## Harvester Stadium construction on track for Sept. 11

The Pampa Harvester football stadium has been under construction since right after graduation. Recent rains have affected the construction progress some, but athletic director Greg Poynor is optimistic that construction will be complete in time for the team's first home game, Sept. 11. "I think it's (rain) affected it a little bit," Poynor said. "From the time they actually got started, (after they gutted everything), there's a lot going on out there. I've noticed them working a lot on Saturdays and even late at night. I can see they are making a lot of progress, a lot of headway." All of the projects except a couple are in progress right now Poynor said. None have been completed at this time. The hump removal in front of the home stands has not been started, nor has the addition of the handrails in the stands. "It's going to be tight (making deadline) on a lot of things," Poynor said. "But I feel like the bathrooms, the concessions stand, the ADA stuff.....I think those things will be ready for our first home varsity football game, Sept. 11." 



# Prosecutors spent \$462,000 on Aaron Hernandez prosecution

FALL RIVER, Mass. (AP) — The investigation and murder trial of former New England Patriots player Aaron Hernandez cost prosecutors nearly half a million dollars, a spokesman said Friday.

Hernandez was convicted in April of first-degree murder for shooting Odin Lloyd in 2013. Lloyd was dating the sister of Hernandez's fiancée, and the motive for the killing remains unclear. At the time of the murder, the star tight end had a \$40 million contract with the Patriots.

The Bristol County district attorney's office spent \$360,462.30 on overtime for state police and \$101,834.64 for expenses such as experts and travel, for a total of just over \$462,000, spokesman Gregg Miliote said.

The tally does not include what the office spent for salaried employees who worked on the prosecution. The trial lasted more than three months, including jury selection and deliberations, and three prosecutors and several other staffers were in court for the duration.

"It would be impossible to quantify man hours of prosecutors and staff," Miliote wrote in an email.

The amount also does not account for the work of local police departments or the county sheriff's office, he said.

It's unclear how much money Hernandez has spent on his defense. He had a legal team of three lawyers, James Sultan, Charles Rankin and Michael Fee. They did not immediately return emails seeking comment.

Lloyd was shot to death in a deserted area of an industrial park near Hernandez's home in North Attleborough. Two other men are also charged with the killing but have yet to go on trial. Ernest Wallace and Carlos Ortiz have both pleaded not guilty.

Hernandez, a native of Bristol, Connecticut, was sentenced to life in prison without the possibility of parole, but his legal woes are far from over. His lawyers have said he plans to appeal the verdict.

In addition, Hernandez still faces two murder charges in Boston, where he is accused of gunning down two men after an encounter inside a nightclub in 2012. Hernandez has pleaded not guilty.

### BLM: Idaho cyclist sparks fire by burning used toilet paper

BOISE, Idaho (AP) — Authorities say a cyclist started a 73-acre wildfire in southwest Idaho by lighting his toilet paper on fire after taking a comfort break.

U.S. Bureau of Land Management officials say the cyclist stopped to defecate in a ravine in the Boise foothills on Wednesday afternoon. The man then lit the toilet paper on fire but lost control of the embers in the dry grass while trying to extinguishing the waste.

Firefighters contained the flames several hours later.

Investigators say the man contacted them Thursday morning and his story matched the evidence found at the scene.

The BLM did not release the name of the cyclist. However, officials say he will be fined for causing the fire.

## Bouncin' Around Grandparents

On these hot summer days when I can't work outside in the yard and gardens, I recently started going through old photographs. Both my brothers moved out when I was 10 and 14 respectively, so I ended up with all the family photos. I've been sorting through them, and taking little jaunts in my memory, looking at pictures of my grandparents.

My father's parents, whom I called "Mimi" and "Daddo" when I was small, spent a number of years in Japan, where my grandfather worked for the government after World War II. They returned to the U.S. after I was born, but my grandfather suffered a severe stroke on the ship. I never knew him as he was before the stroke, and I'm afraid my only memories of him were a very ill-tempered man who had no patience with small children. My grandmother, a very tiny lady,

tried to make up for my grandfather's shortcomings, and I suspect she also felt bad about the fact that my father, her son, had deserted us when I was seven.

Mimi and Daddo lived near us in California, and Mimi would take me shopping for frilly dresses, or out to lunch somewhere, and she always let me buy something fun like a doll or a book. Grandfather passed away when I was about eleven, but Grandmother lived well into her 90's, and got to meet her great-granddaughter, our daughter. Her mother, my great-grandmother Lillian, lived until about the age of 100, and I only met her briefly when I was an adult.

My maternal grandparents, whom I called Gram and Grampy, also lived near us. They lived in a small second-floor apartment, and I can remember sleeping in their Murphy bed—the kind of bed that folds down from the wall—and pretending to be asleep while they were watching wrestling on their tiny television. Sometimes Gram and I would take the streetcar

or the Red Car in downtown Los Angeles to the hardware store where Grampy worked, and ride home with him in their car.

Grampy died when I was about seven and Gram came to live with us. Already in her 60's then, she had no idea how to deal with my brothers and me, especially since my oldest brother was already a teenager. She did insist on complete obedience, and she enforced that with whatever she happened to be holding in her hand. One time it was a milk bottle which my brother had left the little paper cap on when the bottle was empty. Another time she chased me around the house with a broom, cornering me in the bathroom.

Gram lived into her 80's, and died a few months before our daughter was born. I asked Ron for some of his grandparent memories, and he remembers his Grandma Smith who worked as a housekeeper, and used to have Ron over to lunch once a week at the home where she worked.

Recently, I was eating lunch with my husband and kids at Subway.



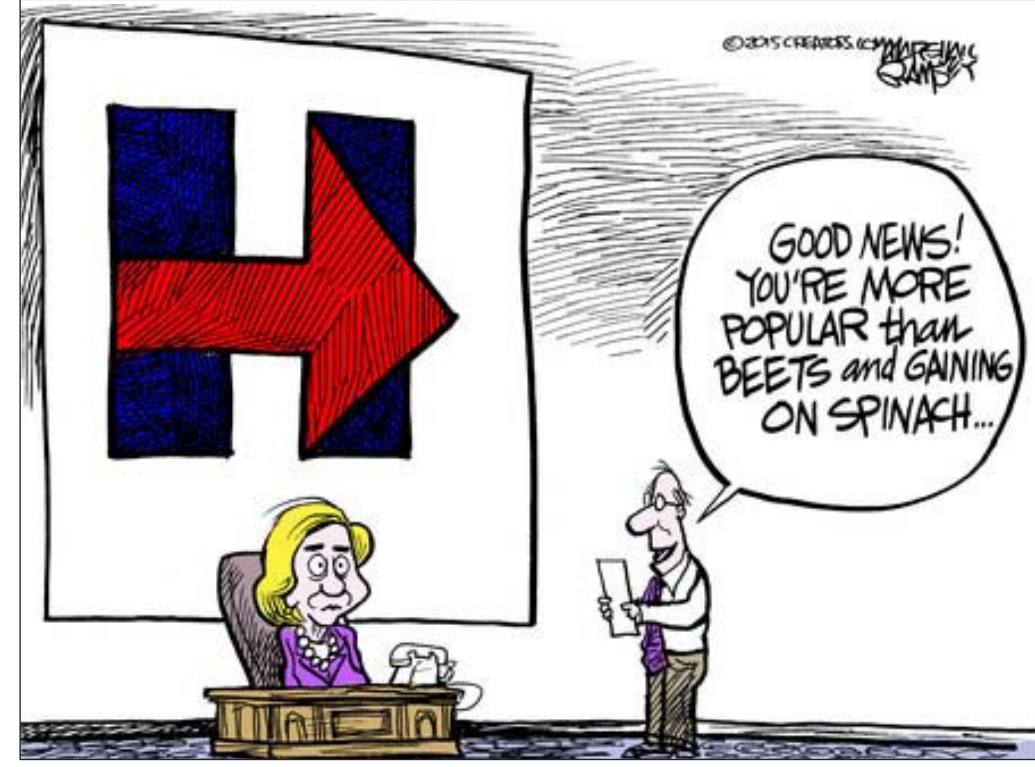

But remind your children how serious it is to walk off and to make sure that someone knows where they've gone. Our signal now is if daddy's not paying attention it's okay to give him a little pinch. Sometimes it's hard to hear their tiny voice, but I don't take my eyes off of them now. I will do my best to never feel that scary feeling again.

## Increasingly Divided Democrats Causing Problems for Their Party

America's two major political parties have a difficult task: amassing a 51 percent coalition in a nation that has always been — not just now, but from the beginning — regionally, religiously, racially and ethnically

diverse. George W. Bush's Republicans in 2006 and 2008 were not able to hold together the 51 percent coalition that re-elected him in 2004. Barack Obama's Democrats in 2014 were not able to hold together the 51 percent coalition that re-elected him in 2012.

And, while the media and the voters are transfixed by the antics of Donald Trump, and speculating on possible damage to Republicans, Democrats are having some trouble holding their coalition together in the run-up to 2016.

That trouble was apparent at last weekend's Netroots Nation conference. Martin O'Malley, the former Maryland governor whose candidacy has made few ripples so far, was faced with "Black Lives Matter" protesters. His response, one that almost all Americans would agree with: "Black lives matter. White lives matter. All lives matter." At which point he was booed off the stage.

Similar treatment was

given to Bernie Sanders, the Vermont senator who's been challenging Hillary Clinton's lead in polls in heavily white Iowa and New Hampshire. Sanders emphasizes economic issues — single payer health care, a 90 percent top income tax rate — but he appeals primarily to gentry liberals.

"It would be a terrible mistake for the progressive movement to split into a 'black lives matter' movement and an 'economic justice' movement," laments Clinton administration Secretary of Labor Robert Reich. But the fact is that the different priorities of gentry liberals and black activists, two heavily Democratic constituencies, are sparking heated arguments.

There may be some heated arguments as well over how to respond to the recently released videos of high-ranking Planned Parenthood officials discussing the sale of fetal body parts. The blithe statements that fetus's bodies should be crushed in ways preserving the option of selling livers, hearts and lungs for \$30 to \$100 strikes many as grisly.

Some liberals have rushed to Planned Parenthood's defense. The videos were taped by abortion opponents operating under false pretenses, they say, as if that made them inauthentic. And they deny that the fetal parts are sold at a profit (which is illegal) though the officials seem unconcerned about the possibility that their fees

will exceed expenses. The 2012 Obama campaign appealed to single women by suggesting that without Obamacare's contraception mandate, contraceptives would somehow be unavailable — a favorable way to frame the abortion issue.

But the Planned Parenthood videos are, in the words of Democratic columnist Kirsten Powers, "stomach-turning stuff."

Most mainstream media outlets are carefully avoiding the subject, as The Federalist's Mollie Hemingway points out. The New York Times and Washington Post ran 773 stories on the Confederate flag over the last month but only 31 on the Planned Parenthood video. Heavily pro-choice newsrooms have no appetite to discredit the nation's leading abortion provider, but may be forced to as members of Congress hold hearings and propose legislation.

Then there is the issue of sanctuary cities, highlighted by the murder on July 1 of Kathryn Steinle by a five-times-deported illegal immigrant whom the San Francisco sheriff set free rather than turn over to federal authorities.

Democrats have defended sanctuary city policies by arguing that illegal immigrants won't cooperate with law enforcement if they're afraid of being deported. But, for some, the San Francisco murder was too much. House Minority Whip Steny Hoyer, with evident sincerity, decried San Francisco's action.

So, perhaps more tactically, did Hillary Clinton.

But some Hispanic leaders and liberal city officials defend sanctuary cities' policies. And so, as congressional Republicans press the issue, Democrats are likely to be split.

It is natural for a party's wingers — right-wing Republicans or left-wing Democrats — to be restive near the end of their party's president's second term. They take his accomplishments for granted and lament goals not achieved. Barack Obama's increasingly leftward lurch has encouraged the party's left wingers to angrily air their views, often in terms unappealing to those outside their narrow groups.

The result is tension between the party's major constituencies and highlighting of positions unpopular with the larger general electorate. Shouting down speakers who say "all lives matter" is not popular. Neither is the sale of fetal organs. Nor are sanctuary cities.

Republicans certainly have their problems, not all of them labeled Trump. But so do the increasingly divided Democrats.

describe, as she sipped wine and tasted a salad, how she harvests the organs of aborted babies for sale to select customers. "Yesterday was the first time ... people wanted lungs," said Nucatola, "Some people want lower extremities, too, which, that's simple. ...

"I'd say a lot of people want liver. ... We've been very good at getting heart, lung, liver, because we know that, so I'm not gonna crush that part, I'm gonna basically crush below, I'm gonna crush above, and I'm gonna see if I can get it all intact."

Nucatola is describing how an unborn baby should be killed and cut up to preserve its most valuable or-

gans for sale by its butchers. Welcome to God's Country, 2015.

Planned Parenthood's image — a progressive organization that provides free birth control to women who seek to space pregnancies as they plan their families — will not easily survive these tapes.

For Nucatola sounds as though she were reading from a film script about a 1940s clinic in Nazi Germany devoted to the disposal of "useless eaters" in the Third Reich.

Watching these tapes, one name comes to mind: Mengele.

Defenders of Planned Parenthood argue that those who taped Nucatola did so surreptitiously, and they misrepresented themselves as buyers from a human biologics company. Moreover, the tapes were deceptively edited and the women undergoing abortions had agreed to donate the organs of their dead fetuses for biomedical research.

Perhaps. But even if all of that is true, the tapes have thrown the "pro-abortion rights" movement in America onto the defensive and

brought calls for complete Congressional defunding of a Planned Parenthood that receives \$500 million yearly from taxpayers.

Set aside the legality of what Nucatola describes. Do Americans want hundreds of millions of tax dollars provided to an organization that harvests and sells the body parts of aborted babies as a potentially lucrative sideline business? Do Americans want to be associated in any way with an organization with the moral mindset exhibited by Nucatola?

That Americans were stunned by those tapes is undeniable. People are not faking their moral revulsion. Indeed, "pro-abortion rights" Democrats are hiding in the weeds because they rightly sense that the disgust is widespread and genuine.

Yet there are questions raised by what these tapes reveal that apply to all of us.

Were we really in the dark? Were we unaware that 55 million unborn have been killed since Roe, many by such crushing methods as described by Nucatola?

Is the Black Lives Matter movement unaware that the execution rate of babies in the womb is highest among African-American women? However many black men or boys are killed in clashes with cops each year, it is not one-tenth of 1 percent of the black babies aborted in the USA?

Did we think that these abortions were almost all painless, like some sick pet being put to sleep, euthanized? Did we not know that the abortionist stabs the baby in the womb, or tears it to pieces coming out? And the more developed the baby, the greater the pain and the suffering and the bloodier the inescapable death?

But if one believes an unborn baby is not a human being, not a human life, why object to selling its body

parts?

Trash haulers and garbage men find uses for what they pick up. Scrap metal collectors find folks who want to buy it. Conservation they call it. Why would we think that abortionists, who regard fetuses as human tissue, not human beings, were any different?

We have long known and praised family members of the victims in auto accidents who volunteer the organs of their loved ones to save or extend the lives of others.

What makes this tape so different, so appalling, is that, at some level, there a sense in all of us, which ideological indoctrination cannot wholly suppress, that, morally, something terrible is happening here.

Listening to that Planned Parenthood woman discourse casually on the hearts, livers, lungs and lower extremities, we know something else. While the women undergoing the abortions at Planned Parenthood may have volunteered those body parts, the butchered children had no say in the decision to be torn to pieces and have their organs put up for sale to a laboratory that was the highest bidder.

Speaking after the fall of France, at the beginning of the Battle of Britain, Winston Churchill said, "But if we fail, then the whole world ... including all that we have known and cared for, will sink into the abyss of a new Dark Age made more sinister, and perhaps more protracted, by the lights of perverted science."

Those phrases, "perverted science," and "a new Dark Age," do they not fairly describe our future if the views and values of Nucatola's Planned Parenthood are the future of America and her people?

# American Airlines beats 2Q profit forecasts

FORT WORTH (AP) — Dramatically cheaper jet fuel helped American Airlines nearly double its second-quarter profit to \$1.7 billion despite lower revenue.

The world's biggest airline said Friday that it was American's most profitable quarter ever, after excluding one-time costs and gains.

Friday's results from American capped an astonishing earnings season for the nation's biggest airlines, several of which reported record profits in the April-through-June period.

Still, American warned that a key revenue figure will decline in the third quarter, and the stock fell in late-morning trading.

Investors worry that cheaper fuel is tempting the airlines to grow too fast, leading to lower prices after five straight years in which airfares rose faster than inflation. American doesn't disclose average fares, but a key figure shows that passengers paid less per mile in the second quarter than they did last summer, and a top American executive said that trend could continue into the second half of next year.

American's message to investors Friday was, don't be fixated on revenue per seat.

"Our largest cost has fallen 50 percent" since last summer, said CEO Doug Parker. "The revenues haven't fallen

nearly as much as the costs have fallen, and as a result earnings are growing."

American's fuel bill dropped by more than \$1 billion — a 37 percent savings — compared with the same quarter last year.

That helped American Airlines Group Inc. report net income of \$2.41 per share. Adjusted profit, which excludes one-time costs, was \$2.62 per share, topping the \$2.58-per-share forecast from nine analysts surveyed by Zacks Investment Research.

Revenue fell 5 percent to \$10.83 billion, a sharper drop than Wall Street expected. Seven analysts surveyed by Zacks had forecast \$10.93 billion.

The company, which owns US Airways and several regional airlines, reported that passengers paid 6.1 percent less per mile than they did in the second quarter of 2014.

American said that revenue for each seat flown one mile will drop by between 6 and 8 percent in the third quarter. That's a closely watched figure in the airline business, and airline President Scott Kirby said it's reasonable to expect it to decline until the second half of 2016. United, Delta and Southwest have also predicted the figure will drop in the July-through-September quarter compared with 2014.

# Drunk man who jumped in lake to avoid rescuers sent to trial

LEVITTOWN, Pa. (AP) — A district judge says a drunken-driving suspect who ran naked from a hospital and jumped into an eastern Pennsylvania lake must stand trial for disorderly conduct and other charges.

The defense attorney for 29-year-old Gregory Morten, of New Hope, argued Thursday that his client was so drunk and mentally disturbed that he couldn't think clearly and didn't intend to disturb the public or endanger rangers

at Core Creek Park in Middletown.

Morten was arrested June 6 because police say his blood-alcohol content was more than four times the legal limit after a car crash. He's still awaiting a hearing on the drunken driving and related charges.

That's when he ran from St. Mary Medical Center and jumped into the lake where he kept authorities at bay by swimming around, sometimes underwater, for about an hour.

will be really close to ready by then.

"The press box will be close, but it will be usable no matter what," Poynor said. "As part of ADA it is required for them to add an elevator. I went and looked today (Tuesday) and they were working on that."

The press box is going to be completely redone on the inside. Poynor said it started by gutting the whole thing.

"We moved some of the rooms. The middle of it is going to be open and a film deck for us so nobody has to go on top of the pressbox like before," Poynor said. "We reconfigured a little bit of who's going to be where, like the radio, media and coaches. A lot of the stuff in there was 50-70 years old. It's going to look at a lot nicer and be way more functional."

There will be new windows added as well as heating and air conditioning in the press box. They will also add the elevator and re-skin the outside of it for a new look.

"Everything that was in there now will be in there again," Poynor said. "Some rooms will be a little smaller. Some of the other rooms will be a little bit bigger. It's a very similar plan except the open in the middle for the film deck."

Poynor then talked about the humps. He said they will be completely removed to become ADA compliant.

"They won't bring them back. I envision what they are going to do is make it look a lot like the visitor side with a ramp on the end and a walkway across the entire length of the stands," Poynor said. "The neat thing about it is they are going to skirt it at the bottom. That will be a green band and cap it with a gold top and it will look really, really nice."

Poynor said the seating will change a little bit, but not a lot, due to the railings being added.

"It shouldn't be too much longer before they get started on the humps and railings," Poynor said.

The old concessions stand has been completely gutted and has been redone with the new plumbing already. They will also be painting the outside of what will now be the restrooms.

"That was one of the things I heard the most from people is 'when are you going to redo those bathrooms, they're horrible,'" Poynor said. "Hopefully people will be proud of those bathrooms and what we've got there."

On the visitors side, the bathrooms will be redone to be made handicap accessible.

The new concessions stand and ticket booth will be located at the main entrance. It will be concessions for both sides.

"That was another great idea they had," Poynor said. "We took that old concessions stand and made it bathrooms. They're building the new concessions stand where the old entrance is. We think that will be way easier for the visitors to get over and use it. We will also put the ticket booth with the concessions stand. It will be kind of a dual purpose with one side for the tickets and one side for the concessions."

Poynor said the concessions stand is it is going to look really nice.

"I think its going to look very classy and very nice. I am really excited about that," Poynor said.



The old yellow sign, if you have driven by, is now on the ground. It will be moved to the southeast gate entrance of the stadium for the team to run through before games.

"It's going to be put up with two columns and repainted so it's going to look really nice," Poynor said. "Home of the Harvesters will face the stands and we're going to use it as our team to come through that gate."

Poynor said another thing that he thinks



the fans are really going to like is the main plaza will be concreted.

"I think that's going to clean it up. That's another thing I've heard a lot of, 'can't you do something about that?' Well, we are going to do something about that," Poynor said. "Under the bleachers, we had some old buildings that were falling down. Those were all moved and it's cleaned out under there. We are going to use that as an exit. You are going to be able to walk under the bleachers without getting muddy and dirty. That's going to be a lot nicer too."

All of these projects, Poynor said, are going to make the stadium look "a thousand times better."

"It's going to be more functional. It's going to be in code," Poynor said. "I am super excited. I can't wait for them to finish."

The walkway under the bleachers will be moved slightly to the west. They will also be building portable walls that can connect the stadium to the Cavalier Building for additional restrooms.

"We're going to build two big gates and walls. If we need to, we can open those up where you don't have to leave the stadium to go to the Cav and use those restrooms," Poynor said. "The Cav has really nice restrooms that don't get a lot of use. We don't have to open it up for every JV game, but when attendance will be high we can have those additional restrooms."

Poynor said the visitor side bleachers will also be made handicap accessible. Handicap parking spots will be added right in front of the ticket booth as well as in the Vahalla parking lot.

"It's really going to look nice. I can't wait for them to start," Poynor said. "They've just been destructing and now I can't wait for them to construct and get some of that new stuff up."

Most things are supposed to be ready for the first varsity home game on Sept. 11. Poynor said he hopes some of the things will be ready before that even.

"That's the drop dead date (Sept. 11) that they know stuff has to be done by then," Poynor said. "I think the only concern is maybe the elevator on the press box and maybe even the skin on the outside of the press box. Everything else, when I talk to them, they feel very confident about having done by then. All the important stuff I think will be done. That's the plan anyway."

The Pampa News plans on doing another construction update sometime in August. Things are changing at Harvester Stadium for the better now.

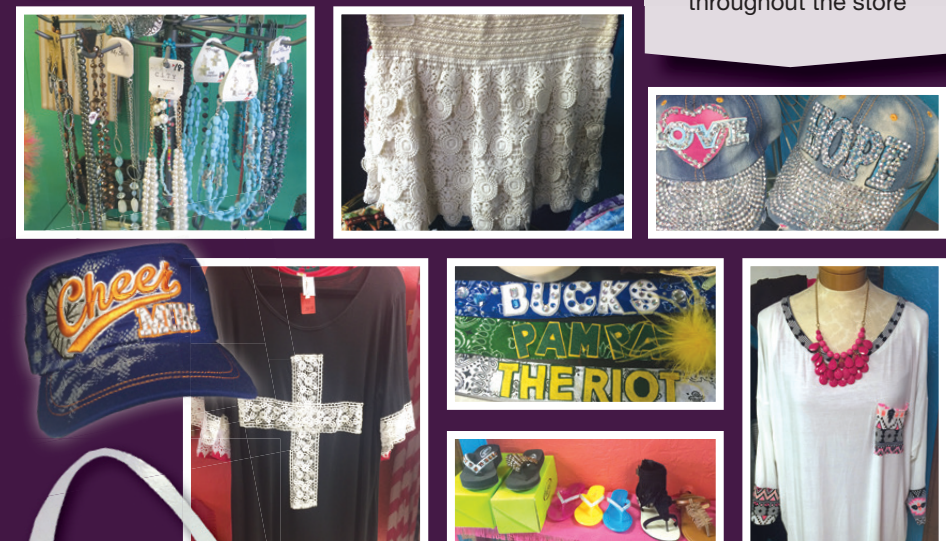

# Thornberry votes to end 'sanctuary city' policies

WASHINGTON — U.S. Congressman Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon) voted today in support of a bill that would remove key federal funding from sanctuary cities that ignore federal immigration law.

The "Enforce the Law for Sanctuary Cities Act," H.R. 3009, passed the House by a vote of 241-179.

The bill would block specific federal grants from cities that prevent law enforcement officials from gathering information or communicating with the Department of Homeland Security about an individual's citizenship or immigration status.

According to federal law, states and local governments cannot "prohibit, or in any way restrict," law enforcement officials from sending or receiving such information, but some municipalities, known as "sanctuary cities," do not comply with this statute. Thornberry has voted for three similar provisions regarding sanctuary cities in the past two years.

"America is a nation of immigrants and a nation of laws. And while I believe our immigration system is broken and must be fixed, that does not mean state and local governments — including these so called 'sanctuary cities' — can ignore federal law,"

said Thornberry. "Anyone who disagrees with current immigration law should work with Congress to pass new laws, and that includes the President."

The Department of Justice offers grants to cover some of the costs of incarcerating illegal immigrants and to provide personnel, training, and other support for criminal justice purposes.

This bill would make the State Criminal Alien Assistance Program grants, Community Oriented Policing Services grants, and the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant unavailable to state and local governments that refuse to comply with current federal immigration law.

# Tips to safeguard yourself against car crimes

■ Car thefts and burglaries increase in July and August.

COPPELL — Summer is the peak season for many things in Texas, such as travel, temperatures and auto theft. According to the National Insurance Crime Bureau (NICB), July and August are historically the top months for auto theft. To help motorists protect themselves against car crooks, AAA Texas is offering tips to prevent the crimes from happening.

According to the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles, nearly 65,000 cars and trucks are stolen in the state of Texas each year, and thousands more are burglarized. Almost half of all vehicles stolen had the keys left inside.

“Leaving keys inside your vehicle is an invitation to car thieves who are looking for an opportunity,” said AAA Texas/New Mexico Representative Doug Shupe. “During the carefree days of summer, be sure to never let your guard down. Instead, vehicle owners should be vigilant about safeguarding their cars, trucks and personal property at all times. Nobody wants to walk up to an empty parking space or to find their windows shattered and their automobile ransacked.” AAA Texas offers the follow-

ing tips to help motorists prevent vehicle burglary and theft:

1. Get your VIN etched. Having the VIN number of your vehicle etched in each piece of glass can be an effective theft deterrent as a thief would have to replace all the glass on the vehicle, cutting into profit margins.
2. Always lock your vehicle with the windows closed. Even if you park your vehicle in a garage, this simple measure is added security.
3. Never leave belongings out in the open in your car as they could tempt thieves. Even empty shopping bags, sunglasses or a change of clothes might look interesting to a thief.
4. Never leave your keys in your vehicle or leave your vehicle running any time you are not in it.
5. Park your vehicle in populated, well-lit areas. When possible, park in a locked garage. Also, consider installing a motion-activated floodlight that illuminates the place where your car is parked.
6. Always use your emergency brake when parking; this makes it more difficult for a thief to tow your vehicle away.
7. Use anti-theft or automatic

tracking devices. If your vehicle wasn't equipped with an alarm or hidden tracking device when purchased, have one installed.

8. Remove spare keys from vehicle. Never hide a spare ignition key on the vehicle. Thieves look for keys in popular hiding places like inside a car bumper or wheel well.

9. Do not leave your title inside your vehicle.

10. Contact your insurance company immediately after calling police. Let your AAA Texas Insurance Representative or other insurance agent know right away if your car is missing.

# Gas Price Average drops two cents this week

**SUBMITTED BY AAA TEXAS COPPELL** — Texas drivers are now paying an average of \$2.53 for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch.

That price is two cents less than last week and 89 cents less per gallon than last year. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in the Lone Star State, drivers in El Paso are paying the most on average at \$2.69 per gallon while drivers in Beaumont are paying the least at \$2.43 per gallon. Nationally, drivers are paying \$2.74, which is three cents less than last week and 82 cents less than a

year ago. Texas drivers are paying 21 cents less than the national average.

Despite regional volatility, the national and state average prices for regular unleaded gasoline have remained relatively stable over the past 30 days. The relatively stable national average continues to disguise volatility in select markets. Drivers in California are paying the highest averages since August 2014, largely due to imbalances between gasoline supply and demand. Ongoing refinery problems, particularly at the ExxonMobil facility in Torrance, also are playing a

significant role in California's gas prices. On the other end of the spectrum, averages in parts of the Great Lakes region are moving lower in dramatic fashion following the resolution of regional supply issues.

Texans are now paying about \$35 to fill up a typical 14-gallon size fuel tank which is about \$13 less per fill-up than this time last year.

"Many families are continuing to take summer vacations before the kids have to start getting ready to go back to school," said AAA Texas/New Mexico Representative Doug Shupe. "We en-

courage those travelers to make sure their vehicle's maintenance is up-to-date, and we remind folks to check their tire inflation, tire tread and batteries before taking a long road trip."
