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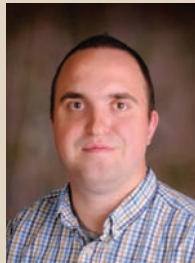
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Four arrested in drive-by shooting

STAFF REPORT

On June 2, at approximately 7 p.m., the Gray County Sheriff's Office and the Pampa Police Department received several calls reporting a drive-by shooting near the intersection of Campbell and Finley Streets in Pampa. A description of the suspect vehicle was given and deputies located a vehicle matching the description and initiated a traffic stop

near the intersection of Tignor and Frederic in Pampa.

Four individuals were detained as a result of the traffic stop, and a handgun was discovered. Further investigation revealed that an occupied residence near the intersection of Campbell and Finley Streets had been struck during the shooting. Evidence discovered in the vehicle and at the residence led to the ar-

rest of the four occupants for aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

The four occupants are Francia Gaytan, 21; Norman Rodgers, 24; Brian Solis Gaytan, 22, and Iran Gaytan, 24, all of Pampa.

Investigation into the matter is ongoing, and anyone with information regarding the incident is asked to contact the Gray County Sheriff's Office at 806-669-8022.

Kotara said she will take custom orders as well, but she is back-logged about a month.

The Shabby Shak has been open for a couple months, and is a product of the success of The Rustic Heart.

"It's been a ride," Kotara said. "It's been interesting and fun just trying to figure out what



people like. And creating, that's what make these stores unusual."

Kotara likes being able to bring in her craftwork and jewelry, all work that she has been creating herself and has her mark on it.

The Shabby Shak logo itself is made from old barn wood and metal you may find in a barn.

Nostalgics would enjoy seeing some old Coca-Cola items and school desks. Kotara even has an old electric washing machine from the 1930s.

Those shopping for decorations for their home will find wall items that say "Love" and "Be Brave" and other wall decor items.

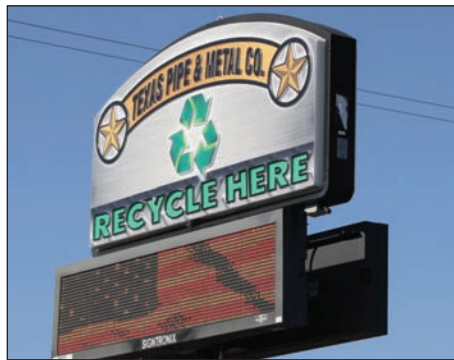
Collectors will find something for every collector with a wide assortment of knick-knacks.

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DPS trooper seizes more than 44 pounds of marijuana

WICHITA FALLS — The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) conducted a traffic stop Monday on US-287, yielding more than 44 pounds of marijuana valued at more than \$268,000.

At approximately 7: 54 p.m., a DPS trooper conducted a traffic stop on a 2013 Chevrolet Impala traveling eastbound on US-287, for a traffic violation, near Iowa Park in Wichita County.

The driver of the Impala was identified as Omar De La Fuente, 22, of Austin. During the traffic stop, the trooper discovered two black suitcases of marijuana in the vehicle.

De La Fuente and his passenger, Colin Michael Spradlin, were placed under arrest for possession of marijuana more than 5 pounds less than 50 pounds, a third degree felony, and booked into the Wichita County jail. The illegal drugs were allegedly being transported from Sacramento, Calif., to Austin.

Americans split on whether Clinton cares about their needs

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hillary Rodham Clinton plans to spend the summer building a case that Republicans are out of touch with the public. But many people aren't convinced she empathizes with them, either, polls suggest, in a potential early warning sign for the Democratic front-runner.

Clinton's approach to defining the Republican field echoes one President Barack Obama used successfully in the 2012 campaign against GOP rival Mitt Romney, a rich man who struggled to make the common touch at times with his policies and persona.

Yet average Americans appear to be split on whether Clinton can relate to them, in the face of scrutiny about her family finances and the Republican argument that she and husband Bill, the former president, play by different rules and have amassed

wealth in ways that are inconceivable for most people.

About 47 percent of Americans said Clinton cares about people like them in a CNN/ORC poll released Tuesday. That's down from 53 percent in the same poll last summer. An ABC News/Washington Post poll released the same day also found a slight decline in the past year on a similar question, with 49 percent saying Clinton "understands the problems of people like you" and 46 percent saying she doesn't.

The dip in Clinton's ratings on attributes like empathy coincides with a decline in her overall favorability from the time she was Obama's secretary of state. Her current levels mirror how the public viewed her during her failed 2008 White House campaign.

Dan Pfeiffer, a longtime Obama adviser who left the White House this spring, said it's too early for the numbers to cause anxiety in Clinton's Brooklyn campaign headquarters. But he added that

"if this trend doesn't reverse itself over the next many months, it should be a cause of concern."

Empathy was a focus of Obama's re-election bid against Romney. The Democratic incumbent relentlessly argued that Romney's policies and personal wealth left him out of touch with most Americans. By Election Day, 81 percent of Americans who said they voted based on whether a candidate cared for people like them backed Obama, according to exit polls.

Clinton campaign officials say they care less about how Clinton is viewed in isolation on the question of empathy and more about how she is compared with specific Republican challengers. While no major polls have done such a head-to-head comparison, a Quinnipiac survey last week found large numbers of Americans undecided on whether many Republican presidential hopefuls — among them Marco Rubio and Scott Walker — care

about their needs.

And the ABC News/Washington Post poll had worrying signs for former Florida Gov. Jeb Bush, with 55 percent of Americans saying he doesn't understand the problems of people like them.

Clinton will use a June 13 rally to argue that the GOP field as a whole is out of touch on gay rights, immigration, climate change and more. She has also been highlighting her differences with Republicans on economic issues, financial reform and budget priorities.

While the GOP race is wide-open, with more than a dozen candidates expected to vie for the nomination, the Clinton campaign plans to cast the field as monolithic on policy.

Republicans, however, see an opportunity to turn the question of empathy against Clinton. They've already started trying.

Republican pollster David Winston said the intense early focus on such issues gives Republicans an opening to define the terms of the debate over the direction each party wants to take the country.

"If she doesn't have a product on the shelf — her ideas — what's the point?" Winston asked.

Since the start of the year, Clinton has faced questions about her family foundation's fundraising practices and acceptance of money from foreign governments, as well as her decision to use a private email server at the State Department and destroy personal emails during her tenure in the Obama administration.

Clinton's personal wealth has also created unwanted attention. The Clintons reported last month that they earned more than \$30 million in combined speaking fees and book royalties since January 2014.

Clinton campaign officials argue that the individual issues have not affected the way the public views Clinton but the cumulative effect of the scrutiny has.

Her early campaign strategy suggests Clinton and her advisers are aware of the need to present herself as more relatable to Americans. While her failed 2008 White House bid emphasized her toughness and experience, the first months of her second campaign have highlighted her family background and her early work on women's and family issues.

During small round table events in Iowa, New Hampshire and elsewhere, Clinton has frequently referenced her roots as the daughter of a father who was a small business owner and a mother who overcame a difficult upbringing and abandonment.

She's also centered policy discussions on pre-kindergarten and daycare options for young children, as well as the plight of those with mental health problems and addictions to heroin and prescription drugs — calling it a "quiet epidemic" striking small towns and rural areas.

Man who stalked actress Mila Kunis recaptured after escape

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A man sentenced to a mental health facility for stalking actress Mila Kunis was recaptured Wednesday in Santa Monica, four days after he escaped from the institution, sheriff's officials said.

Deputies with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department's major crimes division took Stuart Lynn Dunn into custody in an alley about a half-mile from the beach, sheriff's spokeswoman Nicole Nishida said.

Dunn pleaded no contest to stalking Kunis in January 2013. He was sentenced to six months of rehabilitation, five years of

probation and ordered to stay away from the actress and her representatives for 10 years.

He disappeared Saturday night from a mental health center in Pomona, about 50 miles from where he was captured.

Authorities believe he got out of the Olive Vista Behavioral Health Center by climbing through a bathroom window and scaling a barbed-wire fence. Deputy Chief Reaver Bingham of the Los Angeles County Probation Department said officials went looking for him after he didn't return from a shower.

Authorities said Dunn

had few contacts in the Pomona area so they focused their search on gathering places for transient populations in western Los Angeles County. That included parts of Santa Monica, West Hollywood, Hollywood and Beverly Hills. The area where he eventually was found is not far from such a gathering place near the beach.

"Mr. Dunn's arrest was the result of the diligent efforts led by the Los Angeles County Probation Department's special enforcements operation and the Los Angeles Sheriff's Department's major crimes division," sheriff's officials said in a state-

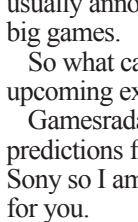

Adios, America!

Ann Coulter lives up to her reputation of issuing warnings and political commentary that nobody else dares to say in her newest book, "Adios, America!" It's aptly titled; she makes the case that it

is goodbye to the America we know and love if we don't stop diluting our population with people who don't love America, don't respect our Constitution and laws, don't even speak our language, and commit all sorts of unspeakable crimes.

"Adios, America!" brims with the scathing humor that has made Coulter's previous 10 books bestsellers. Coulter gives hundreds of specific examples of major crimes committed by illegal immigrants and, in particular, crimes against very young women and girls. She shows the devious ways that the media conceal the fact that these horrendous crimes are committed by illegal immigrants whom our government never should have let into our country.

The media cover-up doesn't conceal merely the nationality of these criminals or the frequency of their crimes. The media cover-up also conceals the depravity of these crimes, which are so horrific I can't bring myself to de-

scribe them in this column. "Adios, America!" spells out chapter and verse on the attitudes and customs of the foreigners Obama is welcoming by the millions into America, including their horrific mistreatment of very young women, some even younger than teens. Where are the feminists when we need them to shout about the "war on women"?

There are many devious ways that foreigners can get into the U.S. and then cash in on our generous welfare system. One route is the family unification policy, which qualifies for entry all varieties of alleged relatives, plus fake marriages by foreigners to U.S. citizens.

Here's a typical headline: "Man wanted for Raping Girl, 11, Robbing Her Family." The news story never used the word "immigrant," but described the criminal only as a "man" or "a 26-year-old man."

To illustrate the false slogan that "diversity is our strength," Coulter tells what happened to A.G. Currie Middle School in Tustin, Calif., which flew 65 foreign flags to make it a "model multicultural school" because, as its principal said in 1992, "we

are looking to build on our diversity as a strength." By 2009, the school had become 91 percent Hispanic. Coulter's comment: "Nine percent more Mexicans, and it will have achieved perfect diversity."

When we're told we can't fence our southern border because "fences don't work" — because people can always go over, under or around them — Coulter responds: That's like saying "wheels don't work" because you might have a flat tire. And, remember, the Great Wall of China is still doing its job after centuries.

A new Gallup poll reports that Americans are becoming more liberal on social issues. In fact, Americans are becoming more conservative on many social issues such as pro-life, and so our candidates don't have to take any more advice from those highly paid strategists who tell them to avoid mention of social issues.

Americans want our borders closed to this flow of anti-American foreigners and criminals. Thank you, Ann Coulter, for alerting Americans to how Obama and the Democrats are destroying the land we love.

LA could become latest US city to pass \$15 minimum wage

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Los Angeles on Wednesday is set to take a final vote on becoming the latest big U.S. city to endorse a hike in the minimum wage.

The City Council is extremely likely to make the move, which has the endorsement of Mayor Eric Garcetti and comes two weeks after a 14-1 preliminary vote on the wage.

The vote would bring a \$15-an-hour wage by 2020 — more than double the current federal minimum.

Seattle and San Francisco recently passed laws to reach the same minimum wage over several years, and Chicago passed one last year that plateaus at \$13.

Earlier this week, the California Senate approved a plan to again raise the statewide minimum wage, lifting it to \$13 an hour in 2017 and tying it to the rate of inflation after that.

New York City Mayor Bill de Blasio has said he also wants to boost his

city's lowest hourly pay to \$15.

Calls for raising the minimum wage at the national, state and local levels have built as the nation struggles with fallout from the recession, worsening income inequality, persistent poverty and the challenges of immigration and the global economy.

But even the backers of the plan acknowledge it's an experiment, with only patchy data on whether it hurts or helps economies at the city level.

I guess I just want to know how to come to grips. — FRANTIC MOM OF A TEEN IN FLORIDA

DEAR FRANTIC: While your fears are based on a real incident, your daughter is no longer a little girl. You can't protect her forever, and as a teenager, she needs to establish some independence. You would be doing both of you a favor to talk to a licensed mental health counselor NOW about this, because your fears are excessive.

DEAR ABBY: I've reached the point in my life that I can no longer hide fine lines and crow's feet. It is bothering me greatly. How do other women handle it, especially when the deep lines form?

I've talked to others my age and it doesn't bother them. I want to talk to

elderly people and ask them, but I don't know how to politely broach the subject. I feel guilty for being vain and I hate that, but it's hard for me to accept. Please help. — HATING AGING IN EAU CLAIRE

DEAR HATING AGING: I don't think anyone, male or female, relishes the idea of being old — particularly in American society — unless they consider the alternative, which is death.

Men and women handle signs of aging in different ways. Fortunes have been spent on beauty products, with varying degrees of success, although hope-in-a-jar springs eternal. Board-certified dermatologists and plastic surgeons can minimize the signs of aging with fillers, Botox, lasers and surgery, but they can be expensive. Others accept that beauty comes from within and opt to do nothing to change their appearance.

Talking to people in their 70s, 80s or 90s about the changes they

have experienced and the lessons they have learned as they grew older is a good idea. I'm sure you'll receive some enlightening input. But if it doesn't change your feelings, talk to a doctor because a good one can work "miracles."

Gallo HR, record 4 RBIs in MLB debut, Texas 15-2 over ChiSox

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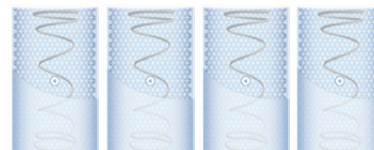


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
