The Gray County Commission met on Monday morning for its second meeting of the month.

Commissioner Joe Wheeley led the meeting in Judge Richard Peet's absence.

Lefors Marshal Travis Pittman gave the commissioners a monthly report, something he would like to

start doing regularly to establish a working relationship with the commissioners.

Wheeley opened the meeting in stating the rain totals for the area. Since Friday, by Monday morning there had been 3.58 inches reported, which made 21.28 inches total for the year so far.

With no old business to attend to, the commissioners approved

paying bills and salaries and heard the county treasurer's report as well as the county clerk's report.

Next, the commissioners approved an engagement letter from Doshier, Pickens and Francis for external audit for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30 of this year. It was similar to letters from past years, and the commissioners approved the agenda item unanimously.

The tax abatement agenda item in regards to an agreement with EC&R Development, LLC relating to its planned development of a wind power facility and related infrastructure to be located in the Gray County Grandview II Reinvestment Zone and the Gray County Reinvestment zone No. 1 as previously designated was re-

PPD investigating Sunday night shooting

In the early morning hours of June 15, the Pampa Police Department responded to the Pampa Regional Medical Center on a report of a patient arriving for treatment of multiple gunshot wounds. Preliminary information obtained through the investigation indicates that sometime just prior to midnight on June 14, several male subjects dressed in black, tactical-style clothing forced their way into

the victim's home, located in the 1100 block of Sirroco in Pampa.

Once inside they ordered the victim onto the ground, and demanded money. After attempting to cooperate with the suspects, the 24-year-old male victim was shot several times, and the suspects fled the scene. The victim was then taken to PRMC via private vehicle, and later transferred via Lifestar to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo for further treatment of his injuries. Is the US starting to turn the corner on urban sprawl?

WASHINGTON (AP) — Once the signature of an era of pell-mell development, American sprawl has slowed to a crawl in recent years, a new study finds.

New streets in metro areas are being built more densely packed and less spread out, according to a study in the journal Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences that looked at a nearly century of sprawl in U.S. street construction. Researchers from Canada and California found sprawl steadily increased in new street construction from 1920 until it peaked in 1994 and has dropped 9 percent since.

Christopher Barrington-Leigh of McGill University in Montreal measured sprawl by looking at construction of streets and how many roads meet at intersections to form corners or nodes. If an intersection had four nodes, essentially two streets in a traditional cross, that would be more dense than a dead end three-node intersection or a cul-de-sac with only node. The lower the node number, the more the sprawl, or as Barrington-Leigh called it, "cul-de-sac hell."

For more than 200 counties — about one third of all the U.S. urban counties — Barrington-Leigh and co-author Adam Millard-Ball traced the history of when every street was built, going back as far as 1720. Then they looked at maps, old and new, for the entire country to take an even bigger look.

Overall, sprawl reached its heights in around 1990 when the average road had 2.6 nodes, but in 2012 the number of corners was up to 2.83, so sprawl had decreased by about 9 percent, putting it at around mid-1960s level, Barrington-Leigh said. This only measures new construction; what's already built is still as spread out as before, he said. He said this is likely the result of actions taken by government officials to control sprawl.

Barrington-Leigh said sprawl contributes to more driving and more pollution, especially heat-trapping gases.

"It shows there is hope," Barrington-Leigh said. "We would like to slam the breaks on bad development."

The five counties that Barrington-Leigh found to be

controlling sprawl the most since the mid-1990s are Travis County, Texas; Mecklenburg County, North Carolina; Alachua County, Florida; Iredell County, North Carolina; and Franklin County, Ohio. He found the Austin region's new construction has cut sprawl by nearly one-quarter in that time.

Sprawl has increased the most in Manatee and Indian River counties in Florida, the study found.

Reid Ewing, director of the metropolitan research center at the University of Utah, faulted Barrington-Leigh for just using just street connectivity to measure sprawl. Ewing measures sprawl by measuring development density, land use, and how the population and jobs are centered.

Sacramento's idea of health: Undocumented welcome

"There are also those who claim that our reform effort will insure illegal immigrants. This, too, is false. The reforms I'm proposing would not apply to those who are here illegally,"

President Barack Obama proclaimed in a 2009 speech to Congress. It was a memorable event, in part because Rep. Joe Wilson, R-S.C., shouted, "You lie." Editorial page umbrage followed.

This month, the California Senate proved that, though Wilson was wrong to heckle the president, he had reason to challenge the sincerity of Obama's pledge. By a 28-11 vote, the Democratic-controlled state Senate became the first U.S. legislative body to vote to expand health care to immigrants who are here illegally. Senate Bill 4, by state Sen. Ricardo Lara, would allow Californians without documentation to buy Affordable Care Act policies (assuming the feds grant a waiver), authorize residents up to age 19 to enroll in Medi-Cal regardless of immigration status and allow some people 19 or older to enroll in Medi-Cal regardless of immigration status.

This is how change happens. Last year, Lara's first "Health for All" bill promised health care to all California residents regardless of immigration status. The tab was \$1.3 billion. It was too pricey, so he peeled it back, and back some more — to a projected \$135 million. How? The bill that passed the state Senate would provide Medi-Cal to minors regardless of immigration status but no subsidy for undocumented residents who want to purchase private plans through Covered California, absent a federal subsidy. Also, SB 4 would put a cap on unauthorized adults applying for Medi-Cal. When it looks as if the funding will run out, the state probably will not accept new enrollees.

What is the cap on undocumented enrollees?

Don't know. "The cap would depend on budget allocations to be decided next year," answered Lara spokesman Jesse Melgar.

In a way, it doesn't matter. If SB 4 becomes law, the camel's nose will have penetrated the tent. Within six years of the president's promising that immigrants in the country would not be eligible for Obamacare — presumably because that would be wrong — the first state will have bypassed that promise. You just know that Sacramento will continue to push to expand the number of immigrants eligible for benefits. No one ever told the Democratic Legislature that you cannot say "yes" to everyone.

Sure, Sacto solons look generous waving Medi-Cal before some 1 million immigrants who came here illegally. But with Medi-Cal paying doctors as little as \$16 for a patient visit, many physicians are refusing to take more Medi-Cal patients. Pols don't care if already there are not enough doctors to pay for the program's existing 12 million recipients. They look good; the docs look greedy.

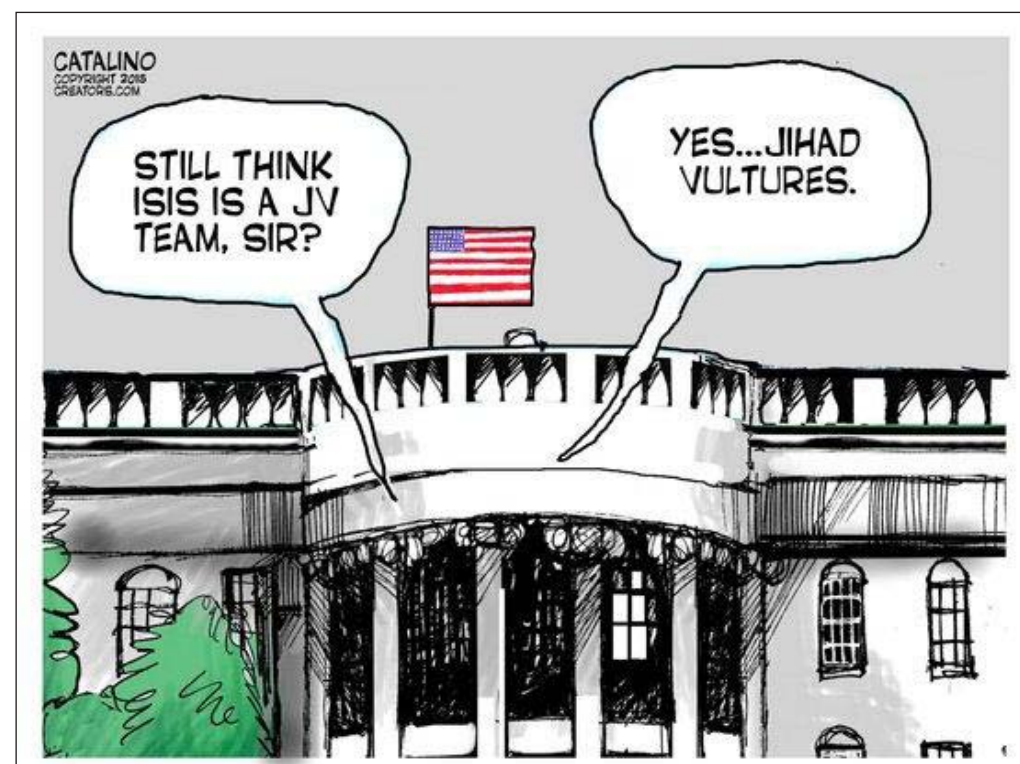
As it is, Medi-Cal provided "limited scope" benefits — pregnancy care, emergency care and long-term care — to 786,600 unauthorized immigrants last year. If you want more of something, reward it. If California offers "full scope" coverage to people if they come here illegally, opined Jon Fleischman, publisher of the conservative FlashReport, "there is no amount of border security that you can erect that will come between smart people and (this) free stuff."

Though their GOP caucus opposed the bill, two Republican state senators voted for it. "There is a cycle that occurs when one party becomes so dominant that the other party finally stops fighting," Fleischman observed. And really, why speak against the bill? To point out any negative consequences is to invite the left to brand you as heartless and racist. A California Senate analy-

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Just a Thought

Spend time focusing on the family

Every problem the world is facing today began with the family. Okay, maybe I am overstating this...but then again, maybe I am not.

I receive regular mailings from the Focus on the Family organization. It is a Christian based organization headquartered in Colorado Springs, Colorado that exists for a simple reason - to help families thrive. After a relationship with our Creator, I don't know of any more important aspect of our existence than our family.

Your world and my world is shaped by our family. The home environment you grew up in (or lack thereof) shaped you and impacts you for the rest of your existence. The pluses and minuses of your childhood and youth will be carried inside you until your last breath.

Your ability to go out into the world and accomplish what you need to accomplish is directly tied to whether or not you are spending your life worried about what is going on back home. In other words, if you need to be advancing what you get paid for to make a living and you are frozen anxiously worried about whether or not your family will be home when you get

off work, your ability to function at work is compromised.

Individuals who stay married for many years live longer. They earn more income. They enjoy life more. The pluses of a happy marriage are life changing to the couple as well as to the children they raise.

In a recent Focus on the Family letter, President Jim Daly set out six suggestions to strengthen our marriages. Although his suggestions are very basic, I thought it might be good to be reminded of these core ideas.

To give and get the most from your marriage, here are six suggestions:

1. Waking up. How important is the way each of us start each of our days? It begins with our waking moments. Instead of saying to your spouse "good morning," why not say something like "I love you and I'm glad to be waking up with you by your side." Or even "I am excited about being able to live another day with you!"

The concept here is that if each of us could start our day with a grateful and positive view of our relationship and the day together ahead, it increases the likelihood of having a great day.

2. Leaving the house. Kiss your spouse goodbye every time you leave. That's right, every time. Do it because you value your relationship and want your spouse to

know you value it also.

In each of our lives there will always be a "last" kiss. None of us know when that will be. When my wife and I separate for the day it always crosses my mind that it could be our last goodbye if a tragedy happens while we are apart. I don't want to take anything for granted. If I leave home after a heated argument and then one of us is killed in a tragic accident, I wouldn't want our last memory to be one of us angry at each other.

Interesting enough, a 1980 study came to the conclusion that men who kiss their wives before leaving for work live longer, get into fewer automobile accidents, and even earn more than those who don't.

3. Checking in. Do you think about your spouse when you are separated during the day? You should. In most instances you are never more than pushing a few buttons on your cell phone apart. Why not send a short text "Thinkin' about you and missin' you." It takes twenty seconds of your day, but means the world to your spouse. Or call and leave a short message on her answering machine.

4. Coming home. If the goodbye is important, the other bookend of coming home is also important. A kiss or a hug shows value to your spouse. A "happy dance" is even better! Ask your

spouse how his or her day was and then listen. If you have been separated eight or ten hours, a lot of life has happened since you have had the chance to visit.

I think here also about modeling for the children in your home. How many of you saw your parents kiss when they left home or when they returned home? You are raising future husbands and wives and future fathers and mothers. The greatest legacy you may leave is your children.

What better model can you give your children than to openly love their other parent? Your kiss or hug upon returning home is because you value your relationship with your spouse, but what better example can you set for the little pairs of eyes watching you?

5. Mealtimes. The most important piece of furniture in your home is your dining room table. Your ability to raise the next generation in the manner that they need to be raised comes from what happens at your dining room table. Mealtimes are a time when the family comes together as one unit and talk about events in each family member's lives.

The mealtime opportunities are endless. You can uplift and encourage. You can model what you would do in a difficult situation. You can celebrate an accomplishment. You can talk about future plans. You can

sis lists more than 70 groups that support SB 4 but not one opponent.

One of the GOP yes votes, state Sen. Anthony Cannella, told me he sees the measure as a "moral issue." Undocumented immigrants work hard, he said, but have "no rights," even though they have been "contributing to our way of life." When immigrants try to cross the border, they see two signs, he added. "One says, 'Do not enter.' The other says, 'Help wanted.'"

Cannella said the answer is better enforcement of the border.

Though 11 Republican state senators voted against SB 4, they were low-key in their opposition. When a bill is going to pass anyway, why throw out red-meat quotes that would be used against you in the next election? State Senate Minority Leader Bob Huff called the

bill's intent "admirable. But without money from Congress and President Obama, it will be very difficult and costly for California taxpayers to fund all of these bill proposals." Smart, earnest, boring tone. This is one Republican who knows better than to point out that Democrats lied when they promised Obamacare would not apply to immigrants who came here illegally.

Asked whether he'll sign or veto SB 4, Gov. Jerry Brown told a reporter that "there's not a lot more money to be spent" on top of what he allocated in his revised May budget. In this one-party state, only Democratic Gov. Brown can save Californians from a Legislature that can't say "no" to a chance to spend other people's money.

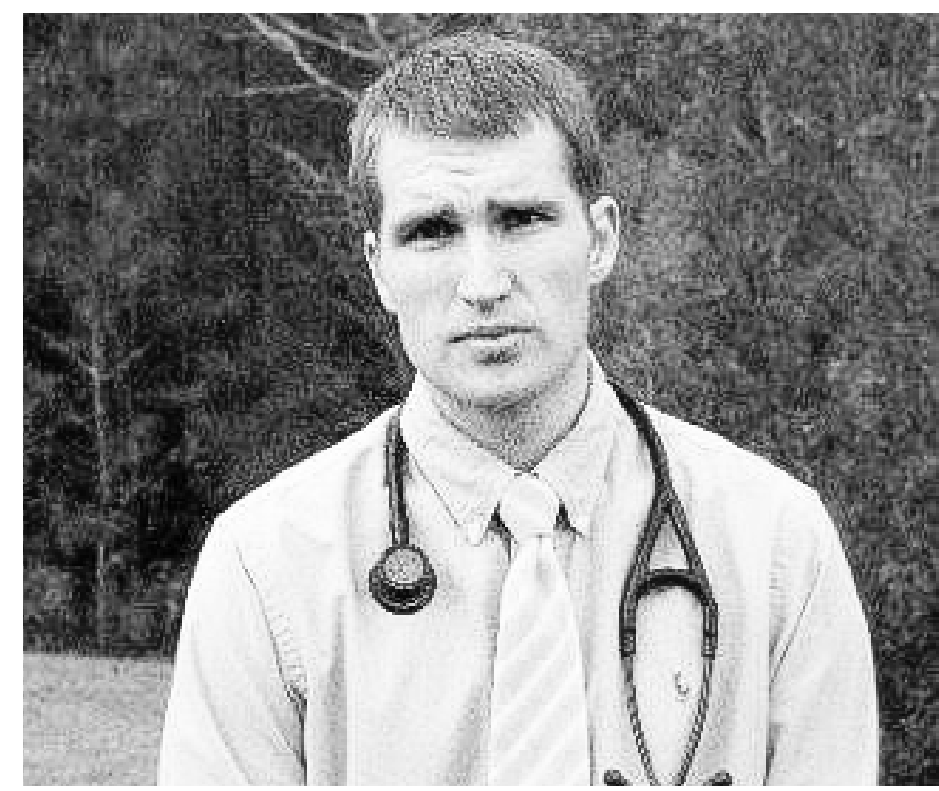

Evacuations but no injuries after pipeline ruptures in Texas

CUERO, Texas (AP) — Authorities say no one was injured after a natural gas pipeline ruptured in rural South Texas, sparking a massive fire that prompted the evacuation of nearby homes.

DeWitt County Emergency Operations Center spokeswoman Peggy Fonseca says an Energy Transfer Partners pipeline

ruptured near Lindenau around 8 p.m. Sunday. Fonseca said early Monday that the gas had been rerouted and the fire was extinguished.

She said seven homes were evacuated but that no one was injured. She says residents were allowed to return Sunday night following safety inspections.

Energy Transfer Partners spokeswoman Vicki Anderson Granado said the company will investigate the cause of the rupture.

The Victoria Advocate reported that the blaze could be seen from 20 miles away.

Lindenau is about 85 miles southeast of San Antonio.

Relatives: Man tied to Dallas shooting was mentally unstable

DALLAS (AP) — James Boulware told family members that he had foreseen a deadly Japanese tsunami and the Newtown, Connecticut, school shooting in his dreams. Police say he choked his mother. And he seethed at police, blaming them for the lost custody of his son.

Boulware, the man authorities have linked to a weekend shooting outside Dallas police headquarters, showed signs of violence and mental instability for years beforehand, according to accounts from authorities and family members.

His brother, Andrew Boulware, told The Associated Press that he and

others in the family had tried to get him help, particularly after the 2013 incident in which he allegedly choked his mother, then fled to an East Texas town where authorities and family members thought he might attack schools and churches.

"He never was properly diagnosed," Andrew Boulware said Sunday. "He could be the nicest guy in the world. He tried to help friends out whenever he could. He was not a bitter person."

Authorities say it was miraculous no one else was injured in Saturday's attack, in which the shooter sprayed the front of the building with gunfire just after midnight.

After opening fire, the suspect drove an armored van into a squad car, still firing, then led police on a chase to a restaurant parking lot in the suburb of Hutchins.

A police sniper shot the man during a standoff, but it took several hours to confirm his death out of fear that he had loaded his van with more explosives.

Police on Sunday said they had put 14 officers involved in the incident on standard administrative leave pending an investigation.

Two years ago, Boulware was arrested for family violence in Dallas, though the case was later dismissed.

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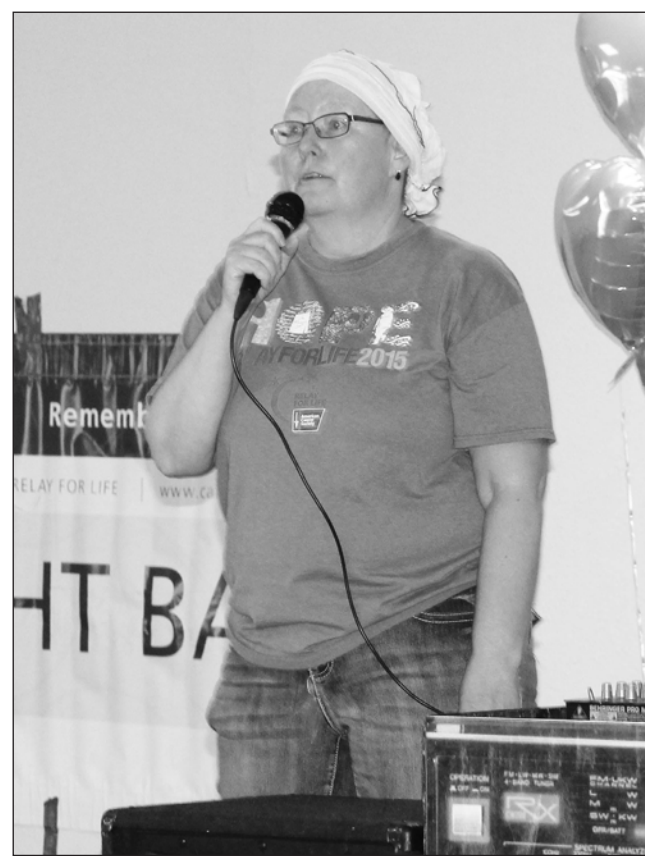

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Low near Yucatan brewing storms for Texas, Louisiana

MIAMI (AP) — The National Hurricane Center says a broad area of low pressure near the Yucatan Peninsula could brew nasty weather along the Texas and Louisiana coasts and inland Monday night and Tuesday.

Hurricane center spokesman Dennis Feltgen (FELT-gen) says the low may develop into a tropical system. But he says that whether

it does or not, it's likely to slam into the middle and upper Texas coast and west Louisiana with at least 4 to 6 inches of rain and 40-mph winds.

He says that includes parts of Texas that were flooded only weeks ago.

He says people should pay attention to the system whether or not it's given a name.

Sunday afternoon and another will go Monday morning.

Man condemned for female impersonator's death loses appeal

HOUSTON (AP) — The U.S. Supreme Court has refused to review an appeal from a Harris County man sent to death row at his request for the strangling of a female impersonator 14 years ago.

Attorneys for 43-year-

old Richard Masterson contended his earlier lawyers were deficient and his confession to police about the death of Darin Shane Honeycutt, known by the stage name of Brandi Houston, was improper.

Masterson testified against his attorneys' advice at his 2002 trial, telling a Houston jury the 35-year-old Honeycutt died while the two were having sex. He also tes-

tified he'd be a future danger. That's one of the questions jurors deliberate to decide a death sentence.

The justices made no comment in their decision Monday.

Masterson doesn't yet have an execution date.

Killeen police investigate fatal shooting of 16-year-old

KILLEEN (AP) — Killeen police are investigating after a 16-year-old

boy was killed as a suspect or suspects slowly drove past a house he was in.

Police say that the teen was found early Sunday morning suffering from a gunshot wound. He was unconscious and not breathing. He was later pronounced dead at the scene.

The name of the victim has not yet been released.

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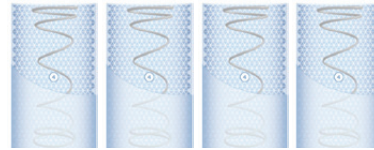

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Texas investigating allegations of academic misconduct

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas says it has contacted the NCAA as the school investigates allegations of academic misconduct in its men's basketball program.

The school issued a statement Wednesday following a report in The Chronicle of Higher Education that mentioned potential allegations from the tenure of former coach Rick Barnes, who is now at Tennessee.

In the statement, the university said it "has no information that suggests" Barnes knew of or was involved in any academic improprieties.

The statement added that "we determined that the university had no knowledge of two former student-athletes allegedly receiving improper help with high school coursework before they enrolled." That stems from a December report by The Chronicle of Higher Education.

"We now are reviewing three other cases purported to have occurred over a

nine-year period since 2006 to determine if any university of NCAA rules were violated and if any action is needed," the school said.

Those three cases are detailed in Wednesday's report from The Chronicle of Higher Education.

In the article, Adam Creasy, a former academic counselor for the Texas football team, says that math instructor Pamela Powell told him she saw former basketball player Martez Walker cheating on an exam, and that Walker passed the class anyway. Walker has since transferred.

Also in the article, a former academic mentor in the athletic department says he helped write papers for former Texas guard J'Covan Brown. Creasy, one of the tutors for former player P.J. Tucker, says he believes Tucker received impermissible help with a paper while preparing for the NBA draft. Creasy says he didn't

provide the assistance but believes someone other than Tucker did the work.

In the Walker case, Creasy says Powell told him she saw Walker cheat and asked what to do. Creasy says he spoke to Brian Davis, the head of academic support for football at the time. According to the article, Davis suggested Powell contact executive senior associate athletic director for student services Randa Ryan, and what happened afterward was unclear.

"The university takes any suggestion of wrongdoing extremely seriously," the school said in its statement. "We are always looking to identify problems that may exist and ways we can do better."

Barnes went 402-180 and reached the NCAA Tournament in 16 of his 17 seasons at Texas before being fired in March. Tennessee hired him two days later to replace Donnie Tyndall and hoped the 604-game winner would stabilize a program that has encountered plenty of turmoil.

Tyndall was fired after going 16-16 in his lone season at Tennessee because school officials decided the NCAA was likely to determine he had committed major violations while coaching Southern Mississippi from 2012-14. Southern Mississippi is currently under NCAA investigation.

"Obviously, we can't talk about what happened in the past at another university," Tennessee athletic director Dave Hart said in a statement issued by the university. "However, as stated clearly by the University of Texas, 'the university has no information that suggests former men's basketball coach Rick Barnes knew of or was involved in any academic improprieties.' Coach Barnes has a sterling reputation as a person of very high ethical standards at every institution he has represented, and we are excited to have him lead our men's basketball program."

Iowa State hires Steve Prohm as Hoiberg's replacement

AMES, Iowa (AP) — Iowa State has hired Murray State's Steve Prohm as its men's basketball coach.

Cyclones athletic director Jamie Pollard confirmed Monday that Prohm will replace Fred Hoiberg, who left last week after five seasons to take over the Chicago Bulls.

The 40-year-old Prohm was 104-29 in four years at Murray State. He led the Racers to 29 wins, including a 16-0 regular-season mark in the

Ohio Valley Conference in 2014-15.

Prohm takes over an Iowa State team that could open next season ranked in the top 10. The Cyclones return six of their top eight scorers from last season, when they won their second straight Big 12 tournament.

Prohm, who has agreed

to a five-year deal with a base salary of \$1.5 million per year, will be introduced at a news conference on Tuesday.

"Steve's personal values, style of play and proven success as a head coach make him an outstanding choice to be our next coach," Pollard said. "He is a proven winner who is widely respected by his current and former players. We feel Steve is the ideal coach to continue the incredible success that Coach Hoiberg and his

players have achieved during the past several years

Prohm began his coaching career at Alabama and worked under current Texas A&M coach Billy Kennedy at Southeastern Louisiana and Centenary. Prohm was promoted to head coach at Murray State when Kennedy left for the Aggies.

Prohm led the Racers to 31 wins and a No. 6 seed in the NCAA Tournament in his first season in 2011-12 behind star Isaiah Canaan. Murray State went 21-10 the following season and won 23 games and the CIT title in 2013-14.

The Racers went on a 25-game winning streak at one point last season and earned a spot in the Top 25. But an 88-87 loss to Belmont in the OVC title game sent Murray State to the NIT.

Prohm's teams at Murray State played a fast-

paced, high-scoring style predicated on strong guard play.

The Racers averaged 79 points per game last season — good for eighth-best in the country. They were led by a dynamic scorer in sophomore sharpshooter Cameron Payne, who could be a NBA lottery pick in the draft.

"I have no doubt he'll be successful with the Cyclones. He's a class individual and represented Murray State proudly," Murray State athletic director Allen Ward said. "I will always be grateful for his service. Because of the unusual timing of this move, it's in our best interest to move very quickly to find a replacement."

Prohm's up-tempo style should be a hit at Iowa State, which played a similar style while winning 115 games and reaching four consecutive NCAA tournaments

under Hoiberg.

The expectations for Prohm and the Cyclones next season will be high. Georges Niang is the headline player for the Cyclones, who won 25 games before a stunning loss to 14th-seeded UAB in the NCAAs.

Point guard Monte Morris was a second-team All-Big 12 pick, and center Jameel McKay was the conference's defensive player of the year. Senior guard Naz Long, top reserves Abdel Nader and Matt Thomas and transfers Deonte Burton and Hallice Cooke round out what's expected to be the most talented roster in school history.

One of Prohm's first priorities will be recruiting.

Niang, McKay and Long will be seniors in 2015-16, and Morris could jump to the NBA if he has another strong season.

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Ex-NFL player Sharper pleads guilty to rape in Louisiana

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Former New Orleans Saints player Darren Sharper pleaded guilty Monday to rape in a Louisiana drug-and-sexual-assault case, completing a series of pleas in four states that will see him serve at least nine years in prison.

Sharper entered his plea in a Louisiana state court in New Orleans. He had already pleaded guilty in the federal courthouse in that city late last month.

Sharper was first arrested on rape charges in Los Angeles in January of 2014 and has been jailed since February of that year. Allegations of drug-related rapes in other states followed, resulting eventually in charges being filed in Arizona and Nevada, as well as in state and federal courts in New Orleans.

A plea deal was announced in March to resolve the charges in all jurisdictions. On March 23, Sharper pleaded guilty to sexual assault in Arizona and no contest in California. He was sentenced to nine years in Arizona and is expected to draw a nine-year sentence when sentenced in California in July.

On March 24, Sharper pleaded guilty in Las Vegas to a reduced felony: attempted sex assault.

Sharper made a brief appearance in a state courtroom in New Orleans on April 7. But Louisiana District Judge Karen Herman delayed the case pending resolution of the federal charges, raising questions about when the series of plea deals would be completed and whether there had been any snags in the agreements.

The federal indictment in Louisiana charged Sharper and another man with distributing the drugs alprazolam, diazepam and zolpidem — more commonly known by the brand names Xanax, Valium and Ambien, respectively — with the intent to commit rape.

The two Louisiana state counts of aggravated rape stemmed from accusations that he sexually assaulted two drug-impaired women at his apartment in September 2013.

Sharper was selected All-Pro six times and chosen for the Pro Bowl five times during a career that included stints with the Green Bay Packers and Minnesota Vikings. He played in two Super Bowls, one with the Packers as a rookie and in the Saints' 2010 victory.

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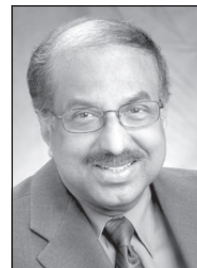

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Can Royals' All-Star surge carry Infante, too?

The All-Star game is still a month away, but it could be a historic occasion for the defending American League champions.

As of last Monday, the Kansas City Royals had seven players on track to start this year's game in Cincinnati on July 14. Kansas City's dominance in the online vote has gotten plenty of attention. Some view it as a mockery of the process, while others offer a tip of the hat to what is clearly an energized fan base.

The Royals in line to start were catcher Salvador Perez, first baseman Eric Hosmer, shortstop Alcides Escobar, third baseman Mike Moustakas, designated hitter Kendrys Morales and outfielders Lorenzo Cain and Alex Gordon. Where the voting has been a bit extreme is at second base. In baseball's version of the coattail effect, Kansas City's Omar Infante was in second place, just 150,000 votes behind Jose Altuve of Houston.

Infante is hitting .204 with an OPS of .496. If he starts the All-Star game with numbers like that, it would be unprecedented.

Smith was a defensive standout, and Richardson's reputation with the glove helped him as well. Aparicio and Ripken were nearing the end of Hall of Fame careers, and Lopes was an All-Star regular when he started in '81. Alomar was the AL rookie of the year in 1990, which helps explain his All-Star appearance the following year.

Infante made the All-Star team in 2010, when he went on to hit .321 for the Atlanta Braves. This year, he's struggling — but he's playing for the right team at the right time.

Toronto has won 11 in a row, and the Blue Jays are now a game out of first place in the AL East. That streak includes a three-game sweep at Boston that left the Red Sox eight games out of first.

Official: Kurdish fighters seize parts of IS-held city

BEIRUT (AP) — Kurdish fighters captured large parts of the strategic border town of Tal Abyad from the Islamic State group Monday, dealing a huge blow to the group which lost a key supply line for its nearby de facto capital of Raqqa, a spokesman for the main Kurdish fighting force said.

Redur Khalil said the group known as the YPG entered Tal Abyad from the east and was advancing toward the west amid fierce clashes with pockets of IS resistance.

"We expect to have full control over Tal Abyad within a few hours," he told The Associated Press in a telephone interview.

An Associated Press photographer in Akcakale, the Turkish town on the opposite side of Tal Abyad, saw several YPG fighters waving their flag and flashing victory signs. Earlier, several dozen YPG

gunmen were seen moving west toward the city.

Khalil suggested that IS fighters holed up in the town have fled toward Turkey. The report could not be independently confirmed. Earlier, he told the AP that hundreds of IS fighters were still believed to be in the town.

Losing Tal Abyad, some 80 kilometers (50 miles) north of Raqqa city, capital of the Islamic State group's self-declared caliphate, would deprive the militant group of a direct route to bring in new foreign militants or supplies. The Kurdish territorial gains, coming under the cover of intense U.S.-led coalition airstrikes in the area, would also link their two fronts and put even more pressure on Raqqa.

The Kurdish advance has caused the displacement of more than 16,000 people who fled to Turkey in the past two weeks. On Monday, up to 3,000 more refugees

arrived at the Akcakale border crossing, according to Turkish state-run TRT television. An Associated Press photographer saw large numbers of people at the border and thick smoke billowing as U.S.-led coalition aircraft targeted IS militants in Tal Abyad.

With most of Syria now controlled by either Islamic militants or forces loyal to President Bashar Assad, the U.S. has found a reliable partner in the country's

strongest Kurdish militia, the YPG. They are moderate, mostly secular fighters, driven by revolutionary fervor and the desire for self-rule.

Since the beginning of the year, they have wrested back more than 500 mostly Kurdish and Christian towns in northeastern Syria, as well as strategic mountains seized earlier by the IS group. They have recently pushed into Raqqa province, an IS stronghold where Tal Abyad is located.

Ukraine's artillery duels again take toll on civilians

DONETSK, Ukraine (AP) — Cracking forth over radio, the voice ordered tanks to take position in a residential area in Donetsk, the stronghold of separatist rebels in east Ukraine.

The rebel armored vehicles trundled to their destination accompanied by a reinforced minivan carrying infantrymen to provide cover. Minutes later, the shells blasted toward government positions. Out of ammunition, the tanks left the scene. Later the same morning, artillery flew in the opposite direction — this time seemingly from Ukrainian troops, hitting a severely damaged area still inhabited by hundreds of families.

Artillery duels like this one have been a dominant feature of Ukraine's conflict, which the United Nations estimates has claimed at least 6,454 lives among both combatants and civilians. After months of relative tranquility ushered in by an internationally brokered armistice in February, civilian deaths are again becoming commonplace amid the stepped-up heavy weapons fighting.

UNICEF, the United Nations children's agency, said that at least 68 children have been killed in the conflict — many by artillery. UNICEF said some children were injured by heavy weaponry as recently as last week, when heavy fighting erupted in Donetsk suburb of Marinka.

The rebel artillery last week hit a checkpoint, killing a rebel fighter and wounding at least two others. More often than not, the shells are less precise and slam into homes, shops or a public building, killing or wounding civilians.

Rebels say they are fighting to push back Ukrainian forces from their main city and keep them as far away from the civilian population as possible. Ukrainian officials say separatists are looking to provoke a new round of full-blown war.

What AP reporters have been able to observe looks like hit-and-run strikes by rebel forces, often carried out from inside residential zones. Some Donetsk inhabitants are willing

to confirm as much.

"There is outgoing fire and then, after a while there is incoming shelling. This has been going on for a year," said Valentina Barakova, as she cleared away debris from a strike on an apartment block neighboring her own over the weekend.

Tensions are at a breaking point for residents. On Monday, a spontaneous rally broke out demanding an end to the war. Some locals are calling for a big push to thwart the Ukrainian army, but many allied to the insurgents are also calling on them to pull their weapons out of residential areas.

Rebel commanders insist that they have no heavy weapons on the front, despite evidence to the contrary.

"There are no such weapons here. We pulled them back. We use small arms and that's that. We are not violating the (peace) agreements even in the slightest way," said the head of the rebel unit at a front line position near the remains of Donetsk airport. The commander identified himself only by the nom de guerre Petrovich.

Separatist spokesman Eduard Basurin said Friday that two civilians had been killed as a result of Ukrainian shelling the previous day.

"During the violation of the cease-fire regime by Ukrainian forces, there were 11 casualties, among them two men killed in (Donetsk's) Kuibyshev district," he said.

One of the men killed Thursday was sitting outside drinking when the shell struck, his friend told The Associated Press. The shell tore into a dusty side-road by a rusting kiosk, and the shockwaves blew the man off his feet into a nearby fence.

Only meters (yards) away, the recently left tracks of heavy armor were still visible, although the vehicle had long gone. In the intense early summer sun, track-marks often remain impressed in softened asphalt as evidence the tanks have been there.

Ukraine's army has always denied it aims artillery at residential areas.

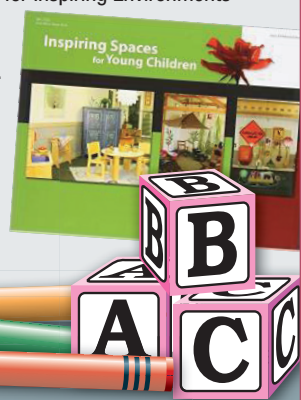

Depardieu intervened for widely panned FIFA movie

 PARIS (AP) — Actor Gerard Depardieu personally intervened to persuade the Cannes Film Festival to show the FIFA-funded movie "United Passions" that sank almost without trace at the box office after being panned by critics.

In an Associated Press interview, Cannes director Thierry Fremaux said he initially rejected the movie, thinking it unworthy of the world-famous festival.

But Depardieu, who plays World Cup creator Jules Rimet in the film, pressured 2014 festival organizers to rethink.

They agreed to let it be shown in the open air on a beach. That green light was enough to allow marketers to attach the prestigious Cannes name — its palm-leaf logo and the words "official selection, festival de Cannes" — to "United Passions" trailers and posters.

"Gerard Depardieu was very insistent. He really wanted us to show it," said Fremaux, speaking Monday by telephone. "I'm not saying we did it to keep him happy, but let's say that he insisted a lot."

The French actor ("Green Card," "Cyrano de Bergerac")

has long ties with Cannes. In 1992, he presided over the jury that awards the festival's coveted Palme d'Or prize. He also has ties with Russia, the next World Cup host in 2018. He accepted a Russian passport from President Vladimir Putin in 2013 after a falling out with France's ruling Socialist government.

Fremaux attended the beach showing with FIFA President Sepp Blatter and Depardieu in 2014, after changing his initial position that the movie was unworthy of Cannes.

"I rejected the film. At the beginning, I said 'Out of the question,' because the film lacks the quality to be part of the official selection," he told the AP. "Then they said, 'Why not on the beach?' I said, 'Ah, the beach. Yes, it's a festival. It's football. It's the general public. OK.'"

FIFA did not pay Cannes to show the movie, Fremaux said.

The movie bombed on its release this month in the United States, taking only about \$900 in an opening weekend at 10 theaters. In France, it went straight to DVD and was released in only a handful of other countries. According to box-office data firm Rentrak, it made only \$178,639

in theaters before opening in the U.S., most of that in Russia.

FIFA largely bankrolled the \$30-million movie about soccer's governing body, the growth of its World Cup tournament and Blatter's rise to power as FIFA president.

Played by Tim Roth ("Reservoir Dogs"), Blatter is portrayed sympathetically in the movie as a hard worker who toiled to make FIFA financially successful and spoke out against corruption. In real life, FIFA is embroiled in U.S. and Swiss anti-corruption investigations and Blatter is on his way out with his 17-year presidency widely criticized.

Critics savaged the movie: "Pure cinematic excrement" wrote the London Guardian, "cringe-worthy, self-aggrandizing" said the Hollywood Reporter. Fremaux was more charitable.

"I don't find the movie horrible at all," he said. "It should have been a television movie."

Romanian leader slams PM's attendance at European Games

BUCHAREST, Romania (AP) — Romania's president says he didn't know the Romanian prime minister would attend the European Games, which most European Union leaders have avoided because of concerns about host Azerbaijan's human rights record.

Premier Victor Ponta traveled to Baku, the Azerbaijani capital, for the opening of the games Friday hours after he survived a no-confidence vote in Parliament. Russian President Vladimir Putin, Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan and Belarus President Alexander Lukashenko also attended the opening.

Protests against Azerbaijan's human rights record took place in cities around the world Friday before the opening ceremony.

President Klaus Iohannis called Ponta's atten-

dance at the games "a foreign policy gaffe," and said Monday he had not known about the visit.

Ponta, who heads the ruling Social Democratic Party, was recently named in a corruption probe. Relations have soured between the two leaders after Iohannis asked Ponta to resign due to the probe and he refused.

Prosecutors said Ponta is suspected of money laundering, forgery, tax evasion and conflict of interest from 2007 to 2008 when as a lawmaker he allegedly received money for a SUV and payment for apartments without doing any work. Still, a bid to lift his immunity failed last week and he also survived a no-confidence vote.

Ponta's foreign policy adviser Radu Magdin, who has a pro-U.S. stance, resigned Friday after six months in the post.
