Harvester Stadium construction on track for Sept. 11

The Pampa Harvester football stadium has been under construction since right after graduation. Recent rains have affected the construction progress some, but athletic director Greg Poynor is optimistic that construction will be complete in time for the team's first home game, Sept. 11.

"I think it's (rain) affected it a little bit," Poynor said. "From the time they actually got started, (after they gutted everything), there's a lot going on out there. I've noticed them working a lot on Saturdays and even late at night. I can see they are making a lot of progress, a lot of headway."

All of the projects except a couple are in progress right now Poynor said. None have been completed at this time.

The hump removal in front of the home stands has not been started, nor has the addition of the handrails in the stands.

"It's going to be tight (making deadline) on a lot of things," Poynor said. "But I feel like the bathrooms, the concessions stand, the ADA stuff.....I think those things will be ready for

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

Sometimes it's hard to hear their tiny voice, but I don't take my eyes off of them now. I will do my best to never feel that scary feeling again.



Drunk man who jumped in lake to avoid rescuers sent to trial

LEVITTOWN, Pa. (AP) at Core Creek Park in Mid-– A district judge says a drunken-driving who ran naked from a hospital and jumped into an blood-alcohol content was eastern Pennsylvania lake must stand trial for disorderly conduct and other charges.

will be really close to ready by then.

"The press box will be close, but it will be usuable no matter what," Poynor said. "As part of ADA it is required for them to add an elevator. I went and looked today (Tuesday) and they were working on that."

The press box is going to be completely redone on the inside. Poynor said it started by gutting the whole thing.

"We moved some of the rooms. The middle of it is going to be open and a film deck for us so nobody has to go on top of the pressbox like before," Poynor said. "We reconfigured a little bit of who's going to be where, like the radio, media and coaches. A lot of the stuff in there was 50-70 years old. It's going to look at a lot nicer and be way more functional."

There will be new windows added as well as heating and air conditioning in the press box. They will also add the elevator and re-skin the outside of it for a new look.

"Everything that was in there now will be in there again," Poynor said. "Some rooms will be a little smaller. Some of the other rooms will be a little bit bigger. It's a very similar plan except the open in the middle for the film deck."

Poynor then talked about the humps. He said they will be completely removed to become ADA compliant.

"They won't bring them back. I envision what they are going to do is make it look a lot like the visitor side with a ramp on the end and a walkway across the entire length of the stands," Poynor said. "The neat thing about it is they are going to skirt it at the bottom. That will be a green band and cap it with a gold top and it will look really, really nice."

Poynor said the seating will change a little bit, but not a lot, due to the railings being added.

"It shouldn't be too much longer before they get started on the humps and railings," Poynor said.

The old concessions stand has been completely gutted and has been redone with the new plumbing already. They will also be painting the outside of what will now be the restrooms.

"That was one of the things I heard the most from people is 'when are you going to redo those bathrooms, they're horrible," Poynor said. "Hopefully people will be proud of those bathrooms and what we've got there."

On the visitors side, the bathrooms will be redone to be made handicap accessible.

The new concessions stand and ticket booth will be located at the main entrance. It will be concessions for both sides.

"That was another great idea they had," Poynor said. "We took that old concessions stand and made it bathrooms. They're building the new concessions stand where the old entrance is. We think that will be way easier for the visitors to get over and use it. We will also put the ticket booth with the concessions stand. It will be kind of a dual purpose with one side for the tickets and one side for the concessions.'

Poynor said the concessions stand is it is going to look really nice.

"I think its going to look very classy and very nice. I am really excited about that," Poynor said.

Poynor said another thing that he thinks



the fans are really going to like is the main plaza will be concreted.

"I think that's going to clean it up. That's another thing I've heard a lot of, 'can't you do something about that?' Well, we are going to do something about that," Poynor said. "Under the bleachers, we had some old buildings that were falling down. Those were all moved and it's cleaned out under there. We are going to use that as an exit. You are going to be able to walk under the bleachers without getting muddy and dirty. That's going to be a lot nicer too."

All of these projects, Poynor said, are going to make the stadium look "a thousand times better."

"It's going to be more functional. It's going to be in code," Poynor said. "I am super excited. I can't wait for them to finish."

The walkway under the bleachers will be moved slightly to the west. They will also be building portable walls that can connect the stadium to the Cavalier Building for additional restrooms.

"We're going to build two big gates and walls. If we need to, we can open those up where you don't have to leave the stadium to go to the Cav and use those restrooms," Poynor said. "The Cav has really nice restrooms that don't get a lot of use. We don't have to open it up for every JV game, but when attendance will be high we can have those additional restrooms."

Poynor said the visitor side bleachers will also be made handicap accessible. Handicap parking spots will be added right in front of the ticket booth as well as in the Vahalla parking lot.

"It's really going to look nice. I can't wait for them to start," Poynor said. "They've just been destructing and now I can't wait for them to construct and get some of that new stuff up."

Most things are supposed to be ready for the first varsity home game on Sept. 11. Poynor said he hopes some of the things will be ready before that even.

"That's the drop dead date (Sept. 11) that they know stuff has to be done by then," Poynor said. "I think the only concern is maybe the elevator on the press box and maybe even the skin on the outside of the press box. Everything else, when I talk to them, they feel very confident about having done by then. All the important stuff I think will be done. That's the plan anyway."

The Pampa News plans on doing another construction update sometime in August. Things are changing at Harvester Stadium for the better now.



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

Thornberry votes to end 'sanctuary city' policies

WASHINGTON – U.S. Congressman Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon) voted today in support of a bill that would remove key federal funding from sanctuary cities that ignore federal immigra-

The "Enforce the Law for Sanctuary Cities Act," H.R. 3009, passed the House by a vote of 241-179.

The bill would block specific federal grants from cities that prevent law enforcement officials from gathering information or communicating with the Department of Homeland Security about an individual's citizenship or immigration status.



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
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Tips to safeguard yourself against car crimes



"If I can help make a family more self-sustainable or a community more productive, that is ideally what I want to do.'



View the Solar System at Alibates Flint Quarries on Saturday, Aug. 15
