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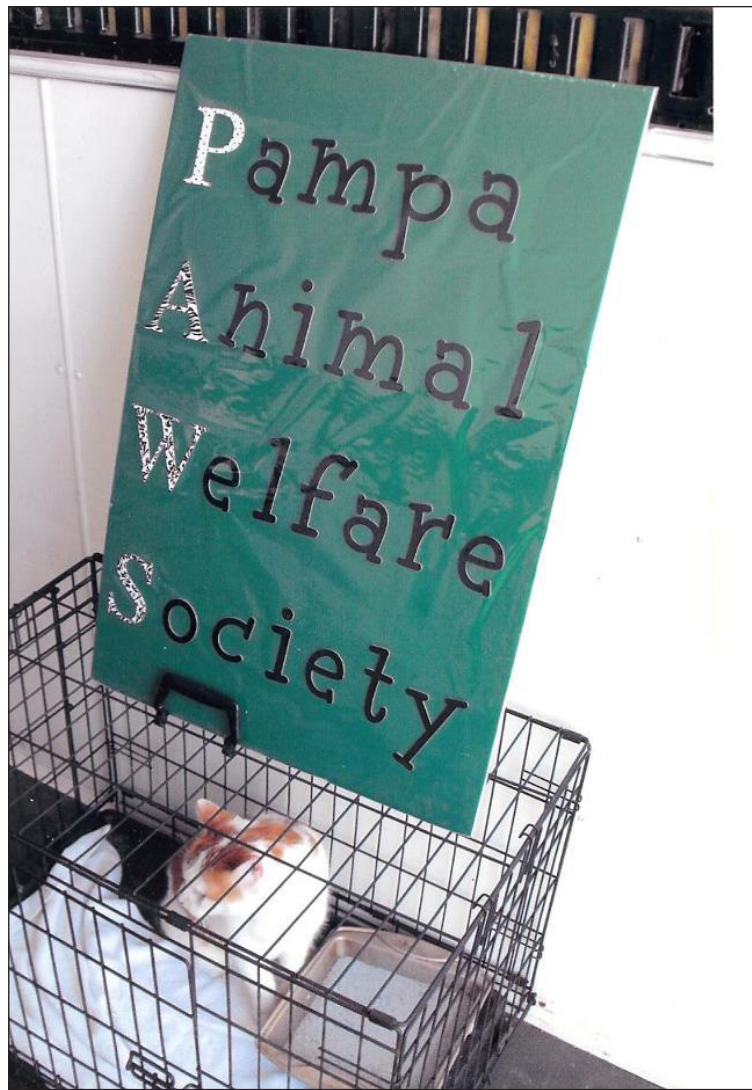

Renowned cardiologist to speak at Heart Ball tonight

The 2014 Tri-County Heart Ball, hosted by the American Heart Association, is being held tonight at the Pampa Country Club.

Who better to have as a special guest speaker for a heart-themed event than renowned cardiologist, Dr. Hugo Blake. Dr. Blake received his Doctor of Medicine degree on Jan. 24, 1974 from Universidad de Medicina in Mexico.

He went on to earn master's degree in business administration from the University of Texas-Pan American in Edinburg.

Since then he has gone on to open up several hospitals, including the opening of McAllen Heart Hospital located in McAllen, Texas. He also assisted in the establishment of building and developing of Harlingen Medical Center in Harlingen.

He has also served on several committees involving the practice of cardiology.

But Dr. Blake knows that tonight he isn't speaking to a medical audience; so he is going to leave the medical dictionary at home.

"I am going to be speaking to a mixed audience," Dr. Blake said. "So I am going to make it entertaining and it will concern the history of cardiology."

Dr. Blake said that the field of cardiology has changed dramatically in the last 20 years.

"It used to be if you had heart disease it essentially meant you were going to die," Dr. Blake.

"But now, with the advancements in medical technology, people are able to live healthier lives as long as they change their lifestyle."

On the same token, Dr. Blake said that there will probably be an increase in congestive heart failure patients. Of course, with the demand, comes the solutions.

"What's going to happen is we will see an increase in cardiac patients," Dr. Blake said. "But we will have more devices to control congestive heart failure."

The Tri-County Heart Ball will be on Saturday, June 14 at the Pampa Country Club. The silent auction begins at 6 p.m. and dinner will be served at 7 p.m.

The live auction begins at 8 p.m. with Dr. Blake speaking at 8:30 p.m.

Following the events, music provided by Agave Posse Band will fill the air for attendees to dance the night away.

Samaritans, their families and all of DPS,” said Director McCraw. “On behalf of Texas, I thank you for your continued service and commitment to helping others.”

The following awards were presented:

- Trooper David Granado, Texas Highway Patrol in Waco, received the Medal of Valor for his efforts to assist a wounded fellow officer despite great risk. On December 18, 2013, Granado and his partner were assisting the McLennan County Sheriff's Office with the apprehension of a kidnapping suspect. The suspect opened fire on the officers, shooting a McLennan County Deputy Lt. Johnny Spillman in the upper thigh. Granado subsequently moved the wounded officer out of danger and used the officer's belt as a tourniquet to stop the bleeding, helping to save his life.

- Trooper Dina Ortiz, Texas Highway Patrol in Midland, and Trooper Grant Belvin, Texas Highway Patrol in Beaumont, each received the Javier Arana Jr. Top Trooper Award, given each year to the top male and female competitors. Ortiz and Belvin competed against other DPS Highway Patrol troopers in the Top Trooper Competition, which tests troopers on core competencies, including job knowledge, driving skills, physical fitness and firearms proficiency. Belvin also was the 2013 male recipient of the award.

- Trooper Eliezer Badillo, Texas Highway Patrol in Lockhart, received the Life Saving Award for his actions during a life-threatening situation on January 9, 2014. During an on-duty break at a restaurant in Kyle, Badillo observed another customer choking on his food (who happened to be a non-uniformed law enforcement officer). Badillo performed the Heimlich maneuver until the officer was able to

begin coughing and breathe normally, helping to save his life.

- Trooper Alex Goch, Texas Highway Patrol in Austin, received the Life Saving Award, for his assistance at a crash scene on September 18, 2013. While responding to a motorcycle crash on FM 2243 in Williamson County, Goch provided medical attention to the motorcycle operator, who had lost his right leg below the hip. Two civilians, Cray Steger and Julia Steger, had already fashioned a tourniquet out of clothing and applied it to the man's leg, but he was still losing blood. Goch ultimately applied a DPS-issued tourniquet to the man's upper thigh to help stop the bleeding until EMS personnel arrived. Julia Steger, Curtis Steger and Cray Steger were each recognized with the Director's Award for their Good Samaritan actions during this incident.

The Austin Crime Laboratory DNA Casework Section received a Unit Citation for

their continued dedication to enhancing efficiency and improving policies and procedures in order to handle an increased caseload. The section has implemented new technologies, including robotics and a new Laboratory Information Management System, which have helped improve the unit's ability to effectively process cases. The Austin Crime Laboratory DNA Casework staff has distinguished itself by exceeding normal expectations in its mission to assist the agency in combatting crime and enhancing public safety. Jody Koehler, Allison Heard, Heather Dragna, Misty Alvarado, Tiffany Bazazzadegan, Chase Baumgartner, Michelle Bonnette, Jane Burgett, Kimberly Clement, Lauren Culver, Katie Dace, Brianne Floryan, Nicholas Ford, Matthew Julian, Caitlin Lott, Rebecca Maguire, Erika Martinez, Robert Meade, Nikki Palmer, Sapana Prajapati, and Heidi Riding were all recognized as part of the Unit Citation.

Border agents in Texas warned not to talk to media

WASHINGTON (AP) — The surge in immigrant children caught crossing the southern border in Texas that has dominated headlines and risks becoming a political crisis for President Barack Obama and Congress includes a new threat facing Border Patrol agents: reporters.

An assistant chief patrol agent, Eligio “Lee” Pena, warned more than 3,000 Border Patrol agents that journalists looking for information about what Obama has described as a humanitarian crisis are likely to ask for information and “may try to disguise themselves.” The email, obtained by The Associated Press, said agents should not speak to reporters, on or off duty, without advanced permission and warned that anyone who does could be charged with a crime or disciplined administratively.

Customs and Border Protection Commissioner Gil Kerlikowske told the AP on Friday he was not aware of Pena's email warnings but said generally, “I am not a fan of telling people not to talk.” Kerlikowske, who has pledged greater transparency since taking over the agency earlier this year,

did not formally disavow the directive but added that Border Patrol agents should be focused on their jobs while on duty.

Pena's email was issued as national news organizations descended on the border to cover the immigration surge, especially children crossing the border alone from Central America. The problem has overwhelmed the Border Patrol. More than 47,000 children traveling alone have been found at the border since the start of the budget year in October.

Pena did not describe what sorts of disguises could be employed by reporters.

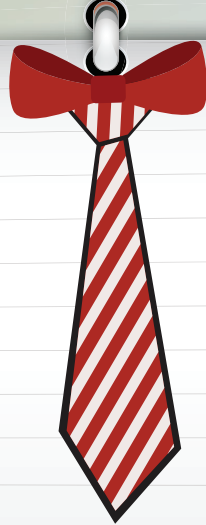
The issue has fueled the political debate in Washington about U.S. immigration policies, which contributed to this week's stunning election defeat of House Majority Leader Eric Cantor, R-Va. Cantor's opponent had said the Republican leader supported “amnesty” for immigrants in the U.S. illegally, and said the surprise election outcome effectively dooms any prospects for legal changes to American immigration laws. Obama has disputed this and urged Congress to act this summer.

Two men sentenced in teen's death in bungled robbery

FORT WORTH (AP) — Two North Texas men have been sentenced to prison for an attempted robbery that resulted in gunfire that left a teenage accomplice dead.

Tarrant County prosecutors say 23-year-old Curtis Fortenberry and 23-year-old Terrance Crumley reached a plea deal Friday in the June 2012 death of Claudia Hidic. Fortenberry pleaded guilty to murder and was sentenced to 33 years in prison. Crumley

admitted to tampering with evidence and received a 15-year sentence.

Prosecutors say Hidic and the two men conspired to rob a Fort Worth home by having the 17-year-old Hidic pretend to be a hostage. Fortenberry and Crumley claimed a man in the home owed them money. An armed person inside confronted them and shots were exchanged.

Hidic was caught in the crossfire, struck by a bullet from Fortenberry's gun.

Buffalo Soldiers, Henry O. Flipper to be honored near Mobeetie

 Today, the Wheeler County Historical Commission will dedicate a historical marker honoring the Buffalo Soldiers that served at Fort Elliott, Texas during the 1875-1890 time period, along with Henry O. Flipper, a lieutenant in the army and the first African-American to graduate from West Point. To start the day off, at 10 a.m., there will be a flag ceremony and firing of the cannons at the old Mobeetie jail museum grounds in front of the flag pole that once stood at Fort Elliott. The dedication will begin at 11 a.m. one mile west of Mobeetie at the road side park on State Highway 152. The dedication ceremony program will include Wheeler County officials, Wheeler Boy Scout Troop 472, decedences of Buffalo Soldiers, re-enacting groups from Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma and recognition of area veterans. A tour of the Fort Elliott site will start at 1:30 p.m. leaving from the front of

the visitors center of the old Mobeetie Jail Museum. Ed Benz, president of the Frontier Regiment of The High Plains, will narrate the tour telling the story of Fort Elliott on site with photos and research information. A reception will be held at the old Mobeetie Jail Museum visitors center at 2:30 p.m. following the tour. Tables of personal finding in past years from the Fort Elliott site and replicas of items that relate to the era will be on display in the visitors center. Also, a photo and information about Lt. Henry O. Flipper will be set up at the entrance of the visitors center. The re-enactor groups will set up a camp site on the Mobeetie Jail Museum grounds and will visit with our guests about the role of the soldiers stationed at Fort Elliott. To close out the day, the re-enacting groups will perform a flag folding ceremony at the Fort Elliott flag pole that is located on the grounds of the old Mobeetie jail museum.

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Bouncin' Around More Wisconsin travels!

Welcome back to our Wisconsin travels! On our last trip, we ended up in Oshkosh and visited the EAA Air Museum. Today we will travel about three hours north to the beautiful North Woods and our destination, Minocqua.

For those who have rarely, if ever, left the Texas Panhandle, you'll want a little item called deer whistles mounted on the front bumper of your car. Driving through the pine forests of northern Wisconsin, you will encounter more deer than you ever thought possible, and the deer whistles coupled with a light foot on the gas pedal will reduce the devastating effects of those encounters.

Late one summer evening, around 10 p.m., it took us over an hour to drive one mile while we waited for herds of deer to cross the road. There is so much to see and do in this area that one week is hardly enough, but we'll see how much we can pack in. The area is rightly known as the Lakeland Area, with over 3,000 freshwater lakes, ponds, and streams.

The town of Minocqua is more or less an island in the center of Minocqua Lake. The lake is the home of the Minocquabats, an acrobatic water ski team that puts on a twice-weekly water ski show.

The skiers are mostly young high school or college students, and their skills are unsurpassed. After the show, walk a few blocks downtown to the Boardwalk Ice Cream and Fudge shop.

You can watch the fudge being made while you chow down on a gooey ice cream sundae or banana split, then take a box of the gourmet fudge back to your lodging with you. There are many choices of lodging, from rustic cabins to luxury motels. Most of the cabins cater to boaters and fishermen with well-equipped kitchens or grills for cooking your catch.

There are pristine beaches where you can go swim in water so clear you can see the bottom of the lake. The area is well-known for cranberry bogs, and no visit to Minocqua is complete without a visit to Cranberry Square, where you can buy cranberry-themed items ranging from T-shirts to cranberry jam.

Being Wisconsin, of course there are many places to buy fresh Wisconsin cheeses. Native American gifts and leather goods are always available too.

No visit to the area is complete unless you visit Paul Bunyan's Cook Shanty. The place has been in business for more than fifty years and serves family-style meals worthy of the big lumberjack himself.

A word of warning, though: it's not a place to eat if you are on a diet or have a small appetite, but a great place to take teenage boys. Another not-to-be-missed event is the Monday night snowshoe softball games in Lake Tomahawk. The games are held at Snowshoe Park, and the infield is covered in pine wood chips,

and the ball is a 16-inch fluorescent yellow ball.

The players wear 36-inch wooden Bear Paw snowshoes, and other players have been known to step on the back of an opponent's snowshoe as he or she runs to first base.

The bleachers are wooden, and I still have a souvenir of my sideways slide along one of those benches. At the time it entered my posterior, it felt like a three-foot plank. Said plank needed to be removed by my husband at the motel while my mother-in-law held a table lamp, and our six-year-old daughter asked if she should go out in the parking lot and yell "Emergency."

Admission to the games is free, but a butterfly net is passed during the game to help offset expenses. An average attendance can be as many as 1200-1500, with more on July 4. The homemade pie that is sold during the games is another popular draw.

During the summer there are many attractions—golf, kid-friendly entertainment areas and zoos, horseback riding. In the winter there is skiing, ice fishing, snowmobiling and winter festivals.

My husband and I spent our honeymoon in Eagle River, a short drive from Minocqua, and we took our daughter there several times on family vacations. From what I understand, the area is still just as much fun, and we have many happy memories of our visits to northern Wisconsin.

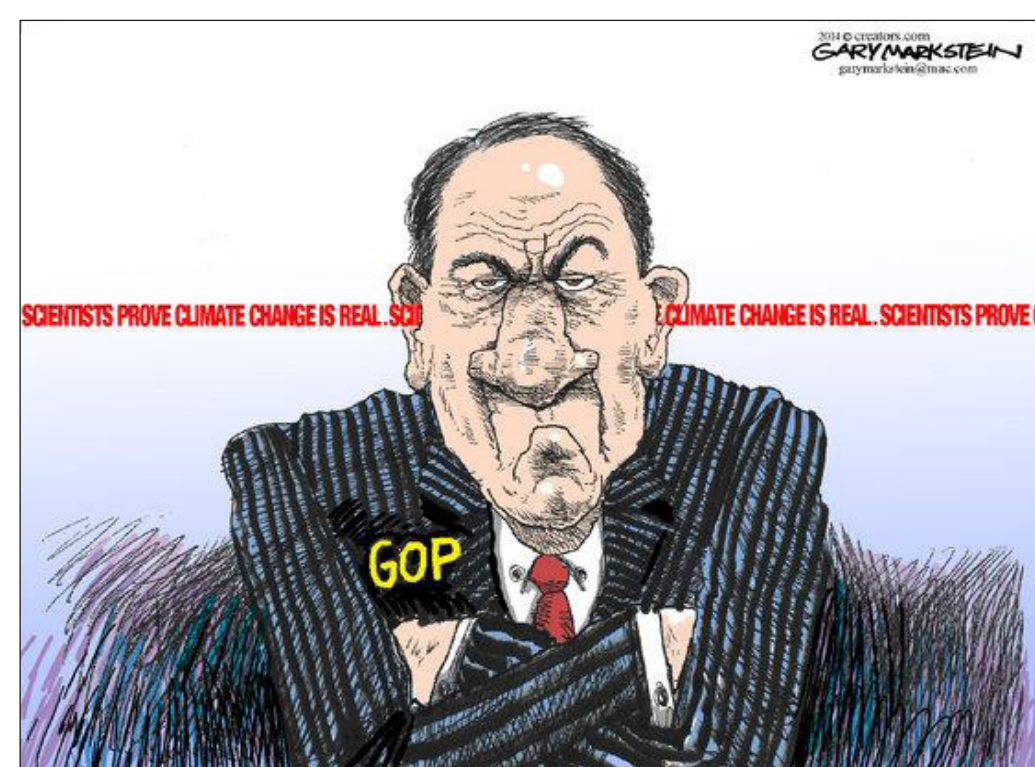

TEREZIN, Czech Republic (AP) — Edgar Krasa took part in one of the ennobling acts of the Holocaust. He didn't take up arms in a ghetto insurrection, or fight in the Jewish underground. Instead, he and several hundred fellow concentration camp inmates defied the Nazis through music.

For Krasa, the road began at the Masaryk Railway Station in the Czech capital, Prague. It was Nov. 24, 1941, and the Nazi machine was crushing one of the oldest Jewish communities of Europe. Over the next four years, thousands of its artists, writers, musicians and professionals would be transported from the Prague area to the fortress-turned-concentration camp where Krasa was sent that day: Terezin.

The 21-year-old cook got off the train with 340 other Jews and trudged across a bleak countryside shouldering the 110 pounds (50 kilograms) of possessions each was permitted to bring. The Germans were billing Terezin, 38 miles (60 kilometers) northwest of Prague, as a "spa town" generously offered by Hitler to shelter Jews from the escalating war in Europe.

As the group passed through the gates of the fortress town, ringed by nine-foot (nearly three-meter)

thick walls, any hopes they may have harbored about a pleasant sojourn vanished.

"They made us feel right away as prisoners," Krasa, now a 93-year-old Bostonian, remembers.

Terezin was never an extermination camp, although some 35,000 of the 140,000 prisoners perished there. Built in the 18th century, the town served as a collection center for the cream of Jewish intelligentsia, not only from what was then Czechoslovakia but half a dozen other European countries. From there, 87,000 were shipped on to camps like Auschwitz; almost none survived. Terezin also proved a propaganda coup for the Nazis, who used it to show the world that they were treating Jews humanely.

The reality of Terezin could not be more different.

Krasa remembers how conditions deteriorated rapidly as military barracks were converted to stack arrivals. A town built to accommodate 5,000, Terezin's inmate population would reach 55,000. Typhus epidemics, overwork, executions and severe malnutrition scythed through its ranks.

A week after Krasa's arrival, a young Prague musician, Rafael Schachter, turned up at Terezin — and

the two shared an attic room. "He was my hero. His vision was to make the lives of every prisoner more bearable," says Krasa.

Schachter gathered inmates to sing popular Czech songs, then entire operas and finally led them in rehearsals of Giuseppe Verdi's Requiem Mass, a towering work that challenges the world's finest musicians. They learned it by rote from a single smuggled score.

The chorus rehearsed in a cold dark cellar after hours of grueling forced labor. The group of some 150 had to be replenished twice as members were deported to Auschwitz. At times they emerged from the cellar and stepped over the skeletal corpses of fellow inmates.

"Well, it kept our spirits lifted. We felt we wanted to go on. We were hungry, we were tired, we were sick. But we had something to live for," Krasa says.

The rehearsals were initially carried out in secret, but Jewish elders were able to persuade camp commanders to allow such activities so they could demonstrate to the world the Nazis' "goodwill" toward the Jews. Intellectual and artistic life exploded. The Terezin Orchestra and a jazz group called the Ghetto Swingers were formed.

Inmates staged cabarets, operas and piano recitals, complete with handbills. They gave more than 2,400 lectures on subjects ranging from physics to philosophy. Krasa, who once crooned in a barber shop quartet, sang in all 16 performances of the Requiem at Terezin.

The final one was on June 23, 1944, given before senior Nazis, including the principal architect of the genocide Adolf Eichmann, and an International Red Cross delegation. It was part of an elaborate and successful hoax to present Terezin, greatly prettified for the occasion, as a benign place of refuge.

The Requiem chorus had its own secret plan to hoodwink the Nazis.

Schachter told his singers, now down to 60, to study the Requiem's message: a heart-breaking plea for salvation but also a terrifying evocation of the day "when the damned are silenced and given to the fierce flames" — the day when their captors would be punished. Singing the Requiem to the faces of the Nazis, he said, would be an act of defiance, and an affirmation of their own dignity.

"If the Nazis realized what the lyrics were about (we) could be deported (to death camps). But nobody left. Nobody. We sang those

verses," Krasa has said. "It was the only way we were able to achieve victory."

The lights dimmed in the elegant, 19th-century Konzerthaus in Berlin, the city where the blueprint for the liquidation of Europe's Jews was finalized.

Sitting in the front row, holding his wife's hand, was Krasa, gray-haired, mentally alert, always ready with a joke.

Seventy years after he first sang the Requiem at Terezin, the somber opening measures of Verdi's masterwork sound in a performance paying tribute to Schachter, his fellow musicians and the power of art over evil.

Above the orchestra, among a 150-strong chorus clad in black, Krasa's 18-year-old grandson Alexander and sons Daniel and Rafael, named after his friend and mentor, were singing the bass parts, just as he once had.

Conducting was Murry Sidlin, the American creator of the Defiant Requiem Foundation which seeks to preserve the legacy of Terezin — its "artistic defiance" as he calls it

— through education and stagings of Verdi's mass across the globe. Krasa, too, promotes this legacy, speaking to students, religious groups and musicians and funding young Czech, Israeli and American composers.

After Terezin, Krasa survived Auschwitz and a labor camp, and escaped from a death march with a bullet lodged in his ribs.

He left his homeland in 1950 and eventually settled outside Boston where he held executive positions in a nursing home and later opened his own restaurant, retiring in 1991.

Schachter was deported four months after his last performance. He survived Auschwitz but died on a death march at the age of 39. The liberation of Czechoslovakia was only one month away.

"You see, music can be so much more than playing a tune," Krasa wrote in a booklet about Terezin. "In my case, it helped me live and it kept me going through the worst part of my life. And for that, I will never forget Rafael Schachter."

90-year-old ex-president Bush makes parachute jump

KENNEBUNKPORT, Maine (AP) — Former President George H.W. Bush celebrated his 90th birthday by making a tandem parachute jump near his summer home, fulfilling a goal he made five years ago after a similar jump even though he can no longer use his legs.

The nation's 41st president jumped from a helicopter Thursday at about 6,000 feet while harnessed to retired Sgt. 1st Class Mike Elliott, a former member of the Golden Knights, the Army's parachute team, who guided Bush to a safe landing on his 85th birthday.

"That's what he wanted for his 90th birthday and that's what he got," Elliott said. "It's a very good feeling to be involved and be able to turn back time."

The helicopter picked up Bush outside his home in Kennebunkport, in coastal Maine. His family sang "Happy Birthday" to him as he was transported him from his wheelchair to the chopper.

Bush floated to the ground under a red, white and blue parachute and landed on the lawn of St. Ann's Episcopal Church, where several hundred friends and relatives had gathered. Elliott said Bush's foot got tangled up underneath him during the landing, causing him to tumble forward onto the ground. A spokesman later said the former president was feeling "fine."

"He had a big smile for the crowd. You could tell he was exhilarated," said Diana Untermeyer, a family friend from Houston. "He's an amazing man. This is just another sign of that. I think that like most of America, our family loves him to pieces. It was just a real thrill to do this again."

Bush was greeted with a kiss from his wife, Barbara Bush, and a hug from his son former President George W. Bush. The family left without talking to reporters.

Outside the grounds, scores of people gathered on the rocky shore to get a glimpse of the jump.

"He has a lot of courage. We need more like him," said David Morris, 79, of Melrose, Massachusetts.

Said Carol Schierl, 75, of Green Bay, Wisconsin: "I think it's wonderful. I hope I can jump out of a plane at

90." The jump was kept secret until Thursday morning partly to give Bush the option of bagging it because of less-than-ideal weather.

"It's vintage George Bush," spokesman Jim McGrath said. "It's that passion for life. It's wanting to set a goal, wanting to achieve it. I'm sure part of it is sending a message to others that even in your retirement years you can still find challenges."

Bush had to overcome the objections of his doctor and his family before making the jump, Elliott said.

"He's smiling like a kid in kindergarten," Elliott said following the jump.

Bush's jump was indicative of a trend among peo-

ple of advanced age, said Lenard Kaye, director of the Maine Center on Aging at the University of Maine. More seniors are participating in extreme physical activities deep into their golden years, a trend that will pick up steam as more baby boomers retire, he said.

Such "extreme acts of adventure" are becoming a part of many seniors' lives, but they need to be mindful that their bones are more fragile than when they were younger, he said.

Bush, during his years in the White House, was known for jogging, tennis and fast-paced golf. The former president, who signed the landmark Americans with Disabilities Act in 1990, now uses a wheel-

chair or scooter because of a form of parkinsonism that has robbed him of use of his legs.

The first time Bush jumped from an airplane was when his plane was shot down in World War II over the Pacific. He marked his 75th, 80th and 85th birthdays by skydiving. Thursday was his eighth jump.

Other birthday festivities included a private dinner with more than 200 relatives and friends, including some from his White House days: press secretary Marlin Fitzwater and political director Ron Kaufman, McGrath said.



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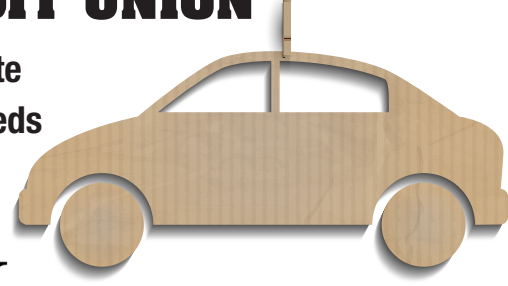
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Homeowner to burn house teetering on Texas cliff

WHITNEY, Texas (AP) — The owner of a vacant luxury house teetering atop a crumbling 75-foot cliff over a Central Texas lake has decided to burn the home. The 4,000-square-foot house to be demolished Fri-

day overlooks Lake Whitney, about 60 miles south of Fort Worth. The house has been condemned and the owners evacuated the property about two weeks ago. Chunks of the cliff — and the \$700,000

home — have been tumbling into the water. Tom Hemrick, Hill County's emergency management coordinator, says the owner decided to burn the house to its slab foundation after consulting with demolition

experts and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Hemrick says the owner will have the charred debris moved to stable land and crews will remove the slab. The residence was built in 2007.

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Abused women and Social Security

Based on emails I get from many women, I sometimes find it hard to believe that we are living in the 21st century! It is just so sad, and even shocking, what some men will do to their wives or ex-wives. In these cases, I'm not talking about physical abuse, although I can only imagine what some of the women who share their stories with me have had to put up with. But I am talking about how some men treat women emotionally and financially — and more specifically, how Social Security gets involved in these matters. I've dealt with these issues before. (One of my columns that got the most feedback from readers was titled something like, "When you are married to a jerk!") However, the sad emails from sometimes desperate women just keep flowing into my inbox, so I've got to address the issue again.

Q: I was married to my first husband for 8 years. He died a long time ago. I've been married to my second husband for 35 years. A few years ago, I had a stroke, which left me with many problems. I am doing much better than I was in the past, but I still have many physical and emotional issues. Ever since the stroke, my husband has been aloof and distant from me. Sometime even hostile. We are both in our early 60s. He would never let me work outside the home, so I don't have any Social Security of my own. He gets a nice pension from his former employer. He won't let me share in that. I was hoping to get some of his Social Security, but he refuses to sign up for those benefits just to keep me from getting anything. What can I do?

A: Frankly, I'm not sure why you are still married to this guy. But from a Social Security perspective, I can tell you that you should dump his sorry butt as soon as possible.



As long as you are married to him, you cannot get benefits on his Social Security record until he is getting benefits himself. But if you are divorced, you could claim benefits from him even though he isn't getting anything. (There is sometimes a two-year waiting period to claim benefits after a divorce, but still, the sooner he is out of your life the better off you will eventually be.

Also, once you are divorced, you might be eligible for widow's benefits off your first husband's Social Security record.

Q: My husband and I are getting a divorce after 30 years of marriage. I worked for a short while before we were married, but was a stay-at-home mom for the past three decades. To put it mildly, our divorce is an acrimonious one. He was a philandering fool, but he blames me for driving him into the arms of his mistresses! I am frankly happy to be rid of him. I was about to sign the divorce papers, but my lawyer just informed me that my husband and his lawyer are insisting on a clause in our divorce decree that stipulates that I cannot have access to any of his Social Security, both while he is alive and after he is gone. My lawyer tells me we should hold out and fight this in the courts. I thought I recall a past column in which you discussed something similar. What can

I do?

A: First, you can think about getting a new lawyer. Second, you can sign the divorce papers.

That Social Security clause your husband wants added to the divorce decree is totally meaningless. Social Security law says that you will be eligible for divorced spouse's benefits on his record as long as you meet the eligibility criteria. In a nutshell, the rules say you would get part of his Social Security if you are at least 62 years old; he is also at least 62 years old; you are not currently married, and you are not due higher benefits on your own Social Security record. Anything your husband's lawyer scribbles into a divorce decree about Social Security cannot supersede federal law. Your lawyer should have known this and told you so.

Q: For the past 25 years, my husband and I have owned a small store in which we sell and repair vacuum cleaners. I do the selling, and he does the repairing. Even though the vast majority of our income comes from the sales end of the business, my husband (and his accountant, who is one of his oldest friends) has always insisted that all of the profits, and therefore all of the Social Security credits, be listed under his name and Social Security number on our tax return. I was always OK with this. But now we are getting a divorce, and I worried that I was dumb to go along with their little accounting scheme. I am 58 years old, and now I'm starting to worry about my retire-

ment years.

A: First, the bad news. There is really nothing you can do to go back and fix this and add earnings to your Social Security record. Having said that, you maybe are being too hard on yourself by saying you were "dumb" to go along with their accounting gimmicks. You certainly are not alone in this situation. In my 40 plus years of working on Social Security issues, I've encountered thousands of moms in a "mom and pop" business who got the short end of the Social Security stick — just like you. I have only met a handful of women who jointly split the income with their husbands, which is what I think you and your husband should have done. And interestingly, I have never once met a couple where the wife had all the earnings (and Social Security credits) put into her name.

The good news is that you will derive something from Social Security for all the years you spent working in this business. But it will all come off of his record. Once you are 62 years old, you will get a divorced wife's benefit from his Social Security. At that age, it will be 35 percent of his full benefit. (You could get up to 50 percent if you wait until age 66 to file.) And when he dies, you could get up to 100 percent of his Social Security in the form of divorced widow's benefits. But all of this is assuming you don't do something foolish like run off and marry another wonderful guy!

Perry and her team hope to visit every nearby national park while on the 46-city North American tour, which starts June 22 in Raleigh, North Carolina. They also plan to stop at Dollywood in Tennessee. Perry embraced the "Make

Roar Happen" effort because so many of her fans are students. But she doesn't let being a role model drive her behavior. "I'm aware that people look up to me, but I hope it's more an inspirational thing and not like, 'Katy Perry makes these decisions for herself, so therefore I'll make decisions based on those Katy Perry makes,' anyone should live their life," she said. "But I hope

they're inspired by my hard work, my ambition, and my integrity." Perry will be on the road through October before launching the European leg of her tour next year. Ruby Dee's legacy of activism, acting mourned

NEW YORK (AP) — For Ruby Dee, acting and activism weren't contradictory things. They were inseparable, and they were intertwined. The African-American actress, who earned lead roles in movies and on Broadway, also spent her life fighting against injustice, even emceeing the 1963 March on Washington and protesting apartheid in South Africa. "We are image makers. Why can't we image makers become peace-makers, too?" she asked after she and her husband, Ossie Davis, accepted the Screen Actors Guild Award for Lifetime

Achievement in 2000. That legacy of entertaining and pushing for change — in addition to the epic love affair with Davis — made Dee, who died at age 91 in her New Rochelle home on Wednesday night, a beloved figure in America and beyond. Broadway theaters will dim their lights in her honor Friday night. As a sign of how influential Dee has been to generations of performers, she was thanked twice from the podium at Sunday's Tony Awards, by six-time winner Audra McDonald and new Tony winner director Kenny Leon.

"She will be missed but never forgotten as she lives on in many of us," Leon said in a statement Thursday, noting Dee's death came just weeks after that of Maya Angelou. "Maya and Ruby leave us only days apart — those two women with four letter names instructed us on how to live." Dee's long career earned her an Emmy, a Grammy, two Screen Actors Guild awards, the NAACP Image Award, Kennedy Center Honors, the National Medal of Art and the National Civil Rights Museum's Lifetime Achievement Award. She got an Oscar

nomination at age 83 for best supporting actress for her role in the 2007 film "American Gangster." Spike Lee, who directed Dee and her husband in "Do the Right Thing," took to Instagram to say he was "crushed." He said it was one of his "great blessings in life to work with two of the finest artists and activists — Ruby and Ossie." President Barack Obama said he and his wife, Michelle Obama, were saddened to hear of Dee's death and will never forget seeing her in "Do the Right Thing" on their first date.

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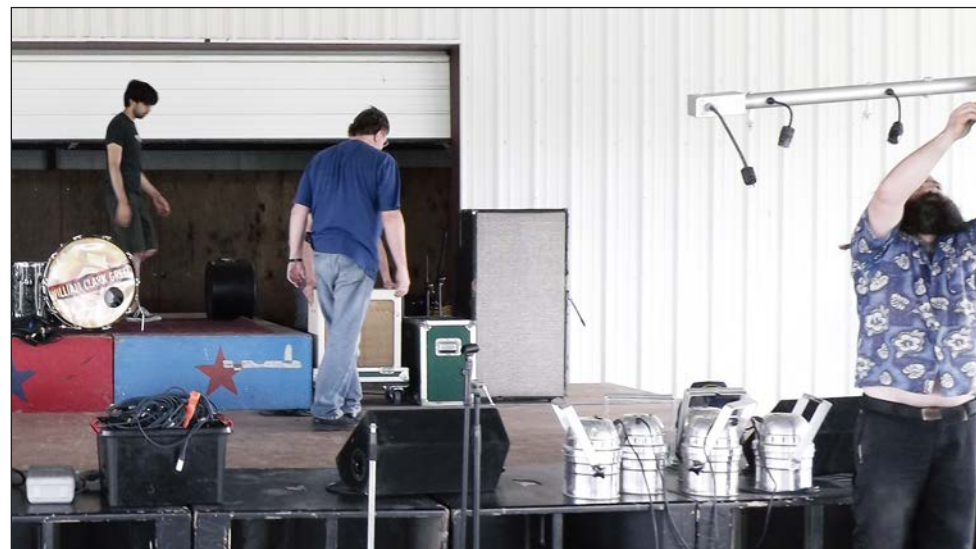
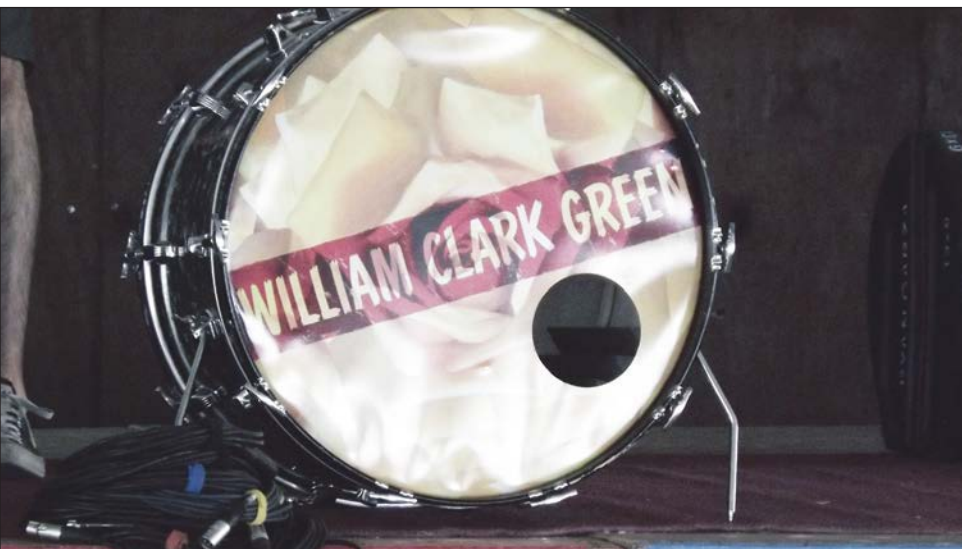
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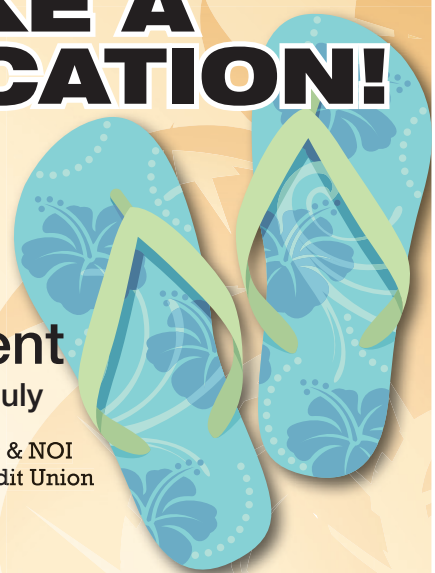

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The Point After

FIFA's corruption runs deeper than soccer

If you are a soccer fan like I am, you are incredibly excited about the World Cup. As great as the World Cup is, it is run by a grotesque organization by the name of FIFA.

American soccer fans can recall the phantom foul that disallowed Maurice Edu's game-winning goal against Slovenia in 2010, or the

no-call on the handball versus Germany in the quarterfinals of the 2002 World Cup. Last year alone, 74 officials and players were banned for match-fixing. Even Thursday's opener was marred by poor officiating. However, FIFA's corruption goes far beyond the game of soccer itself.

Let's start with this year's World Cup in Brazil. Brazilians love soccer. You can equate Brazilians' love of soccer to Texans' love for football. You would expect the Brazilian people to be thrilled to host the World Cup. However, this is hardly the case.

Brazil has a very high poverty rate, and the Brazilian government has spent more than \$11 billion preparing for the World Cup. So it should not be that surprising that there have been riots in the low-income favelas, as well as the Brazilian capital of Brasilia.

Brazil will also be receiving no returns on their investment, as all profits go directly to FIFA. Essentially, Brazil does all the work, and FIFA gets all the money. In addition to that, FIFA demands that all host countries exempt them from all taxes. By Brazil's own estimates, FIFA will be exempt from more than \$250 million in taxes. Rio de Janeiro will be hosting the 2016 Summer Olympics, so these riots will not be ending any time soon.

This all makes complete sense when you consider that FIFA executives have been through more bribery scandals than I can count. In 2001, FIFA honorary president Joao Havelange resigned amidst bribery allegations. Even current FIFA president Sepp Blatter has been investigated on several different occasions.

Now let us look ahead. The 2018 World Cup will be held in Russia, and based on how the Sochi Olympics went over, it should be rocky at best. It is rather

impressive, considering the allegations that FIFA officials approached potential host countries asking for bribes. This scandal helped lead to the resignation of CONCACAF president Jack Warner.

Of course all of this pails in comparison to FIFA's decision regarding the 2022 World Cup. FIFA in all its wisdom chose Qatar to host the 2022 World Cup. I can give you a long list of reasons for why that is an atrocious idea, but I will keep it short.

First off, the 12 stadiums in which the World Cup games are to be played have either not been built, or are scheduled to be expanded. On top of that, the championship game is scheduled to take place in Lusail, a city that does not exist yet.

Secondly, Qatar reaches temperatures of more than 120 degrees during the summer. It is nearly impossible to play an entire game of soccer in heat of that magnitude.

However, here is the worst of it all. Unlike the United States, Qatar has no laws protecting employees, and they are essentially a modern-day slave state. Migrant workers are not allowed to leave Qatar without the permission of their employers. They can make their employees work long hours in unsafe conditions. It is estimated that more than 4,000 workers will die during preparation for the 2022 World Cup. The current death stands at more than 1,100.

I guess this all makes some sense when you consider further bribery allegations. Qatar officials allegedly gave millions of dollars to FIFA voters. Mohamed bin Hammam, the president of the Asian Football Confederation, and a native of Qatar, was at the head of the scandal. The FIFA Ethics gave bin Hammam a life-time ban in July of 2011. He was then fortunate enough to have the ban revoked, only to receive a second life-time ban in December of 2012.

Warner was also found to have been involved, receiving \$2 million from firm connected to Qatar's bid.

Fortunately, there has been talk of revoking the 2022 World Cup from Qatar, with Blatter calling the decision a mistake. If such is done, it would most likely be held here in the United States, which finished second in the 2022 World Cup voting.

Brazil wins opener

SAO PAULO (AP) — Neymar showed why he is carrying Brazil's hopes at the World Cup, scoring twice on Thursday to help the underwhelming hosts escape a disappointing start to the tournament.

With Brazil struggling and down a goal against a spirited Croatian team, Neymar came through to lead his team to a 3-1 win in the opening match, scoring once in each half. The killer goal to make the score 2-1 was a hotly contested penalty awarded by Japanese referee Yuichi Nishimura.

"Things weren't going well," he said. "The first match is always difficult, we were anxious, we were nervous. I'm glad I was able to get the goals we needed at the time we needed them."

"He is a special player and we know that," Bra-

zil coach Luiz Felipe Scolari said. "And he needs to know that we know that."

Brazil got off to a slow start in its home tournament.

Spurs take 3-1 lead over Heat

MIAMI (AP) — Here they are again, back on the brink of a championship.

It slipped away from the San Antonio Spurs last year, but it would take something special — historic, actually — to stop them now.

The Miami Heat would have to make the biggest comeback in NBA Finals history.

"They're the two-time champs, they're a great team, and there is still one more game," Spurs guard Tony Parker said. "We have to win one more game."

Kawhi Leonard had 20 points and 14 rebounds, and the Spurs routed the Heat again, winning 107-86 on Thursday night to open a commanding 3-1 lead.

The Spurs can win their fifth NBA championship with a victory at home in Game 5 on Sunday and avenge their seven-game loss to Miami last year. They have three chances, and the way they're dominating the Heat, they might need just one.

"I'm pleased that they performed as well as they did while we've been in Miami, and that's about

as far as it goes," Spurs coach Gregg Popovich said. "Now we've got to go back home and play as well or better."

LeBron James had 28 points and eight rebounds, but Dwyane Wade was just 1 of 10 through three quarters and finished with 10 points.

"They smashed us," James said. "Two straight home games got off to awful starts. They came in and were much better than us in these last two games. It's just that simple."

No team has overcome a 3-1 deficit in the finals, and the way the Heat were outclassed twice on their home floor makes it hard to imagine the two-time champions being the first.

"We put ourselves in a position where it is about making history," James added.

Parker added 19 points, and Tim Duncan had 10 points and 11 rebounds for the Spurs, who shot 57 percent from the field and are hitting 54 percent in the series.

The Spurs lost twice in Miami to end last year's finals, their only defeat in the championship round. They won their two games

in South Florida this time by a combined 40 points.

San Antonio's surprising dominance has Miami on its heels, and unless Miami can figure things out quickly, the Heat's two-year championship reign will come to an abrupt end.

If this was the last home game of the season in Miami, it looked and sounded nothing like the ones to end the last two years, which featured confetti falling and trophies raised. This one had the unfamiliar sound of boos late in the first half and a chant of "Go Spurs Go!" with under 3 minutes left from the San Antonio fans who remained long after many of Miami's had bolted.

A Heat win Sunday would force a Game 6 in Miami Tuesday.

The Heat had followed their last 13 postseason losses with a victory, but now at the end of a fourth straight season that has gone the distance, they might be out of gas. Miami seemed to lack the energy — or maybe effort — to defend San Antonio's precision ball movement for the full 24 seconds, and time after time the Spurs ended up with a shot from somebody who didn't have a defender nearby.

Not quite as sharp as when they shot a finals-record 75.8 percent in the first half Tuesday night, the Spurs were still plenty good enough to open another huge lead by halftime, and they withstood every attempt Miami

made to make a run. "We were expecting a reaction from them but we were ready for it, so we just did the same thing," Spurs forward Boris Diaw said.

The Spurs knew their defense had to be better, realizing their once-in-a-lifetime, 19-for-21 start in Tuesday's 111-92 Game 3 victory covered the fact that they allowed Miami to make more than 50 percent in the game.

They held Miami to 35 percent in the first half.

"They played great and I can honestly say I don't think any of us were expecting this type of performance," Heat coach Erik Spoelstra said.

San Antonio blew the game open late in the second quarter with seven straight points, capped by Leonard's soaring follow-up dunk that made it 55-33.

James, who battled cramps in Game 1, left the court and briefly returned to the locker room midway through the first quarter Thursday. But he had 10 quick points in the third quarter to bring Miami within 13, but San Antonio pushed it to 81-57 after three and never looked back.

Notes: Under Popovich, the Spurs have won 15 of the 18 best-of-seven series in which they led 2-1. ... The Heat hadn't lost back-to-back games in the playoffs since dropping three straight against the Boston Celtics in the 2012 Eastern Conference finals.

High hopes for Denver's new pass-rush tandem

ENGLEWOOD, Colo. (AP) — With Von Miller's right knee on the mend and DeMarcus Ware's right elbow feeling fine, Denver's new pass-rushing partners are starting to fantasize about what kind of season they could have if they stay healthy.

Neither man will say how many sacks he'd like to collect individually.

As a tandem, that's another story.

"Between two guys, we want to have as many sacks as one team," Ware declared.

Last year, every NFL team collected at least 31 sacks.

Their aim is higher than that, though.

While emphasizing, "I really don't have personal goals," Ware said he'd love to be a part of the "tandem that was the best in the league ever."

In 1989, Chris Doleman and Keith Millard of the Minnesota Vikings teamed up for an astonishing 39 sacks.

To get into the 30s, Miller and Ware are going to have to have nice bounce-backs from the worst seasons of their respective careers.

The franchise sacks leader in Dallas, Ware was released by the Cowboys this winter in a salary cap move after getting to the quarterback a career-low six times last season and missing games for the first time in

his nine-year career with a thigh injury.

He underwent surgery on his right elbow in February, then signed a three-year, \$30 million deal with the Broncos, who lost Elvis Dumervil in the infamous fax fiasco a year ago and then watched Miller founder minus his mentor.

Miller and Dumervil teamed for a Broncos tandem record 29 1/2 sacks in 2012, including a franchise-high 18 1/2 by Miller, who slipped to just five in 2013, when his season began with a six-game drug suspension and ended with a torn right ACL in December.

Miller underwent surgery in January and had to watch the Super Bowl from the sideline. The arrival of Ware, whom he patterned his game after while growing up in Dallas, has inspired Miller, and his long, arduous hours of rehab have led to some reflection and what the front office trusts is more maturity.

"For me, I've got a whole new look on just coming to practice and playing football. If you're not trying to be the best at what you're doing, that just seems lame to me," Miller said Thursday after the Broncos wrapped up their three-day mandatory minicamp.

"You just come out here just to play football, just to pay the bills, because it's cool, that's not for me."

"I want to come out here and try to be the best player I can possibly be, and just be remembered."

"And DeMarcus Ware, he's well on his way to doing that and every time I step on that field, that's what's behind me: To be the best. I know if we keep that same mind-set, we'll be all right."

Just as Ware wants to be the best defensive end in the NFL, Miller said his goal is to be the league's best linebacker.

"I mean, I always wanted to be the best. I don't think I really focused on it as much. I let the sacks and sack dances and all that other stuff kind of take precedence over being the best," Miller said. "It's kind of weird, because when you're making plays, you're doing pretty good. But being the best ... that's

what really matters to me now."

That's just the kind of thing coach John Fox will be glad to read. Because he's not all about stats, the sacks or the silly dances that end up on "SportsCenter."

Fox wants to pressure the quarterback, make him throw it a tad quicker than he wants or force him to change his call at the line of scrimmage, even ditch some of what he does best when he lines up against two of the NFL's

top edge rushers.

"Mike Strahan, way back the year we went to the Super Bowl in 2000, he didn't make the Pro Bowl because he didn't have the sack total that he had had in the past. But yet he had a very, very productive, good season," Fox said.

"Sometimes people read too much into sacks and sometimes it defines the type of season, which in actuality you can have a very good year without huge sacks numbers. We're just looking for affecting the quarterback and making them uncomfortable."

Wireless companies put up more 'stealth' towers

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — One might be hidden in a cross on a church lawn. Others are disguised as a cactus in the desert, a silo in farm country or a palm tree reaching into a sunny sky.

Whatever the deception, the goal is the same: concealing the tall, slender cellphone towers that most Americans need but few want to see erected in their neighborhoods.

As telecommunications companies fill gaps in their networks, many have sought to camouflage the ungainly outdoor equipment that carries the nation's daily supply of calls, texts and data. It's another indication of how the industry is evolving to meet the demands of consumers who insist on ever-increasing amounts of wireless information but won't tolerate large antennas looming over their homes, parks and other beloved sites.

"Each community and each neighborhood can be different, so we really have

to work on a case-by-case basis with each city and with each zoning authority," said Karen Smith, a spokeswoman for Verizon.

So-called stealth cellphone towers have been around for more than two decades and appear to be growing in popularity. They have been concealed in a wide variety of ways, including in a stop sign in New Orleans, a pine tree in Kinnelon, New Jersey, and a water tower in San Dimas, California.

Now an Iowa church wants to join the club by building a tower in the shape of a cross. It's a move that's irked some nearby residents who think the design will be too big and too out of place. It also shows how sensitive the issue can still be.

The First Presbyterian Church in Des Moines is working with Verizon to construct a tower that will be dressed up as an 11-story cross. The deal, which is being reviewed by a city zoning board, includes an-

nual compensation to the church.

"Like a lot of churches, we have to keep each year finding ways to pay our bills," the Rev. Ken Stuber said. "It's an unusual church that doesn't have to worry about something like that."

Suzette Jensen said the tower's height and color wouldn't match the church's exterior, making it an instant eyesore. The pastor said that would not happen.

"We pay some pretty high property taxes. We feel very strongly that it's going to be a detriment to the value of our homes," she said, adding that neighbors are considering legal action.

Scenic America, a non-profit that works to preserve scenery along the nation's roads, has generally opposed the building of more communication towers, but the group has been more amenable to disguised designs.

"We've been in favor of disguising them if you can

and you can do it well," said spokesman Max Ashburn. But even some of the disguised towers are dead giveaways.

"You can tell right away that they're not what they pretend to be," Ashburn said. "Sometimes the attempt to cover them up actually makes it stand out more than if they just put up the tower."

When Verizon first contacted the church last year, the company proposed standard designs for the tower. The church ultimately pushed for the cross-shaped design, which mirrors a tower outside a church in the Minneapolis suburb of Eden Prairie.

STEALTH Concealment Solutions Inc., a South Carolina-based company that offers hidden antennas and towers, has created dozens of multi-tasking steeples and crosses over the years.

In 1992, a BP sign at a gas station in Atlanta earned the distinction of being the first stealth cellphone tower in the country, according to

the company. Designs have expanded over the years and now include a quirky pole in Liberty, Michigan, that looks like a pencil.

Cindy Wishart, a STEALTH spokeswoman, said the company is constantly educating people about the industry and its possibilities.

"They always associate concealment as a tree," she said. "It's just so much more than that."

Specific data on the number of stealth towers is limited, but STEALTH said it works on up to 800 projects a year. The Wireless Association, an industry trade group also known as CTIA, said the presence of towers in general around the country has dramatically increased over the years in an effort to expand coverage.

At the end of 1997, the country had just over 50,000 cell towers. By the end of 2012, the most recent year for which information is available, that number had jumped to more than 300,000.

Stuber said he was surprised by the community backlash.

"It's ridiculous," he said. "Churches put up crosses all the time that are simply crosses. This will be a cross that's also helping us to pay our bills."

Jensen said the tower should be put in another location because space outside the church is too small. In Des Moines, a minimum 10-acre lot is needed for a communication tower. The church has just over three acres.

Smith, of Verizon, would not go into detail about the tower, although she did say the company chooses locations that fit within a geographic radius and meet engineering specifications.

People constantly need more data "to do all the different multimedia applications that are now part of their lives," Smith said, creating continual pressure to "add more capacity to our network to stay ahead of that demand."

GM recalling Camaros for ignition switch problem

DETROIT (AP) — Ignition switches once again are causing problems for General Motors.

This time the company is recalling nearly 512,000 Chevrolet Camaro muscle cars from the 2010 to 2014 model years because a driver's knee can bump the key and knock the switch out of the "run" position, causing an engine stall.

That disables the power steering and brakes and could cause drivers to lose control.

GM said Friday that it knows of three crashes and four minor injuries from the problem. A spokesman said the air bags did not go off in the crashes, but GM hasn't determined if the non-deployment was caused by the switches.

GM said the Camaro switches met its specifications — unlike those at the center of a recall of 2.6 million small cars. That problem has caused more than 50 crashes and at least 13 deaths.

Company spokesman Alan Adler said the problem occurs rarely and affects mainly drivers who are tall and sit close to the steering column so their knees can come in contact with the key.

The Camaro switches are completely different from those in the small cars with ignition switch problems. The Camaro switches, he said, were designed by a different person, and meet GM standards for the amount of force needed to turn the cars on and off.

Currently the Camaro key is integrated like a switchblade into the Fob, which contains the buttons that let people electronically lock doors and open the trunk. GM will replace the switchblade key with a standard one, and a separate Fob attached by a ring so it will dangle from the key. Adler said with the change, if the driver's knee hits the Fob, it doesn't come in contact with the key.

"You can hit the key Fob all day long and it's not going to have any impact on the ignition," he said.

The problem was discovered during internal testing of ignition switches after the company recalled the switches in small cars such as the Chevrolet Cobalt and Saturn Ion earlier this year,

GM said. Adler said the Camaro ignition problem was the only one found in testing of all GM models.

GM knew for more than a decade that the small-car switches were faulty, yet didn't recall them until early this year. The problem has brought federal investigations, lawsuits and a \$35 million fine from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

GM also announced three other recalls on Friday, bringing the total number of vehicles recalled by the company to about 14.4 million in the U.S. and 16.5 million in North America. Earlier this year GM passed its old U.S. full-year recall record of 10.75 million vehicles set in 2004.

Police find 37 in suspected immigrant stash house

HOUSTON (AP) — Police and federal immigration agents are investigating after 37 people were found jammed into a house in northeastern Houston.

Investigators discovered the situation about 6:30

p.m. Thursday in response to a telephone report. Houston police spokesman Kесе Smith says dozens of people were found being held against their will in the house, including 26 men, six women and a girl.

Smith says four other people identified only as suspects tried to flee on foot but were detained and are in custody.

A Houston Fire Department statement says paramedics were called to

the house to check all of the captives out for possible dehydration but none needed hospital treatment. Smith says the captives have been turned over to U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement.

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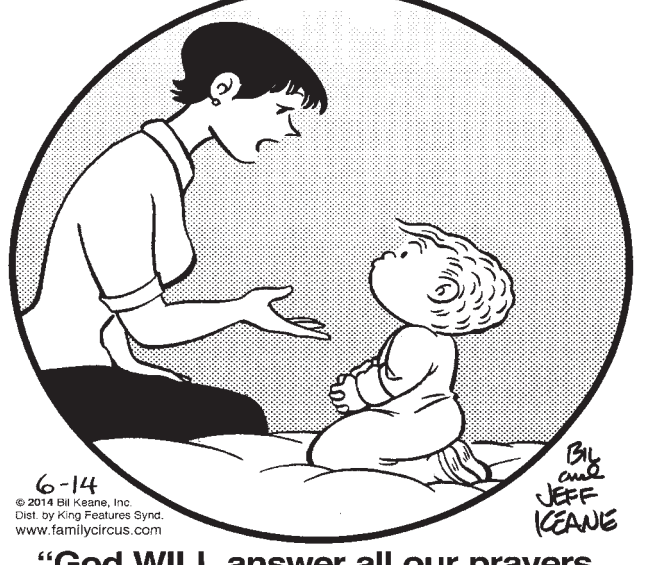
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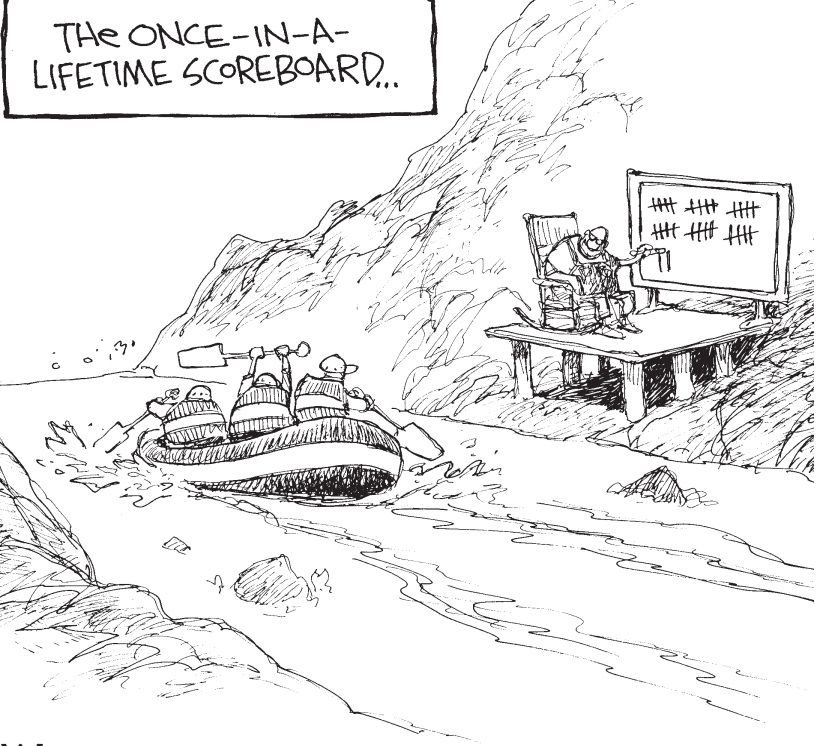
