DPS trooper seizes more than \$96,000 in drugs

AMARILLO - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) conducted a traffic stop Sunday on Interstate 40, yielding 25 pounds of marijuana valued at more than \$90,000 along with 12 ounces of hashish with a value more than \$6,000.

At approximately 2:32 p.m., a DPS trooper conducted a traffic stop on a 2014 Hyundai Elantra traveling eastbound on I-40, for a traffic violation, near Bushland in Potter County.

The occupants of the Elantra were identified as Heidi J. Hilts, 19, of Norman, Okla., and Joshua D Babbs, 23, of Moore, Okla. During the traffic stop, the trooper discovered 29 bundles of marijuana along with the hashish in the vehicle.

Both occupants were placed under arrest for possession of marijuana more than five pounds but less than 50 pounds, a second-degree felony, along with possession of a controlled substance more than four grams, but less than 400 grams, a seconddegree felony, and booked into the Potter County Jail.

The illegal drugs were allegedly being transported from Riverbank, Calif., to Oklahoma City.





Monster snowstorm swirls into densely populated Northeast US

NEW YORK (AP) — The closed. Philadelphia-to-Boston corpeople began shutting down Monday as a monster storm that could unload a paralyzing 1 to 3 feet of snow swirled into the Northeast.

Snow was blowing sideways with ever-increasing intensity in New York City by midafternoon as flurries began in Boston. Forecasters said the storm would build into a blizzard, and the brunt of it would hit Monday evening and into Tuesday.

More than 5,800 flights in and out of the Northeast were canceled, and many of them may not take off again until Wednesday. Schools

Look down, look up, look all around!



"Looking for the anomaly," I replied. "Huh?" he uttered back. I pointed to the geese and added, "The anomaly, you know, checking to see if a different species of goose is flying with the Canada's." With not even a glance towards the geese, he looked my way and rolled his eyes as if I was crazy. "It's a birder thing. Just think Mother Nature" I said to him. AgriLife Extension expert: Soundness exams, genetic testing improve herd performance

Emerging DNA technology offers the opportunity to identify genetic markers for traits of interest and identify individual sires used in multiple-sire breeding pastures, said Dr. Bruce Carpenter, livestock specialist, Fort Stockton.
