## School board approves order of a bond election

■ General trustee election ordered also.

The Pampa Board of Trustees met on Thursday night in their monthly meeting at the Pampa Independent School District administration building at 1233 N. Hobart in Pampa.

The School Board approved the calling of a general trustee election. Three seats on the Board are up for election. As of Friday morning, there were only two incumbents and a new person filed to fill the positions. The Board approved the order of a general trustee elec-

tion. Should there be no other applicants, the Board will cancel the trustee portion of the election.

The meeting was continued with a public comment from Lewis Nava, father of Pampa High School swimmer Elaine Nava. Nava mentioned to the School Board that this was the first year under new swimming head coach Colby Dennis and that came with a learning curve on its own. Then the team's swimming pool stopped working and they were forced to find other facilities.

Those facilities came in the form of Frank Phillip's College allow-

ing the team to use their facilities. Nava was surprised at how well the college received the swim team and worked with them.

Nava simply recommended the Board writes a letter to Frank Phillip's College thanking them for accommodating the swim team in the manner they did.

The next topic of discussion was the calling of a special bond election. As mentioned at the January meeting, the four biggest priorities formed by the Pampa ISD Stakeholder Committee was too alleviate the overcrowding at Pampa Junior High School and the elementary schools, make Harvester Stadium ADA Compliant, improve

Pampa High Schools Career and Technology Education facilities and to make permanent facilities for Pampa Learning Center.

Pampa ISD superintendent Dr. David Young presented the board with the proposal of calling a special bond election to take care of two of those priorities.

The first part the special bond election would be for the District to build an intermediate school. The intermediate school will house fifth and sixth grades at roughly 800 students and be about 104,000 square feet. The second issue the bond election address were the improvements of the career and tech-

## Dr. Grabato celebrates 37 years in Pampa

Dr. Rene P. Grabato has been practicing urology in Pampa since 1978. His office is located at 2931 Perryton Parkway, across the street from Pampa Regional Medical Center.

Pampa Regional Medical Center has undergone numerous changes since the construction of the building in 1981.

There is one member of the staff who has been there since the beginning, and that is urologist Dr. Rene P. Grabato, MD.

Dr. Rene Grabato has been in Pampa since 1978, and since beginning to practice here, he has not left.

Originally from the Philippines, Grabato came to the U.S., finished his education in New York and trained there for six years at the top of one of the World Trade Centers. He had his plans all set to move to Dallas to begin his career as a urologist, when things were altered.

Those plans all changed when the oil industry was bringing more and more people to the Texas Panhandle and there was a demand for specialists to come to Pampa, which brought Grabato here.

In 1982, Grabato built the office where his practice still exists today at 2931 Perryton Parkway.

A typical day for Grabato includes working closely with PRMC for emergencies in the mornings as well as working in his own office in the afternoons. He also travels to Borger a few times a month to help out there and does what he can to help out other sur-

## Fund set up Pampa man injured on drilling rig

Joey Slagle is a mechanic with Stokes Radiator Service in Pampa. Joey was injured during an otherwise normal workday on the drilling rig he was working. After his crushed hand healed, he found he was unable to continue working in the oil industry and lost his health insurance.

Joey began having some painful physical symptoms soon after losing his mom, just before Thanksgiving. After many tests, Renal Cell Carcinoma was diagnosed as the mass which has invaded his left kidney.

Despite of his painful condition, Joey continues to work at his job as much as he is able in order to provide for his family.

Joey and Michele have two children, ages 12 and 15, and recently have taken legal custody of three nephews, ages, six, three and 15 months. The nephews would have otherwise become wards of the state.

So far, Joey's extended family has been able to pay for doctors' visits as well as radiologists, anesthesiologists and similar professionals (also day surgery and all other tests, which have been numerous). But

## Texas Tech, PRMC to give Pampa breast care

Thanks to a partnership between Pampa Regional Medical and Texas Tech University, the city of Pampa will have benefit from a outreach clinic in Pampa featuring Dr. Rakhshanda Rahman, the area's only fellowship trained breast surgeon.

The clinic in Pampa, a monthly 1½ day clinic, will be attended by Dr. Rahman and her breast fellow. The senior family medicine resident physician will be in Pampa 36 weeks a year. One resident physician at a time rotates to Pampa.

The partnership was started when PRMC CEO Brad Morse and Dr. Richard M. Jordan, M.D., regional dean of the Texas Tech School of Medicine in Ama-



nical education facilities. This would add two new programs: Health and pre-Engineering. The bond will also renovate the facilities to improve the home economic department to a culinary arts program, make health science facilities and improve the look of the CTE facilities, among other improvements.

The total for the bond, which will build a new intermediate school and improve the Career and Technology Education program, is \$30,340,000. The new intermediate school is \$25.68 million and the improvement to the CTE program and facilities is \$4.66 million.

The other two needs, making Harvester Stadium ADA compliant and making permanent facilities for Pampa Learning Center will be addressed at a later time and with different funding.

Just for information, the work that Harvester Sta-

dium requires is roughly \$1.85 million. This work includes expanding the bathrooms to make them ADA compliant, making walkways to all of the facilities, making the home-side bleachers, concession stands and the press box all ADA accessible, which will include an elevator to the press box.

Board president Lee Porter asked if the CTE facilities will be flexible to multiple programs. Dr. Young explained that many of facilities will be in lab format, which will allow for multiple programs.

Board member Dana Terry asked if the cosmetology program can be conducted in conjunction with Clarendon College. Dr. Young answered explaining that the program is doing that now and is more advantageous financially to do it that way.

Board vice president Cay Warner commended the stakeholder committee for the way its members presented the Board with what they felt is the District's priorities. Warner said that the bond will affect every student in the District in some way.

Porter added before the Board voted on the special bond election that after Thursday night, the Board cannot in any way promote the bond election or act in favor of the bond. If they are asked questions about it, they can only answer factually.

The Board approved calling a special bond election for the amount of \$30,340,000.

In conjunction with approving the special bond election, the Board approved Underwood Law Firm as bond counsel, an election agreement with Gray County and a joint election agreement with the City of Pampa. All of these items are routine when calling a regular election or special bond election.

The only difference between this year's bond election and previous elections is that early voting will be held at the Pampa ISD administration building.

The next item on the agenda was the approved purchase of a new 4X4 pickup. The Board approved the purchase from Culberson-Stowers, Inc. in Pampa for the amount of \$37,160.65.

It will come prepped for a snow plow and have flexibility for other amenities. Culberson-Stowers added Bluetooth capability so the drivers can drive safely and legally as well as an added leaf spring to improve the suspension into their bid.

When the Board approved the solicitation of bids for the before mentioned truck in January, a week later another District vehicle died.

Danny Seabourn, chief financial officer, said that the next truck they will be soliciting bids for will be a three-quarter ton pickup with standard bed, lift gate, trailing equipment, ladder rack and a snow plow package.

The Board approved the solicitation of bids for the pickup.

The Board also approved the following consent agenda:

- Approve monthly financial reports.
- Approve board minutes for Jan. 29, 2015 and Feb. 9.
- Approve the sale of delinquent tax property.
- Approve TASB Policy Update 101.

rillo, discussed the involvement of Texas Tech and Pampa in the government grant program of Delivery System Reform Incentive Payment Program.

PRMC will benefit from having a primary care physician trainee regularly rotating through the hospital and increasing the likelihood of a well-trained primary resident physician also extending the medical work force of Pampa while rotating here.

"Dr. Rahman's Outreach Breast Clinic provides expert, up to date breast cancer screening and care to low income and underserved women in the Pampa Area that otherwise might not receive timely, live-saving medical attention," Dr. Jordan said.

"Dr. Rahman also does surgery in Pampa, bringing the latest breast surgery techniques to the Pampa hospital. At some point in the future one of the breast fellowship trained surgeons in Dr. Rahman's program may locate to the Pampa area. The breast fellowship was started by Dr. Rahman in 2011."

Texas Tech will benefit by Pampa funding part of a resi-

dency physician position and this allows Texas Tech to produce more family medicine physicians.

"It also allows an excellent rural training experience. Training more primary care physicians by Texas Tech benefits the region and the entire state of Texas," Dr. Jordan said. "Approximately one-third of Texas Tech primary care residency graduates practice in the Panhandle and a total 65 percent stay in Texas."

## Bouncin' Around My favorite actresses

The Oscars have been awarded for another year. Did your favorite actor or actress receive an award?

I know there are quite a few talented performers today, but I was blessed to have grown up during the era of some pretty awesome movie stars. My all-time favorite was Ingrid Bergman, one of the most Oscar-awarded actresses, second only to Katharine Hepburn (whom I will mention later.)

I've seen almost every American movie Ingrid Bergman made, from "Casablanca," to "Notorious," "Gaslight," "Intermezzo," "Spellbound" and "Anastasia." Some of her last movies were made for television, "A Woman Called Golda" where she did a stunning job of portraying Golda Meir and "Murder on the Orient Express," where she played a mentally challenged former nanny. Even with the makeup designed to age her in those two movies, her natural beauty shone through.

My next favorite actress was Lauren Bacall, who passed away just last year at the age of 89. Her first movie, made when she was only 20

years old, was "To Have and Have Not" in which she starred with the man who would later become her husband, Humphrey Bogart. "Dark Passage," "Key Largo," "Blood Alley," "The Big Sleep" are only a few of her many dramatic roles, but I absolutely loved her role as Schatze in "How to Marry a Millionaire." She, too, had a natural beauty that didn't require tons of makeup to make her look better. Her deep, husky voice came across more sultry than masculine. She, too, appeared in "Murder on the Orient Express" as well as many TV movies and variety shows.

Audrey Hepburn, with her big, expressive eyes and her elfin appearance, was another favorite of mine. She possessed a quiet grace and a quick wit that shone through in such movies as "Sabrina," "Funny Face," "Breakfast at Tiffany's," "Charade" and of course, "My Fair Lady." We recently watched "Green Mansions," a movie in which Hepburn starred as "Rima," a young girl living in the forests of Venezuela with her grandfather. It's not one of her better-known movies, but a very good one.

Katharine Hepburn (no relation to Audrey) makes my list with such movies as "The Philadelphia Story," "Adam's Rib," "The African

Queen," "Guess Who's Coming to Dinner," "The Lion in Winter," "Rooster Cogburn," "The Glass Menagerie," "Bringing Up Baby" (in which she starred with Cary Grant and a leopard) and, of course, "On Golden Pond." All of these women were strong but very feminine, even though Katharine Hepburn was once criticized for wearing slacks and no makeup during the 1930's. None of them had cosmetic surgery, and they all aged gracefully. Of the three women, only Audrey Hepburn was active in any kind of charitable work.

In her later years, she put all her energy into UNICEF, supporting the starving children of the world. She herself was one of those children during World War II, and knew what suffering was.

Two British actresses, still living and still active, make my favorites list: Dame Judi Dench and Dame Maggie Smith. In my opinion, there are no more versatile actresses than these two ladies. I am eagerly awaiting their newest movie together, "The Second Best Marigold Hotel." Yes, there are good actresses presently making movies, but I don't think they will ever measure up to the women I honor here.

# Master Marketer program celebrates 20 years

Producers find value in the risk management training.

AMARILLO — When a Master Marketer class is offered by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, seats fill up fast. That's because the program, celebrating its 20th anniversary, is making a difference in farm operators' bottom line, according to attendees and coordinators.

Dr. Steve Amosson, AgriLife Extension economist in Amarillo, initiated the first training in 1996 and hosted the 27th training in Amarillo this year. Graduation of the 62 class members is March 3.

During the past 20 years, the program has offered agricultural producers a way to develop better risk management skills to deal with price volatility year in and year out, Amosson said. It has been conducted around the state in a format of a 64-hour curriculum covered in four two-day sessions held two weeks apart.

The format was suggested by a producer focus group and has worked quite well over the years, he said. While the content remains the same, the commodity emphasis of each program changes to fit the area of the state where it is being held.

AgriLife faculty provide a majority of course instruction, however, their efforts are complemented by a number of outside experts brought in from around the country to give their perspectives and guidance, Amosson said.

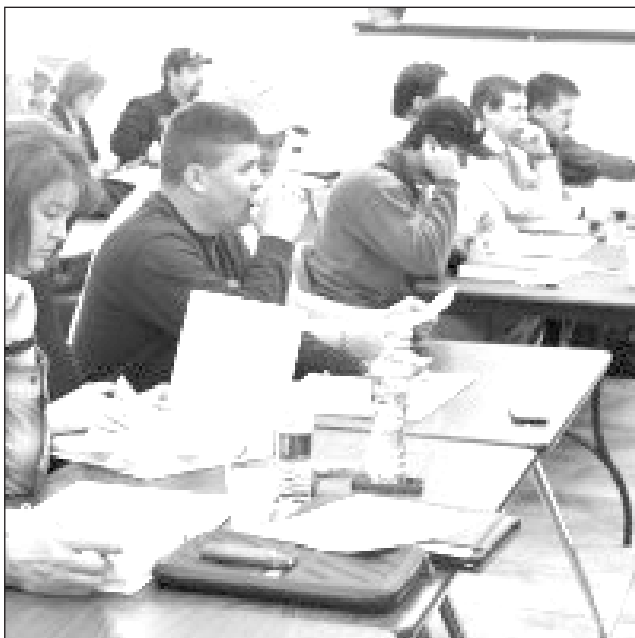
"We wanted to provide participants with the opportunity to hear from professionals they may have only read about, in an effort to provide them the best educational experience possible," he said.

Producers and industry have embraced the program because it is making a difference, confirmed by the repeated attendance by individuals and the requests for the award-winning training, Amosson said. More than a dozen of the current participants are past graduates. Also, other states are now conducting similar programs patterned after the Master Marketer program.

Janet Tregellas, a producer from Booker who attended the first training and has repeated it three times, said, "We acquired the tools to prosper in the transitional environment that unfortunately has eliminated the uninformed."

"Dr. Amosson and the team continue to address the issues that will define success in Texas agriculture for the upcoming leaner years. Producers must stay up to date to remain profitable as margins narrow."

In addition to Amosson, the original AgriLife Extension training team consisted of economists Dr. Mark Waller of College Station; Stan Bevers of Vernon; and Dr. Jackie Smith of Lubbock. Currently, Dr. Mark Welch, AgriLife Extension economist in grain marketing and policy in College Station serves as the statewide



director of the program.

Annual program sponsors and underwriters include the Texas Corn Producers Board, Texas Wheat Producers Board, Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, the Cotton State Support Committee, Texas Farm Bureau, the Risk Management Agency and AgriLife Extension. In addition, several agribusinesses serve as local sponsors to help defray costs of the program.

The program team received the Superior Service Award from AgriLife Extension in 1997, the Vice Chancellor's Award of Excellence from Texas A&M Univer-

sity in 1998, and the Group Honor Award for Excellence from the U.S. Department of Agriculture in 2000 for "creating innovative programming to raise agricultural producers' management skills."

Locations of trainings over the years have included six in Amarillo, five in Vernon, four in Lubbock, two in Waco, and one each in El Campo, Plainview, San Angelo, Gainesville, Victoria, Wharton, Weslaco, Kingsville, Uvalde and Abilene.

The results have been overwhelming with capacity audiences in most locations of 40 to 60 producers, the economists said. Master Marketer has graduated more than 1,150 attendees from the 27 trainings.

In post-graduation surveys conducted two and half years after the training, graduates indicated they have increased their returns by an average of \$30,000 to \$35,000 annually, said Welch.

"What is important to realize is that the techniques learned in this program can be applied year after year in developing a producer's risk management plan," Welch said.

"The program not only has the potential to dramatically impact the bottom line of Master Marketers, but their communities as a whole," said Waller, Texas A&M associate department head for agricultural economics.

"Increased producer income translates into more money for goods and services, multiplying throughout the local economy, over and over again," Waller said.

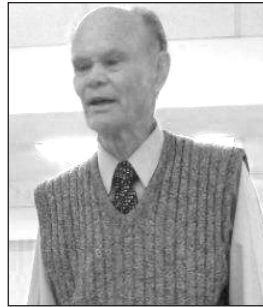

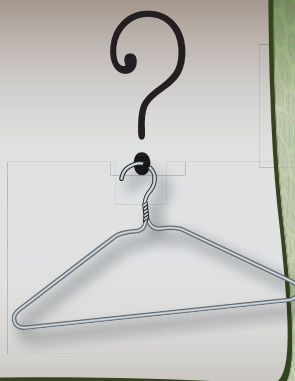

# Examples help clarify confusing rules

I've recently had several email exchanges with confused readers. The topics varied, but I found that the readers tended to be confused until I gave them an example. Here are a couple of examples of ... well ... my examples!

Hank wrote to tell me that he was surprised by a recent column in which I explained that a woman who took reduced benefits on her own record could later switch to full benefits on her husband's record — assuming he does not file for benefits himself until later on.

He was surprised because I have been preaching for years that, unless you are a widow or widower, you usually can NOT file for reduced benefits on one record and later switch to full benefits on another record. The law says that if you are under age 66, you must file for any and all benefits you are eligible for at that time.

But in that recent column, I was making the point that if a woman files for her own reduced benefits and her husband is not yet getting Social Security,

then she could later switch to benefits on his account once he files.



Hank said his wife, Angie, is about to turn 62. Hank is also 62, but he is not going to file for his Social Security until age 66. Hank said he will get a very high benefit and Angie will get a very low benefit. Based on my last column, Hank wrote to say he saw no reason for Angie not to file for benefits now because she would be switched to half of his at age 66. I told him there would be a possible disadvantage. He didn't understand what I was saying until I gave this example.

Let's say Angie's full retirement benefit is \$700 per month and Hank's is \$2,600 per month. Assuming Hank is going to wait until age 66 to file, Angie has two options for taking her own benefits.

Option A: Angie waits until age 66 to file for any Social Security benefits. At

age 66, she would get her full retirement rate of \$700. And assuming Hank also files for his full age-66 benefit of \$2,600, Angie could file for wife's benefits. She would get her \$700 benefit supplemented up to half of Frank's rate. So she'd get \$700 in retirement benefit and \$600 in spousal benefits for a total of \$1,300 per month.

Option B: Angie files for reduced benefits now at age 62. She would get 75 percent of her full retirement rate or \$525 per month. Then when she turns 66, and assuming that Hank also files for his retirement when he is 66, then Angie would file for wife's benefits. Here is how they would figure her spousal rate. They would take her age 66 rate, or \$700, (even though she took benefits at 62) and subtract that from one half of Hank's age 66 rate, or \$1,300. The difference, or \$600, would be added to Angie's reduced retirement benefit of \$525. In other words, from age 66 on, Angie would start getting \$1,125.

In Option B, Angie gets four years worth of

Social Security checks she wouldn't get in Option A. At \$525 per month for 48 months, that is \$25,200 she gets in Option B (by filing for reduced benefits now) that she doesn't get in Option A.

But in Option A, beginning at age 66, she starts getting \$1,300 per month as opposed to Option B's age 66 rate of \$1,125. So she gets an extra \$175 per month from age 66 on in Option A. If she chose Option A, it would take her 144 months, or 12 years, to get back the money she foregoes by not taking Option B.

So Angie's decision is this: does she want more money up front (Option B) or more money in the long range (Option A).

Here is another example of ... well ... an example that helped someone understand Social Security's rules.

Suzanne was 62 in January and filed for her Social Security to begin that month. She is still working, but does not anticipate making more than the Social Security earnings limit of \$15,720 in 2015. But she said there is a chance she could go over that amount depending on how much work she

gets this summer, when she makes most of her money. She said she could make as much as \$3,000 to \$5,000 in both June and July, but much less in other months. She told me she heard that there was a special monthly income rule that was going to penalize her.

I explained to her that the monthly rule only kicks in if she exceeds the yearly limit, and that the rule was intended to help her. She was still confused, until I offered this example.

Suzanne's Social Security check is \$1,000 per month. Suzanne earns \$800 per month at her job, except in June and July, when she makes \$3,000 per month. So her total income for the year is \$14,000. The law says that because her total income for the year is under the \$15,720 threshold, she will get all of her Social Security benefits for the year, even for those high-earning months like June and July.

But let's say that June and July are exceptional months for Suzanne, and she actually earns \$7,000 in each of those months. Now her total 2015 income will be \$22,000. That is \$6,280 over Social Security's \$15,720 threshold. The

law says that half of that, or \$3,140, must be withheld from her 2015 Social Security benefits. Because her benefit rate is \$1,000 monthly, that normally would mean they have to hold back three full benefit checks, and \$140 from a fourth check.

But here is where the monthly rule kicks in. That rule says that in your first year of retirement (2015 for Suzanne), she is due her full Social Security check for any month she earns under a special monthly threshold. The 2015 monthly limit is \$1,310, or one-twelfth of the yearly limit (\$15,720 divided by 12 is \$1,310).

The only months in 2015 when Suzanne made more than \$1,310 are June and July. So Social Security can only hold back her checks for those two months, for a total of \$2,000. The government just has to eat the other \$1,140 she normally would have to repay.

In other words, the monthly rule is designed to help Suzanne, not hurt her as she originally thought.

# Lent devotionals Saturday through Monday

## Day 10 – Saturday - goats

Scripture: Matthew 25:31-46; Luke 21:37-38

“When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, he will sit on his throne in heavenly glory. All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate the people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats. He will put the sheep on his right and the goats on his left.”

“Then the King will say to those on his right, ‘Come, you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.’”

“Then the righteous will answer him, ‘Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you?’

When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?”

“The King will reply, ‘I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me.’”

“Then he will say to those on his left, ‘Depart from me, you who are cursed, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels. For I was hungry and you gave me nothing to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, I was a stranger and you did not invite me in, I needed clothes and you did not clothe me, I was sick and in prison and you did not look after me.’”

“They also will answer, ‘Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or needing clothes or sick or in prison, and did not help you?’”

“He will reply, ‘I tell you the truth, whatever you did not do for one of the least of these, you did not do for me.’ “Then they will go away to eternal punishment, but the righteous to eternal life.” (The Gospels Interwoven, Zarley)

Devotional: Nothing was more common on the Judean landscape than herds of sheep and goats. Jesus took advantage of this common sight to remind everyone of the reality of judgment.

No one liked to hear about that truth then, and the same is true today. No human wants to think about judgment for long. Why? You know why. Because most humans are not faithful worshipers and servants of the Lord God and that means that the vast majority of humanity is goats (on the left) and headed for “eternal punishment.”

I remember when I was a goat, waking up each day in my own little world with no consideration for God’s will for my life. I also remember when the Holy Spirit came to convict me of the

wicked way I was living. Thank You, Holy Spirit. Thank You, thank You, thank You. Praise God, I am no longer a goat; not by my own might but by His.

A sheep awakes each day to simply listen for the Shepherd’s voice. As long as I live, I want to do that too. Father, I pledge to arise each day, report for duty and then live each day in Your strength.

Prayer: Jehovah Rohi, You have always yearned to be my Shepherd God. Each day You speak to me, hoping I will listen. Too often I do not. I am so sorry for my deafness. Please, lead me in the path where the lowly sheep walk. Protect me from the dangers of the stubborn goat. Be my Shepherd; not just today, but every day until I am with You face to face. Amen.

## Day 11 - Monday – an alabaster jar

Scripture: Matthew 26:6-13; Mark 14:3-9; Jn. 12:2-8

While he was in Bethany in the home of a man known as Simon the Leper, a dinner was given in Jesus’ honor. Martha served, while Lazarus was among those reclining at the table with him. Then Mary took an alabaster jar of very expensive perfume, about a pint of pure nard. She broke the jar and poured the perfume on Jesus’ head as he was reclining at the table. She poured it on Jesus’ feet and wiped his feet with her hair. And the house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume.

When some of those disciples present saw this, they were indignant. “Why this waste?” they asked one another. And they rebuked her harshly. One of his disciples, Judas Iscariot, who was later to betray him, objected, “Why wasn’t this perfume sold and the money given to the poor? It could have been sold for more than a year’s wages.” He did not say this because he cared about the poor but because he was a thief; as keeper of the money bag, he used to help himself to what was put into it.

Aware of this, Jesus said to them, “Why are you bothering this woman? Leave her alone. She has done a beautiful thing to me. It was intended that she should save this perfume for the day of my burial. You will always have the poor among you, and you can help them any time you want. But you will not always have me. She did what she could. When she poured this perfume on my body, she did it to prepare me for burial. I tell you the truth, wherever this gospel is preached throughout the world, what she has done will also be told, in memory of her.” (The Gospels Interwoven, Zarley)

Devotional: So far every object for these Lenten devotionals has been very “commonplace.” Well, not this

jar. It was a tiny inexpensive alabaster jar. Therefore the value of it wasn’t based on the outside material, but rather on the contents inside. This particular jar was full of a rare perfume that was valued at one-year’s wages for the average person.

The jar showed up at a dinner in the Bethany home of Simon the leper. Jesus’ close friends, Lazarus, Martha, and Mary had been invited as well. At some point during the meal Mary did the unthinkable. She took the entire jar of perfume and anointed Jesus from head to toe. Who ever heard of such a thing? What was she thinking? What a waste? Now there were those who immediately responded with those objections—the disciples.

Did Jesus? NO! He basically told everyone three things: 1) leave her alone, 2) you can’t be too extravagant with Jesus and 3) Mary will be

famous forever for what she did.

How extravagant in my life for Jesus have I been? Are there people who accuse me of giving too much to Him? Of doing too much for Him? Of worshiping Him too intensely? Of praising Him too vigorously? Of loving Him too much? I haven’t been accused of that one single time in the past year that I can remember. Mary was.

Why not me? Why not me? Why not me? I want to be more extravagant in my relationship with Jesus. I want to be more like Mary.

Prayer: Oh, Lamb of God, You are worthy of so much more than I ever give You. Fill me with more of what filled Mary that night at Simon’s house. Holy Spirit, lead me down the path that she walked. Help me see more clearly the significance of what Mary did that night. Amen.

## Gas price average rises

COPPELL — Texans are now paying an average of \$2.17 for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That's six cents more than last week but \$1.05 less than last year. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in the Lone Star State, drivers in Dallas and Fort Worth are paying the most on average at \$2.22 per gallon while drivers in San Antonio are paying the least at \$2.12 per gallon. The statewide average is 17 cents less than the national average of \$2.34, which is seven cents more than one week ago.

Refineries are in the midst of conducting seasonal maintenance, a process that can limit fuel production and contribute to rising pump prices. In addition, there remains the potential for unexpected refinery problems to further impact production and cause temporary price spikes in various regions. Last week an explosion at the ExxonMobil refinery in Torrance helped push up prices in California, while bitterly cold weather in the Northeast and Midwest led to a number of refinery problems in those areas. Ample domestic supply is expected to keep a ceiling on prices, though there is

a good chance that prices will continue to rise this spring.

"At the start of February drivers in 25 states enjoyed gas price averages below the \$2 per gallon mark, but today just two states are paying below that threshold," said AAA Texas/New Mexico Representative Doug Shupe. "Despite the increases we've seen recently, analysts say barring any major increases in global crude oil prices, averages at the pumps should remain below \$3 per gallon across the state and country for the rest of this year."

## King joint authors important pre- kindergarten legislation

AUSTIN — Today, State Representative Ken King (Canadian) joint authored House Bill 4 (HB 4), filed by State Representative Dan Huberty (Houston). HB 4 encourages Texas public school districts to implement high quality, accountable prekindergarten standards, and to provide additional funding for those districts already operating a program as outlined in the bill.

The overall goal of HB 4 is to implement a long term, successful prekindergarten system for all public schools in the state.

"HB 4 will hopefully provide the incentive for school districts to not only choose to invest in early childhood education, but to also ensure that our students are receiving high quality pre-K classes," said Rep. King. "If we put the emphasis on these children at a younger age we can address possible issues before they begin, and I believe this legislation is a great step in that direction."

Currently, Texas public school districts receive half-day prekindergarten funding for their eligible population equal to \$3,650 per student. HB 4 would allow districts to opt-in and

receive up to an additional \$1,500 per eligible student, as determined by the commissioner of the Texas Education Agency (TEA).

"With the passage of HB 4, school districts will have the opportunity to measure the success of their existing pre-K programs. Many of them are already operating at or above the standards outlined in this bill and may now be monetarily rewarded by the State," explained Representative Huberty.

"It is our hope that this legislation will encourage other districts to raise the standards of their early education programs and help ensure better learning outcomes for all Texas students."

In order for districts to qualify, they must fully align their curriculum with the Texas Prekindergarten Guidelines and measure progress to meet the learning outcomes underlined in those guidelines. Prekindergarten teachers must also be appropriately certified in early childhood education as outlined in the current Texas Education Code. Finally, individual districts are required to develop a parental engagement plan to establish and maintain high levels of family involvement in the student's educational career.

## No word on possible MLB discipline for Angels star Hamilton

TEMPE, Ariz. (AP) — Los Angeles Angels outfielder Josh Hamilton was on the minds of his teammates Thursday, a day after he was in New York to meet with Major League Baseball officials about an unspecified disciplinary issue.

The 33-year-old Hamilton has a history of drug addiction and alcohol abuse, leading to suspensions that cost him more than three years while in the minors. The Angels have confirmed Hamilton's meeting with MLB, but have declined to give any more information.

"I don't know any of the details, so I can't talk about that. But we miss him and we hope everything works out," MVP outfielder Mike Trout said. "I know that he's going through a lot," Trout said.

Hamilton, the 2010 AL MVP, hasn't reported to spring training in Arizona after undergoing surgery on his right shoulder earlier this month.

"He's not here in camp with us," general manager Jerry Dipoto said. "He is at home rehabbing from the surgery and we're going to leave it at that."

Hamilton already was expected to be out until after the regular season begins because of the surgery.

"We'll wait for Major League Baseball and see what the next step is. I don't think it will serve us any purpose to look too far down the road," manager Mike Scioscia said.

"We can deal with a lot of hypotheticals and a lot of rumors that are out there, but it's not going to serve any purpose," Scioscia said.

Hamilton is entering the third season of a five-year, \$125 million contract. He is still owed \$83 million: \$23 million this year and \$30 million in each of the next two seasons. Hamilton has been a disappointment for the Angels, batting just .255 with 31 homers and 123 RBIs in two seasons.

Pitcher C.J. Wilson called Hamilton one of his best friends in baseball. "I support him as a person," Wilson said. "When you have something going on, given what Josh has been through, you're looking out for him as a person first and his family."

In February 2012 while with Texas, Hamilton acknowledged he'd had a relapse with alcohol. It was his second known alcohol relapse in three years, both occurring in the offseason.

"You all know how hard I play on the field and I give it everything I absolutely have," Hamilton said at the time. "When I don't do that off the field, I leave myself open for a weak moment."

The overall No. 1 draft pick by Tampa Bay in 1999, Hamilton was suspended for more than three years because of drug and alcohol use while in the Rays' organization.

He missed the entire 2003, 2004 and 2005 seasons.

Hamilton made his big league debut with Cincinnati in 2007. Since making the majors, the Reds, Rangers and Angels have hired people to help Hamilton with his sobriety.
