Local veteran served two tours, met wife in Germany

Jeff Orvel Brewer, 88, Pampa, received a quilt of valor from Gail Nabors, Sue Bishop and Marilyn Shelton on July 4 of this year. Quilts of valor are meant to honor and comfort those touched by war.

"It comes as a surprise to me. I don't consider myself a hero," Brewer said. "I never was shot at or shot at anyone. Most World War II vets are around 100 and I just barely got in at the end of the war. I was in the Army for three months when the war ended.'

The Pampa News was grateful to be able to sit down and visit with Brewer in his home Wednesday. Brewer shared his story with us. He lived with his family in Mobeetie before heading into war.

Brewer was a high school dropout. The reasoning is much different than some of the reasons kids these days drop out. Brewer said his father couldn't find anyone to work his fields since they had all been drafted into the war. He helped his dad for six weeks but when he came back to school he just didn't get any of the material since he had missed so much.

He then worked at a service station and got interested in basketball and football. He said it wasn't too exciting since the coaches and nearly all men except the superintendent were drafted into the war. He did however attempt to go back to school again but became ineligible at the age of 18. (Back then you could no longer attend school when you turned 18). At that point is when Brewer said he decided to go enlist. He

State sales taxes drop, ending 62-month growth streak

Texas collected less state sales tax revenue in June than it did in the same month a year earlier, ending a remarkable 62-month streak of growth, Comptroller Glenn Hegar said Wednesday.

The state collected \$2.2 billion in state sales taxes in June, down 1.4 percent compared with June 2014. The figure reflects monthly sales made in May by businesses that report taxes monthly.

"This slight decline was expected due to the slowdown in the oil and gas mining sector, and is in line with the biennial revenue estimate presented in January," Hegar said in a statement. Texas rig counts recently concluded a six-

month nosedive as the industry has reeled from dropping oil prices. As of last Thursday, there were 363 oil and gas rigs across the state,

"I started out in a Jeep T Robinson Camp in Little but there was no heat in the Jeep," Brewer said. "I like to froze to death waiting on guys out in the cold so I got off the Jeep as soon as I could. I ended up driving almost every vehicle we had. I enjoyed that type of work."

Brewer said he spent one year overseas that tour and it was kind of relaxed work.

"I started home in 1947. All the trips were across the Atlantic Ocean so I made four total trips across it by ship," Brewer said. "On the way home there was a storm at sea and it made a sevenday trip turn into 13 days as there were rough seas."

Brewer said everytime he was coming home and saw the Statue of Liberty he knew he was almost home.

"We came back to Fort Dix, New Jersey (close to Trenton), and got discharged there," Brewer said. "I had \$300 and back then that was a lot of money. I gave a man \$75 to fly me and some other Texans back to Dallas. It was a cargo plane and there was no heat. It was my first airplane ride and I almost froze to death. After getting to Dallas I took a bus back

home.' When Brewer came back he was a civilian for three years. He worked on the farm some but got tired of that. He helped with the cattle and eventually sold his cattle and bought a car. After buying the car, he had no money left. He went to

Hillary and her roped media herd

Hillary Clinton's campaign again signaled its contempt for the press during a July 4 parade in New Hampshire. Aides brought out ropes to cordon off the

media. It was the perfect metaphor for a "news" media so cowered by their candidate that they would allow such a humiliating action.

The images lit up Twitter on the holiday, but their reaction — or lack thereof — tells you all you need to know about their journalistic pride.

The Clinton campaign treated this as a joke. Spokesman Nick Merrill issued a statement: "While the GOP may want to spin a good yarn on this,

let's not get tied up in knots.

Was he adding insult to injury? New York Times reporter Maggie Haberman was a notable complainer on Twitter, but the rope trick was buried in paragraph 10 of her story on Hillary's campaign stop. The Washington Post buried one mention in print. USA Today offered nothing. PBS had nothing. NPR had one sentence from Cokie Roberts. The AP had one throwaway line that the candidate was "separated by a long rope from the pack of journalists that followed.

Networks that noticed this insult thought the "optics" were bad, but they still led with their liberal empathy. Chuck Todd said he was "sympathetic" to her concerns about what he called the "media horde." NBC's Kelly O'Donnell explained "the rope made it easier for Clinton to be seen by voters and her supporters.'

But on ABC, George Stephanopoulos was disingenuous — again. He suggested "right now I think the Clinton campaign sees the press, in some ways, as their major opponent." Stephanopoulos is not a major opponent. He's a major donor to the Clinton Foundation.

Since she entered the national limelight in 1992, Hillary has enjoyed the sort of fawning and extremely deferential treatment any politician would sell his mother to achieve. So why her hostility to the press? Either Hillary has an extreme sense of entitlement, a deep paranoia, or both.

Bereavement and Healing A funeral director's most difficult call

A nursing home is by far the toughest place for me to pick up a decedent. The halls are not uncommonly narrow, neither are the

doorways. The physical aspects of accomplishing my job are not what make this call the most dreaded from those that I routinely receive. The difficulty of this call is the loneliness that is unconsciously written on the resident's faces

as I enter and exit the

building.

As I pass groups of residents watching television or sitting in social groups, they will reach out to me. Their faces light up as they mistakenly identify me as someone they recognize and love. The disappointment that replaces their elation as they realize I am not there to visit with them is excruciating and weighs heavy on my heart.

A number of weeks ago, I was called to a local nursing home where one of my clients had passed away. As usual, multiple residents mistakenly assumed that I was there to visit them. As always, my heart began to ache as I witnessed their disappointment. I saw their spirits spiral with anguish as they realized my purpose was not to visit them but to remove one of their own as death had claimed him.

My decedent's wife visited the funeral home last week to collect her husband's death certificates. We took a moment to visit, and I asked her how she and her daughters were

recovering from their recent loss. She expressed her loneliness and the difficulties of establishing a new routine without the companionship of her dear husband. Then she said the most amazing thing to me.

She said that although it will be difficult, she would begin returning to the nursing home to visit the residents there. Her heart was broken at the loss of her dear husband, but she has realized a new purpose in life. She has witnessed the pain of loneliness and will work to relieve the devastation it brings to one's heart, mind, and soul. She will dedicate her spare time to visiting residents who have been prematurely abandoned by their family and friends at the nursing home.

This bereft widow will channel her experience of loss and loneliness into helping others. She will endeavor to relieve their suffering while they await the arrival of death to relieve their painful sorrow of loneliness. I do not know why we abandon our loved ones once they have become residents within a nursing home. 

cookies at Christmas share momentary cheer. These people and many others visit and serve the elderly as they sit day after day within the confines of the nursing home. With all of their service and good acts of kindness, they cannot deliver the one thing that the residents stand in need of most - familial love and affection.

If you have a loved one residing in a nursing home, please take a moment and restructure your busy schedule. Allot 15 minutes each month to visit your dear loved one. Squeeze in a weekly visit if you can. Your reward will be infinitely more advantageous than anything you could ever accomplish within those few minutes anywhere else. The love and appreciation of a dying loved one will comfort you through even the worst experiences in life.

I know this because I see it almost every day. I now this because I feel it in my heart every time I go into a nursing home. I know this because I collect the dead after loneliness and isolation no longer rip their hearts out and rob them of the thing they desired most while living - familial love and affection.

Clinton was asked about San Francisco's refusal to hand over to Immigration and Customs Enforcement seven-time convicted felon and five-time deportee Juan Francisco Lopez-Sanchez. He stands accused in the fatal shooting of Kathryn Steinle as she took an evening stroll on Pier 14 last week. (After telling a local TV station he shot Steinle by accident, Lopez-Sanchez has pleaded not guilty to murder.) Clinton answered, "The city made a mistake not to deport someone that the federal government strongly felt should be deported. So I have absolutely no support for a city that ignores the strong evidence that should

be acted on." In a 2007 Democratic presidential debate, the late Tim Russert asked

Clinton if she would allow Francisco's sanctuary city sanctuary cities to disobey federal law. "Well, I don't think there is any choice,' she answered. Immigrants may not talk to police if "they think you're also going to be enforcing the immigration laws." She did not add a caveat that she wanted local law enforcement to work with immigration officials if the federal government had strong feelings that an individual should be deported.

In 2008, Clinton voted against an amendment to yank some federal funds from sanctuary cities. California Democratic Sens. Dianne Feinstein and Barbara Boxer voted likewise — but it didn't stop them from criticizing San Francisco for releasing a repeat offender.

"The 2008 budget amendment was a choice between sending a political message or funding California law enforcement, and I chose to fund the police," Feinstein explained in an email. "I continue to believe we can deport criminals who are undocumented and still support law enforcement.'

Perhaps Feinstein and Clinton are living back in 1985, when Feinstein was mayor and signed San

It was supposed to help immigrants seeking asylum from war-torn El Salvador and Guatemala. Four years later, the law was expanded to cover all immigrants. Then, in 2013, the Board of Supervisors passed an ordinance, signed by Mayor Ed Lee, that prohibits city law enforcement from releasing undocumented immigrants to ICE based on a detainer request alone. (There's an exception for recent violent felons, but Lopez-Sanchez did not

qualify.) Sanctuary City supporters cannot say they were not warned. Recently, ICE Director Sarah Saldana told a House committee that reduced cooperation from state and local governments "may increase the risk that dangerous criminals are returned to the streets, putting the public and our officers at greater risk.'

Rep. Mick Mulvaney, R-S.C., asked Saldana if it would help if Congress made it mandatory for local governments to cooperate with ICE — the sort of bill already rejected by Clinton, Feinstein and Boxer. "Thank you. Amen. Yes." Saldana answered

Then came blowback from the anti-enforcement community. Saldana released a statement that said such a law would be counterproductive and "lead to more resistance." You have to figure her reversal was on orders from the White House. Asked about Steinle's killing at a press conference this week, White House spokesman Josh Earnest blamed Republicans in Congress for blocking "common-sense immigration reform."

Where is the common sense in shielding repeat felons and border jumpers from the consequences of their crimes? There is no need to look outside the city: San Francisco screwed up. Sheriff Ross Mirkarimi, the Board of Supervisors and the mayor were so busy crowing about their pro-immigrant credentials, and refusing to differentiate between legal and undocumented, that they forgot voters elect them to keep their city safe.

New trial recommended for Texan imprisoned for wife's death

HOUSTON (AP) — A judge has Temple was killed when she inter-recommended a new trial for a rupted a burglary at the couple's Houston-area man sentenced to life in prison for the 1999 slaying of his pregnant wife.

In a 19-page opinion filed Wednesday, state District Judge Larry Gist of Beaumont cited repeated misconduct by Harris County prosecutor Kelly Siegler as having tainted the fairness of David Mark Temple's 2007 trial.

"The defendant has shown he was denied a fair trial because of the state's failure to disclose or timely disclose favorable evidence. And had that evidence been disclosed or disclosed timely, the results of the trial would have been different," Gist wrote.

The opinion brings the former high school football coach a step closer to a new trial in the Jan. 11, 1999, shotgun slaying of Katy High School teacher Belinda Lucas Temple, who was eight months' pregnant at the time. It recommends that the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals, which upheld Temple's conviction in 2013, grant him a new trial.

DeGuerin, had argued Belinda defended her handling of the case.

Gist noted that Siegler and DeGuerin "had a personal and contentious relationship and a professional battle of the highest degree." Also, Gist underscored a statement by Siegler at a December hearing on Temple's plea for a new trial, "that apparently favorable evidence did not need to be disclosed if the state did not believe it was true.

"I feel gratified the judge made the findings that he did, with the terrible misconduct of the handling of evidence before and during the trial," DeGuerin said. "I've always known that David Temple is innocent and was railroaded.

Siegler, who is now in private practice in Houston, did not return messages from The Associated Press seeking comment Wednes-Temple's trial attorney, Dick day. However, in the past, she has

Blue Bell to begin trial runs at Alabama plant

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — Blue Bell Creameries said Wednesday that it plans test production runs at its Alabama plant as the company inches toward putting its ice cream back on grocery store shelves.

Blue Bell notified Alabama health officials and the U.S. Food and Drug Administration of its plans for its plant in Sylacauga, Ala. The company shut down production and issued a national recall after the company's ice cream was linked to 10 listeria illnesses in four states, including three deaths in Kansas.

The Brenham, Texas-based company issued a statement saying the limited production runs will test the effectiveness of new procedures, facility enhancements and employee training. After the trial period, the company will begin building inventory to resume commercial sales.

"We are very excited about taking these important first steps as part of the process of getting high-quality Blue Bell products back to consumers,' Bridges said.

The company said there is not a firm date for the test production runs to begin or for the return of Blue Bell ice cream to the marketplace.

Listeria is a type of bacteria that can cause serious illness, particularly in older adults, pregnant women and those with weakened immune systems. The contaminated products have been found at the company's Texas and Oklahoma plants.

Tests found listeria on a plant catwalk at the Alabama factory, but not in the ice cream samples produced there, Alabama State Health Officer Don Williamson said.

Blue Bell entered into a voluntary "We have been working diligently to agreement with regulators on steps and changes to bring its ice cream back on the market.

Woman accused of immigrants legal scam in Texas, Louisiana

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A Texas woman has been accused of scamming immigrants in federal detention centers by pretending to represent attorneys.

Jessica Alva of San Antonio remains in custody facing three counts of wire fraud and two counts of aggravated identity theft. A grand jury in San Antonio on Wednesday indicted Alva, who was arrested last week in Sulphur, Louisiana.

Alva visited the South Louisiana Correctional Center in Basile and the La-Salle Detention Facility in Jena.

Investigators say Alva faxed forged letters to gain access to immigrants believed in the U.S. illegally. Prosecutors say Alva, who's not a lawyer, used the names of two attorneys she formerly worked for, offered legal help and asked immigrants to deposit money into her account.

Authorities didn't immediately provide information on a lawyer to speak for

Texas man fatally shoots intruder, then collapses, dies

ARLINGTON (AP) — Police say a North Texas homeowner collapsed and died after fatally shooting an intruder he found in his garage.

Arlington police say the resident heard suspicious noises late Wednesday

night and called 911.

Officers responding to a burglary-in-progress call arrived to find a wounded 24-year-old man, who was transported to a hospital and died. The Tarrant County Medical Examiner's Office on Thursday identified him as Destrey

Authorities say the 54-year-old homeowner was speaking with officers when he collapsed. The homeowner was taken to a hospital, where he also died. A coroner identified him as David Stephenson of Arlington. No cause of death was immediately listed.

Arlington police didn't immediately provide additional information Thursday.

in 1950 so I decided to enlist again. I was recruited in Pampa."

Brewer said since he had prior service that they promised him no basic training and that he could take his car up to Kansas.

"I had a nice car, a 1946 Plymouth Club Coupe. They messed up the orders and had me set to be on a bus. Eventually they re-cut the orders and I was able to take my car," Brewer said. "We went to Fort Riley, Kansas (by Manhattan) and were training for

He got a job with a training agency and was a supply clerk before that.

"I got the loudspeakers for outside classes, the ammo ready and anything else needed for training," Brewer said. "The first sergeants, company commanders and just about everyone was being snatched up for the war. I kept waiting for my time to come but I never got called to Korea."

Brewer said a bulletin came across his base saying the 28th Infantry Division (Pennslyvannia National Guard) was going overseas and didn't have enough people. They would take volunteers as long

and volunteered to go with them to Camp Atterbury (Edinburgh, Indiana)," Brewer said. "We were there for three days before we left on a ship to go overseas. I only knew one person there."

Brewer said they headed for Germany and when they got there they handed him an M1 Rifle and they began training

'We wallored in snow, ran hills and just were always going," Brewer said. "I was 24 years old now and much older than many of those there. I was promoted to sergeant there but I was tired of all the heavy training. I met a PFC from the batallion.

"He asked me how it was going and I said 'they are about to kill me.' His reply was that he could get me out."

Brewer said the 7th Army NCO Academy was needing a supply sergeant.

"I told him to do anything he could to get me out of there and he did," Brewer said. "They wanted to make an instructor out of me. It was another relaxed type of job. The school was for first three graders only. My job was to give them clean sheets and blankets?

He said there was time to play pool and mess around.

"Every week we took the laundry from Munich to

"I was a corporal at the time Brewer said. "I met a lady working there but she wasn't interested in anyone because she had a boyfriend soldier."

He said they took a bus trip on Sundays.

"July 4, 1952 I met a lady at a restaurant by the lake. She was with her sister on a bus trip as well. Her sister talked to me and asked if I would like to meet her sister," Brewer said. "I met her and I was very impressed with her. She was beautiful. I ended up ditching my bus trip and rode back home with them."

Brewer said he asked if he could see her again and she told him to come see her. "I gave her \$2 which was a lot back then and told her to meet again at the train station in Munich the next Sunday,' Brewer said. "I almost didn't go back thinking she wasn't going to show up but I had some friends going so I decided to go and just see if she would show up.

Brewer said they were having a drink and a beautiful lady in a black dress walked

"I said there she is! She showed up," Brewer said. We spent the afternoon on our first date at the Munich

'We dated for quite awhile after that. Most of the time it was taking her and her sister to the movies. Sometimes I bought them popcorn and

they loved that. They watched and I slept.

They were Germans watching an English movie so they didn't understand a lot of it but they still liked to go."

Brewer said that winter he bought an engagement ring to propose to Rosa (his wife of 62 years come October). "One problem we had

was the American Consulate didn't want Americans marrying Germans. She had to get checked out to make sure she wasn't a Nazi and I had to fill out a lot of paperwork and spend a lot of money,' Brewer said. "The problem is they kept losing the stuff. The rule is that you must get married at least six months before your departure back to the states. That didn't happen with all the paperwork going missing."

August of 1953 is when he was slated to head home. He wanted to make the move back with her so they asked the Consulate what could be done. They told them that they couldn't marry here but they could get her home on a quota.

Brewer ended up coming home and was at Fort Sill near Lawton, Okla., before being discharged on Aug. 6, 1953.

'My older sister and her brother-in-law sponsored her to get her over here. A week after she arrived we got married in Mobeetie," Brewer

said. "She got back on Oct. ted by Sue Bishop regarding 24, 1953. We married on Oct. 31, 1953.

Rosa said she had no idea it was Halloween and Jeff just plain forgot about it so they married on Halloween. They will be married 62 years on Halloween this year.

"I am a believer and try to live a Christian life and love my neighbor," Brewer said. "I am just a guy that loved my country and my wife does,

Rosa said she flies her American flag everyday in her yard because she is grateful that God brought her over here. Rosa became an American citizen three years after moving to the states. "It's nice for them to do that

Now that everyone has popped their fireworks, hopefully safely, and finished their Fourth of July leftovers, it's time to shift gears back to sports.

So I will leave America's Pastime to my colleague, Zac, and I will turn my attention to the NFL.

Right now the NFL is in a lull because all of the players are on vacation or trying to get last minute deals finalized before heading into training camp.

The first teams of training camp are the Minnesota Vikings and Pittsburgh Steelers reporting on July 25. They report early because they are the Hall of Fame game participants. This years Hall of Fame game is 27 days away on August 9, by the way.

To countdown to the unofficial start of football season, each remaining Friday until the game I will break down a regional team's offseason.

In year one under rookie head coach Bill O' Brien, the Texans turned around a 2-14 season into a respectable 9-7 mark.

The Texans merely missed the playoffs by a tiebreaker rule.

With subpar quarterback play and a young receiving corp., the Texans leaned on a strong running game and defense last season.

Gone are Andre Johnson, Kendrick Lewis, D.J. Swearinger, Chris Myers and Brooks Reed.

That's two offensive starters, including a center, and three defensive start-

ers, including two safeties. They traded last season's "starting" quarterback Ryan Fitzpatrick and kept Ryan Mallett and brought in Brian Hoyer. Funny thing is, O'Brien, Hoyer and Mallett have all received Belchick-ian

They also brought in former Denver Broncos' safety Rahim Moore, another former Patriot Vince Wilfork and wide receiver Cecil Shorts III.

The Texans drafted corner Kevin Johnson out of Wake Forest and Arizona St. stand out wide receiver Jaelen Strong to play alongside DeAndre Hopkins, who had a fantastic rookie season in 2014.

For those wondering about last year's first overall pick, Jadaveon Clowney, O'Brien said last year that he expects Clowney to be ready for the start of the season.

As far as the schedule goes, the Texans start the season at home against "Captain Checkdown" Alex Smith and the Chiefs, travel to Carolina, home for Jameis Winston and the Buccaneers then on the road to Atlanta.

The Texans could easily go 3-1 during this stretch.

The Texans get their first crack at Andrew Luck and the Colts in Houston, then have a Florida road trip to Jacksonville and Miami, then home again for Tennessee and Marcus Mariota (if he wins the starting

I think they are a good match for Miami, but being the second game of a road trip, I give the Fins the edge. The Texans will probably go 2-2 in the stretch.

Following their bye week, the Texans get the prime time spotlight on Monday Night Football at Cincinnati, home for the Jets and the Saints, and travel up to Western New York to take on the Bills. This could be a rough stretch and the Texans will go 1-3.

The final quarter of the season begins at home against the defending Super Bowl champs New England, on the road to Indianapolis and Tennessee, then they close the season at home against the Jags. Another 2-2 stretch.

The Texans will need an upset against Indianapolis, Cincinnati, New England or Miami to push them above .500.

If they can steal a couple of wins, they could be a playoff team. But looking at it on paper, they should finish at least 8-8.
