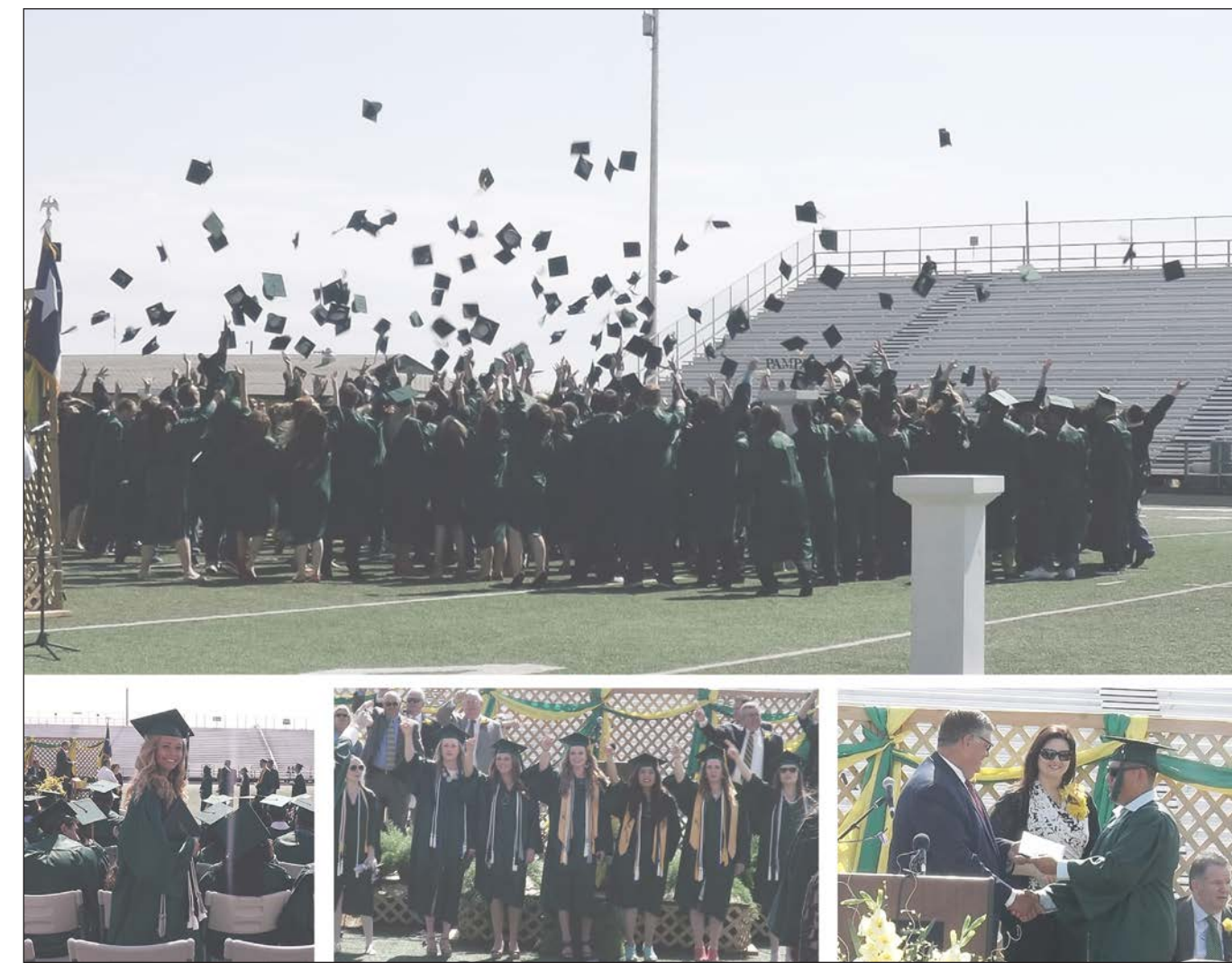

More than 220 Pampa High School seniors took the walk across the stage at graduation Saturday morning. Though the ceremony was at 9:30 a.m., the heat made its presence known. Hundreds of family members and friends seemed almost oblivious of the heat as they watched their loved ones receive their diplomas, and this year's speeches did not disappoint.

Class President Brandon Stokes took the stage after Logan Turley kicked things off with the Pledge of Allegiance and invocation and the PHS band and concert choir teamed up for the Battle Hymn of the Republic.

Stokes started off his speech by giving a heartfelt thanks to his parents before lightening the mood with a quote from contemporary rapper Soulja Boy simply stating, "We made it." On a serious note,

Stokes went into a Bible verse he felt his peers could relate to, referring to all the changes they had faced and have yet to face after leaving Pampa High School. Galatians 6:9 states, "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up."

It is after his explanation of what the verse meant to him, that Stokes asked his peers to reflect on their time at PHS and think of one thing they would change. Then, he challenged them to change it in the future and see what they could achieve without that one thing holding them back. In closing, Stokes left his fellow graduates with one last statement, "Above all else, be yourself and do what makes you happy. Somebody's got to do it."

The PHS show choir took the stage next and sang "Best Day of My Life" by American Authors as a tribute to the class of 2014.

Gray County Commissioners lift burn ban for 2 weeks

The Gray County Commissioners met on Monday morning for their first meeting of the month with a full agenda. One item of discussion many people have been increasingly curious about with the recent rainfall and the Fourth of July holiday approaching was the burn ban. After careful consideration and discussion on the topic, the commissioners decided it was best to lift the burn ban for two weeks until their next meeting.

Along with this decision came the option of banning aerial fireworks. The banning of said fireworks would mean that firework stands would not be able to sell any aerial fireworks. No action was taken on the agenda item after some discussion, meaning that aerial fireworks are permitted to be sold. Keep in mind that fireworks are never allowed to be shot off within city limits or on county roads, and the Commissioners still retain the right to reenact the burn ban during their June 16 meeting.

The Commissioners also paid bills and salaries and approved line item transfers.

Gray County District Attorney Franklin McDonough was present at the meeting to request the opening of a bank account to be entitled "31st District Attorney Pretrial Intervention Account" with signatories to be Franklin McDonough and Carey Mackie. This will allow McDonough to charge those eligible (not having any sort of criminal record) to enter the pretrial intervention program, which is a \$500 charge.

According to the Texas District and County Attorneys Association, pretrial intervention is a form of supervision appropriate for some first offenders. It gives defendants a way to make amends for their transgressions without many of the lingering effects of a deferred adjudication or conviction. There is also no age limit on eligibility, and the rules of the program are similar to probation, according to McDonough.

The Commissioners also approved a modification to the U.S. Forest Service Agreement, which included an increase in funding.

Commissioner Gary Willoughby of Precinct 2 requested to have funds transferred from a full-time employee account to a part-time employee account due to the absence of said full-time employee position.

Another important item agenda came up when Judge Richard Peet brought to the attention of the court that the elevator in the White Deer Land Museum is currently out of use. Repairs to get the elevator up and running again will cost around \$23,000, but the repairs are necessary for those unable to access the upper floors of the museum via the stairs. The absence of an elevator will not

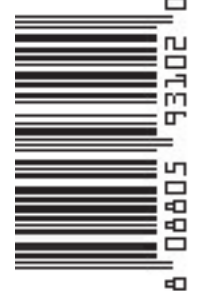
Teel died of his injuries on site. He was not wearing a seatbelt.

US concluded in 2010 that Bergdahl walked away

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Pentagon investigation concluded in 2010 that Army Sgt. Bowe Bergdahl walked away from his unit, and after an initial flurry of searching the military decided not to exert extraordinary efforts to rescue him, according to a former senior defense official who was involved in the matter.

Instead, the U.S. government pursued negotiations to get him back over the following five years of his captivity — a track that led to his release over the weekend.

Bergdahl was being checked and treated Monday at a U.S. military hospital in Germany as questions mounted at home over the swap that resulted in his freedom in exchange for the release of five detain-

ees who were sent to Qatar from the U.S. prison at Guantanamo, Cuba.

Even in the first hours of Bergdahl's handoff to U.S. special forces in eastern Afghanistan, it was clear this would not be an uncomplicated yellow-ribbon celebration. Five terrorist suspects also walked free, stirring a debate over whether the exchange would heighten the risk of other Americans being snatched as bargaining chips and whether the released detainees — several senior Taliban figures among them — would find their way back to the fight.

U.S. officials said Sunday that Bergdahl's health and safety appeared in jeopardy, prompting rapid action. "Had we waited and lost him," said national secu-

rity adviser Susan Rice, "I don't think anybody would have forgiven the United States government." She said he had lost considerable weight and faced an "acute" situation. Yet she also said he appeared to be "in good physical condition."

One official, who spoke on grounds of anonymity because the person wasn't authorized to discuss the subject by name, said there were concerns about Bergdahl's mental and emotional as well as physical health.

On Monday, a U.S. military hospital in Germany reported Bergdahl in "stable condition and receiving treatment for conditions requiring hospitalization" after arriving from Afghanistan. The Landstuhl Re-

gional Medical Center said Bergdahl's treatment "includes attention to dietary and nutrition needs after almost five years in captivity" but declined to release further details. It said there "is no pre-determined amount of time involved in the reintegration process" for the 28-year-old soldier.

Two officials said Monday that the Taliban may have been concerned about his health, as well, since the U.S. had sent the message that it would respond harshly if any harm befell him in captivity.

Republicans in the U.S. said the deal for Bergdahl's release could set a troubling precedent. Arizona Sen. John McCain said of the Guantanamo detainees who were exchanged for him: "These are the hardest

of the hard core."

And in Kabul Monday, the Afghan Foreign Ministry called the swap "against the norms of international law" if it came against the five imprisoned Taliban detainees' will. The ministry said: "No state can transfer another country's citizen to a third country and put restriction on their freedom."

Tireless campaigners for their son's freedom, Bob and Jani Bergdahl thanked all who were behind the effort to retrieve him. "You were not left behind," Bob Bergdahl told reporters, as if speaking to his son. "We are so proud of the way this was carried out." He spoke in Boise, Idaho, wearing a long bushy beard he'd grown to honor his son, as residents in the sergeant's hometown of Hailey prepared for a homecoming celebration.

The five detainees left Guantanamo aboard a U.S. military aircraft flying to Qatar, which served as go-between in the negotiations. They are to be banned from leaving Qatar for at least a year. Among the five: a Taliban deputy intelligence minister, a former Taliban interior minister with ties to the late al-Qaida leader Osama bin Laden and a figure linked by human rights monitors to mass killings of Shiite Muslims in Afghanistan in 2000 and 2001.

Questions persisted, too, about the circumstances of Bergdahl's 2009 capture. Defense Secretary Chuck Hagel declined to comment on earlier reports that the sergeant had walked away from his unit, disillusioned with the war. Such matters "will be dealt with later," Hagel said.

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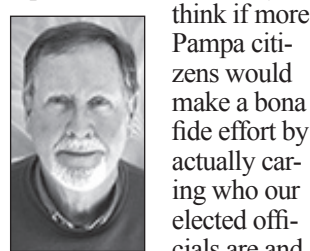

Last week's lamentation over lack of any code enforcement of city ordinances brought out a groundswell of positive response. 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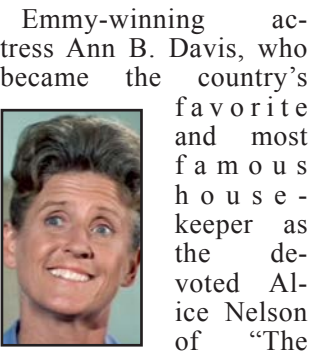
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'Brady Bunch' actress Ann B. Davis dies in Texas

Emmy-winning actress Ann B. Davis, who became the country's favorite and most famous housekeeper as the devoted Alice Nelson of "The Brady Bunch," died Sunday at a San Antonio hospital. She was 88.

Bexar County, Texas, medical examiner's investigator Sara Horne said Davis died Sunday morning at University Hospital. Horne said no cause of death was available and that an autopsy was planned Monday.

Bill Frey, a retired Episcopal bishop and a long-time friend of Davis, said she suffered a fall Saturday at her San Antonio home. Frey said Davis had lived with him and his wife, Barbara, since 1976.

ple hundred glamour gals who are starving in this town," she told the Los Angeles Times in 1955, the year the Cummings show began its four-year run. "I'd rather be myself and eating."

She said she told NBC photographers not to retouch their pictures of her, but they ignored her request and "gave me eyebrows."

Producer Sherwood Schwartz's "The Brady Bunch" debuted in 1969 and aired for five years. But like Schwartz's other hit, "Gilligan's Island," it has lived on in reruns and sequels.

As "The Brady Bunch" theme song reminded viewers each week, the Bradys combined two families into one. Florence Henderson played a widow raising three daughters when she met her TV husband, Robert Reed, a widower with three boys.

In her blue and white maid's uniform, Davis' character, Alice Nelson, was constantly cleaning up messes large and small, and she was a mainstay of stability for the family.

"I think I'm lovable. That's the gift God gave me," Davis told The Associated Press in a 1993 interview. "I don't do anything to be lovable. I have no control."

Davis' face occupied the center square during the show's opening credits. Her love interest was Sam the Butcher, played by Allan Melvin.

"I'm shocked and saddened! I've lost a wonderful friend and colleague," Henderson said in a statement Sunday.

Eve Plumb, who played Jan Brady on the series, called Davis "an amazing lady."

"She was great to work with, and I have wonderful memories of our scenes together on 'The Brady Bunch,'" Plumb said in a statement. "She was kind and generous to all of us on set."

"The Brady Bunch" had a successful run until 1974, but it didn't fade away then. It returned as "The Brady Bunch Hour" (1977), "The Brady Brides" (1981), "The Bradys" (1990). It even appeared as a Saturday

morning spinoff (1972-1974).

"The Brady Bunch Movie," with Shelley Long and Gary Cole as the parents, was a surprise box-office hit in 1995. It had another actress as Alice, but Davis appeared in a bit part as a trucker. It was followed the next year — without Davis — by a less successful "A Very Brady Sequel."

Older TV viewers remember Davis for another non-glamorous role, on "The Bob Cummings Show," also known as "Love That Bob." She played Schultz, the assistant to Cummings' character, a handsome, swinging bachelor photographer always chasing beautiful women.

It brought Davis supporting actress Emmy Awards in 1958 and 1959.

After the series ended in 1959, Davis appeared in such movies as "A Man Called Peter," "Lover Come Back" and "All Hands on Deck." During layoffs she played in summer stock.

Between her two better-known shows, she played a gym teacher at an exclusive girls' school in 1965-66 in "The John Forsythe Show."

During her stints in "The Bob Cummings Show" and "The Brady Bunch," she used the layoffs to appear in summer theater with such shows as "Three on a Honeymoon." She also toured with the USO to entertain U.S. troops in Korea and elsewhere.

She was born Ann Bradford Davis in 1926, in Schenectady, New York, and grew up in Erie, Pennsylvania. She said she took to using her middle initial because "just plain Ann Davis goes by pretty fast."

She was stage-struck since the age of 6 when she and her twin sister, Harriet, earned \$2 with their puppet show. She attended the University of Michigan, joking that she was a premed student "until I discovered chemistry."

She graduated in 1948 with a degree in theater and later joined a repertory theater in Erie, Pennsylvania. She told the AP in 1993 that she got her

big break while doing a cabaret act in Los Angeles, singing and telling jokes.

"Somebody said, 'Get your agent to call the new Bob Cummings show. They're looking for a funny lady.'"

"Within three hours I had the job. That was January 1955. I had such fun with that show."

"I did a couple of pilots that didn't sell, a few movies and one year of nightclub work, which I hated."

"Then I did the pilot of 'The Brady Bunch' and never had to do another nightclub."

For many years after "The Brady Bunch" wound up, Davis led a

quiet religious life, affiliating herself with a group led by Frey.

"I was born again," she told the AP in 1993. "It happens to Episcopalians. Sometimes it doesn't hit you till you're 47 years old."

"It changed my whole life for the better. ... I spent a lot of time giving Christian witness all over the country to church groups and stuff."

She took a long sabbatical from the theater, largely limiting her performances to "Brady Bunch" specials and TV commercials.

In 1993, Davis returned to the theater, joining the touring cast of "Crazy for You," a musical featuring

the songs of George and Ira Gershwin.

Davis never married, saying she never found a man who was more interesting than her career.

"By the time I started to get interested (in finding someone)," she told the Chicago Sun-Times, "all the good ones were taken."

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Yu Darvish fans 12 as Rangers beat Nationals

WASHINGTON (AP) — After getting pummeled by Washington in two straight games, the Texas Rangers were eager to stop the Nationals' seemingly interminable parade around the bases.

Yu Darvish gave the Rangers just what they needed to avert a humbling sweep.

Darvish struck out 12 over eight innings, Leonys Martin broke open a scoreless duel with a homer in the seventh and Texas secured a 2-0 victory Sunday.

The Rangers won despite losing an apparent run in a rare double challenge on the same play. Managers Ron Washington of Texas and Matt Williams lodged separate complaints after a double steal in the first inning.

Pitching for the first time since May 22 after missing his last turn with a stiff neck, Darvish (5-2) gave up five hits and walked two in dropping his ERA to 2.08. The right-hander matched his season high in strikeouts and overpowered a club that won 9-2 on Friday and 10-2 Saturday.

"That team for two days just swung the bats at will, threw the ball around the

ballpark, out of the ballpark," Washington said. "We certainly needed to try to slow them down, and (Darvish) did that. He slowed them down. Yu was good today. He was very good. When the team needed him to be very good, he was."

Joakim Soria worked a perfect ninth to earn his 11th save and seal Texas' major league-leading 11th shutout.

Darvish struck out the side in the second and fanned two in each of the next three innings before encountering trouble in the sixth. One-out singles by Jayson Werth and Adam LaRoche put runners at first and third before Darvish struck out Wilson Ramos and retired Ian Desmond on a deep fly to right field.

Darvish yielded a two-out walk in the seventh and left after a 1-2-3 eighth.

"We just needed Yu to pitch well," Washington said, "and he pitched well."

Darvish was worried that neck stiffness might be a problem, but it obviously didn't turn out to be an issue.

"Last night before I went to bed, I was very scared to wake up with a neck injury

so I probably woke up 20 times," he said through a translator. "But I didn't have any pain when I woke up this morning."

Darvish got the only run he needed when Martin hit an 0-1 pitch from Tanner Roark (3-4) into the Washington bullpen beyond the right-field wall. It was his third home run in 183 at-bats this season and ended the Rangers' run of homerless games at six.

Roark allowed only one run and seven hits in seven innings but lost his third straight start.

"He made one mistake to Martin, a changeup that was up in the strike zone," Williams said. "Other than that, he matched him perfectly."

Roark has lost three straight starts but owns a 3.25 ERA and has allowed only eight earned runs over his last 32 2-3 innings. In this one, he kept the Rangers at bay until Martin connected.

"It was just a bad change-up. It was up and I didn't throw it with conviction," Roark said. "That's how it's been the past couple games, just one pitch."

Donnie Murphy added an

RBI single off Drew Storen in the eighth. Murphy had a season-high three hits and was flawless in his first career game at first base.

"He's a pro," Washington said of Murphy. "Every time he goes out there he does something for us."

In the first inning, both managers talked to the umpires. With two outs and runners on the corners, Elvis Andrus and Alex Rios executed a double steal. Rios was called out for coming off second base after the steal, but umpires ruled Andrus crossed the plate before the tag.

The Texas manager challenged the call at second and Williams insisted the out occurred before Andrus crossed the plate. After replays were reviewed over a span of 2 minutes, 45 seconds, Texas lost its challenge and the Nationals' assertion was confirmed.

"I might have reacted too soon," Washington acknowledged. "I should have waited until the first inning was over and I would have had my challenge. I was just trying to protect myself."

In the bottom half, Ramos looked at a third strike with

two outs and runners at first and third. It was the first of five straight strikeouts for Darvish.

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Kings advance to Finals

CHICAGO (AP) — The Los Angeles Kings almost went down in their opening playoff series. They flirted with elimination again in the second round.

They went to the absolute edge of the offseason in the Western Conference finals. This is one tough team heading to the Stanley Cup finals.

Alec Martinez scored at 5:47 of overtime, and the Kings beat the Chicago Blackhawks 5-4 Sunday night to advance to the NHL's championship for the second time in three years.

Los Angeles improved to 7-0 in elimination games with its third Game 7 win on the road this postseason. It will host the New York Rangers in Game 1 on Wednesday night.

"It's just a trust system in this room as the result of being together for hundreds of games," Kings captain Dustin Brown said. "Climbing the hill once. Then trying to do it again. We know what to expect and we expect a lot from each other."

Martinez's shot went off Blackhawks defenseman Nick Leddy and fluttered past goalie Corey Crawford, stunning the sellout crowd at the United Center and leading to a wild on-ice celebration for Los Angeles. Leddy and Crawford were hunched over as the Kings gathered in a big huddle along the boards.

"I didn't really see it go in," Martinez said. "I know it went off a couple bodies. I just tried to get it through and fortunately it went in."

Patrick Sharp scored twice for the Blackhawks, who blew a 2-0 lead. Brandon Saad had a goal and an assist, and Patrick Kane had two assists.

Chicago's loss means Detroit remains the last NHL team to win consecutive titles, accomplishing the feat in 1997 and 1998.

"I've lost some tough games but nothing like tonight," Blackhawks coach Joel Quenneville said.

The Kings became the first team to play 21 games through the first three rounds of the playoffs and make it to the NHL finals. The 2002 Avalanche and 1993 Maple Leafs also played the maximum

amount of games through three series, but they lost in Game 7 of the conference championships.

Los Angeles is the only team to play all three of those Game 7s on the road.

"We've battled back so many times this year and so many times in these playoffs, we said, 'Why not again today?'" said Justin Williams, who had a goal and an assist.

Tyler Toffoli also had a goal and an assist for the Kings, who once held a 3-1 lead in the series, only to have the Blackhawks come back to force Game 7. Jeff Carter scored his ninth playoff goal in the first, and Marian Gaborik had the tying goal midway through the third period.

The Kings also got 37 saves from Jonathan Quick in another resilient performance for Darryl Sutter's team. Los Angeles trailed San Jose 3-0 in its first-round series and was down 3-2 to top-seeded Anaheim in the second round before rallying each time.

"I feel very fortunate to be with the guys," Quick said. "Obviously our journey's not done yet and we've got a lot of work here coming up. New York's an awesome team. They beat great teams, so they're battle-tested, as well, so we've got a lot to get ready for."

Gaborik, Williams and

Mike Richards each improved to 7-0 in Game 7s.

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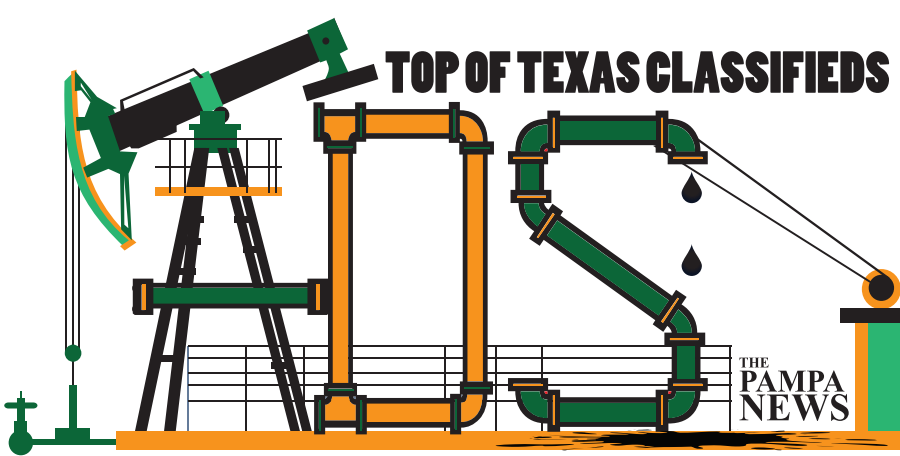
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Dear Abby...

DEAR HURTING: Gladly. This subject has appeared in my column before. You are correct that not all disabilities are visible. One that comes to mind would be a heart problem that prevents a patient from walking long distances. Another would be multiple sclerosis.

Readers, if you are concerned that someone is gaming the system, rather than confront the person, write down the license number of the car with the handicap plate and inform the Department of Motor Vehicles. If you are correct, the authorities will be interested in that information. And if you are not, you won't have caused someone who already has problems additional distress.

DEAR ABBY: I have been married to "Gilbert" for more than 30 years. We have always managed to resolve our differences in a relatively short time, but this time I'm not too sure. Our son was married last weekend, and
