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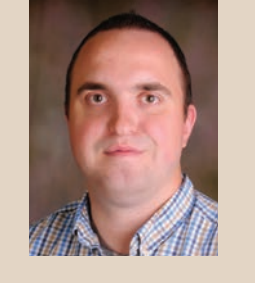
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Author Josie Hudson holds presentation at Pampa ISD Administration Building

USDA accepting applications for Conservation Stewardship Program

■ \$100 million expected to attract 7.7 million Acres for Conservation.

TEMPLE —The U.S. Department of Agriculture will make available \$100 million this year through the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) and although applications are accepted all year, farmers, ranchers and forest landowners should submit applications by Feb. 27, 2015 to ensure they are considered for this year's funding (applications received after that date will be considered for future funding). This year's investment may result in the enrollment of up to 7.7 million acres in the program by private landowners.

“CSP is a way of incentivizing farmers, ranchers, and private forest managers who maintain a high level of conservation on their land and agree to adopt higher levels of stewardship,” said Salvador Salinas, USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service state conservationist. “By focusing on multiple resource concerns, landowners are able to achieve a sustainable landscape and maintain or increase the productivity of their operations.”

Through CSP, participants

take additional conservation steps to improve the resource conditions on their land, including soil, air and habitat quality, water quality and quantity, and energy conservation.

Salinas said CSP producers are conservation leaders, showing how science-based conservation and technological advancements can improve the environment and farming operations at the same time.

For example, Texas no-till farmer Tommy Henderson plants cover crops between his cash crops to prevent soil moisture lost to evaporation, as well as provide important natural nutrients the soil needs to be healthy and productive. This stewardship of natural resources, encouraged through CSP, helps conserve energy and leads to cleaner water and healthier food sources.

The 2014 Farm Bill brought changes to CSP including an expanded conservation activity list that will offer participants greater options to meet their conservation needs and protect the natural resources on their land.

These conservation activi-

ties, called enhancements, include cover crops, intensive rotational grazing and wildlife friendly fencing.

CSP will also help broaden the impacts of NRCS' Landscape Conservation Initiatives through a new pilot effort, which accelerates private lands conservation activities to address particular goals, such as creating habitat for at-risk species and conserving and cleaning water. They include:

- Lesser Prairie-Chicken Initiative - Applicable states: Colorado, Kansas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas.

- Ogallala Aquifer Initiative - Applicable states: Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, New Mexico, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Texas and Wyoming.

- Longleaf Pine Initiative - Applicable states: Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Texas and Virginia.

“CSP is a great addition to our conservation toolbox for our Landscape Conservation Initiatives, which rally together landowners at the broader level to make conservation improvements

that help us tackle our nation's resource issues,” Salinas said. “Historically, other conservation programs have driven these initiatives, but now with CSP, we'll be bringing more farmers, ranchers and forest landowners to these efforts.”

Applications should be submitted to local NRCS offices.

As part of the CSP application process, applicants will work with NRCS field personnel to complete a resource inventory of their land, which will help determine the conservation performance for existing and new conservation activities. The applicant's conservation performance will be used to determine eligibility, ranking and payments.

A CSP self-screening checklist is available to help producers determine if the program is suitable for their operation.

The checklist highlights basic information about CSP eligibility requirements, stewardship threshold requirements and payment types.

Today's announcement was made possible by the 2014 Farm Bill. The 2014 Farm Bill builds on historic economic gains in rural America over the past five years, while achieving meaningful reform and billions of dollars in savings for taxpayers.

• **Female 'Ghostbusters' casted** — While it is still in the early stages, a "Ghostbusters" re-boot has casted an all-female

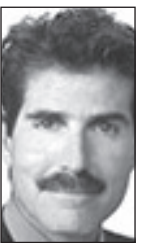

Owning ideas

For most of history, people suffered in miserable poverty.

Then, in a few hundred years, some new ideas made life hugely better for billions of us — things like running water, the printing

press, the steam engine, electricity, the Internet. We want people to keep coming up with new and better ideas. But there's a problem: Why would you bother to spend years inventing something if other people can just steal your idea? Who will devote years and millions of dollars to making a big movie? Or a dozen years and billions of dollars to bringing a new drug to market? Almost no one.

Filmmaker Kirby Ferguson sums up problem: "Let's say a guy invents a better light bulb. His price needs to cover not just the manufacturing costs but also the costs of inventing the thing in the first place. Let's say a competitor starts manufacturing a copy. The competitor doesn't need to cover those development costs, so his version can be cheaper."

Then he profits, but the original inventor goes out of business. That's why America grants time-limited patents and copyrights to creators of songs, books, movies, paintings, drugs, etc. Fine.

But today Fox won't let me sing the song "Happy Birthday" on my TV show. That's because Warner Music bought the rights to it in 1998. People now have to pay Warner about \$2 million a year to use the song in commercials and movies.

Sheesh. Why does Warner get such a long copyright? The song already existed. It's not like the composer needs protection.

Bridgeport Music, a business that makes no music but obtains copyrights and then sues people, won a lawsuit over two seconds of sound. When we questioned that, their lawyer wrote back: "I personally do not understand those who criticize people for protecting their intellectual property ... (We) happen to own valuable music."

Give me a break. He's an opportunistic parasite. I wonder about my former employer, Disney, too. It paid nothing for the Snow White story because it was in the public domain. But then Disney managed to get its version of Snow White copyright-

ed for 95 years. Will 95 years of protection make Disney's animators more creative? I doubt it.

In the era of the Internet, when young people take mashups and do-it-yourself parodies for granted, maybe intellectual property in its current form has outlived its expiration date.

David Koepsell, of the Center for Inquiry, says today's rules are hostile to free speech. "Intellectual property law actually prevents me from making certain expressions, things that are allegedly other people's own."

Lawyer Stephan Kinsella, author of "Against Intellectual Property," says copyright decreases intellectual output because it "prevents people from saying what they want to say, from copying, learning, sharing, remixing." That stops some books from being reprinted and movies from being remade.

When Hollywood complains about "piracy," Kinsella asks, "Why call it piracy? Pirates stole. But if you copy ideas, you don't take anything away from the original."

Thomas Jefferson once agreed, writing, "He who receives an idea from me, receives instruction himself without lessening mine; as he who lights his taper (candle) at mine, receives light without darkening me."

Kinsella points out that movie industry income doubled even though films are now widely copied. "The danger to artists and to people who want to get their name out there is obscurity, not piracy."

I'm not sure what to think. Some of you watch my shows on YouTube. I like that because it means my show reaches more people. But those who post my videos do actually steal from Fox. If everyone can do that, why would Fox pay me or cover the cost of doing my show? When I see myself on YouTube, I both smile and cringe.

So how should ideas be protected? Magicians and comedians found ways to protect their inventions without government — by keeping tricks a secret or shaming people for stealing jokes.

I'll explore these ideas on my TV show in its new slot, Friday, 9 p.m. Eastern. And if some clips from it turn up on YouTube.

Almost ten years before the massacre of the German family, 112 Cheyenne families were massacred by Colorado Militia led by Colonel John M. Chivington. This massacre occurred at Sand Creek in Kiowa County, Colo., on Nov. 29, 1864.

Black Kettle and his Cheyenne were attempting to live and camp according to instructions of the commander of Fort Lyon and believed themselves to be under the guardianship of the U.S. government. An American flag was flying over the Cheyenne camp, and Black Kettle ran up a white flag when the early dawn attack began.

Buffalo Calf Woman, who was 23 years old at the time of the Sand Creek Massacre, saw her entire family cut to pieces with long, slender knives. Some were scalped while still alive, and children were shot at close range. Many of the victims were women, children and elderly people who tried to hide in the sand.

Four years later, on

Nov. 27, 1868, Buffalo Calf Woman experienced another merciless slaughter of her people. Again at early dawn, the Seventh Cavalry led by General George Armstrong Custer charged Black Kettle's peaceful village on the Washita River in Indian Territory. Killed in the "Battle of the Washita" was Major Joel H. Elliott for whom Fort Elliott was named on Feb. 21, 1876.

The area claimed by the Cheyenne for hunting and foraging included present Kansas, Colorado, Nebraska, Wyoming and the Black Hills of South Dakota. Near the Bunch of Trees River (Smoky Hill River) in Kansas, the Cheyenne people followed their leader, Medicine Water, husband of Calf Woman.

In 1874, Medicine Water was made head of the Cheyenne Bow String Warrior Society. He was well known to the U.S. Cavalry and buffalo hide hunters for he constantly engaged them in battle in his efforts to preserve the traditions and lifestyles of his people and to resist any intrusion into his homeland. At his side rode his wife, Calf Woman, a Cheyenne Warrior-woman in her own right.

On June 27, 1874, after Medicine Water smoked the war pipe with Quannah Parker's Comanche and with the Kiowa, he led the Cheyenne revenge at the Old

Adobe Walls trading post.

At the time of the Sand Creek Massacre, John German of Fannin County, Ga., was serving as a Confederate soldier in the Civil War. When he returned to his home in 1865, he found it in shambles. Only his wife, children and some livestock had escaped a guerilla raid. After a friend wrote of opportunities in Colorado, German decided to take his family west. About five years were spent in preparation before the family left Georgia on April 10, 1870.

Travel in the homemade covered wagon was slow for they often stopped to work to earn money before they could continue their journey. At one time they took a homestead in Missouri, but the climate was not favorable for German and Catherine, one of the daughters. German traded the homestead for another yoke of oxen and a covered wagon and the family again headed west.

When they reached Kansas, German intended to travel northwest until they reached the Union Pacific Railroad. At Ellis, Kan., he was told that the station agents would not sell even a cup of water. He then decided to follow the Butterfield Trail, the old stagecoach route that lay alongside the Smoky Hill River. When he asked about the dangers of the route, he

was told that there was little danger as there had been no deeds of violence for several years. The few Indians they had met had seemed friendly and they were unaware of the warfare between the Cheyenne and the whites.

On Sept. 10, 1874, the German family met two men who said that they were only a day's journey from Fort Wallace, Kan. Happy at the thought that they would soon be with white people again, they camped together for the last time.

Early the next morning, as German and his family were leaving the campsite, they were attacked by 15 Cheyenne braves and two squaws. The Cheyenne were led by Medicine Water and Calf Woman who killed John German with her hatchet. The mother, Lidia (Cox) German, Rebecca Jane (20), Stephen (19) and Joanna (15) were killed and the five victims were scalped. The survivors were Catherine (17), Sophia (12), Julia (7) and Adelaide (5).

Engle fuels Harvesters' 101-47 route with 33 points

■ Pampa dropped 101 points in the game Tuesday as they get first district win.

The Pampa Harvesters 19-4 (1-3) hosted the Dalhart Wolves 3-19 (0-3) on Tuesday night in McNeely Fieldhouse.

"We knew that kid could play (No. 5), we kept him on the perimeter and didn't let him get inside," head coach Matt Embry said. "Proud of the guys. I thought Calven and Corbin and Zuniga did a great job inside off the bench when Jett and Johnathan were sitting."

The first quarter was close throughout. Dalhart called a timeout early at the 7:08 mark with the game tied at two apiece.

Senior Jett Gibson's three-pointer made it 11-7 Pampa with 3:25 to go. It was 13-9 after fellow senior Johnathan Stevens added free throws.

Gibson had a steal and a dunk to give Pampa a 15-9 lead with 3:02 to go in the period.

Sophomore Brendon Woelfle hit a bucket to make it 18-12.

Pampa led after the first quarter 20-15.

Woelfle was 1-2 from the line with three points. Engle was 2-3 from the line with eight points. Stevens was 2-2 from the line with two points. Junior Bryson Burrell had two points. Gibson had five points.

Junior Adam Zuniga had a nice pass to Burrell to start the second quarter and put Pampa on top 22-15. Engle had a steal and basket to make it 24-15 at the 7:19 mark.

Engle hit a three-pointer and then had another steal that led to a layup. Pampa now led 30-15 with 6:17 to go before the half and Dalhart called a timeout.

Engle and Burrell each had traditional three-point plays and then sophomore Brandon Sieck added a bucket to put Pampa on top 39-21 with 3:40 to go before the half.

Sieck forced a turnover and then on the ensuing Har-

vester possession, Engle had another traditional three-point play. Pampa led 48-27 with 40 seconds left in the half.

Zuniga added a buzzer beater three-pointer that banked in as the horn sounded to end the half.

Pampa led 51-27 at the break.

Engle was 3-4 from the line with 18 points. Sieck had two points. Stevens was 1-2 from the line with one point. Burrell was 1-1 from the line with five points. Zuniga had three points. Gibson was 2-4 from the line with two points.

With the game well in hand, most of the starters sat the majority of the second half.

Pampa led 73-36 after three quarters.

"When Engle gets going early like that, we're tough to beat," Embry said. "In the first round, the other three teams did a good job of putting their focus on him at the beginning of games."

Embry continued to praise Engle.

"We have to a better job of getting other people going, getting the defense to shift and then Engle can do his thing," Embry said. "He did a great job finishing at the rim tonight too, I was proud of him."

Engle added seven more in the quarter. Junior Shanoaha Bridges added two. Stevens had two. Burrell had two. Zuniga had two. Woelfle had two and junior Kambrin Scott had five points in the quarter.

In the fourth as Pampa got closer and closer to the century marks, one could sense the crowds anxiousness and anticipation for Pampa to reach the mark.

Pampa had 85 early in the quarter. Things started to slow down in the quarter and it was going to be close.

Pampa took a 99-47 lead late in the quarter, with under a minute to go.

The Harvesters got the ball and had about five chances, but they continued to get their own rebound, before fi-

nally sophomore Corbin Hair scored to put Pampa over the century mark.

Final: Pampa 101, Dalhart 47.

How did Embry feel about scoring 101?

"I'm not a big fan of that (going for 100). That's a team right there (Dalhart) they got a good coach, he's a great guy, you hate to do that," Embry said. "But when you got kids and fans that want it, it's pretty difficult to say no to the fans. They were screaming for that hundred, so we had to go do it."

In the fourth, Hair had eight points. Senior Dante Jordan had two points. Woelfle had three points. Sieck had three points. Scott had three points and Gibson had nine points in the quarter.

Cade Engle was 5-8 from the line with 33 points and two three-pointers. Jett Gibson was 3-6 from the line 16 points and had three three-pointers. Bryson Burrell was 1-1 from the line with nine points. Kambrin Scott had two threes and eight points. Brendon Woelfle was 1-2 from the line with eight points and had one three. Corbin Hair had eight points. Adam Zuniga had five points and one three-pointer. Johnathan Stevens was 3-4 from the line with five points. Brandon Sieck was 1-2 from the line with five points. Shanoaha Bridges and Dante Jordan each had two points. Calven Webb was the only Harvester not to score, but he played great defense and got some good rebounds. His shots just rimmed in-and-out.

"That was a team game right there. Six guys had eight or more points. That's bigtime," Embry said.

Pampa will take Friday off before heading to Perryton on Tuesday to start the second round of district play.

"We've got a long time to get ready for Perryton and I intend to do just that starting tonight (Tuesday night). We've gotta do a better job of closing out on their shooters and not giving them open looks. They shot 58 percent from three in the first game," Embry said. "When our guards are hitting from the perimeter like that and Jett does his thing, we're gonna be a tough team to beat in the second round."

Dalhart started the third on a 4-0 run to take a 29-20 lead and they called a timeout at the 5:25 mark.

Brown scored to give Pampa their first points of the quarter at the 4:25 mark. Eubank had a traditional three-point play with 3:55 to go in the quarter to make the score 31-25.

Brown added a bucket to make it 31-27 with 3:25 to go. Dalhart called a timeout at that juncture.

The score was 33-30 with 2:22 to go after another Eubank traditional three-point play. Brown cut the lead to one at 33-32 with a basket at the 1:10 mark.

Dalhart then went on a 4-0 run to end the quarter and take a 37-32 lead into the fourth and final period.

Brown had six points in the quarter. Eubank was 2-2 from the line and also had six points.

"We have to come out ready for the rest of our district opponents. If nobody else can beat Dalhart, then we are sitting neck and neck with everybody else. We just have to be better than everybody else," Chaffin said. "We've gotta move on to Perryton. We're gonna keep clawing. We gotta make sure that Rayna gets on the books next time. She had zero points. We have to make sure she gets in there and gets something done next time."

The Lady Harvesters will have Friday off and will be back in action Tuesday when they travel to Perryton in a game with the Rangerettes.

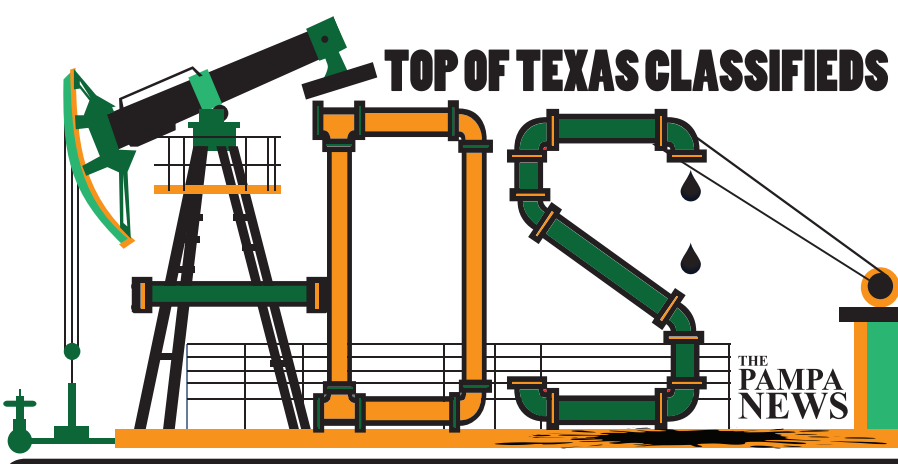

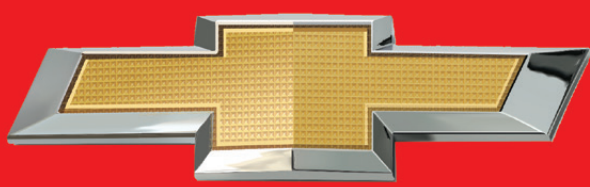
