## County Court implement financial agreement with Happy State Bank

The Gray County Commissioners court met on Friday morning on the second floor of the County Courthouse for their second meeting of the month.

The first item on the agenda was the implementation of an agreement with Happy State Bank. The County first addressed the

agreement at their May 4 meeting, but tabled it so the financial advisors and commissioners could look over it.

County treasurer Scott Hahn told the court he was comfortable with the agreement and that it would be profitable for the county. He also added that he had no safety concerns when it came to Happy State Bank.

The Court Approved this motion.

The next item discussed at length was the issues the crew at Perry-Lefors airport is having with their Batwing mower. Manager Paul Loyd stated the airport recently got their mower back after it being under repair for approximately six months. The mower only worked for two and a half hours after be-

ing returned to the airport with the same issue. Loyd asked if the Court could come up with a plan to replace the mower.

Loyd added that the County keeps throwing money into this mower to have it repaired.

Commissioner Gary Willoughby suggested that Loyd calls the re-

## Gas Price Average rises

**COPPELL** — Texas drivers are now paying \$2.47 for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That price is four cents more than last week but 96 cents less per gallon than last year. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in the Lone Star State, drivers in El Paso are paying the most on average at \$2.57 per gallon while drivers in Beaumont are paying the least at \$2.38 per gallon. Texans are paying 21 cents less than the national average which now sits at \$2.68.

Despite the increases at the pumps in recent weeks, relatively lower crude costs continue to translate to significant savings at the pump for drivers. AAA Texas projects travel this Memorial Day will be up nearly 5 percent (3.1 million travelers) compared to last year's holiday weekend, which would be the highest volume in ten years. Gas prices may not change all that much by the holiday weekend, which would result in the cheapest Memorial Day gas prices in at least five years.

pairman and asks him to come out and look at the mower. Commissioner Joe Wheeley added that it could be a quick fix. Willoughby will contact the Perry-Lefors soon to see about getting mowers out there to mow their grass until the airport gets their mower fixed.

The Court took no action on this item. The next item on the agenda was also related to the airport. Perry-Lefors airport receives money from the Texas Department of Transportation Aviation division every year to the tune of \$150,000. These funds have limitations to the infrastructure from the runway, to the taxi roadways through to the terminal and hangars. Obviously if there is a safety issue,

these funds can be used for that as well. Loyd said that \$150,000 is not enough to cover most projects the airport may address, so the state allows the county to rollover for up to four years maxing out at \$600,000. If the county wanted to use the funds, they have to match 10 percent on the project.

10 percent), for their project. County Judge Richard Peet thanked TxDOT for their recent grant to Perry-Lefors for airport improvements, and Willoughby thanked TxDOT for their addition of an ambulance to Pampa EMS. The Court approved this transfer in good faith that TxDOT will help Perry-Lefors in the future. This will be an item done annually so if the Court doesn't like how the transfer went this year, they don't have to do it next year.

A representative of the division from Austin stated that the only drawback to allowing airports to stockpile is that it inflates their account to where when the Federal Aviation Administration is issuing their grants across the United States, the FAA sees all of the stockpiled accounts and won't grant to TxDOT because of the surplus of funds, regardless of if their ear-marked for the airports.

## Bouncin' Around Chester and George

Most of the pets in my family have been either dogs or cats, and more cats than dogs. When my grandfather passed away in 1954, my grandmother came to live with us. We had no pets at that time, and in fact, none for another four or five years. There were two cats that ended up in our care:

A gray cat who was already in residence in the yard of one house we rented, and an orange striped cat that my brother and I rescued. For some reason, someone gave my grandmother a canary whom she named George. He wasn't a bright yellow canary, but sort of a dirty gray and brown, and the name came from a comedian named George Gobel who was popular then. Gobel used to use the expression, "I'm a dirty bird" and it seemed a natural name for this canary. George proved to be a good singer, and we had to cover his cage at night to keep him from singing all night. It was my job to clean George's cage, put fresh water in the cage along with seed, a cuttlebone for calcium, and a slice of apple.

On a few rare occasions, George got out and flew around inside the house until we could catch him. Soon after that, a green parakeet

came into our home. There was a popular television show, "Gun-smoke" at that time which had a character who limped, named Chester. We noticed early on that the parakeet also had a limp, so he was promptly named Chester.

The first thing we noticed was that Chester quickly started imitating George, and he'd sit on top of George's cage singing at the canary while George gave him dirty looks with his beady black eyes and sang right back at him.

My grandmother taught Chester how to talk, and he had quite a vocabulary. Unfortunately, Chester occasionally mixed up his words which resulted in some pretty funny sentences. He could say, "I love you," "you're sick, sick, sick," "you're a blasted buzzard," "Chester's a dirty bird" and "you need a psychiatrist."

One afternoon a telephone repairman was in the house when suddenly a tiny voice said, "I love you!" The repairman gave Gram a strange look, and went on with his work. "I love you, George" made the repairman look up again, and he said, "Ma'am, my name's not George, and I don't think you love me!"

He could hardly believe it when she told him it was a bird. One day, another parakeet turned up in the tree outside our house, and one of us caught it and brought it inside.

It appeared to be a female, but there was little doubt when Chester flew over next to her, put a foot on her foot, and declared, "Chester's a boy! I love you!" One day my oldest brother announced he was bringing his fiancée and her parents over for a visit to meet us.

Before they arrived, Chester was heard to say, in rapid succession, "Chester's a boy, you bazzard, you're sick, you need a psychust!" We were terrified he would try this line of speech out on my brother's future in-laws, so Chester was caught and unceremoniously put into a covered cage in a back bedroom, where we hoped he'd keep his feathered beak shut. Chester only lived another couple of years, but we had George the canary for several years after that.

George even traveled in the Corvair with Mom and me on Route 66 on our way from California to Illinois. With so many car troubles, poor George, who stayed in the car while it was being serviced, rode up and down in lifts so often he probably thought he was living in an elevator. He lived a year or so after we moved to Illinois, and died a peaceful death in his cage.

I wonder if he and Chester are flying around in bird Heaven, Chester crying out, "I love you, George!"

## British pollsters failed in the increasingly difficult struggle to get it right

"The world may have a polling problem." That's the headline on a blogpost by Nate Silver, the wunderkind founder of FiveThirtyEight. It was posted on 9:54 ET the night of May 7, as the counting in the British election was continuing in the small hours of May 8 UK Time.

That was an hour after the result in the constituency of Nuneaton made it clear that all the pre-election polls were wrong. Nuneaton, in the Midlands just east of Birmingham, was No. 28 on a list of 42 marginal two-party contests. Projections based on pre-election polls were that Labour would win 35 of these 42 seats. Instead, Conservatives won 34 of them.

Nationally, the pre-election polls predicted that Conservatives would win about 280 seats, barely ahead of Labour and far short of a 326-seat majority. The exit poll pegged them at 316. They ended up winning 331.

Something similar happened in 1992, when pre-election polls showed the two parties tied but Conservatives won by a 7.5-point margin. The most common explanation, advanced by Conservative analyst Rob Hayward: "Shy Tories" were unwilling to tell pollsters they favored the Conservative Party.

British pollsters made adjustments then, but as Hayward notes, they didn't work this year. Internal party polls apparently did better. American pollster Stanley Greenberg, working for Labour and using a longer questionnaire, found the party's numbers sagging. Australian consultant Lynton Crosby, running Conservatives' campaign, assured party leaders they would win 300 seats.

Silver correctly points out that Britain isn't the only country where recent polls have been off. Israeli polls projected that Benjamin Netanyahu's

Likud Party would win 22 seats in the Knesset. Instead, it won 30 and Netanyahu formed a government.

And writing just after America's November 2014 off-year elections, Silver concluded that polls tilted toward Democrats. Reviewing the data then, I noted that in seriously contested statewide races, Democrats tended to get percentages of the vote close to their numbers in the polls. But many Republicans, notably in Kansas, Kentucky and Georgia, ran far ahead of the polls. "Shy Republicans," apparently.

Readers may have noticed that all these errors seem to come from one ideological direction. In nations where the dominant media — the New York Times and the old-line TV networks here, the BBC in Britain, Haaretz in Israel — lean left, opinion on the right has been underdusted in the polls.

Evidently, some people don't want to identify themselves as troglodytes to telephone interviewers or even on robocalls.

But, as Silver notes, there are other, not necessarily ideological challenges facing pollsters. Current polling techniques were developed in countries with universal landline telephones and populations that answered the phone. Americans, Britons, Israelis and many others no longer live in such countries.

The Pew Research Center reported in 2012 that only 9 percent of its telephone calls resulted in completed interviews. Is that 9 percent an accurate representation of the larger population? Unclear; no poll can tell you the opinion of people who refuse to be polled.

Nor, despite the relative accuracy of Britain's exit poll this year, do exit polls always get it right. In American elections, the Edison/Mitofsky exit poll numbers are massaged by experts from its news organization clients gathered (and deprived of cellphones) in a room in Rockefeller Center

## Our Next Mideast War — Syria

Jeb Bush has spent the week debating with himself over whether he would have started the war his brother launched on Iraq.

When he figures it out, hopefully, our would-be president will focus in on the campaign to drag us into yet another Mideast war — this time to bring down Bashar Assad's regime in Syria.

While few would mourn the passing of the Assad dynasty, there is a problem: If Assad falls, a slaughter of Christians will follow and the battle for control of Damascus will be between the Syrian branch of al-Qaida, the Nusra Front, and the crazed terrorists of the Islamic State.

Victory for either would be a disaster for America. Where is the evidence of an unholy alliance to bring this about?

Turkey, which turned a blind eye to ISIS volunteers slipping into Syria, has aided the Nusra Front in setting up its own capital in Idlib, near the Turkish border, to rival the ISIS capital of Raqqa.

In the fall of Idlib, said Bashar Assad, "the main factor was the huge sup-

port that came through Turkey; logistic support, and military support, and of course financial support that came through Saudi Arabia and Qatar."

Why would Turks, Saudis and Qataris collude with Sunni jihadists?

Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan detests Assad. The Saudis and Gulf Arabs are terrified of Shiite Iran and see any ally of Tehran, such as Assad, as their mortal enemy.

This also explains the seven weeks of savage Saudi bombing of the Houthi rebels, who dumped over a U.S.-Saudi puppet in the Yemeni capital Sanaa, then seized the second and third cities of Taiz and Aden.

But while the Houthis bear no love for us, they have been fighting al-Qaida in the Arabian Peninsula. Thus, the Saudi bombing has given AQAP, the most dangerous terrorist foe we face, freedom to create sanctuaries and liberate hundreds of fellow terrorists from prison.

The Israelis seem to be in on the game as well. While they have taken in rebels wounded on the Golan Heights and returned them to their units, there are reports of Israel aiding the Nusra Front with intelligence and even air strikes.

This week, an Israeli official bluntly warned that

Hezbollah has amassed 100,000 short-range rockets capable of striking northern Israel, thousands of which could hit Tel Aviv. The rockets are said to be hidden in Shiite villages in southern Lebanon.

Israel is preparing, writes The New York Times' Isabel Kershner, "for what it sees as an almost inevitable next battle with Hezbollah."

As Hezbollah has been the most effective fighting ally of Assad, an Israeli war on Hezbollah could help bring Assad down.

But, again, who rises if Assad falls? And who else, besides Christians and Alawites, starts digging their graves?

As one might expect, Sen. Lindsey Graham is all in. Late in April, he declared, "Assad has to go. ... We're going to have to send some of our soldiers back into the Middle East."

Graham is willing to commit 10,000 U.S. ground troops.

"I would integrate our forces within a regional army. There is no other way to defend this nation than some of us being on the ground over there doing the fighting."

Wednesday, The Washington Post laid out the game plan for war on Syria. While we cannot create a NATO with kings, emirs, sheiks, and sultans,

says the Post,

"[T]here is a way that Mr. Obama could serve both the U.S. interests and those of the Gulf allies: by attacking the Middle East's most toxic, and destabilizing force, the Bashar al-Assad regime in Syria. Syria's dictatorship is Iran's closest ally in the region, and its barbarity opened the way for the rise of the Islamic State. Recently, it has suffered battlefield reverses, in part because of increased Gulf aid to rebel forces.

"If Mr. Obama were to create safe zones in northern and southern Syria for the rebels, the balance could be tipped against Damascus and Tehran — and U.S. allies would have tangible reason to recommit to U.S. leadership."

Consider what is being recommended here.

The Post wants Obama to bomb a Syrian nation that has not attacked us, without congressional authorization — to aid rebels whose most effective fighters are al-Qaida and ISIS terrorists.

And we're to fight this war — to nullify ultra-rich but unhappy Gulf Arabs?

Obama must also "do more about Iranian aggression," says the Post.

But against whom is Iran committing aggression?

In Syria, Iran is backing **SYRIA** cont. on page 5

at 5:00 p.m. ET Election Day.

Exit poll interviews have tended to tilt Democratic especially, according to a report by the late exit poll pioneer Warren Mitofsky, when the interviewer is a female graduate student. In the 2008 Democratic primaries, exit polls

were so heavily tilted toward Barack Obama as to be useless.

The massaging gets the results closer to, but not quite on, the mark. On election night 2004 the exit poll showed 51-48 Kerry.

The actual result was 51-48 Bush. On election night 2012, the evidently over-massaged exit poll came in 49-49. The actual result was 51-47 Obama.

Perhaps the next step is to go back toward

the beginning, and to conduct interviews, as Gallup did in 1935, in person — still fairly common practice when I started working for pollster Peter Hart in 1974. In-person interviews are standard practice in Mexico and other countries where telephones are not universal.

Polling provides useful information, but information whose reliability is often ephemeral and increasingly, it seems, limited. Good

luck to British and other pollsters in the continuing struggle to get it right.

### Advice for soon-to-be graduates

- Coupons for Military – \$95,700 in coupons were mailed to military families this year.

### Did you know?

According to the 2013-14 PayScale Salary Survey, which examines salary data for full-time employees in the United States who possess only bachelor's degrees but no higher degree, petroleum engineering is the most lucrative major with regard to salary potential. Petroleum engineers earned an average annual starting salary of \$103,000, and those salaries ballooned to \$160,000 by mid-career, when typical graduates in the study had 15 years of experience in their fields. Though engineering majors dominated the survey's top 10, second place on the list went to actuarial mathematics majors, whose average starting salaries of \$58,700 were more modest than those of petroleum engineers. However, by mid-career actual mathematics majors closed much of that gap, with average salaries hovering at \$120,000.

Regional refinery issues on the West Coast continue to push prices higher in a handful of states, with the majority of the nation's most expensive markets located in the region. In Texas, drivers are paying about \$35 to fill up the average 14-gallon size fuel tank which is about \$13 less than a fill up this time last year.

# USDA invests \$6.5 million to help Ogallala Aquifer region

WASHINGTON, May 14, 2015 — Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced today that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is investing \$6.5 million in the Ogallala

Aquifer region this year to help farmers and ranchers conserve billions of gallons of water and improve water quality. Funding will be targeted to seven focus areas to support their primary water source and strengthen

rural economies. "This work not only expands the viability of the Ogallala Aquifer but also helps producers across the Great Plains strengthen their agricultural operations."

Underlying the Great Plains in eight states, the Ogallala supports nearly one-fifth of the wheat, corn, cotton and cattle produced in the United States. It has long been the main water supply for the High Plains' population and is being depleted at an unsustainable rate. The reservoir was created more than a million years ago through geologic action and covers about 174,000 square miles; mainly in Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, and Texas (also known as the High Plains). The aquifer also covers part of South Dakota, Wyoming, Colorado, and New Mexico.

Through the Ogallala Aquifer Initiative (OAI), USDA's Natural

Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) is directing funding in fiscal 2015 to support targeted, local efforts to improve the quality and availability of this vital water supply. This year's work is planned in seven focus areas in five states and will continue for up to four years. It will conserve billions of gallons of water per year, extending the viability of the aquifer for multiple uses. This conservation investment builds on \$66 million that NRCS has invested through OAI since 2011, which helped farmers and ranchers conserve water on more than 325,000 acres. The Secretary noted that much of the funding invested by USDA has been matched or supplemented by individual producers.

The fiscal 2015 focus areas include:

Northern High Plains ground water basin in Colorado: NRCS will focus on helping producers install new technologies on irrigated operations to more efficiently use water. These technologies include weather stations, sensors and telemetry for soil moisture and nutrients and advanced irrigation systems. Water and conservation districts are also developing incentive programs for producers. This conservation work

will conserve 2.1 billion gallons of water over four years.

Priority areas in Kansas: NRCS will work with producers to convert irrigated cropland to dryland farming in high priority areas. The state identified these areas in the Kansas Water Plan as Priority Ground Water Decline and Quick Response Areas, meaning they are the ones most in need and where conservation can have the biggest impact on recharging the aquifer. The conservation work will conserve 1.8 billion gallons of water over four years.

Priority areas in eastern New Mexico: NRCS will work with producers to convert irrigated cropland to dryland cropping systems and restore grasslands. NRCS will work with producers to reduce pumping on 1,190 acres each year over four years. This conservation work will conserve 1.56 billion gallons of water over four years, helping ensure water for agricultural lands, cities like Clovis and Portales, N.M. and Cannon Air Force Base.

"Water is a precious resource, and the Ogallala Aquifer Initiative helps our farmers and ranchers use it wisely," NRCS Chief Jason Weller. "This is especially important in a place like the Ogallala, where drought conditions have prevailed in recent years. We know we can't change the weather, but we can help producers be ready for it."

# Sea lion pup startles sailor on yacht with snoring, sneezing

SAN DIEGO (AP) — A surprising stowaway startled a man out on his boat in San Diego: A sea lion pup who decided to crash in a bunk, waking the owner with his snoring.

Michael Duffy, 48, said he was on his 41-foot Kettner boat "Elixir" at the San Diego Yacht Club when he awoke at 2:30 a.m. Sunday to sneezing and snoring.

He thought it might be a friend, crashing from a night out, but couldn't find anyone. Once it got light a few hours later, however, he heard it again.

That's when Duffy saw a 35-pound sea lion pup on another bunk, curled up like a dog on top of his board shorts.

"It was a tiny little guy, and I was kind of shocked, but he was basically asleep," Duffy said, guessing it was a male. "Then he heard me coming, so he kind of looked up a little bit like when a dog is sleeping and you want to wake it up and it doesn't want to wake up."

Duffy said the pup was probably looking for his mom but found him instead.

Duffy grabbed his cellphone and took a photo of the pup, who had already jumped down onto the cabin floor.

"You gotta go buddy, go...go, go, go," Duffy said, as he filmed, softly coaxing the baby sea lion back up the stairs, off the boat and into the water.

Duffy has been sailing since he was 6 years old and has grown up around the marine environment; he'd heard of sea lions getting onto boats, but going down below?

"Totally bizarre," he said, adding: "Sea lions they can be cute, but they can be dangerous. You've got to be careful it's a wild animal."

If the sea lion had been an adult, he would have stayed away. But, he said this pup was very well behaved and left no mess, not even seawater on his shorts.

"He was extremely well behaved, except for his loud snoring and sneezing," Duffy said. "He was looking at me, and

I was like 'you gotta go.'"

He said the pup had an orange tag on its flipper and he believed it may have been once rescued after washing onto the shore, before being set free again. The baby sea lion appeared to be healthy and swam fine, and it was seemingly no stranger to humans.

Duffy, an advertising copywriter, said he nicknamed the pup "Gilligan" after the character on "Gilligan's Island" who The Skipper called his little buddy.

"It was a very personal thing, and he was a very cute guy," Duffy said.

"But I was a little emotional about it. For that 2 1/2 minutes he was my little buddy."

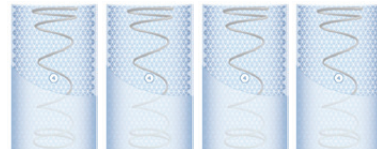

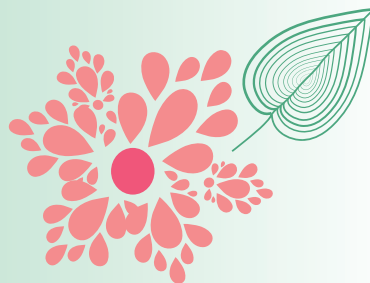

## Perry to say June 4 if he'll run again for president

AUSTIN (AP) — Former Texas Gov. Rick Perry will say whether he is running for president at an announcement next month in Dallas. The longest-serving governor in Texas history has spent months traveling in the early voting states of Iowa, New Hampshire and South Carolina as he gears up for a second White House bid. Perry's wife, Anita, tweeted the first word of Perry's plan for an announcement and then emailed supporters about it. "America is facing a time of testing, and it's clear that we need principled leader-

ship and an optimistic vision to see us through after eight years of the Obama Administration," she wrote. A spokesman said Friday Perris not ready to declare his candidacy. "He's announcing his intentions on June 4," Perry spokesman Travis Considine said in Washington, where he was traveling with Perry. "He has not said what he'll be announcing. You'll have to stay tuned." Asked if he knew whether Perry had made up his mind, senior adviser Jeff Miller said, "I do know that," but refused to give any details.

When Perry got into the 2012 presidential race, he announced his campaign in South Carolina. He entered as a potential front-runner but flamed out after a series of blunders, including an infamous "oops" moment when Perry couldn't remember, during a GOP debate, the name of the third Cabinet agency he wanted to eliminate. Perry left office in January and is facing a criminal abuse-of-power indictment in Austin for threatening in 2012 to veto state funding for public corruption prosecutors and then doing so.

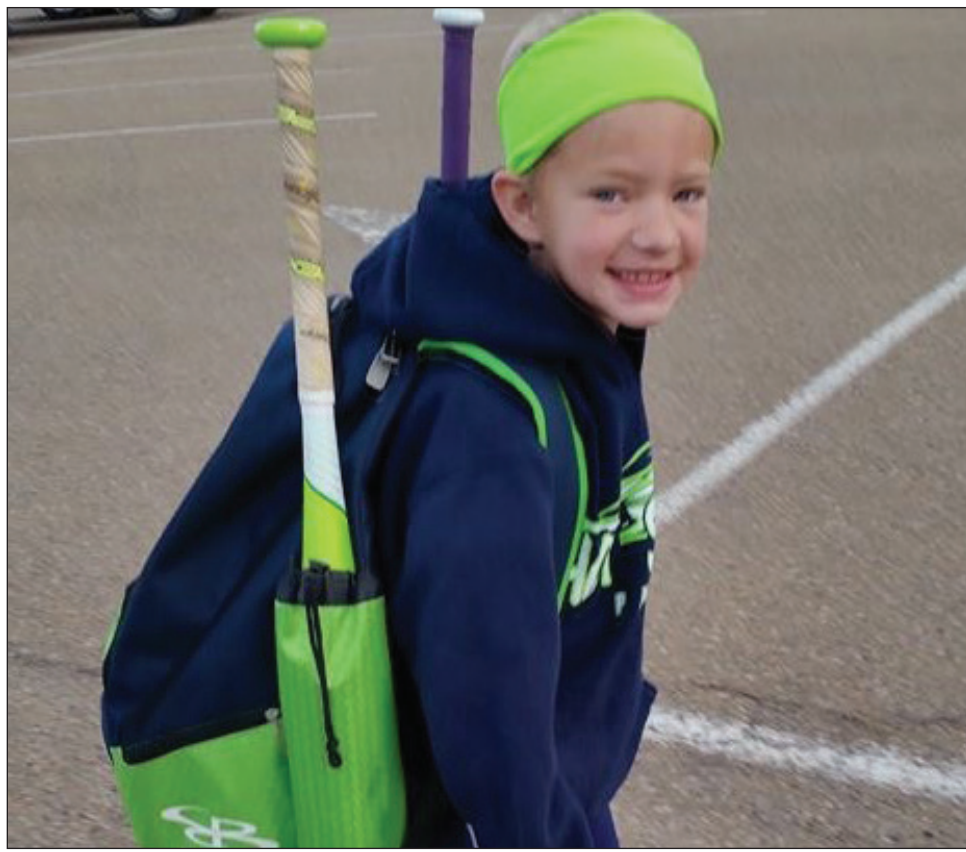

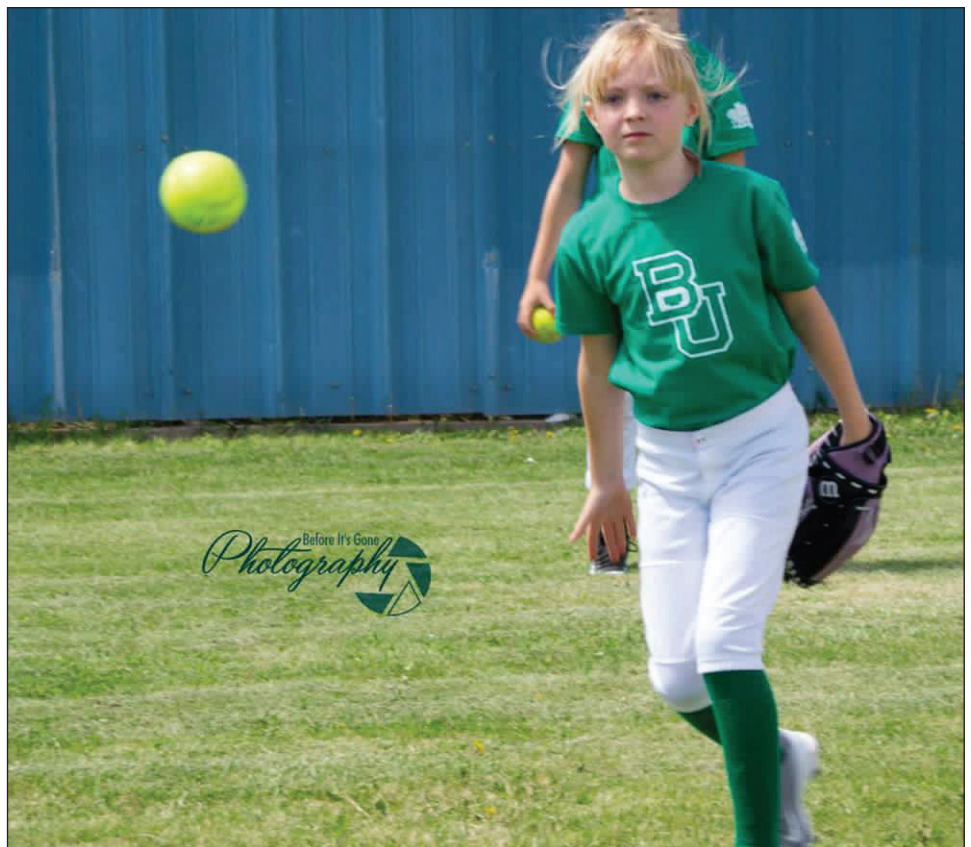

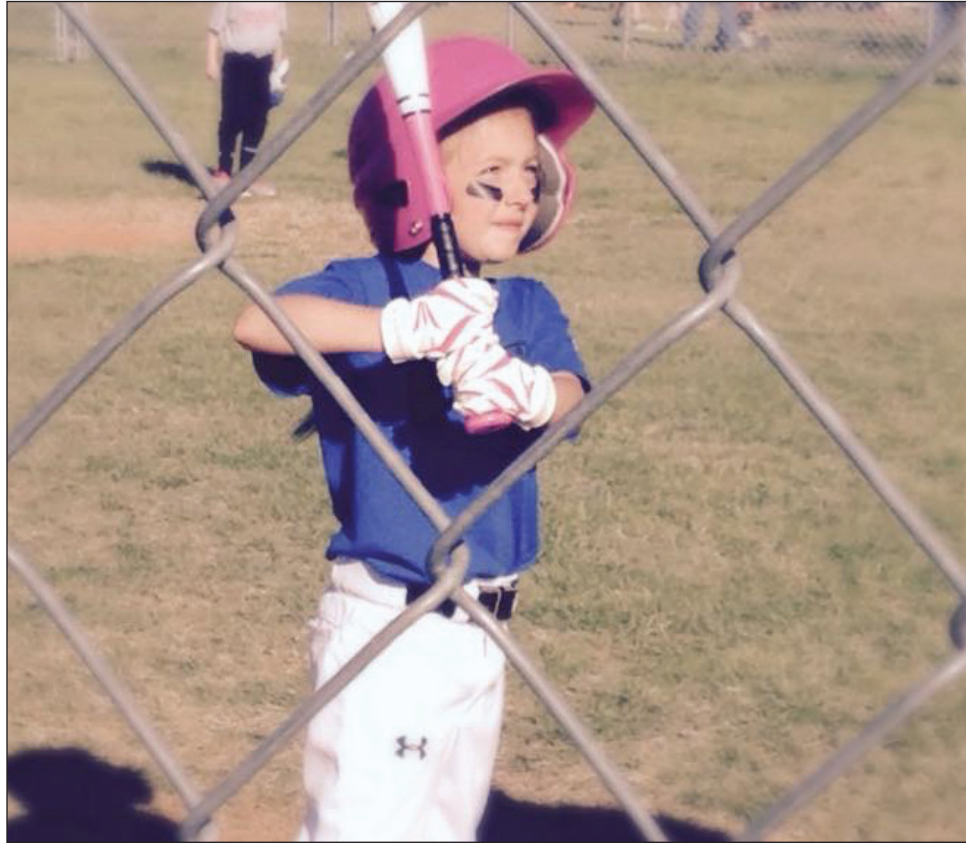

## Gundy deposition: Assistant took lateral move to Texas

AUSTIN (AP) — Testifying in a legal fight between two Big 12 rivals, Oklahoma State coach Mike Gundy says his assistant Joe Wickline made a lateral move to join Texas and that his new duties with the Longhorns sound identical to his old ones.

Whether Wickline took a promotion with "play-calling duties" at Texas or just got a title with the same responsibilities he had in Stillwater is at the center of a nearly \$600,000 dispute between Wickline and his former school.

Oklahoma State's breach-of-contract lawsuit contends Texas assistant Shawn Watson is really the play-caller and is seeking damages from Wickline, who has the titles of offensive line coach and offensive coordinator. Wickline insists he and Watson share development of game plans and play-calling duties.

The legal dispute is unusual in that it has drawn Gundy and Texas coach Charlie Strong into giving lengthy sworn statements about play-calling in their programs. Oklahoma State's lawyers have said they may also seek testimony from former Texas players and assistants. Texas has not been named as a defendant.

Although Strong has said Wat-

son had the "final" word in calling plays during the game, his sworn testimony in March attempted to describe a complex collaborative effort between Wickline and Watson and sometimes himself.

Gundy sat for a four-hour deposition on April 22 in which he called Wickline's move to Texas a "lateral" one. When told of a description of Wickline's duties at Texas, Gundy said: "He did the same thing at Oklahoma State."

The Associated Press obtained a copy of Gundy's deposition Tuesday through an open records request. An Oklahoma State official noted Gundy still has time to review the transcript and file any clarifications of his testimony.

Gundy said he hadn't read Strong and Watson's depositions, but had scanned parts of Wickline's testimony before giving his own.

Gundy said he only had a brief conversation with Wickline before Wickline left for Texas in January 2014. He didn't recall many details, but Gundy said at the time he believed Wickline was going to coach the offensive line for the Longhorns.

Gundy said he conferred with Oklahoma State athletic director

Mike Holder in early 2014 and it was his opinion Wickline had triggered a clause in his contract that required him to pay damages if he left Oklahoma State for a lateral coaching move and not a promotion. Gundy said he didn't help Holder draft a letter sent to Wickline warning him of a potential lawsuit if he didn't pay. But Gundy said "I agree with the letter in that Joe Wickline took a lateral move."

Gundy's testimony also got testy during a lengthy exchange with Wickline's attorney over who should be considered the "play-caller" at a major college program.

Gundy said the person who sends the play to the field to be signaled to the players is the play caller, regardless of who actually decides what it will be. Wickline's attorney repeatedly pressed Gundy as to why it shouldn't be the person actually responsible for making the decision.

"One guy sends it down ... that's the play caller," Gundy said.

Watson has previously testified that he's the one who sends play to the sideline, even when he collaborates with Wickline or Strong.

Gundy also said that schools will give assistants "fabricated" titles.

DEAR NEEDS HELP: Yes. It is important you understand that birth mothers love their babies very much. When a woman places her child for adoption, there can be legitimate rea-

I told him I liked him regardless of what he says. I think he likes me, too, but it's not always clear. What should I do? — SCATTERED IN CALIFORNIA

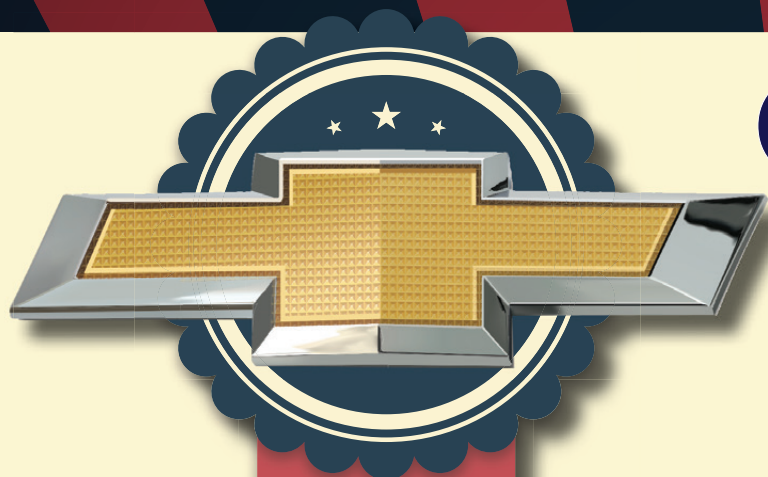
