## Wind takes Pampa by storm

**Late evening storms brings wind, rain and hail to Pampa.**

A downed tree here, a broken fence there and other kinds of damage can be seen across the city of Pampa. Pampa was blasted by 93 mph winds at approximately 11:25 p.m. on Sunday night.

While meteorologists on Amarillo's broadcast networks reassured viewers that tornadoes were a low threat, the afore-mentioned windy gusts fall in the criteria of a EF-1 tornado or a high-end Category 1 hurricane (Category 2 starts at 96 mph.)

BJ Simpson, meteorologist for the National Weather Service in Amarillo, said that the storms fired up along a cold front which started in Colorado and pushed through the Texas Panhandle.

"We had plenty of moisture and humidity in the area, which made conditions right for these storms," Simpson said. "We had what we call a mesoscale convective complex (MCC)."

An MCC, by definition, "is a particular type of MCS (mesoscale convective system), an MCC is a large, circular, long-lived cluster of showers and thunderstorms identified by satellite. It often emerges out of other storm types during the late-night and early-morning hours."

The obvious damage across city streets is not the result from Sunday's storms. While the lightning show that accompanied the storms illuminated the skies, many portions of the Texas Panhandle lost power.

"As of 2 p.m., our outage numbers had been reduced to 1,175, and most of those, 1,079, were in Pampa," Wes Reeves, spokesman of Xcel Energy, said.

## Pampa GO Bond rating raised To 'AA-' based on local GO Criteria

DALLAS — Standard & Poor's Ratings Services said that it raised its rating on Pampa, Texas' general obligation (GO) bonds to 'AA-' from 'A+'. The outlook is stable.

"The upgrade is based on our local GO criteria released Sept. 12, 2013," said Standard & Poor's credit analyst Alexander Laufer.

The city pledges its ad valorem tax levy as payment for the bonds within the limits prescribed by law. The Texas Constitution limits the city's maximum ad valorem tax rate to \$2.50 per \$100 of taxable assessed valuation (AV). In our view, significant flexibility remains between the current tax rate of 62 cents per \$100 of AV and the maximum amount allowed by state law.

"The rating and stable outlook reflect our opinion of the city's very strong budgetary flexibility and liquidity," said Mr. Laufer.

"Within the two-year outlook period, deterioration of the city's financial metrics could place downward pressure on the rating," added Mr. Laufer.

Conversely, economic expansion and diversification that resulted in higher incomes and wealth, coupled with a moderated debt burden, could lead to a positive rating action.

over their own writing. For the showcase, each student prepared a story about themselves without writing their name on the story, and their parents were told to guess which story was their child.

The students who just completed fourth grade

were in the science academy with Mrs. Pierson. They will be in science classes for the first time during the upcoming school year, so they focused on energy and matter to prepare them for the STAAR test in fifth grade. Pierson said that the students did experiments with wind energy as well because it is a growing industry in the area.

She added that they learned vocabulary, too.

Her students learned 33 new vocabulary words over the course of the last eight days with a 98 percent mastery rate of the words.

Those who will be entering sixth grade in the upcoming school year were in Mr. Andy Lopez's writing academy. During the summer program these students did writings and small group readings and discussions. They had 15-minute independent readings and

writings over books as well, and wrote two essays in the academy.

Lopez said that these activities were to prepare the students for entering junior high.

The students in the third and fifth grade academies had one additional project that they have been working on throughout the course of their time in the program.

On Monday morning

these students put on the plays they have been working with Altrusans to learn in the academy. There were five plays including: The Four Rabbits, The Three Little Pigs, The Lion and the Mouse and Goldilocks and the Three Bears.

The groups of students from each play also made their own props for the skits, and the students from the third grade writing academy made invitations

for the pre-k and kindergarten students in the younger bilingual summer program.

Many parents and other family members were in attendance at the showcase to see the progress their children have made in the program and also to see the plays prepared by the students.

The pre-k and kindergarten students will have their summer program on July 3.

“We discovered more damage as we began to work the Pampa area, and we currently have one feeder line out of service and 12 smaller tap lines out of service.

“Additionally, we are working 10 transformer outages and 55 service-level outages in Pampa, so the going has been much slower. We have 12 crews working in Pampa and will continue working into the evening. We hope to have the majority of these customers, if not all, back on by day's end.”

The biggest chance of storms was on Sunday night but the chances will continue through Wednesday. Unlike many summertime storms, the ones that fire early this week will likely live even after daytime heat.

“Some of the activity is actually going to fire in the day depending on the environment,” Simpson said. “Without getting too technical, a stationary boundary will be laid out on top of us and supporting the storms.”

An isolated storm had fired up in Beaver County, Okla. between 3 and 4 p.m. Sunday and moved south-southwest over the next seven hours before being overtaken by the cold front

in Mobeetie.

There was a hail core in this cell that was dropping hailstones sized anywhere from golf balls to tennis balls. A tornado is also believed to have touched down outside of Canadian, but the National Weather Service is still investigating it.

Some may say the region has gotten lucky thus far with all of the rain with no damage, but as many residents of West Texas know, something was bound to give. Pampa and many other communities experienced that Sunday night.



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# US mayors unanimously pass climate change ideas

HOUSTON (AP) — A bipartisan group of mayors from across the country unanimously approved a resolution Monday that calls on cities to use natural solutions to fight the effects of climate change.

Attendees of the U.S. Conference of Mayors voted in Dallas on the resolution that encourages cities to use nature to "protect freshwater supplies, defend the nation's coastlines, maintain a healthy tree and green space cover and protect air quality," sometimes by partnering with nonprofit organizations.

The resolution was backed by Democratic mayors from GOP-dominated states — Austin Mayor Lee Leffingwell, Houston Mayor Annise Parker and Phoenix Mayor Greg Stanton. It passed easily even though Republicans and Democrats remain deeply divided over how to deal with climate change. Although science shows human industrial activity is contributing to global warming, some conservatives remain skeptical. "What's so significant is that there was a unanimous vote on an issue that can be so divisive," said Laura Huffman, director of The Nature Conservancy in Texas. "When you peel away the high-level arguments and deal with the ground-level issues everyone just rolls up their sleeves and gets to work." Mayors are looking for alternatives to traditional infrastructure projects that will be cost-effective and provide residents with amenities. For example, Huffman said, Philadelphia Mayor Michael Nutter is combining traditional pipes with open spaces as he revamps the city's storm water collection system. These open spaces collect water much like pipes do, while providing residents with additional parks. "We're seeing that all over the country," Huffman said.

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

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



Hill singled as well, but series of throwing errors brought every Pampa player home to give them a

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

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

### World Cup group stage nearing end

The 2014 FIFA World Cup has now been underway for two weeks. I am here to tell you what we have learned so far.

Portugal has one point. They also are -4 in goal differential. The Portuguese face off with Ghana at 11 a.m. Thursday.

Ghana has one point. They also are -1 in goal differential. The Ghanaians still have a shot in Group G thanks to a surprising draw result versus Germany.

Are you confused yet? Well let's go for simplicities sake to begin with. The Americans advance to the next round if they beat Germany. Let's hope it is that easy. However there are many more scenarios:

•The USA is assured of a spot in the Round of 16 if Portugal and Ghana draw.

•Should Portugal beat Ghana, the USA will likely be in due to the tiebreaker that is goal differential. Portugal would have to beat Ghana by 3 and have

the USA lose by 3 to Germany to advance.

•In what first looked like it may be good news for the USA, the Ghana draw result with Germany could come back to bite the Americans. If Ghana beats Portugal by 2 and the USA does anything worse than ties Germany, then Ghana advances.

Now that we have thoroughly covered the "Group of Death," let's move on to the other groups, starting in alphabetical order.

In Group A, host and favorite Brazil will most likely advance to the round of 16 with the Mexico, Croatia winner advancing as well. These games were played on Monday with results coming too late for the article.

In Group B, there was a surprise as defending World Cup Champion Spain dropped two matches and has been eliminated. The Netherlands and Chile will advance out of Group B.

In Group C, Columbia will be advancing. Cote D'Ivoire will join them barring a big (at least two goal) Japan victory over Columbia today.

In Group D, there was another surprise with England dropping two matches and being eliminated. Costa Rica will be advancing. The Italy-Uruguay match today will send one very good team home. The winner advances. In case of a draw, Italy would advance.

Switzerland beats Honduras and how Ecuador does against France. Both games are on Wednesday.

In Group H, Belgium will be advancing. This is the only group where all three other teams still have a shot at that second spot. Algeria is in the driver's seat and only needs a draw against Russia to advance. South Korea needs to beat Belgium by a lot to enter the discussion.

It should be some exciting action this week to determine those final Round of 16 spots. The Round of 16 will start on Saturday and hopefully we are spending Friday analyzing who the USA will play in that round.

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
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
