# Midland-area housing crunch hurts foster care oversight

Since moving to Odessa in September to work as a state Child Protective Services investigator, Juan Carlos Pacheco has bounced among three homes, struggling to find a place he could afford. At one point, he shared a one-bedroom apartment with six people.

"It was a situation kind of like a sardine can," said Pacheco, 29, who now rents a room in the house of a family of four. His wife, 1-year-old daughter and 5-year-old

son live in El Paso.

The oil boom that has brought jobs and prosperity to Midland and Odessa has driven up housing prices, making it difficult for the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services to hire caseworkers at a time when the agency is under pressure to fill jobs following the highprofile deaths of two foster children.

Midland had the nation's highest increase in median home value after the recession, according to a NerdWallet study last month that examined census data from 2009 to 2012 for 510 cities. The median home price in the Midland metro area last month was \$283,100 — the highest in Texas, according to the Real Estate Center at Texas A&M University.

"It is an overwhelming problem," said John Specia, the family and protective services commissioner. "The rents have tripled or more. We have a number of people who want to transfer to other areas because it's like getting an immediate boost in pay.'

The department has tried to fill vacan-

cies by temporarily sending workers from elsewhere in the state to the Midland and Odessa area; offering new caseworkers \$5,000 signing bonuses, a practice since discontinued; and giving all 153 workers in the area \$500-a-month housing supplements. A typical rate for a one-bedroom apartment in Midland is \$1,100 a month, Mayor Jerry Morales said recently. With the housing supplement, Pacheco's

annual pay is about \$49,000.

But Specia said the housing supplements had not "stemmed the tide" of workers leaving. Because of the nature of the work — the agency has 24 hours to investigate urgent reports that a child faces harm — "we don't have the luxury of teleworking," he said.

When Camille Gilliam became the department's regional director a year and a half ago, there were so many vacancies that 200 children did not have caseworkers, she said. Bringing in reinforcements has helped, and she tells new hires that they are "doing God's work." But employ-

ees continue to resign or transfer. One employee, Gilliam said, recently transferred to Houston to escape her Odessa home: a trailer with electrical problems and no running water. Another is staying in the area in a better-paying job, as a manager for Domino's Pizza.

Of 18 investigator jobs in Ector County, including Odessa, seven were vacant; five were filled by new hires; and six were held by workers who had been on the job for at least a year, Gilliam said.

"Children need to be able to develop a trusting relationship with their caseworker," she said. "But if you have four caseworkers in a year, how are you really able to do that successfully?"

She said more money could solve the turnover problem.

But state Rep. Richard Peña Raymond. chairman of the House Human Services Committee, said raises might not help.

"We're working with the agency on what can be done salary-wise, but if you've got a housing shortage, I'm not sure what the state can do," said Raymond, a Laredo Democrat. "That's kind of the private sec-

Still, the state is responsible for 16,700 children in foster care and 10,000 being cared for by relatives. Among them were two Austin-area girls, Alexandria Hill, 2, and Orion Hamilton, 11 months, who died last year from head injuries that led to murder charges for adults in their foster homes.

Those deaths increased scrutiny on the department, which is using an infusion of money from the Legislature to hire more caseworkers statewide.

Pacheco said his position in Odessa was an opportunity he would not have had in El Paso, where he found stiff competition for such work.

"This is a very good job," he said. "I've been growing as a person here.' His wife hopes to join him soon, he said.

Their goal is to buy a house in Odessa.

# US rig count up 12 to 1,883

HOUSTON (AP) — Oilfield services company Baker Hughes Inc. says the number of rigs exploring for oil and natural gas in the U.S. rose 12 this week to 1,883.

The Houston firm said Friday in its weekly report that 1,562 rigs were exploring for oil and 318 for gas. Three were listed as miscellaneous. A year ago there were 1,776 active rigs.

Of the major oil- and gasproducing states, Louisiana gained six, California, New Mexico and Oklahoma were each up four, and West Virginia increased by

Alaska lost three rigs, Pennsylvania and Texas were down two apiece and Ohio was off one.

Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, North Dakota, Utah and Wyoming were unchanged.

The U.S. rig count peaked at 4,530 in 1981 and bottomed at 488 in 1999.



# **False** equivalence

The "crossfire" mentality that defines public discourse today has the obvious problem of ignoring

land somewhere in the middle, turning every debate into a shouting contest between the extremists who

generate passion and ratings, and rarely reflecting the views of the majority in the middle. I've been saying for years that it might be just as entertaining, and certainly more productive, to see where ideological opposites find common ground. But until someone actually attempts it, we will keep spiraling down into extremism and incivility.

That, in my mind, is bad. What's worse is that our crossfire, right and left, mentality can create a sense of equivalence when there is no basis for it.

Survivors and deniers do not belong on the same platform.

Evolution is not debatable.

Israel and Hamas do not stand in the same shoes.

Poor Israel. Until the past day or two, the death toll scoreboard so widely reported in the media was running so lopsidedly in Israel's "favor" that Israel was being chastised

because too few of its soldiers and civilians had died. But that is not for want of trying.

Hamas has launched thousands of rockets into Israel, one so close to Ben Gurion airport that American airlines were banned from flying there. Israel is being punished for investing in shelters (where families are literally living) and building a sophisticated missile defense system — in other words, for protecting its people. Hamas uses children and families as human shields for terrorists.

Israel gets cast in the eyes of the world as an aggressor, but this is not about conquering foreign land. Israel withdrew from Gaza in 2005. This war is about finding and destroying the tunnels that were built to smuggle terrorists and weapons into Israel more of them than anyone expected and some of them clearly built to target Israeli communities.

Israel is seeking to defend itself, seeking to stop the rockets and attacks. Hamas is seeking to destroy Israel, and they are willing to sacrifice their own wives and children to do it.

So how did Israel become the aggressor?

The murder of three Israeli teenagers was followed by the murder of a Palestinian teen. Equivalent? No. The Israelis

# Good, old-fashioned summer fun

With a little more than a month to go before school starts again, parents (and grandparents) are already hearing, "I'm bored! There's

nothing to do!" I heard this the other day from our 11-yearold triplet grandkids. I suggested a few things they could do but those suggestions were too much like "chores" for their

consideration. Now, these are kids with Netbooks,

gaming systems, stacks of books and games and musical instruments, but they're bored. I dislike sounding like the typical old-timer who "walked ten miles to school, uphill both ways, every day."

People complain that there is nothing here in Pampa for kids to do. I translate that to mean there are insufficient activities to keep the kids entertained during the long, hot summer days. I grew up in the 1950's and early 1960's in southern California. There weren't any organized activities for kids, and since our family didn't own a car and we had little money, I wouldn't have been able to go anyway.

What we did have, though, was a neighborhood full of kids who all seemed to hit the yards at the same time every day, faces still wearing

milk mustaches. We moved from yard to yard, rarely going inside until we were called to our own homes for lunch.

We climbed trees, played hopscotch, jacks, marbles, hide and seek and ball games. We jumped rope and the girls played with our dolls while the boys played with their Army men. We all played "cops and robbers" and "cowboys and Indians" before that became politically incorrect. There was never the option to sit in front of a television all day.

If it rained or was too hot to play outside, someone usually had a garage we could play in. When I was about ten, I was deemed old enough to go to the park swimming pool by myself, and for a quarter I could spend most of the day there turning my fingers and toes pruney. We could go to the closest grammar school playground and play there on the swings, slides, or monkey bars. The lucky kids who had basketballs played with them, and there was usually a game of dodge ball or foursquare going on. My personal favorite was the tetherball, and I came home more than a few times with a bloody nose from that activ-

One of the highlights of my summer was going to Vacation Bible School, something that today's kids still enjoy. When I was about 12, I learned to play tennis and I spent

many hours imagining I was playing at Wimbledon while whacking the tennis ball against the cement block garage in our back yard.

We used old roller skates and built our own scooters. I loved my roller skates, too, and spent hours circling our neighborhood. There was no water park. On hot, dry days we played in the sprinkler in someone's front yard. Few people had their own swimming pool. There was no Jump 'n' Jive in those days—we found piles of dirt and played King of the Mountain. We dug holes in the vacant lot looking for treasure.

When the grandchildren sleep over at our house, we have declared it a "no electronics" zone, and they leave their games and notebooks at home. We have art and craft supplies, and the kids are encouraged to use their imaginations. We have books, jigsaw puzzles, and board games for quieter times, and a big back yard with a tree made for climbing. TV watching is limited to late in the evening before bed, and the kids get an hour to read after they climb into their beds.

The grandkids know better than to tell their mother they are bored, because she will come up with jobs for them to do. Boredom doesn't last long in our family.

# Layoffs prove the deceit of amnesty

The shocking announcement that Microsoft is cutting 18,000 jobs is still sinking

in. Most of those employees do not have a realistic chance of obtaining as good a job as the one they are

losing. In the United States, the number of engineering jobs has been sharply declining. In 2002 the number of electrical engineering jobs in the United States was 385,000, but despite increased demand for technology, the job total dropped to only 300,000 last year.

And that number is not even for American workers, because thousands of these jobs are soaked up by the H-1B visa racket, whereby companies like Microsoft can import and pay foreign workers less than it costs to hire an American. High-tech companies have thousands of foreign employees working on H-1B visas who are almost like indentured servants to the company, because they lose their right to be in our country if they leave their job.

Microsoft's massive layoff makes downright ridiculous the op-ed recently published by Bill Gates and his billionaire pals.

Warren Buffett and Sheldon Adelson. They and Facebook's Mark Zuckerberg, who financed the lobby group FWD.us, demand immediate amnesty disguised as immigration reform in order to bring in more cheap labor.

The real shortage is in good jobs, but these visas flood the labor market and hold wages down, when wages should be climbing for American workers. Fewer Americans have a job today than just six years ago, even though the potential workforce has expanded during that time. One reason is the overuse of foreign labor by large companies.

Microsoft is highly profitable, breaking its own records for revenue and profits as recently as last year, with an effective tax rate of less than 20 percent. One of its directors has agreed to pay \$2 billion for a basketball team, and Gates is often listed as the wealthiest man in the world.

In 2007, at a U.S. Senate committee hearing, Gates asked for permission to import "an infinite number" of foreign workers. "I don't think there should be any limit," he continued, but at any rate the cap should be "dramatically increased."

In 2008, before the House Committee on Science, Space, and Technology, Gates claimed he

had jobs "going begging" that no American could be found to do, so he had no choice but to import workers from India. When Representative Dana Rohrabacher, R-Calif., suggested he might consider raising the pay for those jobs, Gates impatiently dismissed that option, saying: "No, it's not an issue of raising wages. These jobs are very, very high-paying jobs."

Economics 101 teaches that wages are a function of supply and demand. When the supply of labor is increased, such as by expanding immigration, then wages can and do decrease, despite increased productivity.

Recently a reporter caught up with the laid-off semiconductor engineer whose wife publicly challenged President Barack Obama in January 2012, "Why does the government continue to issue and extend H-1B visas when there are tons of Americans just like my husband with no job?" Darin Wedel eventually found a job in the health care industry, earning \$40,000 a year less than before.

Obama is still deceiving the American public about the economy, bragging that 288,000 jobs were created last month. As Mortimer Zuckerman explained in The Wall Street Journal: "Most people will have the impression that the

288,000 jobs created last month were full-time. Not so." They were part-time jobs, which pay lower wages than the full-time

jobs that have disappeared. There are several reasons for this, such as employers desire to avoid the Obamacare mandate to provide health insurance to anyone working 30 or more hours a week. Another is women's willingness to accept lower pay in exchange for a flexible schedule with fewer hours per day, per week and per year.

But now many breadwinners, including men, have been forced to take these jobs. Of men aged 25 to 54, one in six does not work; 50 years ago, only one in 20 was not working

When we first brought the transformation of the American economy into a part-time-worker society in 2010, many scoffed and suggested that when the "recovery" really gets going, the temp jobs will all be morphed into high-paying full-time jobs. Instead, Zuckerman writes, "more than 24 million Americans remain jobless, working part-time involuntarily or having left the workforce.

Zuckerman hits us with the depressing conclusion: "Faith in the American dream is eroding fast. The feeling is that the rules aren't fair and the system has been rigged in favor of

height and it's time for a reminder about the dangers of leaving your pet in a parked car. Whether you're parking in the shade, just running into the store, or leaving the windows cracked, it is still NOT OK to leave your pet in a parked car.

# Coming out of the Social Security closet

# TWC Grants \$1M for High-Tech Summer Camp

# Migration spotlights Mexican 'coyote' smugglers

temala (AP) — The manin-the-know nursed a latemorning beer at a bar near the Suchiate River that separates Guatemala from Mexico, and answered a question about his human smuggling business with a question: "Do you think a coyote is going to say he's a covote?"

Dressed as a migrant in shorts and sandals but speaking like an entrepreneur, he then described shipments of tens of thousands of dollars in human cargo from the slums of Honduras and highlands of Guatemala to cities across the United States.

"It's business," he said, agreeing to speak to a reporter only if guaranteed anonymity. "Sometimes, business is very good.'

Judging by the dramatic increase in the number of apprehended in the United States in recent months, it seems the human smuggling business from Central America is booming. The vast majority of migrants who enter the U.S. illegally do so with the help of a network of smugglers known as "coyotes," so named for the scavengers that prowl the

It is a high-risk, often highyield business estimated to generate \$6.6 billion a year for smugglers along Latin America's routes to the U.S., according to a 2010 United Nations report. The migrants pay anywhere from \$4,000 to \$10,000 each for the illegal journey across thousands of miles in the care of smuggling networks that in turn pay off government officials, gangs operating on trains and drug cartels controlling the routes north.

The exact profit is hard to calculate, though some experts estimate it's \$3,500 to \$4,000 per migrant if the journey goes as planned. organizations Smuggling may move from dozens to hundreds of migrants at a

"We're talking about a market where chaos reigns," said Rodolfo Casillas, a migrant expert at the Latin American Faculty of Social Sciences in Mexico.

majority from Guatemala, El Salvador and Honduras, were apprehended at the U.S. border from October to June, according to the Border Patrol. That's more than double the same period last year.

The smugglers are profiting from the rising violence in gang-ridden cities of Central America, and the yearning of families to be reunited; parents often head north to find work and save money to send for their children, sometimes years later.

Many of the children and teenagers who travelled to the United States recently said they did so after hearing they would be allowed to stay. The U.S. generally releases unaccompanied children to parents, relatives or family friends while their cases take years to wend through overwhelmed immigration courts. That reality gave rise to rumors of a new law or amnesty for children.

Some say coyotes helped spread those rumors to drum up new business following a huge drop in Mexicans migrating to the United States. Arrests of migrants on the third person, he said a smugsouthwestern U.S. border dropped from about 1.1 million annually a decade ago to 415,000 last year.

Because of that, some smugglers say they are in the service business.

"The most important thing is to help these people," said another smuggler in Ixtepec, a town in the Mexican state of Oaxaca where many migrants board the northbound train known as "La Bestia," or The Beast.

The smuggler goes by the name of Antonio Martinez, which is most likely a pseudonym, though one that appears on an arrest record, he said. He wears Nike sport shoes, jeans and a pressed blue Oxford shirt, the two top buttons open to reveal a tattoo of Jesus Christ on his left breast. After spending 12 years in U.S. prisons for drug possession, he said, he converted to Christianity and fell into the coyote business.

"The coyote is essential," he said. "If you don't have a compass, you can get lost."

Martinez appears to be an independent contractor. He said he charges \$2,500 for the trip from the Guatemalan border to the U.S. border, where he gives Central American migrants fake Mexican identity cards and makes them learn the first stanza of the Mexican national anthem before handing them off to another smuggler. Hopefully, if they are apprehended in the U.S., they'll only be sent back to Mexico, where they can try again, Martinez said.

Most smugglers charge far more, having raised their prices in recent years to compensate for the drop in Mexican business and to offset the "taxes" charged by cartels for moving people through their territories.

From Honduras, Karen Ferrera and her 8-monthold daughter traveled with a coyote she had known since childhood, a friend of her brother's whom she paid \$4,000 for three tries to get in. Glendis Ramirez, who was deported by plane back to Honduras last week, also left with a coyote from her town whom her family paid \$4,700 to take Ramirez and her 3-year-old daughter. He promised to return half of the money if she didn't make it. When she tried to get her money back, he told her to stop demanding or he would kill her.

The trafficker on the Guatemalan border, who spoke with The Associated Press after an intermediary negotiated the time and place, said the people he smuggles pay \$10,000 a head for the trip from Central America, which covers everything from hotel and train payments to official bribes and cartel taxes. But occasionally, he said, a cartel will demand as much as an extra \$5,000 on threat of


# Oakland Raiders still searching for winning season
