a lot of the history and details behind it. Recently, Walden Haynes, Pampa a resident and longtime member, spoke about the history and his memories of the


Optimist. Optimist started in 1954 in Pampa and John Clark president.

#### **DPS** trooper seizes more than one pound of meth

SUBMITTED BY TEXAS DPS AMARILLO - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) conducted a traffic stop Sunday on Interstate 40, yielding over one pound of methamphetamine valued at

more than \$87,000. At approximately 4:20 p.m., a DPS trooper conducted a traffic stop on a 2006 Mercedes Benz traveling eastbound on IH-40, for a traffic violation, near Bush-

land in Potter County. The driver of the Mercedes was identified as Scott Alan Cheney, 51, of Paramount, Calif. During the traffic stop, the trooper discovered the illegal drugs in the

Cheney was placed under arrest for possession of a controlled substance more than 400 grams, a first-degree felony, and booked into the Potter County Jail. The illegal drugs were allegedly being transported from Los Angeles to Oklahoma City.

#### Under BP deal, another \$788 million will flow to Texas

Texas is set to receive another \$788 million stemming from the 2010 Deepwater Horizon explosion and oil spill under a settlement between BP, the federal government and five Gulf Coast states.

BP will pay a total of \$20.2 billion in damages and penalties under the agreement it forged with the federal government and Alabama, Florida, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas – resolving all state claims against the company for its role in the disaster, which killed 11 people and spewed millions of barrels of oil into the Gulf of Mexico.

'After five years, I'm proud to announce that Texas, along with the other Gulf States, has reached an agreement in principle with BP to resolve all the states? claims," Gov. Greg Abbott said in a statement. "This settlement will allow Texas to reinvest in the Gulf community and reinvigorate the economic and environmental



Under the settlement:

• BP will pay \$5.5 billion in federal Clean Water Act fines over 15 years – \$4.4 billion of which will fund Gulf-wide projects in the state's federal RESTORE Act plans. More than \$400 million of that money will flow to Texas.

• BP will pay about \$8.8 billion (including about \$1 billion already paid for restoration proj-

• BP will pay \$4.9 billion over 19 years for economic cluding some \$150 million for Texas.

• BP will pay up to \$1 billion to resolve claims by more than 400 local governments across the Gulf.

"This is a realistic outcome which provides clarity and certainty for all parties," Bob Dudley, BP's group chief executive, said in a statement. "For BP, this agreement will resolve the largest liabilities remaining from the tragic accident and enable BP to focus on safely delivering the energy the world needs.'

A high school will serve as an emergency shelter for the area about 70 miles northeast of Spokane, Washington.

The blaze started near the lake shore and burned upslope through timber, destroying other buildings such as boat houses and pump houses, Lyon said.

About 100 firefighters dealing with steep terrain put in a fire line between the blaze and homes to protect the properties, fire

spokesman Jim Lyon said. The fight included four aircraft and a U.S. Navy boat that was dousing some expensive homes. The Navy operates a small submarine research facility in Bayview.

A team of investigators planned to examine where the fire started to try to determine a cause, Lyon said.

'We have a good idea of





ator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happi-

ness." These words from the Declaration of Independence helped launch the great American experiment in democracy that we celebrate this July 4th. And while most Americans do so by grilling hot dogs with friends and family and attending fireworks displays in their hometowns (or watching them broadcast live from the National Mall), maybe we ought to spend a little time actually thinking about those words and what they mean. John Agresto is one

man who has thought long and deeply about our founding, and he has a new book out that every American who cares about our democracy should read: "Rediscovering America: Liberty, Equality, and the Crisis of Democracy" (Asahina and Wallace 2015)

Agresto aims big. He says in the preface to his book that it "will try to explain the core meaning of the Declaration of Independence of 1776 and of the Constitution of 1787. It is a book that rises to defend the intelligence and patriotism of the Founders who wrote those documents and the ideas and the wisdom those documents contain. It is a book centered on a hope: the hope that a renewal in understanding the principles of the founding will lead to a restoration of those principles in our public life, and the hope that such a restoration will mitigate the crisis we are in.'

Agresto has spent a lifetime on the project of restoring an appreciation for our founding principles. As a college professor and administrator (he was president of St. John's College in Santa Fe, N.M.) and as deputy chairman of the National Endowment for the Humanities during

the Reagan years, Agresto says he watched for years as our schools and colleges abandoned the mission of teaching the Constitution or explaining our beliefs. "On one level," he says, "this is a book written by an old professor for his students, past and future." But it is

invasion as senior adviser to the Iraqi Ministry of Higher Education and Scientific Research. That experience informs his understanding of how truly difficult it is to create and sustain democracy as our Founders conceived it — a project that seems to have failed utterly in Iraq despite so much loss of American blood and treasure trying to transform that nation in our image. Anyone who has read Agresto's previous book, "Mugged by Reality: The Liberation of Iraq and the Failure of Good Intentions" (Encounter Books 2007) will not be surprised at what has happened in Iraq and throughout the Middle East over the past few years.

Democracy — or the right of individuals to elect their leaders — is not an end in itself. It would have been unthinkable to most Americans until just a few years ago, Agresto says, "that the rise of democracy itself would be, in many places around the globe, the harbinger of new and often greater repression." As he notes, the Arab Spring did not usher in liberty, but Islamic fundamentalism in many places. And the Middle East is not the only place where elections have resulted in less freedom. "Putin may rule both corruptly and with ferocious force, but he does it under the cover and through the mechanism of open elections," Agresto notes.

'Rediscovering America" walks readers through the underlying principles necessary for democracy to survive and thrive. With chapters devoted to the proposition that "All Men Are Created Equal," economics and justice, and the role liberty and equality play


Disgustingly mad. Other Republican presidential candidates running from Trump's words. What this

# Patriotism, optimism and good-natured debate

The Fourth of July is a time to remember Americans

who have contributed much to their country, and this Fourth weekend is a good time to remember two such

Americans who died in recent weeks and whom I'd had the good fortune to know and joust with intellectually since the 1970s — Allen Weinstein and Ben Wattenberg.

Both were sons of Jewish immigrants, born in the 1930s and raised in the Bronx, which then had the highest Jewish percentage of any American county and also large Irish, Italian and black communities.

The Bronx was one of the heartlands of American liberalism — the big argument in 1948 was whether to support Harry Truman or the anti-anti-Soviet, Henry Wallace — and Weinstein and Wattenberg as young adults were proud liberal Democrats. But

while both remained liberals in many respects, they were willing to challenge leftist orthodoxy.

As a history professor at Smith College, Weinstein authored two books in the 1970s and came to public attention with his 1978 book "Perjury: The Hiss-Chambers Case." He had begun his work believing, like many on the left, that Hiss was unjustly convicted of perjury in 1950 for denying he was a Soviet spy.

But his research — including 30,000 pages of Justice Department records, interviews with Soviet spies and with Hiss himself — convinced him that Hiss was guilty. And the meticulous narrative and argumentation in "Perjury" convinced readers ranging ideologically from George Will to Arthur Schlesinger, Jr.

Though affirming Hiss' guilt was apostasy in academia, Weinstein continued to teach at Georgetown and Boston University. In 1985 he founded the Center for Democracy, and worked with Democrats and Republicans

to advance democratic institutions in the Philippines, Central America and Russia

Weinstein was a conduit of information between the White House and Boris Yeltsin during the 1991 coup, and, with former KGB agent Alexander Vassiliev, he gained access to Soviet secret police files, the basis for their 1999 book "The Haunted Wood: Soviet Espionage in American — the Stalin Era." Those documents and the until-then-secret Venona transcripts of KGB communications sealed the case against Hiss and other spies whom some considered unjustly accused.

From 2005 to 2008 Weinstein served as archivist of the United States, developing digitized records and arranging federal status for the Nixon presidential library.

As a careful scholar, he was not given to broad generalization. But the thrust of his life's work was a reaffirmation of the value of American democracy and the worthiness of the struggle against totalitarian rule.

Ben Wattenberg started not as an academic but as a journalist and first gained attention with his 1965 book, "This U.S.A.," co-authored with former Census Director Richard Scammon, using census data to show how "we have achieved a better

America." That led to a speechwriting job in Lyndon Johnson's White House, where Wattenberg's inveterate optimism about America and Americans never wavered despite multiple urban riots and numerous antiwar demonstrations. Wattenberg worked on Hubert Humphrey's unsuccessful 1968 campaign and in 1970, again with Scammon, wrote "The Real Majority," arguing that the Democratic (or Republican) party could win only with the support of the median voter, personified by an archetypical housewife from Dayton.

Wattenberg's arguments did not convince his fellow Democrats, who nominated George McGovern and Jimmy Carter in 1972 and

in the character of American life, among others, Agresto argues that unless we fully appreciate the foundations of our liberty, we risk losing it.

The book also contains a wonderful compendium of foundational documents,

including the Declaration, the Constitution, the Bill of Rights and other Amendments, three of the most important Federalist Papers, Nos. 1, 10 and 51, and Abraham Lincoln's speech of July 1858 defending the principle that all men are created equal. It is a book that asks the right questions and points us to the right answers so that, in Lincoln's words,

"this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom — and that government of the people, by the people, for the people shall not perish from the

1976 while Wattenberg worked for the campaign of the hawkish liberal Henry "Scoop" Jackson. But he never lost faith in his fellow Americans.

When many writers depicted overpopulation as a looming problem, Wattenberg took the opposite view: the world needed more Americans. His immersion in statistics enabled him to appreciate before others the sharp decline in national and world birth rates. His responses included his books "The Good News Is the Bad News Is Wrong" (1984) and "The Birth Dearth" (1987).

For three decades Wattenberg was a scholar at the American Enterprise Institute (where I am a resident fellow) and for even longer he produced and appeared in television series, including "In Search of the Real America" and "Think Tank."

For Wattenberg the United States was, in the title of his 1991 book, "The First Universal Nation," and he proclaimed himself, echoing the 1840s phrase, a "neomanifest destinarian."

American liberalism has moved in different direc-

tions from these two sons of the Bronx, but Allen Weinstein and Ben Wattenberg embodied some of its historic virtues: patriotism, optimism, openness to dialogue and friendly but zestful argument. Legacies we all can learn from.

2011 Women's World Cup rematch dominated by USA.

Sunday night, millions tuned in to watch the 2015 Women's World Cup final game between the United

Japan. It was a rematch of the 2011 Women's World Cup Final. That game saw Japan win in penalty kicks. It was 2-2 after

regulation and overtime.

The United States completely destroyed Japan in a 5-2 victory. The USA had

four goals within the first 16 minutes of the game. The game scored a 15.2 rating in metered market result for Fox, according to Nielsen. That was a 77 percent rise compared to the 2011 final and it was the highest MM result for a soccer game on a single network in U.S. television history. The previous game at the helm? Yup, the 1999 Women's World Cup Final when the United States beat China for its first ever title.

If you take away the own goal snafu by Hope Solo, the United States only allowed two goals in the entire World Cup. That is an impressive feat. The only other goal scored was in the Australia game to open the tournament.

Being a casual soccer fan, it was hard to watch some of those defensive battles early on. Everyone in the media said, "just wait if the USA can find their offense it will be fun to watch." Boy I am sure glad I waited as that offense provided more fireworks in the first 16 minutes of the game than we saw just the day before on Saturday.

The three goals may not seem like a lot to casual fans, but it was the biggest margin of victory in a WWC Final ever. The United States also became the first team to win three WWC titles.

If you take a 90 minute soccer game and divide it by 15-16 minutes, that breaks it up to six segments. So in just one of the six segments, the USA scored four goals. Let's try to make a comparison for other sports.

Football -— The game is 60 minutes and divided into four, 15 minute quarters. Sixty divided by 15-16 is about 10 minutes. The comparison here would be a 28-0 score just ten minutes into the ball game, that is of course if the team scored a touchdown on every possession.

Baseball — The game is nine innings. If you divide the game's 54 outs by 15 you get 3.6. This means three outs would be made, one half inning, and a team would be batting in the bottom of the first inning. The score would be 4-0, if the team only knocked in single runs and that would be before any outs were even recorded in the team's first at-bat.

Basketball — The game is 48 minutes. Our same division would be 3.2, or just over three minutes into the first quarter. It would be a 12-0 run to begin the game if a team shot three pointers.

These comparisons should be taken with a grain of salt as I probably didn't even calculate right. but the point of the matter is how impressive that beginning was. In basketball, teams can come back from a 20 point deficit as late as the fourth quarter. In baseball, teams can come back from a 6-0 first inning deficit to win the game. In football, teams can come back from a 21 point deficit at halftime to win games. But in soccer, a one goal lead is huge, a

two goal lead is bigger, a three goal lead is pretty secure and a four goal lead is almost impossible to come

back from. Why is that the case in soccer when so many other sports can have big comebacks? That is because in soccer teams can play aggressively to score goals, but when they get a two goal or more lead they can sit back on the defensive and play aggressively on the defensive end. That is why it is so hard to score on teams when you are trailing.

Needless to say, it was a pretty impressive win anyway you slice it. The men's team is also improving rapidly and the game of soccer will continue to gain popularity in America as these teams continue to have success

I will be the first to admit that I used to be a soccer is dumb, boring sport person. Now I am turning that corner around.

Winning teams always help that and the American teams keep winning. Not only that, but the Pampa teams are showing some great success in recent years as well thanks to new coaches Joel Baker and Hugo Aguillon. I am excited to see how many more improvements come from those teams next season.

By the way, PHS is hosting soccer camp this week so head on out to the field between 9 and 11 a.m. for grades one through fifth. Then from 1 to 3 p.m. for grades sixth through nine.

# FIFA bans former 2018-2022 WCup inspector for 7 years

ZURICH (AP) — FIFA has banned the official it chose to inspoken to some media of conversations he had in 2010 with spect 2018 and 2022 World Cup hosting candidates for break-

Harold Mayne-Nicholls was suspended for seven years by FIFA's ethics committee which gave no reason in its decision published on Monday.

The former Chile football federation president has previously

Mayne-Nicholls was considering standing in the FIFA presidential election when his ethics case was reported last year.

Instead, he is barred "from taking part in any kind of footballrelated activity at national and international level for a period of seven years," the ethics panel said in a brief statement.

FIFA ethics judge Joachim Eckert chaired the panel which conducted a personal hearing for Mayne-Nicholls, who can appeal to FIFA and then the Court of Arbitration for Sport. Eckert's statement said "more detailed information will be

given after this final decision becomes effective."

Challenges to FIFA's appeals committee and subsequently to CAS typically take around one year.

Mayne-Nicholls was appointed by FIFA in 2010 to lead a six-member team evaluating the 2018-2022 World Cup bidders. All nine candidates were visited between July and September

In the technical report, Mayne-Nicholls flagged eventual winners Russia and Qatar as presenting the most risk to FIFA as potential host nations.

The FIFA executive committee largely ignored his report, and a FIFA-commissioned analysis of the commercial prospects for each bidder's World Cup project, in a December 2010 vote.

Mayne-Nicholls was voted out of office in Chile soon after completing his task for FIFA.



many reasons cited for Iowa State's lack of success in football was a stadium experience that often fell flat.

That shouldn't be much of an excuse

The Cyclones are in the final stages of a major renovation to the stadium's south end zone, part of a \$60 million expansion of Jack Trice Stadium that is set to be completed in late August.

"The south end zone project is something that's been discussed for 25 years," athletic director Chris Jorgensen said. 'So to finally see where we're less than 100 days away from seeing it in action,

everybody is really excited about that." The stadium's original design offered 1970s-style functionality. Adjoining double-decked grandstands were surrounded by a sea of parking lots perfectly positioned for tailgating.

The Cyclones are hoping this project will fix that.

The centerpiece of the new end zone will be a two-story club space, replacing a set of metal bleachers put in nearly 15 years ago. The facility will feature a glass-encased upper level with views of the field and multiple bars, accessible only to the 3,000 fans that purchase club

seats. Iowa State is hoping the club's facade will be a much cleaner look for both fans and the general public, since the road that borders the stadium serves as a de facto entrance for many heading to campus as well.

For Cruz and Huckmegachurch congregation in Georgia that God favors the United States but warning that the nation is on a perilous spiritual path because of actions like the Supreme Court decision legalizing same-sex marriage in all 50 states.

Huckabee, who enjoyed evangelical support on his way to winning eight states in his 2008 White House bid, called the ruling "radical" and "illegal."

"I want to serve notice that the Supreme Court is just the supreme of the court system that is one of the three equal branches of government," Huckabee told hundreds of members of Rock Springs Church in a rural area outside metro Atlanta. "It is not the supreme branch, and it most certainly is not the supreme being."

Cruz, the Texas senator, said a five-justice majority "ignored the text of the Constitution" and said the cascade of judicial and public support for same-sex marriage threatens religious liberty in America. He said he hopes the ruling "serves as a spark, to start a fire that becomes a raging inferno as the body of Christ stands up to defend the values that have built America.

Their appearance on Sunday at the megachurch about 50 miles south of downtown Atlanta is part of the early, concerted scramble for the conservative evangelicals who remain an important bloc of the GOP presidential electorate. Christian conservatives have long held considerable influence in Iowa, which hosts the first caucus of the primary season, and in South Carolina, home of the South's first primary a few weeks later.

Now, Georgia and several other Southern states get more frequent visits from presidential hopefuls ahead of the planned "SEC primary," named for the Southeastern Conference of college athletics. The March 1, 2016, vote falls after the traditional first four states and ahead of the usual "Super Tuesday" states.

Huckabee, whose 2008 wins included Iowa and Georgia, has called the Southern-dominated primary date "manna from heaven." But Cruz and others — Rick Santorum, Louisiana Gov. Bobby Jindal, retired neurosurgeon Ben Carson — are making hard runs for the same bloc of support.

But the minister is also a serious player in Republican politics, with many Georgia politicians, and now national ones, courting his public approval, if not his explicit endorse-

Tate told the assembly that Huckabee, as Arkansas governor, signed "a ban on partial-birth abortion," referring to the termination of late-term pregnancies. He hailed Cruz for "standing against the Democratic Party ... and even against the Republican Party.

# South Carolina lawmakers return for Confederate flag debate

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — The depth of support for bringing down the Confederate flag gets its first test in the South Carolina Legislature this week as lawmakers return to Columbia to come up with a specific plan.

Nikki Haley's budget vetoes and what to do with the rebel flag that has flown over some part of the Statehouse for more than 50 years.

Several bills have been filed, but details such as when to bring down the flag, whether to put another flag in its place and what kind of ceremony should mark the removal are not specified.

And if South Carolina takes any lesson from the 2000 debate that brought the Confederate flag off the Statehouse dome to its current location at a nearby monument to Confederate soldiers, it is that minor details can trip

The Senate will debate the flag bill first, and Sen. Larry Martin expects several amendments discussing whether to keep the flagpole and put a different flag on it. Suggestions have included the U.S. flag, the South Carolina flag and a flag that may have been flown by Confederate troops but doesn't have the same connections as the red banner with the blue cross and white stars.

"We're going to be about as thorough listening to folks as we can be," said Martin, a Republican, after walking out of the governor's office Monday morning. "But we need to get to a vote today."

The Senate opened its discussions on the flag with an vote. Debate was expected to last several hours.

The governor, business leaders, the Legislative Black regalia has created new support for removing the flag Caucus and civil rights leaders are against flying any flag that flew over the Confederacy.

"There is no good-looking Confederate flag. It all stands The General Assembly returns Monday to discuss Gov. for the same thing — secession," said Lonnie Randolph, president of the South Carolina chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

Outside the Statehouse, dozens of protesters began to arrive Monday morning. Some called for the flag to come down. Others, such as Nelson Waller in his rebel flag tie, said the state was giving in to Northern liberals and civil

Waller carried a sign that read "Keep the flag. Dump Nikki!" Two decades ago, he carried a "Dump Beasley" sign after then-Gov. David Beasley made an unsuccessful attempt to get the Confederate flag off the Statehouse

A few years after Beasley's push and a round of stories that embarrassed the state's business community, a consensus emerged that South Carolina — the last state to fly a Confederate flag on its Capitol dome — needed to pull down the banner.

But 15 years ago, lawmakers spent months discussing whether to build a healing pool, display authentic flags in glass cases as a history lesson or include the Confederate flag in a circle of flags of historical significance. The compromise was reached a few weeks before the session

Some powerful Republicans have not said how they will vote. Senate Majority Leader Harvey Peeler has not taken a public position. Neither has House Speaker Jay

money with Confederate flag bumper stickers with the message "keep your hands off my flag." He also wants the state's voters to decide whether the flag is moved. "In South Carolina, we know what this flag symbol-

izes: resistance against a federal, centralized power that far overreached its constitutional limits.

It proudly symbolizes states' rights and constitutional liberties, which many have fought and died for," Bright wrote in a statement on his website.

But plenty of lawmakers who held their nose and accepted the 2000 compromise are not willing to make any deal this time, said Gerald Malloy, a Democrat who joined the Senate in 2002

Al-Selek's life changed forever that July 30.

The Israeli strike on his home in Gaza's Shijaiyah neighborhood, just along the border with Israel, came at the height of the fighting and was one of the deadliest single incidents during the entire conflict. Two AP reporters arrived in Shijaiyah after the final barrage of mortar strikes subsided, leaving a scene of carnage and bloodshed.

Gasping for air, Rajab lay among other victims, waiting for help. An AP reporter tied a tourniquet around his leg as water from a rooftop tank pierced by shrapnel pooled around them.

The smell of rust filled the air as blood mixed with petrol and dirt. The wounded cried out for help. Medics with stretchers struggled to navigate the uneven pavement, carrying out triage, selecting those who still had a chance and leaving those who were beyond help.

Rajab was taken to a hospital where he survived for five more days before he died of his wounds. "People were coming to stay here, saying this is

a safe neighborhood," Bilal said. "But for months after the strike, the spirit of the community was At the al-Selek home, the rabbit cages have since

been replaced on the roof but the shrapnel marks on the walls have yet to be covered. A poster with the faces of the 10 al-Selek's family members who died welcomes visitors into the narrow street.

Al-Selek is still struggling to start a new life. For the first six months, he barely slept. He sold his other apartment in Gaza City and moved into his father's bedroom in the Shijaiyah family home.

His once solid frame is now sapped, his muscles thetic leg he was given is too heavy for him, he says, preferring to make his way to and from work in his brother's computer shop on his squeaky

He seems resigned to his fate.
