Bouncin' Around



Pampa: a research hub last week

You may have wondered what in the world all those vehicles with funky instruments on them were doing in Pampa on Wednesday and Thursday of last week. They were part of a multi-million dollar research project called Plains Elevated Convection at Night. In lamens terms, they were researching nighttime thunderstorms and how they develop, specifically in the Midwest and Plains regions.

The Pampa News had the chance to speak with Dr. Robert Palmer, the executive director of Advanced Radar Research at the University of Oklahoma, as well as Jim Kurdzo, one of his PhD students that was actually out in the field with the project.

"It is difficult for us to predict nighttime thunderstorms. It was a six-week project that we spent driving across the Plains and stayed up until five or six in the morning each night," Kurdzo said. "We had 10 radar trucks and a number of other vehicles ourselves. Some of those included mobile mesonets and mobile sounding units (basically instruments that collect data such as temperature, dew point, wind speed, etc.)."

Kurdzo said after leaving Pampa, the group spent two days in Minnesota. He started to list off all of the states they spent time in before settling with "we went to almost every state in the Midwest and the Plains to study these thunderstorms."

Many organizations and universities have small projects every summer on their own but Kurdzo said this was a major project that happens once every decade or two.

How are these storms different? Well, supercells are low to the ground and surface based. Many times they form along the cold fronts and dry lines. Elevated storms form from a completely different aspect and Kurdzo said quite frankly they have no idea how they form.





Blue Bell: \$125M investment necessary to remain operational

BRENHAM, (AP) — Blue Bell's chief cuss financial matters or executive told sharehold- the ownership interests of ers this week that Texas individual shareholders," billionaire Sid Bass will lend the company up to \$125 million, and that the investment is essential for the popular ice-cream maker to remain in business, according to a published report.

Under the terms, the one-third stake in the company, struggling to recover after listeria contamination forced a crippling national recall in April, according to The Wall Street Journal, which reviewed the letter.

CEO and President Paul Kruse sent the letter to investors Monday saying Blue Bell Creameries was unable to raise enough capital from existoperational. So the company's board of directors opted to "work with a single source" who was able to provide the necessary financing, the newspaper reported.

Texas-based Blue Bell on Tuesday announced that Bass would become an investor, but no terms were revealed.

Bass, whose family has deep ties to Fort Worth, is an investor and philanthropist whose father and uncle built an oil fortune. Forbes last year ranked Bass as the 324th wealthiest person in the U.S.

He has not responded to from The Associated Press seeking comment.

In an email Friday, Blue Bell spokesman Joe Robertson declined to elabo-Journal's report.

> Kruse said in the letter that Bass' financing will allow Blue Bell, one of the top ice cream producers in the country, "to move forward to restart our production and sales effort.

In a separate letter to Bass family would get a shareholders in May, Kruse had sought additional financing from them to avoid recruiting an outside investor who he said could dilute existing shares, the WSJ reported. Kruse said the company faced "a financial crisis." That same month Blue Bell announced it was laying off 37 percent of its work force.

After issuing the recall ing shareholders to remain because of concerns about listeria, the company stopped production at its facilities in Brenham, Texas; Broken Arrow, Oklahoma; and Sylacauga, Arkansas. Its ice cream was linked to 10 listeria illnesses in four states, including three deaths in Kansas.

No date has been given for when Blue Bell products could be back in stores. Blue Bell last week announced plans to test production runs at its Alabama plant. After a trial period, the company plans to begin building inventory to resume commercial sales.

The president has said that the United States will be safer because of the nuclear deal his administration and five other nations fashioned with Iran. "Without a deal, we risk even more war in the Middle East,"

In 1938, British Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain signed a fourparty pact with Adolf Hitler allowing Nazi Germany to seize a portion of Czechoslovakia. Chamberlain returned from the Munich Conference, claiming "peace with honor. I believe it is peace for our time." But his Conservative Party rival Winston Churchill's words turned out to be more prophetic: "You were given the choice between war and dishonor. You chose dishonor, and vou will have war." In less than a year, the Nazis invaded Poland, and the British declared war on Germany. It is too soon to know exactly how events will unfold in the Middle East, but certain things are clear. There will be more nuclear weapons in the region because of this deal, not fewer. It isn't a matter of whether there will be war — there are already several wars ongoing in the region, wars in which Iran participates directly or through its proxies. The Iranian Revolutionary Guard's Quds Force is already on the ground in Iraq, our erstwhile ally in the fight against ISIS but, in the long run, a great threat to our interests. Iran is supporting the Assad regime in Syria and the rebels in Yemen and is the major sponsor of terrorism in the world. With the estimated \$100 billion in unfrozen assets soon to be available as Iran sanctions are lifted, more money will flow into wars where Iran hopes to expand its influence and ultimately create hegemony in the

Muslim world. But don't expect Saudi Arabia or other Sunni countries to sit idly by. The Saudis, rightly, do not trust Iran to keep its promises — and nothing in the agreement should increase their comfort. Saudi Arabia has little choice but to pursue its own nuclear program in the face of the likelihood that Iran will build a bomb, if not secretly during the term of the agreement, then soon

The Iranians aren't dismantling their nuclear program; they are simply putting on hold some elements — and even that cannot be assured. The verification regimen put in place by the agreement gives Iranians ample time to stall in order to move, hide or repurpose their weapons-creating capacity once notified that inspectors want to visit a site. The president promised 24/7 access to Iran's nuclear facilities in any deal his administration negotiated - he accepted in its place a plan that will give Iran 24 days before it allows inspectors in and a bureaucratic maze to get there. Of course, the country that is most endangered by this agreement is Israel. Our ally and the only democratic country in the region, Israel is small but powerful, with perhaps the best military in the world. Its people have already survived a Holocaust that destroyed one-third of the Jewish population, which ultimately led to the creation of the Jewish state. It has successfully defeated its neighbors' aggression and survived near constant threat of terrorism on its soil and against its co-religionists around the world. Does anyone really expect that Israel will stand by while Iran builds bombs and acquires missile systems that threaten its very existence?

The GOP's Iran Dilemma

From first reactions, it appears that Hill Republicans will be near unanimous



then vote to override PATRICK President

BUCHANAN Obama's veto of their

resolution. And if the GOP fails there, Gov. Scott Walker says his first act as president would be to kill the deal.

But before the party commits to abrogating the Iran deal in 2017, the GOP should consider whether it would be committing suicide in 2016.

For even if Congress votes to deny Obama

authority to lift U.S. sanctions on Iran, the U.S. will vote to lift sanctions in the U.N. Security Council. And Britain, France, Germany, Russia and China, all parties to the deal, will also lift sanctions.

A Congressional vote to kill the Iran deal would thus leave the U.S. isolated, its government humiliated, unable to comply with the pledges its own secretary of state negotiated. Would Americans cheer the GOP for leaving the United States with egg all over its face?

And if Congress refuses to honor the agreement, but Iran complies with all its terms, who among our friends and allies would stand with an obdurate America then?

Israel would applaud, the Saudis perhaps, but who

else?

And as foreign companies raced to Iran, and U.S. companies were told to stay out, what would GOP presidential candidates tell the business community?

Would the party campaign in 2016 on a pledge to get tough and impose new sanctions? "Coercive diplomacy," The Wall Street Journal calls it.

If so, what more would they demand that Iran do? And what would they threaten Iran with, if she replied: We signed a deal. We will honor it. But we will make no new concessions under U.S. threat.

Would we bomb Iran? Would we go to war? Not only would Americans divide on any such action, the world would unite against us.

And would a Republican

president really bomb an Iran that was scrupulously honoring the terms of the John Kerry deal? What would we bomb? All the known Iran nuclear facilities will be crawling with U.N. inspectors.

"Either the issue of Iran obtaining a nuclear weapons is resolved diplomatically through negotiation or it's resolved through force," said the president, "Those are the options."

Is that not pretty much where we are at, even if the GOP does not like it?

Republicans seem to be unable to grasp the changes that have taken place in this century.

With the Arab Spring, the fall of half a dozen regimes, the rise of al-Qaida and ISIS, civil wars

Remarkable. Iran agrees not to build a bomb it had already decided not to build, and we agree to lift all sanctions. And they pulled it off.

What is one or two atom bombs you can't use, without committing national suicide, compared to \$100 billion in freed assets and a welcome mat back to the community of nations.

form. We are hoping by this research we can predict them better in the future,' Kurdzo said. "Many times these storms happen at night while people are sleeping. We are hoping in the future we can warn of storms with 100 mph that will hit during the night, before someone goes to bed.'

Kurdzo added these storms can be even more dangerous than tornadoes sometimes.

"They happen at night so people don't really think much about them. They can be very severe, cause a lot of damage and travel hundreds of miles," Kurdzo said. "We got all the universities together with one common goal; to get the warnings out sooner to save lives and property. We had 12 different organizations and a lot of logistics went into it. There were at least 30 different instruments on at least 30 vehicles. We had 25-30 investigators. These

both the operational forecasting and in climate models.

Why is it important to study nighttime storms?

PECAN is driven in large part by poor prediction of these large-scale, severe and hazardous thunderstorms, known as Mesoscale Convective Systems (MCSs) that often occur at night. There is a considerable gap in our knowledge about the dynamical mechanisms that initiate, organize and maintain this convection. These storms have significant impact on the region's hydrology, energy, agriculture and public safety. PECAN research will positively influence the nation's forecasting and weather prediction capabilities through collaborative efforts between researchers and NOAA's National Severe Storms Laboratory.

The effort is highly relevant to National Weather Service's goal to assess the increasing dependence of storm-scale prediction on numerical modeling, as in the Warn on Forecast Initiative. This initiative has a goal to increase the lead-time of ac-



were the main mission scientists. All of us were working together as colleagues for one common goal."

It was a very interesting sight to see in Pampa those two days last week. Hopefully, this research will lead to a better handle and forecast of these nighttime thunderstorms.

More about PECAN

All information following here, came from the Earth Observing Laboratory website.

The Plains Elevated Convection at Night (PECAN) campaign is designed to increase the understanding of severe thunderstorms at night over the continental United States and involves eight research laboratories and 14 universities, both national and international. PECAN will be conducted across northern Oklahoma, central Kansas and into south-central Nebraska from June to July and is funded by the National Science Foundation (NSF), the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) and the Department of Energy (DOE)

PECAN will focus on nighttime convection in conditions with strong low-level winds and a stable layer near the surface with the largest instability located aloft. The findings should be applicable to other continental regions with strong nighttime thunderstorms.

curate tornado, severe thunderstorm and flash flood warnings to reduce the loss of life, injury and damage to the economy. Nocturnal convection, in particular, endangers public safety as significant flash floods in the eastern two-thirds of the U.S. usually occur at night. The data from this project will also assist in developing and applying space-based remote sensing, weather prediction and climate modeling.

While PECAN will initially focus on observational analyses, idealized modeling, and high-resolution simulations, we are confident that the advances in knowledge about the initiation, organization, maintenance and evolution will benefit both weather forecast models and climate models

What are nighttime thunderstorms?

Nocturnal convection is nighttime thunderstorms. The prediction skill for nocturnal convective storms is lacking. Not only is it difficult to forecast the location and timing of nighttime storm formation, it is also difficult to forecast the evolution of the storms into mesoscale convective system (MCS). An MCS is a series or cluster of thunderstorms that organize into a large-scale system that typically persists for several hours or more. MCSs may become severe and can produce injuries or fatalities through torrential rains, flash floods, high winds, hail, intense electrical storms and even tornadoes.

What kind of platforms and instruments were used?

The PECAN campaign calls for a wide range of more than 100 platforms and instruments to profile the atmosphere and make detailed observations of temperature, pressure, humidity, wind speed and direction.

A unique aspect of the experimental design is the integration of a wide variety of profiling systems into a fixed and mobile PECAN Integrated Sounding Array (PISA) including water vapor Differ-

Three research aircraft will also be deployed to make higher altitude observations, including the NSF/University of Wyoming King Air, the NASA DC-8 that will probe the pre-convective environment, and the NOAA P-3 that will observe the dynamical and microphysical characteristics of MCSs.

Is data only collected at night?

Much of the fixed instrumentation of PECAN can operate autonomously and will therefore be collecting data continuously day and night. The mobile instrumentation requires experienced personnel



ential Absorption Lidars (DIAL), Doppler and will be operated only during PECAN lidars, Raman water vapor lidars, multichannel microwave radiometers, infrared spectrometers, and acoustic systems. Each PISA will be highly complementary in their capability to profile wind, temperature, water vapor, and aerosols. PECAN will deploy balloon-borne radiosonde soundings at discrete locations to complement others from the National Weather Service and Department of Energy sites.

To improve prediction of nocturnal convection that will be useful to improving

Does this benefit other areas in the world?

While the study is aimed at the Great Plains of the U.S., the long-term implications of PECAN are that the findings will have important relevance for other regions with similarities in the behavior of convection. Relevant regions include southern Canada, the Sahel/Savanna belt of northern Africa, Asia, Africa, Europe, S. America and Australia.

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35,000 gallons of oil spills after Montana train derailment

BILLINGS, Mont. (AP) — Three tank cars leaked an estimated 35,000 gallons of oil after a train hauling crude from North Dakota derailed in rural northeastern Montana, the latest in a series of wrecks raising concerns across the U.S. and Canada, authorities said Friday.

No one was reported injured in the accident Thursday night that temporarily led to the evacuation of some homes and followed recent oil train crashes including a 2013 derailment in Quebec that exploded and killed 47 people.

A hazardous-materials team contained the spill with earthen dams, and oil did not affect any waterways, according to a preliminary report by Michael Turnbull of the U.S. Department of Transportation to Montana's Public Service Commission.

Unlike many prior accidents, no explosions or fire were reported after the Burlington Northern Santa Fe train derailed about 5 miles east of the small town of Culbertson, near the North Dakota border.

But about 30 people were evacuated from their homes within a half-mile radius, Turnbull said. That order was lifted Friday morning.

There was no immediate explanation of what caused more than 20 cars to topple from the train, which had 106 loaded crude oil tank cars, two buffer cars and four locomotives. The tank cars typically haul about 30,000 gallons of oil apiece.

Two days ago, a BNSF train carrying a mixed cargo derailed about 20 miles away from Thursday's accident, damaging about a mile of track. There was no connection between the derailments, railroad spokesman Matt Jones said.

The latest accident knocked over a power line, and firefighters planned to spray foam on the wreckage to prevent a fire, Roosevelt County Chief Deputy Sheriff Corey Reum said.

"We're lucky it didn't ignite," Reum said. Under a rule enacted in April, oil being shipped from North Dakota must be treated to reduce the chances of an explosion — by removing some of the volatile gases found in crude from the region. It was not immediately known if the shipment involved in Thursday's accident had gone through that process.

It forced the closure of U.S. Highway 2, the region's main artery, which was expected to stay shut through much of Friday, Reum said.

Investigators from the Federal Railroad Administration were on site, agency spokesman Michael Booth said, along with police and other responders. BNSF's response crews arrived late Thursday.

Roosevelt County is situated along one of the main corridors for Bakken oil shipments bound for refineries on the West Coast. About 12 BNSF oil trains a week pass through the county, according to information submitted by the railroad to state emergency officials.

U.S. transportation officials recently extended an order for railroads to notify states about shipments of hazardous crude-oil shipments and put in place new rules that require sturdier construction of tank cars hauling hazardous liquids. Critics have said the rules do not do enough to keep cars on the tracks and prevent derailments.

In addition to the 2013 Quebec accident, in which much of the town of Lac-Megantic was incinerated, trains hauling crude from the Bakken region of North Dakota and Montana have been involved in fiery derailments in Alabama, Illinois, Virginia, Oklahoma and North Dakota.

Every team in the American League reached the All-Star break with a .450 winning percentage or higher. It's the first time an entire league did that since 1944, according to STATS, and many rosters that season were depleted of stars because of World War II.

"It's fantastic to see," Pittsburgh pitcher Gerrit Cole said. "All the teams at .500 all think they're going to finish over .500, and all the teams that are over .500, and even us, we're always fretting, looking behind our back.'

Boston headed to the All-Star break in last place yet just 6 1/2games from first — only the second time since division play began in 1969 the AL East spread was that close. The first-to-last gap has been that narrow in any division just nine times overall in the expansion era, STATS said.

"We're at the bottom of the barrel right now, but we're not that far out," Red Sox All-Star Brock Holt said. "It's just about going out and taking care of our business, and the standings will kind of take care of themselves towards the end of the year.
