Simply call 806-664-1131 and make the proper reservation, our City folk will deliver the bin to your address or place of business, then pick up the bin when your chore is accomplished. For free!

All this rain we've had has really made your lawn grow, weeds, too. The City will pick up your bagged grass clippings and weedonce a week during the summer months. Remember, the key word is 'bagged.'

If you've some trees and shrubbery you've cleared from your property and have no means to get such to the city waste disposal site, pick up your telly and dial 806-664-1078, tell the city employee your issue, and for a minimum fee of \$20 added to your water bill, the city will come and pick the tree limbs, branches, and shrubbery up! But the company, in its lawsuit filed Wednesday in Tesoro Corp. based in U.S. District Court in Salt County's three new ordinances will block any pipeline in the county.

Among other restrictions, no pipeline can run within 2,500 feet of any wetlands, natural creek, pond, river, reservoir, school or other high-use building, or within 500 feet of other structures.

The suit says the ordinances interfere with the U.S. Forest Service's role in approving an acceptable corridor for the pipeline.

Summit County Attorney David Brickey told The Salt Lake Tribune the county thinks the ordinances are appropriate and fair, and will aggressively defend the county council's decisions.
