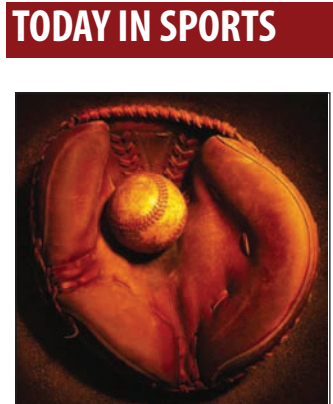

Pacific World War II vet spending his twilight years in Pampa

World War II is arguably the most well-known conflict the United States has been a part of. It is also a war the United States has fought on two fronts. The European front, where much of the conflict came, and the Pacific Front where the Americans took on the Japanese forces. James Goodwin, 90, served in the Marines during World War II and fought in two battles, the land battle of Vella Lavella in the Solomon Islands and the Allies retaking of the island of Guam. Goodwin joined the Marine Corp on Dec. 15, 1941 in San Diego, Calif. at Camp Elliot. That is where the 3rd Marine Division was activated. From there, Goodwin and the 9th Marine Regiment, which is a part of the 3rd Marine Division, were moved to Camp Pendleton. In January of 1943, Goodwin was sent to Auckland, New Zealand, the largest city on the north island. In September of 1943, Goodwin and his squad were sent to



the Solomon Islands, where he saw action on an island called Vella Lavella. From there the regiment was sent back to Guadalcanal and in July of 1944, his regiment was sent to liberate the island of Guam. "They took Saipan first and it was pretty bloody," Goodwin said. "We were on reserves and when we went

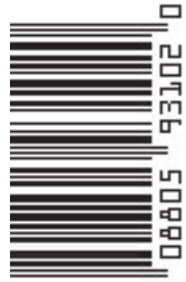

on to Guam on July 14 of 1944. We landed at Agana beach at about 10:30 a.m. and it was pretty light, we didn't have a lot of trouble. The first night was pretty noisy, because they tried to counter-attack."

On the third day of liberation, Goodwin said that the Japanese let the natives of Guam loose and the appreciation of American troops was unrivaled.

"I have never seen so many people ragged, thin and discouraged," Goodwin said. "But you talk about get hugs and kisses and thank yous, they re-

ally put us up as heroes. We were not heroes, the heroes were the ones that the Japanese used as slave labor. It didn't take long to unload supplies at the beach, on the fourth or fifth day they had moved forward and didn't need us to move the supply dump."

Goodwin experienced many unique situations while in Guam.

The island was hit by a typhoon which spread their supplies across the island. Goodwin even caught a tropical type of fever.

"One week I got sick," Goodwin said. "I got dengue fever (a virus spread by mosquitoes). I went to sick bay and said, 'I really don't feel well,' and the crewman there says, 'Sarge your really going to

be sick cause you have dengue fever,' I asked 'Is that bad?' and he said 'Oh it's real bad.' So they put me to bed there on a cot and the next thing I knew three days later when I woke up I had lost five pounds.

The crewman said 'Welcome back, Sarge. We thought we had lost ya' and he went on to tell me that sometimes dengue fever is fatal."

Goodwin was in Guam five or six weeks and when the war ended via the Atomic Bomb, Goodwin left the Marines in December of 1945, after his four years was finished. After Guam was liberated,

Goodwin's regiment kept a military base on the island which served the purpose of housing the B-29

bombers that would fly to Pacific missions and other missions.

He spent some time in the reserves during the 50s and was with three other Pampa men.

Goodwin enjoyed his time in the war and loves to share his stories. He earned two stars on his stripes from the two campaigns he was a part of.

"I grew up in the Marine Corp and had a lot of friends," Goodwin reminisces. "Fortunately I didn't lose too many of them."

Goodwin enjoyed New Zealand, also, saying the coldest it was while he was there was 38 degrees.

Goodwin, who turns 91, now lives in Pampa with his wife of 67 years (on Sunday) Wenona.

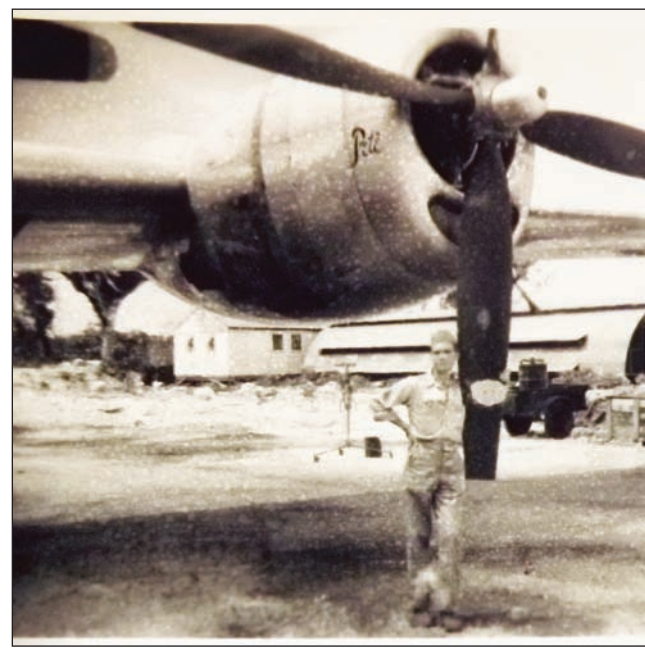

Will some split votes? Some think so

You might have heard someone say Leticia Van de Putte is the Democrat most likely to win a statewide election in November. She's the state senator from San Antonio facing Republican Dan Patrick, a state senator from Houston, in the race to replace Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, who has held the office since 2003.

The hopeful line about Van de Putte has found some traction, in Texas and beyond, among political observers and partisans who wonder how conservative a candidate can get before moderates who customarily vote for Republicans will peel off, hold their noses and vote for a statewide Democrat.

That's a lot to hope for. Patrick beat Dewhurst in a GOP

runoff a couple of weeks ago, and with Texas not having elected anyone but Republicans to statewide office in 20 years, Patrick is the favorite to win in November.

They said some of the same things about Ted Cruz when he ran as the most conservative candidate in the Republican primary for U.S. Senate two years ago and went on to an easy win in the 2012 general election.

Now Patrick is the man of the hour. His runoff win last month mirrored Cruz's victory over Dewhurst in 2012. Like Cruz, he claimed the most conservative ground in the primary. He has called the influx of undocumented immigrants an "illegal invasion," promised to curtail Democratic power in the state Senate (with rule changes and by putting fewer of them in charge of commit-

tees), and said during a televised debate that he would block consideration of legislation he opposes — such as a bill that would allow women to sue employers who pay them less than equally qualified men. (That legislation passed the Senate and House last year before dying on Gov. Rick Perry's veto.)

It was a winning combination in the GOP primary: Patrick surged ahead of three statewide officeholders in the March election, getting 41.4 percent of the vote; in the runoff, he got 65 percent, defeating a Republican who had won four statewide elections since 1998.

Democrats are hoping the Republicans will eventually make some of the mistakes Democrats themselves made back when they were on top and the GOP was trying to break down the doors of power.

They ran candidates — particularly at the national level — who were too liberal for conservative Texas

Democrats to stomach. They developed a split between conservatives and liberals that made it possible for Republicans to peel away the conservatives and form the beginnings of what is now a solid Republican majority.

The notion behind the current Van de Putte proposition is that — to Democrats — Patrick is so extreme that even some Republicans will rebel and vote for the Democrat. In a debate with Patrick this year, San Antonio Mayor Julián Castro said the Houston Republican would be the Democrats' "meal ticket" in November.

The differences between the two top candidates (there are also a Libertarian, a Green and an independent in the race) are stark: gender, ethnicity, party, ideology, roots. She is likely to attack his positions on immigration, health care, abortion, equal pay and education.

He is likely to attack her positions on some of those same things, characterizing

her as a liberal who wants to expand government and poisoning his darts with the unpopularity of the Democratic president.

To be the only Democratic statewide winner in November, Van de Putte would need to make sure Patrick doesn't perform as well as Greg Abbott. And that requires one to imagine the voter who will vote for Abbott and then turn and vote for Van de Putte — who will vote against Wendy Davis for governor and against Patrick for lieutenant governor. Republicans are betting there won't be many of those.

Democrats are hoping that women and minorities will have an allergic reaction to his rhetoric and positions, creating an opportunity for their candidate.

It happened before, but this was a different state when voters elected George W. Bush, a Republican, and Bob Bullock, a Democrat, to the top two positions on the ballot.

It nearly happened again four years later, when Bush won re-election against Gary Mauro by 37 percentage points and Republican Rick Perry beat Democrat John Sharp by less than 2 points in the race for lieutenant governor.

Hispanic voters received most of the credit for that one. Bush courted them heavily and won more votes than other Republicans, but those voters snapped back for the next Democrat on the ballot.

They swung. It is possible to overestimate the public's willingness to go along with whatever the ruling party is willing to throw at them. Democrats took their voters for granted and lost the state.

Now they're trying to create new voters in a low-vote state and to convert moderates and independents into ticket-splitters who might not automatically fall in behind the Republicans' red flag.

That's all they can do.

Houston, union reach deal on firefighter contract

HOUSTON (AP) — The City of Houston has reached a tentative deal with its firefighters' union on a 30-month labor agreement that includes a 4 percent pay raise in January but limits how vacations can be used.

The agreement, which still awaits approval by rank-and-file firefighters, would eliminate vacation banking that allows firefighters to use unused vacation days

of co-workers. It also tightens restrictions how many firefighters can be approved for vacation at any given time and how many can be guaranteed any given holiday.

An attendance review board also would be set up to recommend discipline for excessive unscheduled absences.

The existing contract expires June 30. The new contract would take effect July 1 and expire Dec. 31, 2016.

Brands use music to speak globally in World Cup

NEW YORK (AP) — Companies that are advertising for the World Cup are hoping music will strike a chord with fans globally.

Because the FIFA World Cup, the international soccer tournament that begins on Thursday, is the most popular sports event on the planet, advertisers want to take advantage of the large viewing audience. But the World Cup poses problems for companies that are used to making a splash at big sporting events like the Super Bowl with a pricey 30-second spot.

First off, soccer doesn't have very many commercial breaks, with two 45-minute halves played mostly straight through. Additionally, soccer is a global event, so it's hard to make TV ads that translate across cultures. As a result, brands — both official sponsors and those that just want to capitalize on the event — increasingly are using music to get the world's attention.

Danone's Activia yogurt teamed up with Shakira to update her wildly popular 2010 World Cup Song "Waka Waka," about Africa, with a Brazil-centric video for "La La La." Coca-Cola made a song in English, "The World is Ours," and then created 32 local versions, each sung by a local artist in the native language. And Beats by Dre launched a splashy

new 5-minute video "The Game Before the Game" that shows soccer stars like Neymar Jr. and many others preparing for game time by listening to "Jungle" by Jamie N Commons & The X Ambassadors.

The move is an effort by companies to try to capture the attention of one of the largest global audiences for any event. In the last World Cup four years ago, 3.2 billion people tuned in, including 909.6 million for the final match, according to FIFA. That's compared with the 111.5 million people who tuned into the Super Bowl this year.

"Sports is a great unifier and very few sports are as global as the World Cup," said Allen Adamson, managing director of branding firm Landor Associates. "Music is the other big platform that transcends cultures and languages, so it's an emotional way to connect with as broad an audience as the World Cup audience is."

The link between music and the World Cup is nothing new. The tournament has had a theme song since 1962 when "El Rock del Mundial" by Los Ramblers kicked off the 1962 World Cup in Chile. But this year, brand song ties are more popular than this year's official effort.

FIFA's "We Are One (Ole Ola)," has been criticized by Brazilians and other soccer fans as being

tone deaf to Brazil culture. Critics complain that it is sung by Cuban-American rapper Pitbull and Bronx-born Puerto Rican singer Jennifer Lopez instead of a Brazilian singer (although it does feature Brazilian singer Claudia Leitte); and it is sung mainly in English and Spanish rather than Portuguese.

So marketers have stepped in, and so far, are scoring big. Shakira's "La La La" video, sponsored by Activia in partnership with the World Food Programme, has garnered 95 million YouTube views since it went up 3 weeks ago. By comparison, the official FIFA song has about 72 million views after five weeks. The video: <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=7-7knsP2n5w>

"When we heard 'La La La,' we immediately knew consumers would be swayed by the rhythm and energy of this song," said Santiago Mier Albert, general manager of Activia and vice president of marketing of Danone's fresh dairy products division worldwide.

Coca Cola's song has hit the top 10 charts in 40 countries worldwide. That is a big step up from their last effort in 2010, "Wavin' Flag" which was done in 24 versions and charted in 17 countries. The video: <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=v32DO6XV1BE>

versal. Music is universal too," said Joe Belliotti, director of global entertainment marketing at Coca-Cola. "And if you can find that simple melody and simple lyrical idea that can translate and connect with people around the world, that's the formula we strive for."

Beats, which is not an official sponsor of the event and refers to its ad as a global campaign featuring the world-known soccer players, has gotten nearly 8 million views after just four days on YouTube. The five-minute ad cinematically shows rituals athletes use to get ready for "The Game Before The Game." Brazilian soccer star Neymar Jr. takes a motivational call from his father, Serena Williams gets a patriotic manicure, and they all block out distraction with their Beats headphones to the tune of the foot-stomping "Jungle." It's a chance for Beats, which was recently bought by Apple for \$3 billion, to step out onto the global stage for the first time, said Barbara Lippert, longtime ad critic and a columnist for Mediapost.com.

"Beats is a company about music, they really know how to make music videos, it's a smart strategy and beautifully put together," she said.

If you ask her "Why the decoration?" She'll say "It's fur my lover who is fur, fur away."

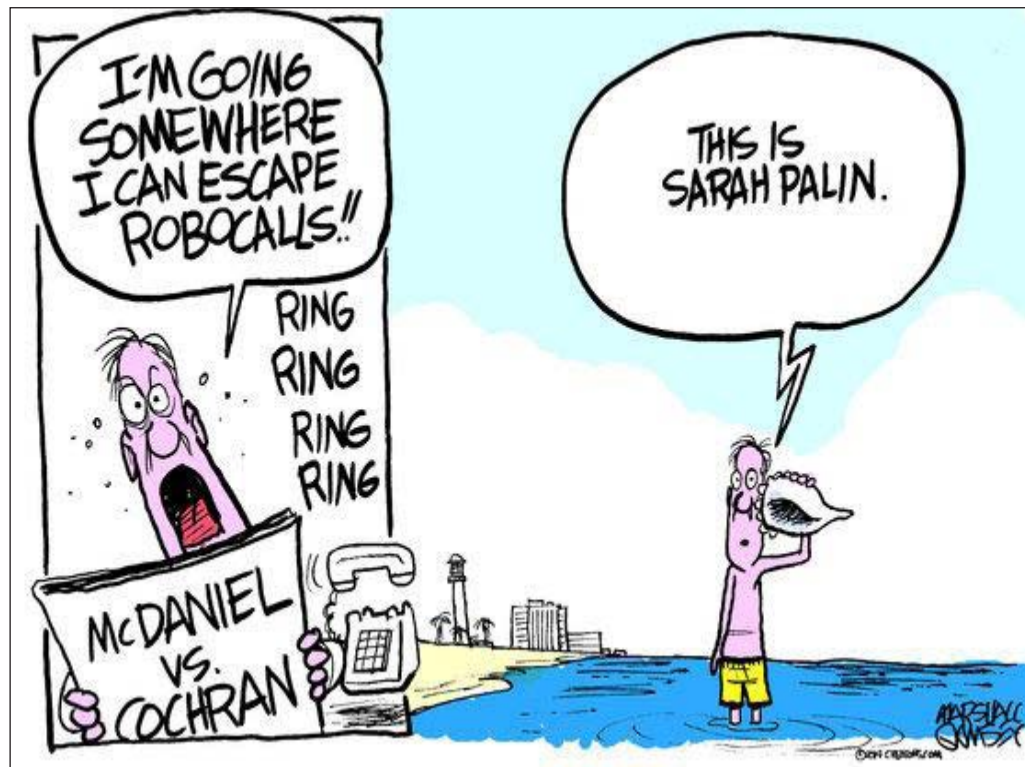
In 1949 a song was created using the above lyrics, and added more to show that it was supporting the military troops. In 1970 "Tie a Yellow Ribbon Around the Ole Oak Tree" was a song put out by Dawn and Tony Orlando. It again signified that a loved one was overseas serving in the military.

When a person wants to show support for those who are serving in the war overseas, then they can put a flag with a star in the center of it on display. A blue star means someone you love is serving and a gold star represents that someone passed away while serving.

The hero and the bad guys

On Saturday, Bowe Bergdahl was a hero, and the five members of the Taliban being freed in exchange for him were the worst of the worst.

By the end of the week, it seemed that neither is actually true. The parade in Bergdahl's Idaho hometown was canceled. Four of the five aren't nice guys, but they aren't war criminals, either.

As for Bergdahl, I don't pretend to know whether he deserted his unit. That is a question that can only be answered in a properly and fairly conducted court-martial.

But the account that broke my heart was the interview with the widow who had only just learned that it was while he was out looking for Bergdahl that her husband was killed. She was pregnant with their second child at the time. I don't know how you explain that to your kids, especially when they

are old enough to understand.

And of course, what made it so much worse is that we really wanted a happy ending to this story. I was watching the coverage on Saturday in the green room at Fox, and Tammy Bruce reminded me of all the questions that had been raised in the past about Bergdahl's disappearance. Jake Tapper had already tweeted about it. It was there. And if you listened to the coverage clearly or read the whole story, it was there: the continued uncertainty as to how it was that Bergdahl was seized. But who listened so closely? The army promoted him twice. They must know. Besides, I wanted to be happy for Jani and Bob.

Saturday belonged to Bowe's parents. They lived through every parent's nightmare, and then after years of pain and grief, they got the call. Their son was coming home. I defy you to find a mother who did not relate to Jani Bergdahl, who did not want to share her joy. To a mother, it's worth five of the worst of the worst

or, as John McCain put it, "the hardest and toughest of all."

Well, maybe not so hard and tough. Three of the five, it is now being reported, were political officials during the period that the Taliban ruled and were thought to be among the moderates in the Taliban government; one of them was a student working for a relative, who offered to help the United States after we came in, and we arrested him instead. Another was a midlevel police official.

One, the former army chief of staff, looks to be among the worst and is accused of war crimes. But in terms of his likely role in the Taliban today, even he is more than a decade out of date, and as some of the experts have not so charitably put it, all of these guys are old, at least in terrorist terms.

So should the administration have done the swap?

Probably. But like so much of our politics today, the answer isn't very satisfying.

It's important to send the message to our sol-

diers that we leave no one behind. Bergdahl deserves his day in court, at least, and until proved guilty, he is an American soldier whom we are all bound to support.

But my heart still goes out to the widow who is wondering exactly why her husband was out searching for this guy.

On the bad guys, the hardest question, as to four of the five, is not whether we are endangered by their release, but whether this is whom we have been keeping Guantanamo open to detain. Why?

As to the fifth, the really bad guy, my assumption, which the reports seem to confirm, is that he was the price of the deal. You want to get your soldiers home? You give up bad guys. Ask Israel. War is an ugly business. Not much to be happy about. The left and right can scream at each other, but neither side has great answers. It is what it is.

feel violated. Not only that, you could lose Husband No. 3.

DEAR ABBY: My 2-year-old daughter has recently become boob-obsessed. The first thing she does in the morning is point at my chest and say, "Boobs!" If she hugs me, she tries to grab them.
