# City approves Pampa EDC Jump N' Jive loan

Jump N' Jive will use the loan to expand services, add laser tag.

The Pampa City Commission held its first meeting of the month on Monday evening at

City Hall. The meeting began at 5 p.m. with a work session led by director of public works Donny

Hooper spoke about Operation Community Pride, which had to cancel its community cleanup day that was supposed to be held on Saturday due to the rain the area received.

He also mentioned that the efforts of the city to clean up the alleys has cleared up 10 miles in just three days of work. During those days, 1,500 tires have been collected.

Since the last meeting, the two full-time employees hired to continue cleanup efforts during the week have completed their first week. Hooper said they averaged collections of 3.5 tons of debris a day in just their first week.

For the canceled event Saturday, he said about 30 city employees showed up, along with some additional volunteers and all were excited about having the opportunity to lend a hand, but mother nature had other plans that

The landfill still allowed community members to bring in their tires that day even though the event was canceled.

They reported that over the course of about five hours, 436 tires were brought in by the nublic.

During the work session, Hooper also spoke about the new app that will be accessible for



to clean up the city.

The app will be called Pampa Community Pride, and Hooper said it will essentially serve as the new front door of City Hall.

Rather than coming in to report ordinance violations, citizens will be able to take a picture of, say, a pothole in the street and submit it through the app. Citizens will also have the

complaints. The app can also be used to keep up with city events and programs and will have the potential to send out city alerts and reminders.

# House Approves Heart Exams for High School Athletes

The numbers assigned to legislative bills are usually meaningless, often reflecting nothing more than the order in which they were filed. That's not the case for House Bill 767, intentionally numbered in honor of a Texas high school football player who wore number 76 and died in 2012 from sudden cardiac ar-

On Monday, almost three years after the death of Crosby High School senior Cody Stephens, the Texas House gave preliminary approval to HB 767, which requires students to receive an electrocardiogram (EKG) before they can play high school sports. Stephens, who planned to attend Tarleton State University on a football scholarship, fell asleep in his dad's recliner on May 6, 2012, and never woke up.

The screening required by the new legislation, written by a bipartisan group of lawmakers, could have caught the heart problem that cost Stephens his

state Rep. Wayne Smith, R-Baytown, one of the bill's

A similar effort in 2013 by state Rep. Sylvester Turner, D-Houston, faltered in a House committee. But HB 767 — which boasts five authors, Republicans Smith, Dan Huberty and J.D. Sheffield and Democrats Turner and Eddie Lucio III — tentatively passed the House 86-57. The measure adds an electrocardiogram — a non-

invasive test of electrical activity in the heart — to the health assessment students are already required to pass before they're allowed to play high school sports. The EKG is required before an athlete's first and third year of participation, and parents have the option to waive the EKG requirement for their children "for any reason."

"All we're asking for is one more test," Huberty

The requirement wouldn't go into effect until the

2016-17 school year, giving rural school districts that "If we can save one kid's life, it's worth it," said lack EKG capabilities time to prepare for the change. A similar bill in the Texas Senate was filed by state

> Sen. Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa, D-McAllen. Huberty said an EKG costs about \$15. Several organizations, including the Cody Stephens Go Big or Go Home Memorial Foundation, run by Stephens father, Scott Stephens, offer free heart screenings.

> But several House members who spoke in opposition to the bill voiced concerns about the high cost of further procedures if the initial electrocardiogram is inconclusive. State Rep. Stuart Spitzer, R-Kaufman, a physician, said subsequent tests could cost families hundreds or even thousands of dollars.

> Lucio told his colleagues to imagine facing the parents who had lost a child to a heart problem that could have been detected by an EKG.

> "What are you going to tell that parent when they come to you and say, 'Hey, there was a bill before you to make this test mandatory and you voted against it?" Lucio said. "Think about that."

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# A year after kidnap of schoolgirls in Nigeria, hope dwindles

year now, the hundreds of girls abducted by Islamic militants from their school in northeastern Nigeria.

And while the cry to 'Bring Back Our Girls' remains a worldwide cause, the new president Tuesday would not repeat his predecessor's failed promise to find them — only that they won't be forgotten.

A solemn march was held to remember the 219 girls seized from their boarding school in Chibok by gunmen from the Boko Haram extremist group. In Nigeria's capital of Abuja, 219 girls paraded in the streets, with each carrying a placard bearing the name of a kidnap victim.

"We believe the girls are still alive," said Dr. Allan Manasseh, the brother of missing 18-year-old Maryamu Wavi, in an interview with The Associated Press. But it was clear that hope

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# Not a perfect ending but a better ending

My friend Julia died as we knew she would. Cancer had ravaged her

body for

a decade.

She no

longer

could

breathe.

She was

at home,

under

hospice

care, when she asked for a dose of morphine that she knew would kill her but also keep her final moments free of pain.

I mention Julia's death because a blogger named Jazz Shaw took issue with my Sunday column, "Assisted Suicide — It's Civil Rights for the Affluent." Doctors have been killing people with morphine overdoses for the past century or so, he wrote. And: "Forcing someone to suffer to the last bitter moment because you want to save them from burning in hell is not dignity.'

I don't know any credible opponent of assisted suicide who opposes doctors administering needed pain control, including lethal doses if necessary. That's how medicine is supposed to work. Doctors alleviate pain. They prescribe not with the intent to kill but to stop suffering. If a patient dies from needed pain control, so be it. That's how a compassionate health care system should work.

I'm revisiting the issue because there is so much misinformation — like Shaw's - about the issue. I've received emails from readers who talked about loved ones who endured unwanted treatment. They don't seem to know that patients have the right to refuse medical treat-

Last week, I watched ALS patient Christina Symonds, 43, assert that she does not want to live her "last days in a wheelchair, fully paralyzed, connected to a breathing machine."

"She can refuse a breathing machine," bioethics professor Bill Hurlbut, of Stanford University, told me. Also: "The argument that ALS is a very terrible way to die — you have to feel for that argument; you have to feel the sadness of that. But the alternative is" to turn medicine away from being a heal-

minute we start participating in promoting the end of life with the intention of ending it, then we have a different relationship with the patient, and fear will enter the equation when people enter the hospital.' So let me repeat:

Doctors can and should use pain control to alleviate pain and suffering. Palliative sedation is available to those who fear a bad end. And patients are free to refuse treatment — an important right. These safeguards do not guarantee the sort of choreographed final moments that "death with dignity" advocates seem to think they will get if more states legalize physician-assisted suicide; they do give patients the wherewithal to make the most of their last years, months or days.

A hospice near me has the perfect motto: "Design a better ending.'

If you remove disinformation about inadequate palliative care and treatments being forced on people, advocates are left with one argument: Choice. They say they should be able to choose when they die.

I agree, but if you want to kill yourself, no government can stop you. This point tends to enrage advocates, who feel that they have the right to choose when they die and have someone else help them.

They want to pervert health care to cater to their perfect death ceremonies. That is their sorry idea of dignity.

# Museum Musings

Billy Dixon lead an exciting life, however I wouldn't go so far to say that it was a simple life. Dixon was born in Ohio County, West Virginia, on Sept.

25, 1850. By the age of 12 he was orphaned and sent to live with his uncle, Thomas Dixon in Ray County, Missouri.

Dixon left his uncle's home in the fall of 1864, when he went to work

in woodcutters' camps along the Missouri River. From there he gained employment from government freight contractors in Kansas as a bullwhacker and a muleskinner. Briefly during 1866 he quit working there and went to work for the McCall family's farm near Leavenworth, Kansas. While working for the family it was the only time in his life he attended any sort of formal schooling. After working for the McCall's for about a year he returned to his freight job. He was a skilled marksman and occasionally scouted for eastern excursionists brought out by the railroads to buffalo hunt.

In November of 1869 he joined a venture in hunting and trapping on the Saline River northwest of Fort Hays. In 1870 buyers offered a dollar each for buffalo cow hides and two dolBilly Dixon lars for bull hides, and Dixon's

marksmanship made hide hunting highly profitable. He invested in a road-ranch or supply store, a merchandizing venture that was successful until 1871, when, during Dixon's absence, the store manager, Billy Reynolds, sold out and departed with the proceeds.

Dixon returned to hunting buffalo, sometimes he stayed busy enough to employ four to five hunters and skinners. He scouted Texas as far south as the Salt Fork of the Red River when the buffalo hunters moved into the Texas Panhandle in 1874. He and his group hunted along the Canadian River and its tributaries. It was said when the spring migration occurred Dixon could shoot enough buffalo to keep ten skinners busy, and he found Adobe Walls a convenient place to store his wagonloads of hides hauled in from the field.

Dixon led the founders of Adobe Walls to the Texas Plains, where he knew buffalo were in abundance. The group of 28 men and one woman occupied the outpost built there and five buildings. The outpost was attacked that year by a band of 250 Comanche, and that is when Dixon went into the history books for firing "The Shot of the Century."

The story goes he became a hero only a few days into the battle, when a bullet from his Sharps buffalo rifle knocked an Indian off his horse nearly a mile away, it's perhaps exaggerated. Dixon himself never claimed credit for his "long

# Kids and sports: two emotions

of year. This year, my wife and I have a daughter playing in her first competitive league. A few weeks ago she had her first game and to be honest it was nerve-racking. I had a lot of emotions going on during that game. I had a lawn chair at the game but never sat down in it because I was too busy pacing fence line. My apologies to the grounds crew at the ball field. Hopefully that strip of grass will grow back from where I was pacing.

There are two emotions that continually came up during the game. As I think about it now there were two extreme emotions that I experienced. The first one was the overwhelming sense of fear for her. The second, was the overwhelming sense of pride I had for her. So I want to take the next two weeks and address these two emotions I experienced. I think all parents of athletes experience these two emotions from time to time. And I think it is necessary as parents to keep these two emotions in check for the sake of our

This week I want to start be addressing this overwhelming sense of fear I had for her. It was a fear specifically that she might fail. What if she loses? What if she messes up?

And you know what? During the game she did make mistakes. She missed a few ground balls. She struck out a time or two. She was frustrated with herself. The fear that I was experiencing and my protective daddy instincts made me want to run to the dugout and make everything alright. But I didn't do that. I didn't do that because that would not help her learn anything.

You see, as my wife and I have talked about letting our daughter play in competitive sports we have talked seriously about the goals associated with her playing. One of the main things we want sports to be in her life is a platform for learning. Specifically learning life lessons. Yes, we want her to do well and win. But even more important than that we want her to learn how to handle failure. As painful as it is to say, she will be way better off in life

as she learns to overcome a strikeout than if she hits a home run every time at bat.

The fact is she is going to make a lot of mistakes on the ball field. And the fact is she is going to make a lot of mistakes in life. If she is expecting me to always be there and bail her out from her mistakes then she will never develop the mental and emotional capacity to overcome failure. She must develop these things and I must allow her to develop these abilities.

I have noticed in my daughter a desire to only do the things that come easy to her. I cannot allow her to settle for only doing the easy. The easy, no struggle life is no path to success. I am teaching her if she really wants to do something, she will have to work at it.

As crazy as it sounds, I think it would be best for her at this age to fail fast and to fail often. In those failures she will begin to understand herself. She will begin to understand what she likes. She will begin to understand what she wants to work at. She will build character. She will build determination.

I realize what I have said is contrary to the common--cover our kids in every protective item we can—approach. But protecting our kids from everything is a short-term approach. Our job as parents is to prepare our kids for the short-term for sure. But more importantly, to prepare them for a life of challenge and overcoming challenge.

Contrary to how this article may sound to you at this point, the goal is not to have our kids fail. The goal is to help them know that failure is a part of life and the real winners are those who learn to navigate and overcome failure.

Even if my daughter never wins a championship, or a trophy, or a medal, or a game. She will have won if she learns to work hard through difficult times.

I leave you with a quote this week from one of the greatest failures in all of sports history. He is such a failure that he didn't even make his high school basketball team.

"I have missed more than 9,000 shots in my career. I have lost almost 300 games. On 26 occasions I have been entrusted to take the game winning shot...and I missed. I have failed over and over and over again in my life. And that's precise-

ly why I succeed." - Michael Jordan Next week I will touch on the other emotion that I experienced, pride. And how I think we as parents (and grandparents) need to keep that emotion in check too. Have a great week!

(NASB)

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

deal believers see the humorous insanity of anyone thinking that God could get Himself into a fix He couldn't get out of and even more so that we puny humans could help Him out of that mess. Only a fool would think that way. Which leads me to

King Jehu of Israel in 2 Kings 9-10. Recently I was preparing the handouts on King Jehu for my advanced class on the Kings of Israel and Judah. I was stunned at the comments I found in about half a dozen commentaries and even more places online concerning God's instructions to King Jehu and the King's fulfillment of those orders.

God's commands to Jehu were: "You are to destroy the house of Ahab your master, and I will avenge the blood of my servants the prophets and the blood of all the Lord's servants shed by Jezebel. The whole house of Ahab will perish. I will cut off from Ahab every last male in Israel—slave or free. I will make the house of Ahab like the house of Jeroboam son of Nebat and like the house of Baasha son of Ahijah." 2 Kings 9:7-9

King Jehu fulfilled God's command in chapter 10. There he executed: 1-Ahab's son Jehoram, 2-Ahab's grandson Ahaziah, 3-Jezebel, 4-Ahab's 70 sons, 5-Ahab's many followers in Jezreel, 6-42 of the brethren of Ahaziah, 7-Ahab's many followers in Samaria and 8-the many prophets, servants, and priests of Baal. Now by anyone's definition that is a lot of bloodshed.

This is where modern commentators, preachers and Bible teachers start finger-pointing.

Now they don't dare accuse God of wrong doing, but they blister Jehu for being an ungodly, blood-thirsty



# Impoverished tribe struggles to stop surge in teen suicides

cut short.

But a string of seven suicides by adolescents in recent months has shaken this impoverished community and sent school and tribal leaders on an urgent mission to stop the deaths.

On Dec. 12, a 14-year-old boy hanged himself at his home on the reservation, a sprawling expanse of badlands on the South Dakota-Nebraska border. On Christmas Day, a 15-year-old girl

to die was 12.

Students in the reservation's high school and midposting Facebook messages wondering who might be next, with some even seeming to encourage new attempts by hanging nooses near homes. Worried parents recently met at a community hall to discuss what's happening. And the U.S. Public Health Service has dispatched teams of mental health counselors to talk to students.

"The situation has turned into an epidemic," said Thomas Poor Bear, vice president of the Oglala Sioux Tribe, whose 24-year-old niece was among two adults who also committed suicide this winter. "There are a lot of reasons behind it. The bullying at schools, the high unemployment rate. Parents need to discipline the children.'

Somewhere 16,000 and 40,000 members of the Oglala Sioux Tribe live on the reservation, which at over 2 million acres is among the nation's largest. Famous as the site of the Wounded Knee massacre, in which the 7th Cavalry slaughtered about 300 tribe members in 1890, it includes the county with the highest poverty rate in the U.S., and some of the worst rates of alcoholism and drug abuse, violence and unemployment.

"Why so young?" she said. "Why do these kids think there is no hope? Well, look around," DeCory, who has worked on the reservation

for almost 30 years. 'The economic structure here does not support the population. You have a gas station, a little boutique, a big grocery store, Taco John's, Pizza Hut and Subway.

You have people of all between ages vying for those jobs. People that are 50 and 60 years old are competing against the teenagers who want to work."

Federal experts say that some reservation children experience a form of posttraumatic stress from exposure to family turmoil.

The symptoms are comparable to those of military veterans returning from war

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
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
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

# Big score: College bowl game payouts surpass \$500 million

than a half billion dollars to college football conferences most ever and an increase of almost \$200 million from the final season of the Bowl Championship Series to the first of the College Football Plavoff.

According to an NCAA report to be released Tuesday, the 39 postseason FBS games distributed \$505.9 million to the participating conferences and schools. The schools spent \$100.2 million to take part in bowl games.

Total payouts from 35 postseason games from the 2013-14 season were \$309.9 million while schools spent \$97.8 million to participate. For the 2012-13 season, payouts were \$300.8 million and expenses were \$90.3 million.

The increase in payouts is due mostly to the increased value of media deals with the seven games — six bowls and a national championship game — that are part of the College Football Playoff.

The College Football Playoff replaced the BCS last season. The playoff matched the four top teams in the nation, as selected by a selection
