## Hutcherson Youth ls Seriously Burned In Gasoline Fire

Rayford Hutcherson, 11-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Hutcherson, was seriously burned late Monday afternoon when spilled gasoline was ignited and set his clothing ablaze as he and his father were pumping gasoline into the fuel tank of a tractor.

Both his father and his uncle, Edd Hutcherson, received painful burns on their hands in extinguishing the flames that enveloped the boy's body from his waist up.

The most serious burns sufferbut he also sustained burns to his arms, hands and back.

Dr. J. A. Odom, his physician, considered critical now and he believed the youth out of danger,

barring complications. Friction or a spark from some cause ignited the fumes as the boy was holding the gasoline hose and his father was pumping the fuel. In some manner gasoline was spilled over the boy's shirt, and in a flash his clothing was ablaze.

Alfred Hutcherson and his brother, Edd, who was nearby, grabbed him and tried to tear off the boy's shirt, then picked him up and ran to a water tank

For Farm Veterans **To Buy Supplies** 

A speeedy procedure by which farm veterans of this war may obtain priority preference for the purchase of surpulus equipment for use in their agriculturel enterprises is now available through AAA and the Smaller War Plants Corporation, Russelll Smith, SW-PC district manager, Dallas, has declared.

Veterans who "have been re leased from active duty in the armed forces and who need surplus government property for use on their farms should go to the County AAA committee in the county in which they live for cercertification, their applications certification, ther applications are turned over to the nearest district office of SWPC, and SWPC then acts as the veterans"

buying agent. Applications have already been received in the Southwest Region for tractors, trucks, of SWPC harrows, plows, power pumps, power saws and many similar types of equipment for use on the farm. This equipment is being purchased from the disposal agencies as fast as it is declared

These commodities, if available in surplus, may be purchased through Smaller War Plants Corporation for cash or with a minimum cash downpayment of 15 per cent of the sale price of the item

Smith explained that a few limitations apply in the case of the farm veteran desiring to purchase surplus property. His capital investment may not exceed \$25,000, he may not purchase in excess of \$2,500 worth of surplus, and the County AAA committee must certify that there is a reasonable probability of the vetretn's success in the enterprise.

About 100.000 pounds of raw silk will be produced at Mineral Wells, Texas, this year.


Dad have you got the old Buick going yet? How much will it cost to get it fixed up? I guess the little "B" is getting plenty of running while the other car is torn down.




