



Rangers acquire lefty **Detwiler from Nationals**

Left-hander Ross Detwiler will get his wish to start again from the Texas Rangers after he spent last season in Washington's bullpen.

Texas completed a deal Frithe Nationals for two minor league prospects, infielder Chris Bostick and right-hander Abel De Los Santos. "I don't really look at it as

> Detwiler was in the bullpen all last season, working mostly in long relief and going 2-3 with a 4.00 ERA in 63 innings over 47 appearances. The former first-round draft pick was left off the Nationals' postseason roster for the NL division series against the San Francisco Giants.

"When you've got a player that's motivated and maybe has some internal drive, internal motivation to go out there and perform, it's usually a good thing," Rangers general manager Jon Daniels said.

Detwiler has started 69 of his 132 major league games, all for the Nationals after they drafted him sixth overall in 2007. His career record is 20-32 with a 3.82 ERA.

Not involved in the market for upper-tier free agents, Texas went into the offseason looking to add another experienced starter in its rotation with Yu Darvish, Derek Holland and Colby Lewis. The fifth spot will likely be left open for competition in spring training among several young pitchers in the organization, including some who have already made a number of starts in the majors for Texas.



Top lawyer at state health agency resigns over contract

Jack Stick, the top lawyer for the Texas Health and Human Services Commission, is resigning his post amid a crumbling state contract with data warehouse 21CT.

The commission's Office of Inspector General, or OIG, has been under scrutiny for the way it decided to award a highly sought-after contract to the company to store and sort the sprawling health agency's data into searchable, cataloged material. The state tentatively awarded the contract to 21CT outside the formal bidding process, Janek has said. The contract, originally set at \$20 million, is about to expire, and the OIG had proposed a \$90 million, three-year extension.

"Contractors have raised issues about the procurement project," Kyle Janek, the agency's executive commissioner, said in a statement Friday. "I've looked into those concerns, and I'm not comfortable with the process used so I've withdrawn the request for state approval to extend the project and notified



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Slaughtered 'Sons Of Anarchy'

The year is winding down with some good TV news: The amoral

drama 'Sons of Anarchy" has ended its sevenyear run on the cable channel FX, after a

biker-gang

drenched

in pointless sex and violence. Jax, the leader of the gang, shot a bunch of his enemies dead and then drove his motorcycle straight into the oncoming grill of a semi truck.

The show wound down into a relentless deathfest. Jax shot his mother dead, because she stabbed his wife in the neck with a barbecue fork. Most of the cast was slaughtered. And for what? It all seemed like a long slog of sensationalism for its own sake.

The Nov. 11 episode opened with an unbelievably graphic sex scene lasting a full two and a half minutes, depicting seven different couples. Adam Buckman at Media Post reported "this montage featured five heterosexual couples, and two homosexual one of which featured the transgender character ... and the other one featuring a jailhouse rape being simulated by guest-star Marilyn Manson."

Producer Paris Barclay explained that on the set. they called it the "f--tage." In an interview, Yahoo's Kimberly Potts told Barclay the transgender sex scene was "the most honest relationship moment in the whole series." Barclay described the awe and wonder of it all

"When we did the first read-through, everyone responded in such a hushed and reverent manner to just the reading of it, just the lines.

... We knew that we had something great," Barclay declared. When they filmed the scene, "the entire crew applauded for at least two minutes. I mean, literally, with tears in our eyes. Everyone. I'm sitting there

watching them applaud, in the middle of 'Sons of Anarchy,' a love scene which involves probably the most degenerate club member, the necrophiliac ... and this transgendered woman who really, for the first time, explains where she came from emotionally and what it's about."

Welcome to Hollyfinal season wood, where the weirder it gets, the more people cry on the set about the "honesty."

Once the sex and the tears were over, the plot veered back into senseless violence. The show's primary antihero, Jax the gang leader, ripped out a man's eyeball with his bare hands. The eyeball was shown dangling from the socket, blood erupting from the wound, as other gang members kicked and beat the victim. Someone hacked off the victim's fingers with a knife, as the victim screamed in pain. A close-up displayed the severed fingers in a pool of blood. Jax then shot the man point-blank in the head.

It's a given that some in this industry will believe the finale proved a moral point, that the murderous gang leaders all arrived at punishment for their sins, making "Anarchy" creator Kurt Sutter a moralist. It's quite the opposite. The whole point of the show was vicariously enjoying the sadism, the sexual calisthenics, even the school shooting that opened season six and since that wasn't enough, Sutter included two rapes and a man drowning in a bathtub of

Sadly, brain-damaged TV critics compare Sutter to Shakespeare, which should have the Bard spinning like a top in his grave. Our "tastemakers" repeatedly adore savage antiheroes and demonstrate a boundless appetite for the grotesque.

The enjoyment I get out of sledding

I watched kids sledding over at Central Park the other day, flying down the snow-less hill on their sleds

or pieces of cardboard. A few were sliding on what looked like garbage can lids. What they all had in common, though, was the absolute fun they were having, and I drove home with a smile on my face.

Growing up in southern California, I

only experienced snow once when, as a small child, we went up to the mountains. When we moved to northern Illinois in the middle of my 19th year on earth, I had my first taste of winter about a month after we arrived

I'm afraid the first few snowstorms were not much fun for me as I either tried to coax my 1961 Corvair to keep providing me transportation to work, or I rode the public bus and had to walk several blocks from the stop to our apartment.

The next winter was just as snowy, but I was finally appropriately kitted out with snow boots, a parka, mittens and earmuffs. Someone invited me to the local park where there was a

At that time I hadn't yet developed a distaste for roller coasters, so I

gamely gave it a try, and my short life really did flash before my eyes as I flew down the track behind two friends from work. I had a picture in my mind of a nice shiny Flexible Flyer sled with me sliding down a snowy hill, and that snow-covered roller coaster didn't fit.

As an "adult" I didn't feel that it would look right for me to go sledding by myself, so I settled on giving ice skating a try. An aunt gave me a pair of skates that were about three sizes too big, telling me all I needed to do was put on two or three pairs of heavy socks and the skates would fit, keep my feet warm, and keep my ankles from turning over. I actually did manage to move a little bit over the ice on the pond near our apartment, but unfortunately it was more on the seat of my pants than on the blades of the skates.

Some years passed, and I had a child who, at the age of three, wanted to go sledding at the park near us. Ah, here was my chance to show her how to sled! We trudged through the snow the three blocks to the park and sledding hill. With the picture of that Flexible Flyer in my mind, I set out to show her how it was done.

I gave the sled a little push and did a less than graceful dive onto the sled...or so I thought. The next thing I knew, the sled was on its way down the hill without me as I lay on

my stomach with a face full of snow. I settled for sitting on the sled with Catherine on my lap, and we coasted down the hill (after a kind child brought our errant sled up the hill for us.) We had a number of years of sledding fun at that park—sometimes on a wooden sled, sometimes on a plastic one, and a few times on a tube made for sledding.

One year we had snow and then an ice storm, followed by below-zero nights. The fire department came and sprayed a portion of the hill to the point that it was solid ice. Everyone had a wonderful time sliding down on the ice, either on sleds or simply on our behinds, but coming back up the hill again was quite a challenge.

Several years ago we paid a visit to the old neighborhood and found that some Grinch in city hall decided to plant a number of trees right at the foot of that hill in an effort to discourage sledding. The reasoning was that it would prevent sledding accidents if they just couldn't sled there. Apparently, the kids have proven more resourceful, and they still sled there, just making sure that they avoid the trees. I hope that Pampa kids are allowed to sled here in town in all seasons, with no Grinches interfering. I may join you!

The importance of Advent

The older I get the more I really appreciate and love the liturgy and ceremonies of our Lutheran church. The reason why they mean so much to me is that they continue to point me to my Savior Jesus and help me meditate upon and ponder God's Word.

Let me give you some examples. At this time of year the Church is the midst of the season called Advent, which means coming. We all know that Jesus has already come the first time in His conception and birth. Jesus comes to us now, in our present day, through His Word and Sacraments. And He will come again on the Last Day to judge the living and the dead. What joy it is to meet our Lord in faith, knowing that He comes to us with grace and mercy.

With this major idea of the Lord's coming the messages and themes of Advent call out for us to repent. That is what sinners do as they consider meeting the Lord. During the four Sundays of Advent we hear readings about John the Baptizer and the prophet Isaiah calling people to repentance. In repentance we turn from sin and look to Jesus as our only hope for rescue and deliverance from sin and death.

Because Advent is a

the Gloria in Excelsis part of the Liturgy. It is a hymn of praise taken from Luke 2. By omitting this from the Service, it subdues our praise for a short time, until it comes back at Christmas. In this way we are denying ourselves a bit in our devotion. Much like fasting denies oneself of food to train the body. Denying ourselves with fasting is really helpful for it calls to mind and prepares us in what may be asked of us during times of persecution.

During this season an Advent wreath stands in our sanctuary. It consists of four candles with one in the middle. A candle is lit for each week of Advent, reminding us that Jesus is the light of the world (John 8) that no darkness can overcome. It is a visible way that counts down to the true celebration of our Lord's incarnation as Christmas approaches.

Now, let me be clear. These ceremonies and practices help me focus my faith on Christ, but they do NOT merit me salvation. Only Jesus does that. He is our Savior, but the many things we do in the Church help us look to Him and ponder His great love for us. Ceremonies and ritual are only valuable as they show us the Savior. We don't do them,

penitential season we omit just to do them, but they in hymns during Advent and very tangible ways deepen our devotion to Jesus Christ. The Sundays of Advent

(and midweek services during this time) are so very helpful and refreshing because I can come to a place that is NOT in the midst of the Christmas rush. The Church is the refuge from the shallowness and chaos of the world. The world does celebrate Christmas and it even borrows much from the Church. But the world's idea of Christmas is like cotton candy. It does not satisfy. It leaves one wanting. People get caught up in nostalgia and trying to have a perfect Hallmark moment for the holidays, but that is not reality. No wonder so many are disappointed and left empty. It reminds us that even in our joy and festivities things can be tainted, and the Church directs us back to what is really right and salutary. That is the message that Jesus came to this earth to be born for the purpose of giving His life over for sinful mankind.

Advent prepares us for the celebration of Christmas, which arrives on Dec. 25 and lasts until Jan. 5. Those are the 12 feast days of Christmas. They are glorious days. Our church sings Advent

then at Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, and the Sundays after we burst forth in joyful song with all the Christmas carols and hymns that celebrate our Lord's birth. Hymns that deepen one's pondering of the incarnation of Christ. For the Church, Christmas is not over on Dec. 26 it is just beginning

of the twelve days. The Christmas celebration is not just a pretty manger scene birth of God's Son, but that Jesus was born amid such humble means in a harsh place. There was no room in the inn. No pleasant bedding to lay the Lord of the nations. Jesus begins to suffer for us, even in His birth. God in the flesh begins His work right away out of His steadfast love for us.

The seasons of the Church are something I cherish in my middle age. These holy days are full of readings, lessons, and ceremonies that deepen my devotion each year as I receive God's Word and partake of His supper in the Divine Service. They are holy because it is Jesus who engages us and brings to us life and salvation. And that is what I need the

The Queen of Old Fort Griffin

Proudly the old bakery ruin stands upon that bluff above Fort Griffin town, which is eighteen miles from my home town, Albany, in Shackelford County. Tattered and torn she is, but her head rises high with thoughts of grandeur in days gone by, when she was the queen.

Yes, she was the queen in those good old days. I can well understand that now. She was the queen of all the bakeries for many a mile around. I even seem to recall that day late in 1874, when the last iron nail was placed in her and the last stone was cut. Boy, how old Howarth must have grinned; the soldiers were pleased, too, since it had been quite a task to complete this structure with Howarth head of construction. You know how Enlgishmen are about things like that, and Sergeant Howarth was no exception, I had been

The queen bakery had taken the place of a smaller one made of pickets, while the queen was made of hand-shaped and man-quarried stones from adjacent hills. Her sides were two and one-half feet thick and seven feet high. The floors were fifty-two feet by sixteen feet. Indeed, she was a "whopper" for a bakery in those days.

Her ovens went all the way across one end and took up ten feet of the fiftytwo feet. The fire bricks were probably made in Parker County, while the iron doors were brought from Fort Worth.

The hand-rived shingles, made of cottonwood, were nailed on with large iron nails. They were very good shingles, though, since it has been only a few years ago that the roof of the pompous structure began to let the


teardrops of the western sky fall upon the inside. The window and door facings were made of oak timber, which, in turn, were cut at the mill in the Fort.

Besides her main cavity, the bakery also had a smaller one used for the vast amounts of flour, sugar and spices which were brought from San Antonio and Fort Concho. Most of it was brought by wagon from San Antonio, since better products could be obtained there. The queen always had the best.

Still another thing which she had in her possession was a huge cypress tank with hand-wrought iron bands around it. This take was filled by the soldiers with water from the Clear Fork of the Brazos.

Once a reigning sovereign, now she is an epitaph — a marker that is symbolic of her former charms. Desolation saddens all her surroundings. Her sunken roof is shapeless, and the grass o'ertops the mouldering walls. The doors and the windows have fled, and nothing is left but the ovens and the board where the bread was kneaded.

In 1881, the last Comanche had been driven beyond the borders of West Texas, and the last holiday dinner of roast buffalo and wild turkey was prepared for the guardians of the frontier as civilization surged over the plains of West Texas, and the queen of Old Fort Griffin was a memory. Destiny can make a queen, and destiny can destroy her, but once she rules, memories of her remain in the minds of humanity. Even though I am a very infinitesimal part of humanity, reveries of what I had been told and the actuality of my trip to the old bakery have made a wonderful composite picture which I shall always cherish.

Those shepherds had another awesome blessing from heaven poured out all over them. Not brighter light; it was already as bright as God's glory. But in the midst of the silence the heavenly choir exploded in praise. I'll bet that those shepherds about jumped out of their skin. What a night that must have been!

Question: When and where was the greatest time of praise and worship through singing that you have ever experienced? How does remembering that time make you feel?

Now if we multiply that memory by at least 1,000, we may just have a glimpse of what those shepherds heard that night. Spectacular! Don't you imagine that every hair on their bodies was standing straight up on end?

Does your spiritual life need a boost? Do you ever feel as if you are wandering out in the silent darkness? God stands ready to lift your spirit. As the heavenly choir of angels surely inspired those shepherds, so God is uniquely capable of thrilling you. Just ask Him.

Day 19 - the lantern/ lamp

Have you ever lived out in the country? Do you remember what it was like after the sun went down? How dark it got when your electricity went out during a storm? Ever been out camping in the woods? How dark did it get when you turned the lantern off at bedtime?

The stable probably wasn't as dark as that, but it certainly didn't have any lighting. After all, it couldn't because of the animals and the possibility of fire. That made it a very, very dark place once the sun went down. The only light would have been from lamps inside houses and buildings in Bethlehem.

We really aren't told about any lighting in the biblical text, but since the actual Advent happened at night, the only way for anyone to see would have been some type of simple oil lamp. It certainly wouldn't have provided much light. Most candles provide less than twenty lumens of light. A twenty-five- watt incandescent bulb provides 210 lumens. So one thing is for certain – there wasn't much light in that stable.

However, when you are in a dark enough place, even a little light helps. Whatever light there was in the stable that night it was enough to enabl everyone to see the fulfillment of centuries of prophecies. They saw the true Light of the World.

Do you ever feel like the light in your life fades and makes finding your way more difficult? Do you ever feel like you need a bright spotlight? If so, then you need Je-

It wasn't a lamp or candle or lantern that supplied the needs of the stable inhabitants. It was the newborn Savior who shined brightly in that dimly-lit room. And it is that same Savior who wants to brighten you up. Will you let Him?

Prayer: Blessed Father, even when I'm not in the dark, I still sometimes feel like the light in my life is so dim that I can hardly see. So Lord, please help me. Turn the wattage up inside me. Please be my lighthouse in the storms of life.







- If you have an artificial tree, be sure it's labeled, certified, or identified by the manufacturer as fire-
- If you choose a fresh tree, make sure the green needles don't fall off when touched. Before placing it in the stand, cut 2 inches from the base of the trunk. Add water to the tree stand daily.
- Make sure the tree is not blocking an exit and is at least three feet away from any heat source, like fireplaces, space heaters, radiators, candles, heat vents,
- Use lights that have the label of a recognized test- SFMO, visit http://www.tdi.texas.gov/fire/index.html.

People who feel cheated by Social Security

There are two kinds of people in the world: those who jump out of bed each morning all bright-eyed and bushy-tailed ready to take on the world, and those who get up all sullen and despondent waiting for the world to take them on. And with respect to the latter group and the subject matter of this column, I'm talking about folks who think the government in general, and Social Security in particular, is out to cheat

them. Today's sampling of

emails comes from these

people.

Q: The government is cheating me out of money every month, and I want to know how they are able to get away with it. I get my Social Security check usually around the 20th of each month. But I know many people who get their checks at the beginning of the month. That means every month I get cheated out of about two weeks worth of interest I could have earned had I received my Social Security on time like everyone else. I've written my congressman and he says there is nothing he can do about it. If you ask me, it's just another example of a corrupt and unresponsive government!

A: Well, I'm going to try to explain to you why the tim-

Social Security and you

ing of your Social Security check is actually an example of an efficient and creative government. But I've got a hunch you won't buy it.

For the first 60 years of the program, all Social Security checks used to come out on the third of each month. That one day a month was always a huge burden for post offices and banks, and especially for local Social Security field offices. And officials knew it would only get worse as time went on. So, in anticipation of the coming wave of baby boomer retirees, Social Security's long-range planners decided about 20 years ago to stagger the delivery of Social Security checks.

The method they chose, that's still in effect today, is a fairly simple one. People whose day of birth comes on the 1st through 10th of the month get their checks on the second Wednesday of each month. Those born on the 11th through the 20th get their Social Security on the third Wednesday. And finally, folks whose birthday is on the 21st through 31st of the month get benefits on the fourth Wednesday.

Your birthday probably is near the middle of the month since it sounds like you are getting your check on the third Wednesday of each month.

I hope my explanation helps you understand why Social Security checks come out on a staggered basis. And maybe you'll even admit it was done for good and sound reasons? But as to your complaint that you are being cheated out of two week's worth of interest each month — I'm afraid I just don't buy it. I concede that when you got your very first check, it came a week later than someone who was born sometime between the 1st and 10th days of

benefit instead of spending the money. But after that first month, you get a check every 30 days or so, just like everyone else. In other words, you get a check once each month just like the 50 million or so other Social Security beneficiaries. So you get a chance to earn the same amount of interest as everyone else.

Q: Just because I am a teacher in California, I am being cheated out of benefits that are rightfully mine. Because I collect a teacher's pension, there are dreaded and unfair offset laws that prevent me from getting any of my husband's Social Security. How can the government justify that?

A: They can justify that because they are treating you in the very same way all working people have always been treated by the Social Security program. In fact, before the so-called "dreaded and unfair offset laws" went into place, you (and he dies. other government employees system. > Q: Why is the government preventing me from getting any of my husband's Social Security? He gets his Social Security and I get mine. Yet I just learned when he dies, I won't get a nickel of his Social Security money. He worked hard all his life, so I should be able to get what he worked for when he dies.

> A: I purposely put your question here as a follow up to the previous question. What I didn't explain in the last answer is that Social Security spousal benefits have always been paid to "dependent" spouses. In other words, had you not worked and had your own source of income, you would have been financially dependent on your husband's income while he was working and you would also then be financially dependent on his Social Security when he retires. So in that situation, you would have qualified for Social Security wife's benefits while he was alive and widow's benefits after

House passes annual government spending bill

■ Thornberry says bill cuts spending, protects national security, restricts overreach.

WASHINGTON, D.C. -The U.S. House of Representatives passed a spending bill yesterday that provides funding for nearly all of the government's operations through the end of the fiscal year, Sept. 30, 2015. The exception is the Department of Homeland Security, which will receive funding for less than 90 days, expiring on Feb. 27, 2015. Under the agreement, overall discretionary spending has been reduced by \$165 billion since Fiscal Year 2010. The legislation passed with a bipartisan vote of 219 to 206. Congressman Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon) voted in favor of the bill.

"This bill fulfills our constitutional responsibility to fund the government, while also reining in spending and executive and other federal overreach," said Rep. Thornberry. "We have been able to reduce spending by \$165 billion since 2010. We plan to build on this progress with additional meaningful cuts and changes when Congress returns in January with Republican majorities in the House and the Senate."

The bill funds important Department of Defense programs and projects, offers a pay raise for troops, and provides resources to help prepare for current

and future threats. In addition, it contains nearly \$2.8 billion for Bell Helicopter's V-22 and other aircraft programs, much of which is done in Amarillo. It also increases funding for nuclear weapons activities-much of which is performed at Pantex—to \$8.2 billion. To help address the backlog of deferred maintenance on physical infrastructure in the nuclear weapons facilities, the agreement provides \$37.4 million specifically for recapitalization projects at Pantex. Harvesters thump Wheeler at Panhandle tourney

PANHANDLE — The Pampa Harvesters (9-1) dominated the Wheeler Mustangs 64-27 Friday afternoon to advance to the Championship game of the Panhandle Tournament. Depending on how other teams play, the Harvesters will either face Panhandle or Spearman tonight at 6:40 p.m. in Panhandle.

The Harvesters didn't take long to get going as senior Cade Engle was fouled on a layup, allowing him to go a perfect 2-2 from the free throw line and put the Harvesters on the board 2-0.

Pampa created a turnover and gave it to Engle again, who took it to the house to extend their lead

Wheeler pulled within one with a 3-pointer, but junior Bryson Burrell scored a basket pulling away again at 6-3. Wheeler sank a couple of free throws and scored a basket allowing them to go on top 7-6 until sophomore Brandon Sieck hit a 3-pointer, putting Pampa back on top 9-7.

The Harvesters went on a 16-2 run with a 3-pointer from Shanoaha Bridges, a basket from senior Jonathan Stevens and a pair of transition layups to Engle. The Harvesters took a 25-9 lead into the second quar-"I thought our transition game was good today.

That's our focal point on the season, to beat the other team down the floor and push the basketball. We were able to do that early and get (Cade) Engle going early," head coach Matt Embry said.

"When he gets his offense going early it opens up

big stuff for other people. It's our key to success."

The Harvesters let up on the gas in the second quarter, scoring only seven points to Wheeler's 10. This included a 3-pointer from sophomore Brendon Woelfle, a basket from Engle and a jump shot from Bridges. Pampa lead the Mustangs 32-17 at the half. Pampa took control back in the second half starting

in the third quarter with a pair of layups from Engle and Stevens. Engle was fouled shortly after and went 2-2 from the charity stripe. Junior Kambrin Scott came alive at this point and drained a pair of threes to extend Pampa's lead to 44-17.

"Kambrin is a great shooter, that's why he is on this team. We've got to make Kambrin understand there's more to basketball than just being inside of 94 feet of wood," Embry said.

"He's learning life lessons every day and I am proud of the steps he is taking as a player and being able to shoot that ball."

After a 3-pointer from Wheeler, Woelfle answered with one of his own keeping the lead 47-20. Sieck was fouled just before the quarter ended, and he went 1-2 from the line and the Harvesters took a 48-20 lead into the half. In the final quarter, Wheeler tried to fight back and

hit a 3-pointer following a Harvester basket and made the score 50-23. After a basket from Burrell, senior Jett Gibson scored his first points of the game on a 3-pointer. On the next Harvester possession, Gibson took it to the house and slammed it into the basket for a dunk. Sieck and Bridges had a pair of baskets making it 61-25. Junior Adam Zuniga scored the final points of the game for the Harvestes with a 3-pointer. dle's JV, 74-38 in the tournament.

While it's hard to find issues with a 37-point victory, Embry said the Harvesters need to contain opposing corner players better.

"We've got to prevent teams from getting the ball out of the corner. We force teams into the corner and trap them. We are long and lanky down there and we want to force teams to do that. It allows us to create turnovers and we have to do a better job of that," Embry said.

"(We also need to continue to have) crisp passing. We moved the ball really well today. That's something we need to be able to do against the great teams."

The Harvesters return to action tonight at 6:40 p.m. against either Spearman or Panhandle, Embry doesn't have a preference.

"We just want to play four games and win four games. Panhandle's a great team, we watched them play yesterday," Embry said. "But I think as long as we do our job we will be able to play with them."

Cade Engle was the Harvesters leading scorer with 19 points, including a 3-pointer and a perfect 4-4 from the free throw line; Kambrin Scott and Brendon Woelfle each had eight points and each had two 3-pointers; Shanoaha Bridges had seven points with a 3-pointer; Brandon Sieck had six points, with a 3-pointer and went 1-2 from the charity stripe; Jonathan Stevens and Bryson Burrell each had four points; Adam Zuniga had a 3-pointer for his three points of the game and Jett Gibson had five points, a 3-pointer and the exciting dunk.

While cruising through Yahoo! Sports the other day, I saw a headline that went something along the



lines of "Broncos: Peyton Manning still the starter in Denver." Immediately I asked myself when did it become a question.

Now the Denver Broncos' passing game has frustrated me both as an armchair quarterback and the proud owner of wide receiver Demaryius Thomas in

my fantasy football team.

However, I have never thought the Broncos needed to bench Manning.

Since the Broncos' Nov. 2 loss to the New England Patriots, Manning has thrown at least two interceptions in four of the six games.

The fans want fireworks in the passing game, did they forget at one time we had Tim Tebow?

If Broncos fans want to complain about Manning throwing for less than 200 yards in two straight games, don't forget Tebow won a game in 2011 where he went 2-8 69 yards and a touchdown. One of those was a 56yard bomb to Eric Decker.

Manning, likely frustrated with the reports asking what's wrong or if age is catching up with him, said recently, "There are multiple ways to win."

He is referring to the running game, of course. Over the last three games, the Broncos are averaging 186 yards on the ground. A commentator from last week's game against

the Bills was quoted to say, "When was the last time you heard that one

of the keys to stop the Denver Broncos offense (under Manning) is stopping the run."

Like the legendary Terrell Davis, undrafted running back C.J. Anderson was relatively unknown. Injuries to starters Montee Ball and Ronnie Hillman have spring-boarded him

to be the starter and he has exploded onto the scene.

While Sunday against the Bills, he had a modest 58 yards on 21 carries, he had 167 and 168 yards against the Dolphins and Chiefs, respectively.

The Broncos' vice president of football operations, John Elway, knows that even in the pass-happy NFL, a running game certainly elevates a team to Super Bowl victories.

Elway had Davis for his two Super Bowl wins and he just watched the Seattle Seahawks dominate the Broncos in the Super Bowl less than a year ago.

Personally, I am not worried about Manning.

Like the last time the Denver Broncos won the Super Bowl, they are lining up and punching teams in the mouth with their run game.

So it comes down to the final three weeks of the season.

A win Sunday and the Broncos clinch the AFC West title for the fourth straight year.

They need a little help with losses to Indianapolis, Pittsburgh and Cincinnati, but they can also clinch a first-round bye.

With all these reports coming out about Manning's health and age, it would be nice if offensive coordinator Adam Gase let him come out slinging for 300-plus yards and handful of touchdowns.

Watch out, San Diego.

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


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


