### Wal-Mart sues Texas for right to sell liquor

Wal-Mart filed a lawsuit in an Austin federal court on Thursday challenging a Texas law that forbids the company from owning and operating liquor stores in the

The lawsuit says the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission code prevents Wal-Mart from obtaining a permit to sell hard alcohol because it is a publicly traded

Wal-Mart spokesman Lorenzo Lopez said the company is seeking a "fair and level playing field so we can offer our customers a full assortment of adult bever-

'This is counter to Texas' belief in free enterprise and fair competition, limits our customer's choice and keeps the price of spirits artificially high, all of which harm Texas consumers,"



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## Museum Musings Sweetwater, Texas, ringtown saloon

transform the Panhandle from Indian hunting territory into a settlement area. Troops from Fort Elliott patrolled the borders of Indian Territory to the east, policed cattle drives headed north to Kansas railroad depots, and in other ways protected and encouraged settlement of

Catering primarily to the soldiers at the fort, during the war time water City, Texas was established. Like many old west settlements, the town was primarily home to bullwhackers, outlaws, buffalo hunters and gamblers. Before the town was called Sweetwater it was known as Hidetown, it's name coming from the buffalo hunters hide trading post there, and was located southeast of where Old Mobeetie is today.

The 15 women in the small town were the dance hall and saloon girls. Many of the saloons had names such as the Pink Pussy Cat Paradise, the Buffalo Chip Mint and the White Elephant. One saloon, called the Ring Town Saloon, located about two and a half miles northwest of Sweetwater was designated for black men only - primarily those Buffalo Soldiers employed at the fort.

Except during its first months, when more than 400 troops were stationed there, Fort Elliott's strength was normally slightly fewer than

200 men. After 1883, a company of forty Indian scouts was also stationed at the post. In 1879, a company of the black Tenth United States Cavalry was assigned to the garrison, and between 1880 and 1888 other black units, companies of the Twenty-fourth United States Infantry and Ninth United States Cavalry, served there. From November 1881 until February 1884 all of Fort Elliott's troops were black. The commissioned officers were all white, however, with the exception of Lt. Henry O. Flipper, the first black graduate of West Point.

The Buffalo soldier units were formed in 1866, a year and a half after the civil war ended. Named by Plains Indian Warriors, the Indians saw two things in the soldiers that they saw in the buffalo — naturally curly hair and a ferocious fighting spirit. Through the years, these soldiers have worn these names with pride.

Throughout the era of the Red River Wars, approximately 20 percent of the U.S. Cavalry troops were buffalo soldiers.

Whether you are happy with what you have or unhappy with what you don't have, you still have the same

The first action you need to take to find contentment is to stop comparing yourself to others. Although it is human nature, it is a condition that you can conquer if you so desire. I truly believe this. There is always going to be someone whom you interact with that has

more than you. More belongings, a better job, a better spouse, better children, a better body. You get the idea.

The popular Disney song from the movie "Frozen" tells us "Let it go, let it go, turn away and slam the door." Although Elsa's song isn't about coveting it is good advice for each of us as we are tempted to look over our neighbor's

If you are grateful for each blessing you have received (regardless of how that looks) and focused on what you need to be doing in your life to accomplish the calling placed on you, you will not have time to covet another and your experience on this planet in the years you have will be much better.


In the Bible at Ecclesiastes 6:9b we are told "It is better to be satisfied with what you have than to be always wanting something else." You control your "contentment me-

## Just so they would feel at ease

God opened my eyes today to see something in the Advent story that I have missed all the years of my life. I was once again amazed and in awe of the limitless magnificence

of God's love and mercy. He cares about so many things only because those details are meaningful to us. Isn't that remarkable? The Creator of the universe cares about tiny details because they are important to His human creation. So it was with the shepherds on the

night of the Advent. They were a smelly, uneducated lot who hardly ever spent time around people. They were shepherds who couldn't ever leave the defenseless sheep with whom they had been entrusted. So they spent most of their lives with the sheep and each other. And the only good thing about living their lives with the other smelly shepherds was that they didn't notice their own personal odor so much. This was the life of the shepherds in the Advent

Even though it was one of the lower class occupations, the shepherds could at least take great comfort from time to time in knowing that the sheep they watched over would one day be the sacrificial part of one of the great Jewish festivals. Their greatest hope was for each of the sheep in their care to be offered on the Temple altar in

But on the night Jesus was born those hopes changed. The stinky, ignorant shepherds were selected by God Almighty to be humanity's only representatives to welcome the Christ child into the world. They were the only ones who received a personal invitation from heaven. They didn't even have to RSVP; all they had to do was walk to the stable in Bethlehem.

But don't you know that as they

headed for Bethlehem, their hearts filled with worry. After all they were no doubt smelly and dirty and so were their clothes. They must have discussed among themselves that they were hardly appropriately cleansed and attired to welcome the new king. But to their surprise they found Him in the one and only place in Bethlehem where they were completely comfortable, perfectly at ease. They found Him in a smelly, dirty stable.

If Jesus had been born in any of the houses in Bethlehem, the shepherds would have felt totally out of place, maybe so much so as not to even enter. And if He had been born in the inn, the inn keeper would surely have denied them entrance because of how they smelled or due to the complaints of his other guests about their bodily odor. This part of God's plan was for the ease of the shepherds. Mary would surely have preferred a nice room in the inn and so would Joseph. The stable part of the Advent story was God's way of telling the shepherds that He cared about them too and that He wanted them to feel at home with the new infant king.

Father God wants to do for you what He did for the shepherds that night. In this Advent story Father God is sending you a personalized invitation to meet His Son and doing it in such a way so as not to intimidate you. He doesn't want to frighten you away. He just asks that you meet Jesus in the same place where the shepherds met Him. It isn't a matter of you getting all cleaned up on your own, somehow becoming worthy of meeting the Redeemer. All you have to do is just meet Jesus in the stable; arriving all smelly in your sin will be fine, just come. So is it time for you to do what the shepherds did? It is the longest running syndicated game show with more than 6,000 episodes and it started its 33rd season in 2015. That certainly is amazing.

As I watched I also thought about all the contestants that had been on the show. Quick math told me that at least 18,000 contestants had been on the show during its history. That is a lot of people.

I also thought about Ken Jennings, who holds the record for the longest running winning streak in game show history at 74 wins on Jeopardy. Jennings has quite a story as he is also second all-time in game show winnings at just more than three million dollars.

After going through this thought process another thought crossed my mind, "I would love to be on a game show. It would be a lot of fun. Why have I never been on a game show?"

It is a good question to ask I guess. My first answer to the question was, "I have never been on a game show because the producers of a game show have never called and asked me to be on a show." But that brings up another question, "Why have the producers of a game show never called and asked me to be on a game show?"

How do you overcome the fear of trying something new? Here are three thoughts:

1. Identify. Identify that one thing that you have always wanted to try. You may not want to be on a game show but there is certainly that thought that you have always pushed to the back of your mind. The thought that says, "I would

2. Educate yourself. Learn all that you can about what it is that you want to try. Find stories of people who have done what you want to do and learn from them. In the information age that we live in there are endless opportunities to learn new things.

3. Step. Take the first step. Educating yourself can be a powerful motivator but there comes a point where you just have to step out and TRY.

Last year more than one million people tried out for "Wheel of Fortune" but only 600 made it on the air. 600 people made it on the air because they identified what it was that they wanted to do, then they educated themselves and finally they stepped out and gave it

These 600 would have never had the chance if they had sat at home with the thought, "It sure would be nice to be on a game show." They would have never had the chance if they had not taken the steps to overcome their fear.

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## Texas' defense the key in 61-59 win over No. 14 Baylor

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Longin overtime, and Bears' guard Kenny Chery had less than 5 seconds to bring the 14th-ranked Bears back.

Chery drove up court but missed a shot at the rim — Texas' Myles Turner was credited with a block — and the Bears lost 61-59 Monday, snapping their four-game winning streak and the Longhorns' four-game losing streak.

"They're a good defensive team," Chery said. "They are going to contest

Texas (18-12) improved to 7-10 in the Big 12 with one game remaining, keeping its hopes for an NCAA tournament bid alive. Last season, Oklahoma State became the first Big 12 team to get an at-large bid with a losing conference record (8-10).

"Coach (Rick Barnes) said this gives us another breath," Texas guard Javan

The Longhorns took the lead when Isaiah Taylor made a tear-drop shot in the lane with 4.8 seconds remaining.

Taylor, the point guard, played only 6 minutes in the first half because of foul trouble. He was on the bench for all but 5 minutes in the second half and that was Barnes' choice.

"He wasn't doing what we needed him said. to do defensively," said Barnes, who Said won his 400th game at Texas.

But Taylor was back for the overtime, making another tear-drop shot early in the overtime before the game-winner.

Seven players from both teams were ejected in the overtime for leaving the bench during a brief skirmish between Taylor and Baylor's Royce O'Neale.

Demarcus Holland led Texas with 12 horns had just gone ahead of Baylor points. Kendal Yancy scored 11, one more than Felix, who began the overtime with a 3-pointer.

Taurean Prince led Baylor with 17 points. Rico Gathers had 12 points and

11 rebounds. After an exchange of turnovers in the overtime, Taylor and O'Neale fell to the court, prompting the brief skirmish. Four Longhorns, including starters Yancy and Cam Ridley, were ejected along with key reserves Prince Ibeh and Connor Lammert. Three Baylor players, starter Johnathan Motley and subs Ishmail Wainright and John Heard, were tossed.

Barnes and Baylor coach Scott Drew said they expected that none of the players would be suspended by the Big 12.

The Bears (22-8, 10-7) led by 10 points with a little more than 6 minutes remaining, a lead they built with 3-pointers by Prince, Lester Medford and Al Freeman in a span of less than

Texas' Jon Holmes hit a long 3-pointer with 1:04 left in regulation to tie the game at 54. Ibeh then blocked a driving shot by Chery. Texas had 11 blocks in the game, six by Turner.

"I thought I had a clear lane," Chery

Said Drew, "We had too many times when we challenged the shot-blockers.' Even so, Baylor, unlike Texas, doesn't have to worry about receiving an invitation to the NCAA tournament.

"They played hard, and they won," Prince said. "It's frustrating, but we're still in a good position. We're going home happy."

## The right car seat makes for a safer ride for children

Finding the right car seat can be challenging. When used correctly, such seats can reduce the risk of death by as much as 71 percent, according the Safe Kids Worldwide organization. Whether you are buying a car seat for the first time or upgrading an existing seat as your child grows, being informed can help with the decision-making process.

#### Access professional reviews

A number of organizations rate available car seats on the market. Consumer Reports and the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety are just two of the car seats. Regulations change frequently, and car seat engineers continually modify designs to keep kids as safe as possible. Frequently revisit car seat reviews to check whether your seat is still receiving high marks or if it's time to invest in a new car seat.

Many experts now advise keeping installed correctly. her passengers. These seats are being manufacturered to meet higher weight limits in the rear-facing position. However, always verify the exact height and weight limit for the seat by reading the information booklet or the safety data that is printed directly on the seat.

Older children in booster seats, which are designed to position passengers correctly to make use of the vehicle's seat belts, should have a proper fit. The lap belt should lie flat and on top of the thighs. The shoulder belt should rest directly in the middle of the shoulder and not too close to the neck.

#### Know the types of seats

Children may go through three or more safety seats before they're allowed to safely ride using the vehicle's own passenger restraint system. In addition to infant car seats, manufacturers offer convertible seats, harnessed seats, beltpositioning booster seats, and built-in safety seats. Many children are ready to bid farewell to car seats when they reach about 4-feet-9-inches tall.

#### Avoid used seats

Unless you can verify the full crash history of a car seat, it is best to buy it new rather than from a thrift store or on the Internet from a third party. Al-

Eggs are frequently viewed as a symbol of new life, so parents can use them to show their children how Christ died and was born anew. Eggs can be filled with small items that symbolize something related to Christ's story. Or they can be left empty to represent the empty tomb after His resurrection.

 Eat food that conveys Biblical stories. For Easter dinner, enjoy foods that are mentioned in the Bible. A fish dinner can convey the story of how Jesus multiplied fish to feed the crowds, or dine on lamb and share the story of Passover.

• Participate in church services. Throughout Lent, many parishes offer Easter vigils or specialized services that relate the account of Jesus' life and subsequent death on the cross. Some ing on the spirituality of the season.

Share your holiday celebrations with a person of another faith so that he or she may be able to see what makes this time of year special.
