## Local veteran was at Guantanamo Bay during Cuban Missile Crisis

If you asked David Cooper, 74, he would tell you he is not a war hero.

But, had one of the United States' most high pressure periods gone a different way, he very well could have been.

### The path to the Cuban Missile Crisis

Cooper was in the U.S. Navy from 1960-1964. Cooper was an aviation ordnance- men, which are the servicemen who are responsible for the maintenance of guns, bombs, torpedoes, rockets and missiles. This includes stowing, issuing and loading of munitions and small arms.

He came out of aviation ordinance school in Jacksonville, Fla., and shipped down to Guantanamo Bay about a year before the Cuban Missile Crisis.

Cooper was stationed at specifically Leeward Point at Guantanamo Bay.

"It's a small [base]," Cooper said. "It's just where we kept the fighter aircraft. A short runway and a hand full of men there. I lived on that peninsula."

This was during the Cold War when John F. Kennedy was the U.S. president and Nikita Khrushchev was the leader of the Soviet Union.

"It was a real time of uncertainty," Cooper said. "I was just in the wrong place at the wrong time (during the Cuban Missile Crisis)."

## Statewide gas price average is slightly higher

COPPELL — Drivers in Texas are now paying an average of \$2.58 for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That price is one cent more than last week and 90 cents less per gallon than last year. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in the Lone Star State, drivers in Dallas are paying the most on average at \$2.67 per gallon while drivers in Amarillo are paying the least at \$2.48 per gallon. Nationally, drivers are paying \$2.76, which

is one cent less than last week, 88 cents less than a year ago, and 18 cents more than the average in Texas.

Motorists paid the lowest price at the pump for Independence Day travel since 2010, saving 90 cents per gallon compared to the 2014 holiday. The national average price remained relatively steady over the past 30 days, despite regional fluctuations in price due to refinery issues. Pump prices remain considerably discounted year-over-year.

The direction of pump prices in

the near term is less than certain. Consumer demand for gasoline typically climbs during July and August, and the ability of supply to keep pace with growing demand can directly impact the price at the pump. Additionally, retail averages can also be impacted by Atlantic hurricanes or issues at refineries, both capable of limiting supply and putting upward pressure on prices for drivers. While these domestic factors could influence gas prices higher, the relatively low price of crude oil is expected to keep a ceiling on

the price at the pump compared to recent years. AAA still expects drivers to pay averages below \$3 per gallon for the rest of the year.

"Before heading out on a summer road trip make sure you check your tires, battery and perform other recommended maintenance routines as suggested by your vehicle's manufacturer," said AAA Texas/New Mexico Representative Doug Shupe. "By doing so, drivers will maximize their fuel efficiency and also prevent breakdowns on the side of the road."





We had it put on us and it became a threat."

Cooper added he and everyone else stationed at Guantanamo Bay weren't quite sure what their purpose was.

But he does remember being a part of some of the war game trainings.

One of the games included being in the plane towing the target that fighter pilots would use.

"It was an adventure for me. We were just kids," Cooper said.

"The old men were the pilots at 22-23 years old. We did that all for a year and were able to go to a lot of different islands."

Cooper and his fellow servicemen enjoyed doing this for about a year.

When the Cuban Missile Crisis came about, the U.S. government wasn't sure what the role of those stationed at GitMo would be.

"What our practical thinking was for us was to load napalm bombs," Cooper said. "It was the first time I had ever loaded napalm. So we loaded napalm bombs under the wings."

Cooper also remembers at GitMo the Cubans would fire their weapons in the vicinity of the men at Leeward Point, not trying to hit the U.S. soldiers, but to harass them.

After Cooper had been at Leeward Point for about a year, one day he and those stationed there noticed several Russian warships passing by carrying intercontinental ballistic missiles that Khrushchev wanted to put in Cuba.

"That certainly got our attention," Cooper said. "President Kennedy was on the TV. We jumped on that real quick and word quickly got out that we were witnessing all of these ships go by."

From where Cooper was standing on the cliff on the southern edge of Cuba, it happened just like the history books teach it.

"Kennedy told them it wasn't going to happen and he set up a blockade," Cooper said.

"These ships, we stood out there watch go along the southwest end of Cuba came back just a couple of hours later with their missiles loaded. We were shouting at them and cheering them on going back. Of course they were giving us obscenities."

Cooper remembers thinking about what could have happened.

"In nuclear war, you're thinking about the total devastation of it," Cooper said.

"It wasn't going to be an infantry thing. It wasn't going to be wiping out Cuba with a nuclear weapon because we probably would have wiped out part of Florida, too, who knows. We knew that."

Following the Cuban Missile Crisis, it was time for Cooper's next adventure.

**U.S.S. Saratoga**

In March 1963, Cooper was stationed to the aircraft carrier *U.S.S. Saratoga*, which immediately went on a Mediterranean Cruise near the Middle East.

"We stayed over seven months and came back," Cooper said. "What many people don't realize is that even in times of peace, you're still playing war games all of the time. Getting ready. Sharpening your knife, so to speak."

The ship had a real bad wreck on the flight deck coming back from Barcelona, Spain, that killed nine people.

"A plane came in at night, we don't know what caused it, but the pilot was 39 years old, a lieutenant commander," Cooper said.

"For some unknown reason, he didn't allow the other aircraft, which had already landed, to move out of the way. He just came right on and hit the flight deck and went right through that aircraft."

That was Cooper's first taste of death. He had missed the accident by 20 minutes. He had been on the flight deck a little earlier loading missiles and guns on the planes.

"It was an act of God, I'm telling you," Cooper said. "He was looking after me. We had a whole flight deck just covered in burning fuel. It was the first time in my life I realized how training pays off. Everybody knew what to do. Nobody was like, 'What do I do?'"

Despite the accident, serving on the *U.S.S. Saratoga* was Cooper's fondest memory from serving in the Navy.

"It was an adventure," Cooper said. "My favorite memory was when we went to a lot of countries. We went to Turkey and Spain. It's just like a job, you work all day on the ship and every Friday we'd pull into a port."

Cooper added that it was often a different port every Friday.

"A lot of fond memories," Cooper said. "I met a lot of interesting people. Couldn't speak the language and didn't need to. We got along fine."

Cooper said his favorite was the French Riviera.

"Mostly because I stood beach patrol at night, and there were a lot of girls," Cooper said jokingly.

**Since Cuban Missile Crisis**

Cooper came home in July of 1964.

When asked how he felt about John F. Kennedy, Cooper spoke fondly of the fallen president.

"He was a war hero, we all know the story of PT 109 and John F. Kennedy was run over by another ship," Cooper said.

Cooper remembers the Kennedy assassination during a time when his wife was visiting him in Florida.

"I was out driving around in Wayport, Fla., and we got the call on the radio," Cooper said.

"They called us back and all of the military was activated immediately."

This was because nobody knew anything about who assassinated Kennedy.

Over the Fourth of July weekend, Cooper was one of three men to receive a Quilt of Valor made by Gail Nabors, Sue Bishop and Marilyn Shelton.

"I have special place in my heart for this country," Cooper said.

"I'll be honest with you, I absolutely detest anybody that says anything bad about it. I have great love for these young men and women coming back that are maimed and for what they have done. It's as though I went on adventure and a vacation and they went to war."

Cooper added that he also has a lot of respect for the World War II veterans because they were his instructors.

Cooper said his brush with death bothered him for a couple years after it happened.

"It's pretty frightening (dealing with death and violence)," Cooper said.

"I had nightmares about it (the *Saratoga* plane crash) for a couple years but I got over it. I tried to work real hard. But that was the whole thing. I am not a hero and thank God I'm alive."

His advice to the younger guys going into the military, is "to hold on to your God and serve your country."

"God had a plan for me and my country called me," Cooper said. "I went because I loved America."

After his service, Cooper began working at Cabot Corporation in Pampa for 34 years and retired in 1997.

He and his wife of 53 years, Gail, have one grandchild, but lost their daughter at the age of 29.

# Defense in Colorado theater shooting trial rests its case

CENTENNIAL, Colo. (AP) — The defense in the Colorado theater shooting trial rested its case Friday after trying to show James Holmes was legally insane when he opened fire at a midnight movie and suffering from delusions that each person he killed would increase his self-worth. Holmes' public defenders ended their case after playing two silent surveillance videos of Holmes taken in the months following the attack. One showed him in his jail cell, running and slamming his head against the wall, falling backward and sitting down. The other, taken at a hospital, showed Holmes naked and tethered to a bed,

repeatedly trying to cover his head with a blanket and then a sheet. Uniformed officers and hospital workers pull them off and try to cover the lower half of Holmes' body with them. The decision to rest the case ended 10 weeks of often-gruesome testimony, with witnesses describing the bloody shooting scene and their own crippling wounds and attorneys probing psychiatrists about Holmes' mental condition. Judge Carlos A. Samour dismissed the jury until Tuesday, when closing arguments and a formal reading of jury instructions will be made. That's also when the judge will reveal the 12 jurors who will deliber-

ate the case and seven alternates who will report to the courthouse but have no contact with the others. Formal deliberations are expected to begin Wednesday morning, the judge said. Public defenders presented two weeks of testimony that featured a pair of psychiatrists who found that Holmes met the legal standard for insanity. Defense attorneys also highlighted his sometimes-bizarre behavior after the shooting, including playing with paper bags that were placed over his hands to preserve gunshot residue. Earlier in the trial, two court-appointed doctors testified for the prosecution

that Holmes knew the difference between right and wrong at the time of the killings and therefore was sane under Colorado law. From the start, Holmes' lawyers contended that he was in the grips of a psychotic episode when he killed 12 and wounded 70 at the Denver-area theater. Their task was to raise reasonable doubt about whether Holmes was sane and show he should not be held accountable for his actions because of his depleted mental state. In Colorado, prosecutors have the burden of proof in insanity cases. Most states and the federal system place that burden on defendants.

# Wreck on U.S. 287 kills Amarillo man

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) responded to a two-vehicle accident on July 9. At approximately 11 p.m., DPS received information of a major crash on U.S. Highway 287 in Potter County about one mile east of Amarillo. The preliminary investigation revealed that a 1988 Chevrolet Pickup driven by Carlos Maldonado, 56, of Amarillo, was turning south onto U.S. 287 from Parsley Road. Maldonado, who failed to yield the right of way,

pulled out in front of a 2003 Chevrolet Avalanche driven by Hugo Carillo Vaquera, 41, of Amarillo. Vaquera, who was traveling southbound on US 287 and wearing a seatbelt, collided with the vehicle driven by Maldonado. Vaquera was transported to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo in stable condition. Maldonado, who was not wearing a seatbelt, was also transported to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo where he died. Next of kin has been notified and the crash is still under investigation.

# Thornberry votes for education overhaul

■ Bill would empower States, local schools, and education officials.

WASHINGTON — U.S. Congressman Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon) voted yesterday in support of a bill that would return many of the decision-making responsibilities in education back to the states by reauthorizing and reforming the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, currently known as No Child Left Behind (NCLB). The Student Success Act, H.R. 5, passed the House by a vote of 218-213. The bill would remove one-size-fits-all federal education standards, eliminate a number of federal mandates, empower local schools and officials, and enhance school accountability. It gives local schools more flexibility in using the federal funds they receive for the district's indi-

vidual needs. "Bureaucrats in Washington cannot replace the first-hand experience and understanding that our local teachers and parents have of the needs of students throughout our area," said Thornberry. "Education standards should be determined by the individual states and school districts to ensure that the academic standards are best tailored to local schools and their students. Too often, Washington thinks it can and should dictate policy at all levels of government, and those policies often come at the expense of our communities and the American people." The Student Success Act improves K-12 education by: Returning responsibility for measuring student and school per-

formance to the states and school districts rather than using the current national system based on high stakes tests; Repealing more than 65 ineffective, duplicative, and unnecessary programs and replacing them with a Local Academic Flexible Grant for schools to better support students; Prohibiting the Secretary of Education from coercing states into adopting Common Core or any other common standards or assessments, as well as reining in the Secretary's regulatory authority; and Strengthening existing efforts to improve student performance among targeted student populations, including English learners and homeless children.

# Thornberry on army force reductions

**SUBMITTED BY THE OFFICE OF MAC THORNBERY**  
WASHINGTON - Rep. Mac Thornberry (R-TX), Chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, made the following statement on Army plans to reduce the force by 40,000 Soldiers. "People who believe the world is safer, that we can do with less defense spending and 40,000 fewer Soldiers, will take this as good news. I am not one of those people." Planned reductions in Army force levels have been public for some time and are a result of hundreds of billions of dollars in defense cuts since President Obama took office. During this time, Army end strength has been reduced from 556,000 to this new low of 450,000. Personnel reductions are one of the few places where the military can achieve the savings mandated by defense cuts in the time required. The House Armed Services Committee has consistently warned about the size and pace of reductions in both end strength and defense spending and the negative impact on the country's national security.

Before moving here to Texas, we lived in Indiana and enjoyed going over to the man-made Brookville Lake where the fireworks were synchronized to music. We also went to the local park near where we lived in Indiana, and the bangs were so loud that car alarms went off all over the area.

When we moved to Amarillo in 2011 there were no fireworks displays due to the extreme drought conditions.

We moved to Pampa in 2012, and various things have kept us away from the local celebration until this year. Unfortunately, as the pyrotechnics didn't start until 10 p.m., we old fogeys came home before it started, but I understand it was a great show, and free.

As I've mentioned here before, my husband is of Danish heritage. He is proud of the fact that many Danes in Denmark celebrate our Independence Day along with us at Rebild Park. Rebild National Park is the site of what is commonly believed to be the largest annual 4th of July celebration held outside the United States.

Since 1912, The Rebild National Park Society Inc., a Danish-American

## A coming era of civil disobedience?

The Oklahoma Supreme Court, in a 7-2 decision, has ordered a monument of the Ten Commandments removed from the Capitol.

Calling the Commandments "religious in nature and an integral part of the Jewish and Christian faiths," the court said the monument must go.

Gov. Mary Fallin has refused.

And Oklahoma lawmakers instead have filed legislation to let voters cut out of their constitution the specific article the justices invoked.

Some legislators want the justices impeached.

Fallin's action seems a harbinger of what is to come in America — an era of civil disobedience like the 1960s, where court orders are defied and laws ignored in the name of conscience and a higher law.

Only this time, the rebellion is likely to arise from the right.

Certainly, Americans are no strangers to lawbreaking. What else was our revolution but a rebellion to overthrow the centuries-old rule and law of king and Parliament, and establish our own?

U.S. Supreme Court decisions have been defied, and those who defied them lionized by modernity.

Thomas Jefferson freed all imprisoned under the Sedition act, including those convicted in court trials presided over by Supreme Court justices. Jefferson then declared the law dead.

Some Americans want to replace Andrew Jackson on the \$20 bill with Harriet Tubman, who, defying the Dred Scott decision and fugitive slave acts, led slaves to freedom on the Underground Railroad.

New England abolitionists backed the anti-slavery fanatic John Brown, who conducted the raid on Harpers Ferry that got him hanged but helped to precipitate a Civil War. That war was fought over whether 11 Southern states had the same right to break free of Mr. Lincoln's Union as the 13 colonies did to break free of George III's England.

Millions of Americans, with untroubled consciences, defied the Volstead Act, imbibed alcohol and brought an

end to Prohibition.

In the civil rights era, defying laws mandating segregation and ignoring court orders banning demonstrations became badges of honor.

Rosa Parks is a heroine because she refused to give up her seat on a Birmingham bus, despite the laws segregating public transit that relegated blacks to the "back of the bus."

In "Letter from Birmingham Jail," Dr. King, defending civil disobedience, cited Augustine — "an unjust law is no law at all" — and Aquinas who defined an unjust law as "a human law that is not rooted in eternal law and natural law."

Said King, "one has a moral responsibility to disobey unjust laws."

But who decides what is an "unjust law"?

If, for example, one believes that abortion is the killing of an unborn child and same-sex marriage is an abomination that violates "eternal law and natural law," do those who believe this not have a moral right if not a "moral responsibility to disobey such laws"?

Rosa Parks is celebrated.

But the pizza lady who said her Christian beliefs would not permit her to cater a same-sex wedding was declared a bigot.

And the LGBT crowd, crowing over its Supreme Court triumph, is writing legislation to make it a violation of federal civil rights law for that lady to refuse to cater that wedding.

But are people who celebrate the Stonewall riots in Greenwich Village as the Mount Sinai moment of their movement really standing on solid ground to demand that we all respect the Obergefell decision as holy writ?

And if cities, states or Congress enact laws that make it a crime not to rent to homosexuals, or to refuse services at celebrations of their unions, would not dissenting Christians stand on the same moral ground as Dr. King if they disobeyed those laws?

Already, some businesses have refused to comply with the Obamacare mandate to provide contraceptives and abortion-inducing drugs to their employees. Priests and pastors are going to refuse to perform same-sex marriages.

Churches and chapels will refuse to host them. Christian colleges and universities will deny married-couple facilities to homosexuals.

## What (little) you see of Hillary Clinton is what you'll get if she wins

It says something about Hillary Clinton's presidential campaign that it was big news that she submitted herself to an interview with a cable news journalist.

It also says something that the journalist selected for this honor, Brianna Keilar of CNN, was recently a guest at the wedding of the director of grassroots engagement for the Clinton campaign. Makes sense to hedge your risk.

To her credit, Keilar did ask some reasonably tough questions and even some follow-ups, before concluding the interview with questions about earth-shaking issues such as who should be on the \$10 bill and who is Saturday Night Live's best Hillary Clinton imitatrix.

But, oddly for a former secretary of state, there was nothing on foreign policy, despite the rise of the Islamic State in the Middle East, the nuclear negotiations with Iran, the failed reset with Russia and the Greek Euro crisis. Nothing on the Trans-Pacific trade deal, which Clinton advocated in the first Obama term and is waffling on now.

As one might expect from a candidate whose campaign keeps reporters back behind a moving rope line ("horrible, horrible" optics, says longtime Clinton adviser

Paul Begala), Clinton didn't provide much in the way of answers.

Will she call for increased tax rates, like Bernie Sanders, who is nipping at her heels in Iowa and New Hampshire polls? No answer. She promised to set out later her policies, which "will actually work in the short term, the medium term and the long term."

On immigration, she's still for a "comprehensive" reform that "includes a path to citizenship." But after the murder committed by an illegal immigrant who has been deported five times then was turned loose in San Francisco under its "sanctuary city" policy, Clinton did reverse her 2008 support of sanctuary cities and admitted that the city, where 83 percent of the population voted Obama in 2012, "made a mistake."

About her private email system, she repeated the improbable tale she told in the United Nations press conference in March — that there was nothing wrong about having a private email system; nothing wrong about deleting thousands of messages; people will eventually see the (unsearchable, edited by staff) 55,000 pages she turned over; she has never "had" a subpoena (actually she has).

Early in the interview, Keilar asked Clinton why most voters don't find her honest and trustworthy. Clinton repeated the

defense she and her husband have made since the 1990s: any charges are old news. The Clintons have been subjected to a "constant barrage of attacks," have endured "the same kind of onslaught" for "many, many years," and have been the subject of "books filled with unsubstantiated attacks." But "people should and do trust me."

This defense worked for Bill Clinton in 1996 when he was the incumbent president and most voters considered him competent and a near-majority voted to give him a second term. It's not clear whether it will work for Hillary Clinton in 2016, when she is not the incumbent and most voters are not so favorably inclined toward the policies of her party (and are so far largely bereft of knowledge about her own).

A political leader's strength is also his or her weakness. Bill Clinton is articulate — and slippery. George W. Bush is steadfast — and stubborn. Barack Obama is inspirational — and weak on details.

Most voters regard Clinton as dishonest and untrustworthy, but most also consider her a strong leader.

Behind this judgment I think is an appreciation of her strength, which is also her weakness. She is persistent — and shameless.

She slogs on, as she did for hopeless weeks in her 2008 campaign, despite

embarrassments that would make most people want to disappear from public view forever.

She makes brazen misstatements and assumes voters will consider her public virtues so manifest they justify overlooking all her evasions and prevarications.

She is still on track to win the Democratic nomination, even though her super PAC feels obliged to furnish volunteers with scripts to explain why they're excited about her.

Bernie Sanders is drawing enthusiastic crowds of white liberals but has little appeal to blacks, Hispanics and moderate whites. And about half of general election voters will favor the Democratic nominee over any Republican.

Her campaign tells us what the nation is in store for if she wins. As David Frum wrote in *The Atlantic*, "No one becomes more accessible, more forthcoming, more candid, more unentitled in office than as a candidate."

Laws will be passed to outlaw such practices as discrimination, and those laws, which the Christians believe violate eternal law and natural law, will, as Dr. King instructed, be disobeyed.

And the removal of tax exemptions will then be on the table.

If a family disagreed as broadly as we Americans do on issues so fundamental as right and wrong, good and evil, the family would fall apart, the couple would divorce, and the children would go their separate ways.

Something like that is happening in the country.

A secession of the heart has already taken place in America, and a secession, not of states, but of

people from one another, caused by divisions on social, moral, cultural, and political views and values, is taking place.

America is disuniting, Arthur Schlesinger Jr. wrote 25 years ago.

And for those who, when young, rejected the views, values and laws of Eisenhower's America, what makes them think that dissenting Americans in this post-Christian and anti-Christian era will accept their laws, beliefs, values? Why should they?

The founder of the Rebild National Park was a Danish-American who emigrated to the United States in 1881 and settled in Chicago.

In 1911, almost 200 acres of the hilly coun-

tryside were bought with funds raised by Danish Americans.

In 1912, the deed was presented to His Majesty King Christian X as a permanent memorial to Danish Americans.

From pictures I've seen, the fireworks display is pretty spectacular. Regardless of where we are or have been on July 4, we always fly our American flag proudly, watch "A Capitol Fourth" on PBS (I always eagerly await hearing the 1812 Overture with cannons!), we have summer food and we celebrate America's birthday.

# New national monuments coming in Texas, Cali., Nev.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mammoth bones, prehistoric rock carvings and more than a million acres of wilderness will be protected as part of three new national monuments that President Barack Obama is creating in California, Nevada and Texas.

The presidential move, announced by the White House early Friday, brings to 19 the number of monuments that the Obama has created or expanded since taking office. Environmental advocates hailed the new monuments as bringing sorely needed protection to natural American treasures, even as Republicans in Congress were pursuing legislation to stop the president.

In Texas, Obama is creating a monument at Waco Mammoth, a relatively small site in central Texas where archaeologists have discovered remains of 24 Columbian Mammoths — the largest of the mammoth species — from more than 65,000 years ago, the White House said. Like other mammoths, the Columbian Mammoth is now extinct, but roamed freely in North America during the Pleistocene epoch, known colloqui-

ally as the ice age. The site marks the only spot in the U.S. where a nursery herd of mammoths has been discovered, and is also home to preserved remains of other ancient species including the saber-toothed cat, dwarf antelope and the western camel.

Nevada's Basin and Range, home to rare rock art from 4,000 years ago, will also become a national monument. The White House said more than 700,000 acres of public land will be protected in an untouched area of the Great Basin region. In addition to petroglyphs, the site also contains "City," an array of abstract sculptures that artist Michael Heizer has worked on for more than four decades. The project evokes elements of Mesoamerican life, with ceremonial mounds interspersed with more modern architecture. Nevada Sen. Harry Reid, the Senate's top Democrat, has been pushing for years to protect the site and its surroundings. Tourists and nature lovers in California will see more than 330,000 acres in northern California set aside for a new monument at Berryessa Snow Mountain.

# Poll: Sandwich generation worried about own long-term care

WASHINGTON (AP) — Caught between kids and aging parents, the sandwich generation worries more than most Americans their age about how they'll afford their own care as they grow older, a new poll shows. But most aren't doing much to get ready.

Nearly 1 in 10 people age 40 and over are "sandwiched" — they're supporting a child while providing regular care for an older loved one, according to the poll by The Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research.

Another 8 percent may join the ranks of double-caregivers in the next five years, citing declining health of an older relative or close friend.

Dueling responsibilities can make some days feel like a tug-of-war.

"If my mom needs something badly, I get pulled away from my kids a lot," said Kamila Al-Najjar of Santa Rosa, California, a lawyer with two children and self-described health advocate for her mother. She visits her mother's assisted living facility at least twice a week and checks in daily by phone, to oversee a list of illnesses.

"You're dealing with someone who is aging, toward the end of their life; then you have to deal with a teenager. I hear from my mom and daughter that I'm a nag. There's no winning in it," she said.

Adding to the challenge, 40- and 50-somethings tend to be at the height of their careers — and need to hang onto their jobs despite difficulties of caregiving, said Susan Reinhard, who directs AARP's Public Policy Institute. Employer flexibility is a top issue as the population ages, she said.

"It's not just their own financial security, it's the financial security for their children and for the future," Reinhard said.

After age 65, government figures show nearly 7 in 10 Americans at some point will need long-term care — from a relative, home aide, assisted living or nursing home.

Yet the AP-NORC Center poll found overall, most Americans 40 and older — 54 percent — have done little or no planning to get ready for this often pricey reality. Only a third reports setting aside money for those needs. That's even though Medicare doesn't pay for the most common types of long-term care, and a nursing home can cost more than \$90,000 a year.

Drill down to the 9 percent of this age group who make up the sandwich generation, and their experience leaves them far more concerned about their own senior years.

About half worry about being able to pay for their future care needs or having to move into

a nursing home, compared with just over a third of other adults, the poll found. Also, 44 percent of sandwichers fear leaving debts to family, compared with 28 percent of others polled.

But the poll found the sandwich generation no more likely than other middle-aged adults to be planning and saving, possibly because of time or resources.

Al-Najjar is glad her mother "saved all her life ... so she didn't have to stress out about stuff like that." Caring for her has changed how she spends and plans for the future.

"It's like a wake-up call," she said. There are "a lot of seniors in the United States that don't have that money."

The squeeze isn't ending as children grow up. Among currently sandwiched parents, 29 percent have adult children living at home, the poll found; others are providing adult children with financial assistance, meaning some are sandwiched even after their children leave the nest.

Another challenge: Finding services to help seniors live out their days at home. AARP recently opened an online "livability index" to rank communities on such factors as accessible housing and transit options.

And the National Association for Area Agencies on Aging runs an Eldercare Locator — at

www.eldercare.gov and 1-800-677-1116 — to help people find local resources. Last year, the locator averaged more than 22,000 requests for assistance a month. A recent report found the top needs: transportation, mostly to get to doctor appointments; in-home services, such as meals and personal care; and finding affordable housing or making age-friendly home modifications.

"People don't generally make these calls until they're in crisis," said association CEO Sandy Markwood. "If mom and dad need this as they get older, you should prepare for that, too."

Carroll Burnett of Whitesboro, Texas, cared for his 88-year-old father, who'd suffered a stroke, for a year before he died in March.

"I felt good that I could take care of him," said Burnett, a retired tool and die maker who had help from his wife and one of his three grown children. But he's saving up: "I don't want any of my kids to go through what I did."

The AP-NORC Center survey was conducted by telephone April 7 to May 15 among a random national sample of 1,735 adults age 40 or older, with funding from the SCAN Foundation. Results for the full survey have a margin of sampling error of plus or minus 3.2 percentage points.

## Aiming fire at seedlings may be key to rangeland mesquite control

SUBMITTED BY TEXAS A&M AGRILIFE VERNON — Fire must be effectively managed to get the best control of mesquite seedlings, a Texas A&M AgriLife Research rangeland ecologist said.

Dr. Jim Ansley of Vernon recently published study results in "Rangeland Ecology and Management" journal that indicate both season and intensity are important factors in the mitigation of mesquite seedlings by fire.

"We know adult mesquite trees are fire resistant because they resprout following a fire," Ansley said. "We have determined that range managers might have a greater success of mesquite control with fire if their efforts are aimed at the seedlings."

In the study, mesquite seeds were planted in mid-grass and tall-grass plots in the spring and then burned in the winter at 10 or 22 months seedling age or in late summer when they were 17 months old.

He said summer fires were especially effective in the mid-grass fuels and yielded a higher death rate when the seedlings were 17 months old than did earlier winter fires when seedlings were 10 months old.

However, Ansley said, this same advantage of summer over winter fires is not seen in higher fuel load areas, such as those with tall-grass types. In that case, both seasons had a high death rate of trees after fire.

The air temperature was, of course, higher during summer fires, and this greatly increased fireline intensity on the mid-grass plots, but only slightly increased intensity on the tall-grass plots, he said.

Grass fuel amounts were similar for both winter and summer fires in the mid-grass plots, about 1,700 pounds per acre, and slightly higher in summer than winter in the tall-grass plots, 6,900 versus 5,950 pounds per acre.

"One of the most important conclusions was that there was a very close positive relationship between fireline intensity and seedling mortality, especially in winter fires," Ansley said. "So, conditions that yield high fire intensity such as higher fuel loads or summer burning will have the greatest effect on seedling mortality."

Summer fire in lower-grass fuel amounts may accomplish the same level of mesquite seedling mortality without the need for lengthy grazing deferral to accumulate sufficient grass fuel needed for a successful winter fire, he said.

The published paper shows a common scenario for controlling mesquite seedlings with fire. Typically, a drought year followed by a wet spring accelerates mesquite seed germination, Ansley said.

If the pasture remains ungrazed or lightly grazed, this would create the highest probability for a natural fire to occur within five to 20 months after mesquite seedling emergence.

"This is probably how mesquite was kept in check naturally before Europeans settled the region," he said. "The introduction of cattle and fire suppression disrupted this natural cycle and mesquite populations exploded."

Ansley said his results show a prescribed fire applied during this period, either in winter around February at about 10 months seedling age or in late summer at about 17 months age, reduced the number of surviving mesquite seedlings by 35-80 percent in mid-grass and over 75 percent in tall-grass stands. Mortality in winter fires in the mid-grass fuel type was never more than 35 percent, however.

"So you need either higher fuel or a summer fire to really be effective." Any removal of grass by livestock grazing during this period of high grass accumulation would obviously reduce the probability of higher fireline intensities during the brief window of time when seedlings would be vulnerable to a prescribed fire, Ansley said.

Certainly, he said, more research is needed to explore this critical window of mesquite seedling vulnerability.

## Iran talks at impasse amid bickering, extended for 3rd time

VIENNA (AP) — The Iran nuclear talks shifted Friday to a blame game, as Iran's foreign minister accused the United States of shifting its demands and dismissed a warning that the U.S. was ready to quit the negotiations.

Hours after his comments, Iranian Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif met again with

U.S. Secretary of State John Kerry for another attempt at resolving the differences standing in the way a landmark deal that offers Iran sanctions relief in exchange for long-term, verifiable curbs on nuclear programs that Tehran could use to make weapons.

Still, the sense of drift grew, along with expecta-

tions that the talks could continue through the weekend.

A senior U.S. official said the preliminary April deal that set up the present negotiations had been extended until Monday.

That effectively set a fourth target date for a final accord that initially was supposed to be sealed by June 30.

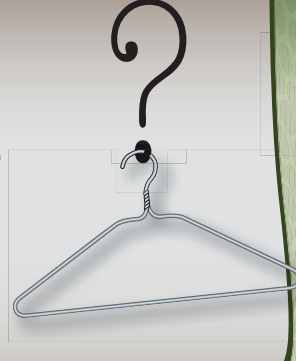

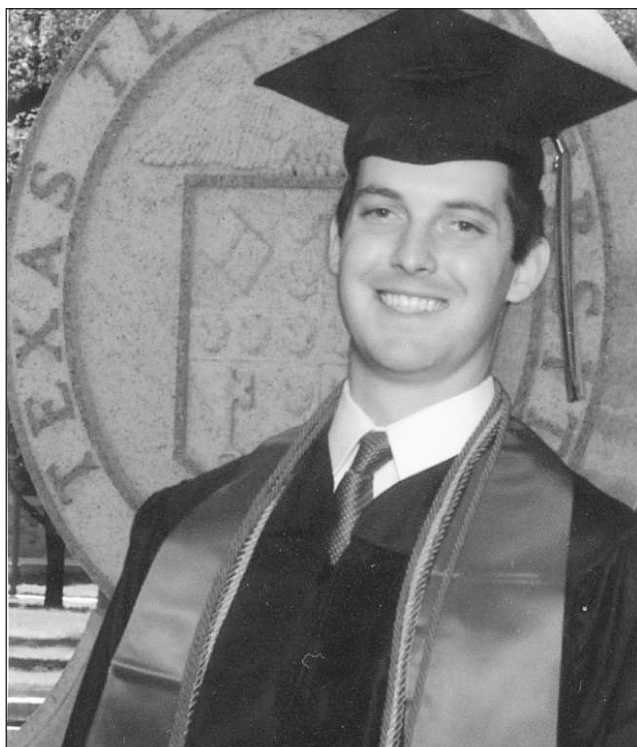

Internships were once exclusive to college students, but many organizations now offer internship opportunities to high schoolers as well.

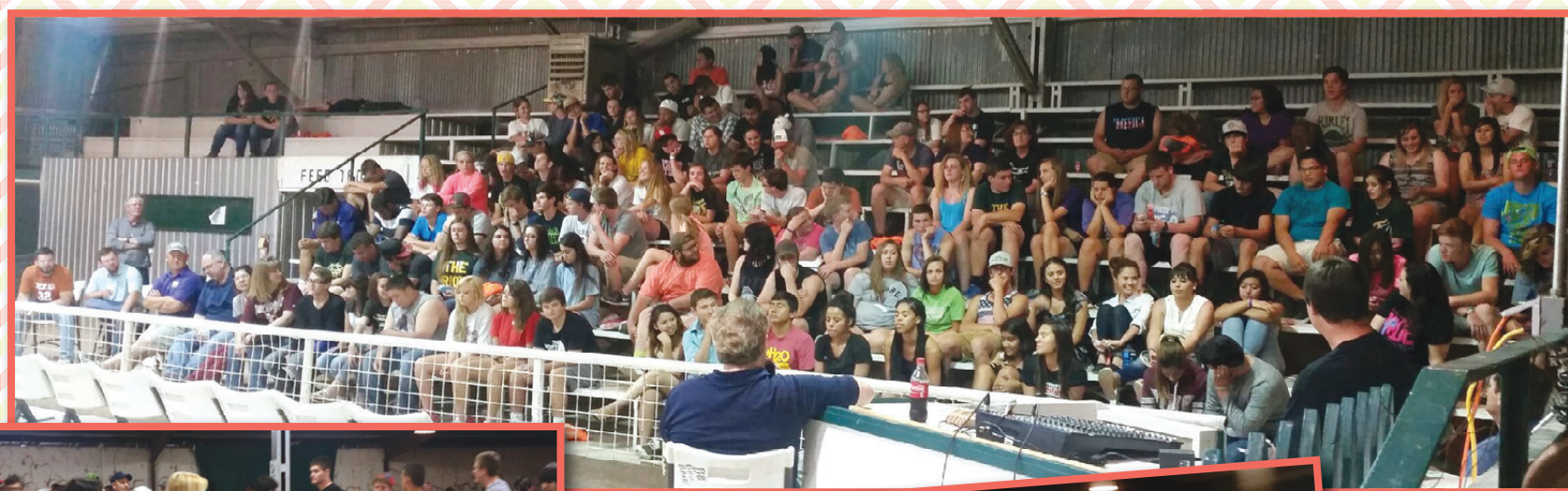

## Texting and driving a problem for more than just Texas

It can be frustrating that every time we look at the news there seems to be tragic story concerning another preventable accident caused by a distracted driver. But the likely culprit when it comes to driving distractions isn't alcohol, as many might assume, but something much more insidious: cell phones. In fact, there is a one in four probability that a motor vehicle crash will involve a mobile device in some way. In 2013 alone there were over 340,000 texting related crashes and the behavior continues to be a problem affecting communities across the United States.

Earlier this year, a bill that would have outlawed texting and driving throughout the state of Texas was derailed after failing to make it to a vote in the state Senate. The Dallas Morning News reports that the bill had been approved in the House but failed to garner the necessary votes to move forward. A similar bill was vetoed in 2011 by former Gov. Rick Perry and another texting and driving ban failed to make it to the governor's desk in 2013. Perry cited concerns dealing with enforcement and infringement of personal liberties among his

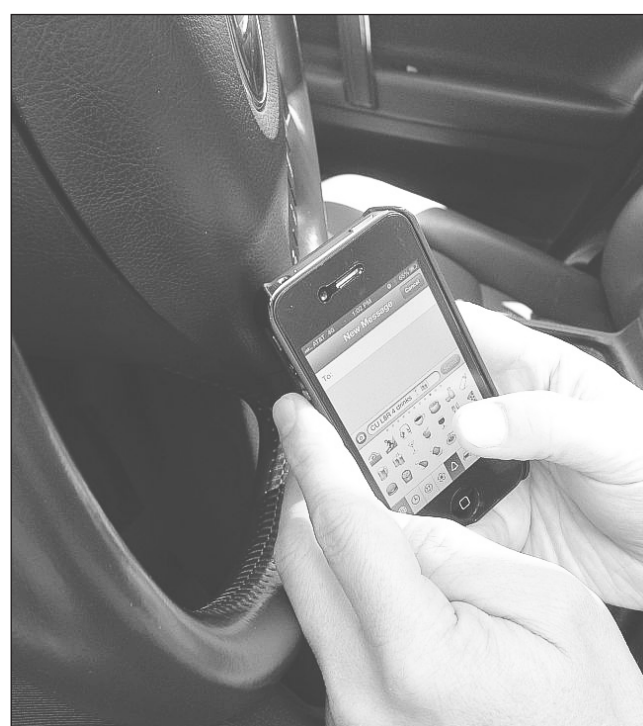
reasons for the veto. He referred to the bill as "a government effort to micromanage the behavior of adults."

The 2015 bill was also known as the Alex Brown Memorial Act. It was named for a 17-year-old student from West Texas who lost his life in a texting related accident in 2007. The proposed bill called for a complete ban of reading, writing or sending text messages unless stopped and outside of traffic lanes under penalty of a Class C misdemeanor and a \$200 fine for repeat offenders. A study quoted by Verizon Wireless claims that 57 percent of drivers between the ages of 21 and 24 send text messages and emails while behind the wheel, so it should come as no surprise that this is also the age group most at risk for this dangerous behavior and its consequences. The same study found that those texting while driving are 23 times more likely to be in an accident than those who are not distracted by mobile devices.

While Texas itself has yet to pass a statewide ban on the practice, there are still local laws prohibiting the use of mobile devices on the road. The Houston Chronicle has a list of 40 cities that have local ordi-

nances banning texting and driving that includes Austin, San Antonio, and Pampa. Austin was the first city to pass such legislation, adopting a ban across the city in 2009. According to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, 46 states and the District of Columbia have laws banning texting while driving.

Rep. Tom Craddick was a strong supporter of the texting ban for the Lone Star State and plans to continue to spearhead the movement for stronger laws. "I'll keep fighting for it. At that point, we may be the only state left pushing for it," Craddick said. It will be two years before the measure can be considered in the next legislative session in 2017.



## 10-foot alligator captured near downtown Fort Worth

**FORT WORTH (AP)** — A blind alligator stretching more than 10 feet has been removed from the Trinity River in a park near downtown Fort Worth and taken to a refuge.

Game wardens and a reptile hunter, Chris Stevens, used a noose to capture the male gator Thursday night at Riverside Park.

Stevens said the animal needed to be moved to ensure public safety.

"The problem is not the alligator — it's the people," he said. "Being in that high profile of a location, people are going to start feeding it, and anytime you have an alligator like this, it's just a matter of time before people

poke it."


Stevens took the 10-foot-2-inch alligator to a nature reserve. He said it was likely blind in both eyes.

Texas game wardens summoned Stevens to help catch the alligator after several reported sightings in recent weeks. Recent heavy rain and flooding

may have brought the animal to the area.

A man swimming in a Southeast Texas marina, Tommie Woodward, was killed July 3 by a 400-pound alligator.

That animal was shot and killed days later, with Woodward's remains still inside its stomach.

## LeBron signs 2-year contract with Cavaliers

CLEVELAND (AP) — The Cavaliers can exhale for another year. They've got LeBron James' signature on a contract.

The four-time MVP, who brought the Cavs back from irrelevancy to the brink of an NBA championship this season, signed his two-year, \$47 million deal on Friday. The commitment allows him to maintain financial flexibility and keeps pressure on Cleveland's front office to keep building.

The deal includes a player option for the 2016-17 season. He finalized the agreement shortly before hosting a private screening for a new movie in which he has a supporting role.

He's the unquestioned star with the Cavs, who are thrilled he'll be back and expect him to complete his career wearing wine and gold.

"LeBron's re-signing today is a reflection and continuation of his strong, personal commitment to help deliver championships to Northeast Ohio and Cavs fans everywhere," general manager David Griffin. "We share this deep level of commitment with him."

His impact upon this team, his community and the game are impossible to overstate and we look forward to continuing on our mission together."

James' signing comes a day before the one-year anniversary of his return to Cleveland after spending four seasons in Miami.

The 30-year-old has indicated he will

finish playing career with the Cavs, who went from being a lottery team to Eastern Conference champions in James' first season back.

James will likely opt out of his contract again next summer so he can cash in when the league's salary cap jumps thanks to a new \$24 billion TV deal.

James averaged 25.3 points, 7.4 assists and 6.0 rebounds in 69 regular-season games.

However, his biggest contributions may have come off the floor as his leadership helped instill a belief in a Cleveland team that dropped to the bottom of the league during the four years he was with the Heat.

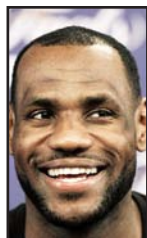
He scored in double figures in all 69 games, increasing his consecutive double-digit scoring streak to 641 — third-longest in history.

Despite missing 13 games — he sat out two weeks to rest a sore back and knee — he was one of just three players to amass 1,700 points, 500 assists, 400 rebounds and 100 steals.

The 11-time All-Star finished third in the MVP voting, a slight that seemed to motivate him during the postseason.

In 20 playoff games, he averaged 30.1 points, 11.3 rebounds and 8.5 assists, joining Hall of Famer Oscar Robertson as the only players to average at least 30, 11 and 8 in a postseason.

James saved his best for last, dominating the finals but failing to lead the Cavs to a championship as they were beaten in six games by the Golden State Warriors. James averaged 35.8 points, 13.3 rebounds and 8.8 assists in the six games, the best statistical performance in finals history.

## Spieth surges to 7-under 64 at John Deere Classic

SILVIS, Illinois (AP) — Jordan Spieth shot a 7-under 64 on Friday to move into contention at the John Deere Classic.

Spieth, who'll try for his third straight major title next week at the British Open, opened

the tournament Thursday with a par 71.

But Spieth rallied with four birdies in six holes and an eagle on Friday

to land safely above the projected cut line.

Spieth moved from back of the pack to a

tie for eighth by the end of his early round, although most of the leaders had yet to finish.

Spieth's first career win came at the John Deere Classic in 2013, when he was just 19.

## Federer beats Murray in three sets to reach 10th Wimbledon final

LONDON (AP) — Playing the kind of untouchable tennis that has brought him 17 Grand Slam titles, Roger Federer beat Andy Murray in straight sets Friday to reach his 10th Wimbledon final and put him within one victory of a record eighth championship at the All England Club.

Riding a dominant serve that produced 20 aces, keeping relentless pressure on Murray with his returns and breaking at the end of each set, Federer put on a supreme grass-court performance to outclass his British rival 7-5, 7-5, 6-4.

"I played so well on the biggest occasion today, and that's probably why I got it," Federer said. "Definitely one of the best matches I've played in my career."

The win sent Federer into his 26th Grand Slam final, where he will face defending champion Novak Djokovic in Sunday's championship match. The top-ranked Serb beat Richard Gasquet 7-6 (2), 6-4, 6-4 to advance to his fourth final in five years.

It will be a repeat of last year's final, won by Djokovic in five sets.

"Novak's been the best player for a few years now," Federer said. "He's made it extremely difficult for the guys to win big tournaments. ... I know how I can beat him, but this is a different occasion. We've been both been there before. I really hope I can get this one on Sunday."

Federer has a 20-19 career record against Djokovic, who is going for his third Wimbledon and ninth Grand Slam title.

"We all know how good he is," Djokovic said of Federer. "He's the greatest ever. There's not enough praises for what he does. This is where he loves to play. This is where he plays his best tennis."

Djokovic was twice treated by a trainer on his left shoulder near the end of the second set against Gasquet. He said he woke up with a stiff shoulder but said the ailment is not serious.

"It'll be fine for the next match," he said. Federer, who ran his record in Wimbledon semifinals to 10-0, is the oldest man to reach the final since Ken Rosewall finished runner-up in 1974 at the age of 39.

If he can beat Djokovic, Federer will become first man to win eight Wimbledon titles. In 2012, he tied Pete Sampras and 1880s player William Renshaw with seven.

"I need to keep it up for one more match to really make it the perfect couple of weeks," Federer said.

Federer extended his career record against Murray to 13-11, including 5-1 in Grand Slams.

This was the first time they've met here since 2012, when Federer beat Murray in the Wimbledon final and the Briton won in straight sets a few weeks later on Centre Court in the Olympic final.

"I don't know if it's the best I've played in a loss or not," Murray said Friday. "It's tough to know just now. But I definitely don't feel like I played a bad match."

If anyone thought the 33-year-old Federer was past his prime, this match against Murray dispelled any of those thoughts. The second-seeded Swiss served as well as he ever has, saving one break point in the opening game of the match and never facing another the rest of the way against one of the best returners in the game.

Federer won 70 of 91 points on serve and, after the first game, was taken to deuce only once on serve.

"Definitely it was one of my best serving days of my career," said Federer, who has been broken only once, by Gilles Simon in the quarterfinals, ending a streak of 116 service holds in a row going back to the warm-up tournament in Halle, Germany.

"That's definitely the best he served against me," Murray said.

Federer smacked untouchable serves of 125 mph, but also took off the pace and hit the lines with well-placed deliveries. At the same time, he flicked back Murray's 130 mph deliveries with quick reflex returns to keep his opponent guessing. When Murray put in second serves in the 80s, Federer stepped in and knocked off return winners.

"I kept the pressure up," said Federer, who piled up 56 winners and had only 11 unforced errors, compared to 35 and 17 for Murray.

The match featured a thrilling, 15-minute game near the end of the second set with Murray serving at 5-4 down.

Murray fell behind love-40, but saved a total of five set points as the game went to deuce seven times and included furious corner-to-corner rallies.

Murray finally held with a 129 mph ace.

But Federer held in the next game and then broke for the set.

## Paolini tests positive for cocaine at Tour de France

FOUGERES, France (AP) — This year's Tour de France was hit by its first doping case as Italian rider Luca Paolini was thrown out of the race on Friday after testing positive for cocaine during cycling's biggest event.

Cycling's governing body, the UCI, said in a statement that the 38-year-old Paolini, who rides for Russian team Katusha, was tested on July 7, the day of the fourth stage.

Paolini, who was a support rider for teammates Joaquim Rodriguez and Alexander Kristoff at the Tour, can request a "B" sample to be tested after he was notified "of an adverse analytical finding of cocaine," the UCI said.

In accordance with UCI anti-doping rules, Paolini could not immediately be reached for comment. Cocaine is among a class of stimulants whose use is banned

only in competition.

"The presence of cocaine has been detected in a sample," the team said. "Bearing in mind the anti-doping regulations, the team will wait until the analysis of the B sample has been conducted before taking any further action or making any further comment."

Paolini, who was 168th overall after Friday's seventh stage, 46 minutes and 41 seconds behind race leader Chris Froome, won the Gent-Wevelgem one-day classic earlier this season.

Katusha spokesman Philippe Maertens said Paolini "was shocked" when finding out about the result.

Tour de France director Christian Prudhomme could not immediately be reached for comment.

In March, the one-day classics specialist posted his first victory in nearly

two years after overcoming heavy wind and rain and conditions to win Gent-Wevelgem.

His previous victory came in May 2013 when he claimed a stage win at the Giro d'Italia.

During his career, he also secured podium-finishes at the world championships, in the Tour of Flanders and in Milano-San Remo.

The UCI and the French anti-doping agency are working together in handling the Tour de France testing program, which includes targeted controls.

On the eve of the race start in the Netherlands, questions were raised when Vincenzo Nibali's Astana teammate Lars Boom was allowed to start the race despite a low cortisol level, which can indicate cortisone doping but is not a conclusive proof of doping.
