (AP) — An hour after what he called the best regular-season game he's ever played, LeBron James simply explained why this performance was like none other. The basketball, he said, felt small as a golf ball. The basket, to him, looked as wide as the ocean. Best player in the game.

Best game of his career. James rewrote his record book Monday night, etched his name a few different times in Miami Heat annals as well, and let the NBA know in crystal-clear terms that his MVP award won't be ceded without a fight this season. He scored 61 points, setting career- and franchise-bests, as the Heat topped the Charlotte Bobcats 124-107.

“A surreal feeling for me right now,” James said.

With good reason. He made 22 of his 33 field-goal tries, becoming just the third player in the past 25 years

to take that many shots and make at least two-thirds of them, with only Alex English and Shaquille O'Neal on that list. James set a career-high for field goals made, plus Heat records for points in a quarter (25) and a half (37).

And of all his feats on Monday, the most impressive might have been how he started 8 for 8 from 3-point range.

“The man above has given me some unbelievable abilities to play the game of basketball,” James said before the Heat flew to Houston for a game there Tuesday.

“I just try to take advantage of it every night. I got the trust of my teammates and my coaching staff to go in there and let it go.”

Glen Rice scored 56 to set the Heat record on April 15, 1995, against Orlando. James' previous career best had been 56 points, on March 20, 2005, for Cleveland against Toronto.

This outing was much better, James said. Not because 61 tops 56 — but because the night he scored 56, his Cavaliers lost.

“Phenomenal, amazing, stupendous ... he reminds me of me,” Heat forward

Chris Bosh said afterward in an overjoyed locker room.

James had 24 points at halftime, then added 25 in the third quarter.

The record-breaker came with 5:46 left, when James spun through and around three defenders for a layup that fell as he tumbled to the court.

Heat coach Erik Spoelstra walked into his postgame news conference with a confession: He nearly took James out after the third quarter.

He didn't. Good call. “He was in a great groove, obviously,” Spoelstra said.

Russell Wilson enjoys time with Texas Rangers

SURPRISE, Ariz. (AP) — Russell Wilson has enjoyed spending time with the Texas Rangers.

Wilson sat in the Texas Rangers dugout Monday, fans yelling “Seahawks” filled the spring training stadium.

“I couldn't expect anything less,” Wilson said. “The 12th man fans were unbelievable today. They're everywhere. The 12th man fans are out in the outfield, they're on third-base line, first-base line, chanting ‘Seahawks’ the whole way. Hopefully the Dallas fans didn't get too mad.”

Wilson threw for 3,357 yards and 26 touchdowns and helped the Seattle Seahawks rout the Denver

Broncos 43-8 in the Super Bowl last month.

He also happens to be a pretty good baseball player, drafted three times and hitting .229 with a .350 on-base percentage in 93 games in 2010-11 in the low minors in the Colorado Rockies system. But he's had instant success in the NFL.

“You never say never,” Wilson said. “I've always had the dream of playing two sports. If somehow it was a miracle that it could work out, I'd consider it. At the same time, my focus is winning the championship with the Seattle Seahawks and hope to be playing for a long time.”

“For me, it only being my second year, yeah I won a Super Bowl and all that, but that's not enough for me. It really isn't. My goal is to be one of the best quarterbacks to ever play the game, if not the best. I've got a long ways to go. I make sure I get up earlier than Tom Brady and Drew Brees and they're on the East Coast.”
