Army Answers Your Questions

Your questions on allotments, insurance, legal problems or other matters as they relate to Army and their dependents will be answered in this column or by letter. Write Headquarters, Eighth Service Command, Dallas 2, Texas.

Q. Is it true that points have been added for men in the service since last May?

A. Yes. Points for discharge under the adjusted service rating system were first computed as of May 12, 1945. They are now computed of September 2, 1945.

Q. My son has been awarded a distinguished unit citation. How many points does this count toward his discharge?

A. No discharge points are given for unit citations.

Q. How long after my husband is discharged from the Army will I continue to receive my family allowance?

A. The last payment of your family allowance will be for the month during which he is discharged.

Q. How long after my husband is discharged from the Army will he be able to keep his Army Insurance?

A. If you refer to National Service Life Insurance, it may be carried in its present form for eight years from the date the insurance was issued. It is term insurance, and may be converted to permanent plans any time during this eight-year period.

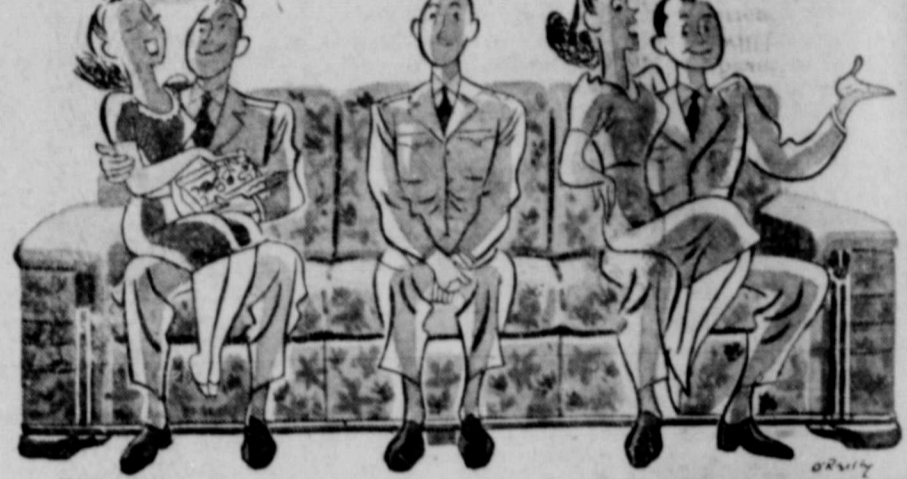

WE'VE FINISHED THEIR JOB—LET'S FINISH OURS'

The war is over, but we haven't paid the bill for it. In addition to continuing sales, there must be one more big drive extra bonds—the Victory Loan. The Treasury tells us that billion dollars will be needed to help pay the bills of occupation, veteran rehabilitation and getting our men back home. The campaign, which is to be the last one, will open on October 29 and end on December 8.

Although the quota is considerably smaller than in previous drives, The Democrat believes that the people of Hall County will subscribe both readily and generously in the campaign coming up, regardless of the local quota.

Aside from the factors of inflation and the cancellation termination of war contracts, which are dwelt upon at considerable length by the Treasury in outlining the reasons for the Victory Loan, we believe that the phases which affect our men now in service and who have been discharged, are common enough to cause an over-subscription in the bond drive. These would come under three general headings:

- Care of the wounded and rehabilitation of veterans.** This job is going to be one of the nation's biggest expenses for some time. Mustering-out pay, education, loans and general administration of the G. I. Bill of Rights must be added to care of the wounded.
- Bringing men home.** It's just as expensive as sending them away, and the process will go on for an indefinite period. Maintaining armies of occupation. Housing, feeding, medical care to at least two armies of occupation a costly business which will go on for some time—how long.

Ten days before the campaign officially opens but the people subscribe our share of the Victory Loan bonds the government guarantee we'll have that our fighting forces will be ready to fight.

T-Sgt. Joe True Writes Father After Liberation

Two letters have been received recently by Jerry W. True from his son, T-Sgt. Joe W. True, who was a prisoner of the Japs since the fall of Corregidor. The letters were written from a rest camp in the Pacific and were the first word Mr. True had received from his son in two years.

His letters told of illness, starvation, lack of clothes and work in a coal mine, during the time he was a prisoner of the Japs.

He has been awarded the Purple Heart for shrapnel wounds in the knee and 32-cement splinters in his back, received when a Jap Zero strafed a wall where he and other prisoners had taken refuge. He is one of three survivors of the American unit.

Since his liberation he has gained 20 pounds and says he hopes to be home about December 1.

After being in action through the North Solomons, New Guinea and Luzon campaigns, Pfc. Clyde D. Vaughn is returned to the United States with the 43d Winged Victory Division which he has served with overseas since October 28, 1943.

Pfc. Vaughn has been awarded the Combat Infantryman's Badge, Good Conduct Medal, Asiatic Pacific Ribbon with three campaign stars and arrowhead for the Luzon invasion, and a Philippine Liberation Ribbon with one Bronze Star. He has gone through the victory march right up to the heart of Japan and is now returning to the United States for demobilization.

He was inducted at Lubbock, February 11, 1943. His father, lives on Route 1, Hedley.

He was a former resident of Hall County. His wife, who died in Amarillo several years ago, was the daughter of the late O. B. Burnett.

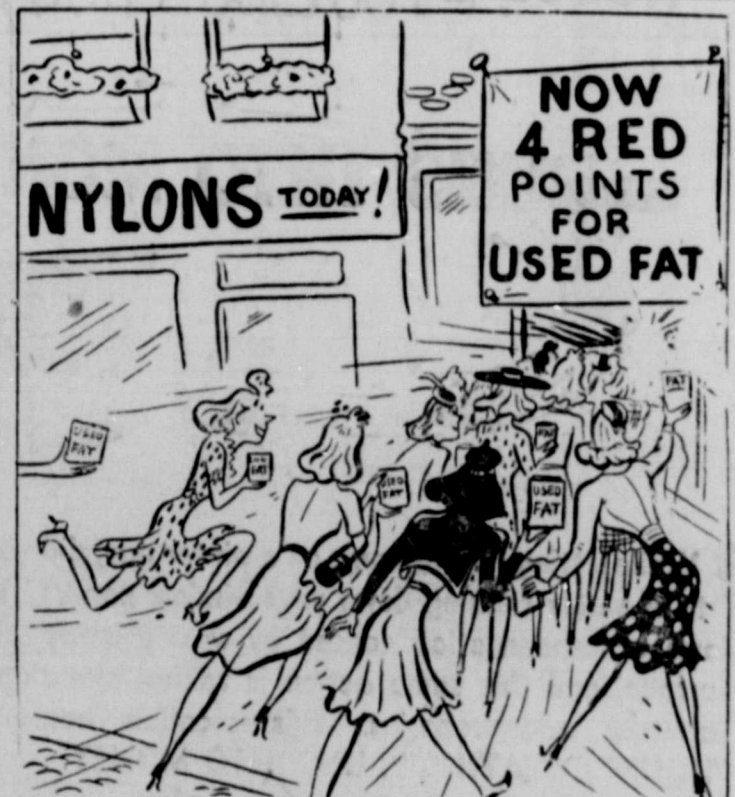

Red Cross Help On Discharges in Dependency Cases

Recent conversation between the War Department and the American Red Cross have resulted in the resumption of Red Cross service in army discharge requests involving dependency and undue hardship in cases where Red Cross is asked by the military to provide verifying and supplementary information, Mrs. T. D. Weatherby, home service chairman of the local Red Cross chapter, has announced.

Pointing out that the chapter acts only on request of the military and that such requests are made on a selective basis, Mrs. Weatherby said that the resumed service in no way changes the Red Cross' traditional position of neither recommending discharges nor applying for them.

Verified "home conditions" reports are provided by Red Cross in connection with dependency discharge applications only in cases where the facts are not sufficiently clear to the military to warrant their making a decision. The only direct contact between the serviceman seeking discharge and the Red Cross occurs when the former needs aid in filling out the necessary discharge application forms or when he is unable to obtain the necessary statements to accompany his discharge application, in which instance the local chapter will help dependents to obtain them.

The serviceman, however, must make out his own request for discharge and either he or his family obtain the necessary affidavits, statements or recommendations from individuals in the community relative to need for discharge.

The serviceman's dependents are expected to prepare a communication to the enlisted man stating the situation at home and asking that he request discharge. Such a communication must come from the family and not from the Red Cross chapter.

BORN SEPT. 23, 1899, DALLAS, OF PIONEER FARMER FAMILY; FIRST MEMBER OF THE AMERICAN BAR IN 1927; BOY SCOUTS LEADER; EARNEST FIRST MONY ON NINETEEN TWENTY; LEADERSHIP IN VARIOUS ORGANIZATIONS AND GRADUATED HONORS; SERVED WORLD WAR I; SERVED IN THE ARMY; ADMITTED TO THE BAR IN 1927; MARRIED MISS JANE BAKER IN 1924; TWO CHILDREN; PRACTICE WITH BAKER AND BAKER, 1927; CIVIL DISTRICT ATTORNEY, DALLAS COUNTY, 1927-32...

CLARK WAS NAMED IN 1943 BY PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT AS ASSISTANT ATTORNEY GENERAL TO HEAD THE ANTI-TRUST DIVISION AND LATER BECAME HEAD OF THE CRIMINAL DIVISION. AMONG HIS MOST IMPORTANT CASES WERE THOSE OF TWO MEN WHO LANDED FROM A SUBMARINE ON THE ATLANTIC COAST LAST FALL. BOTH WERE CONVICTED.

ONE OF MR. 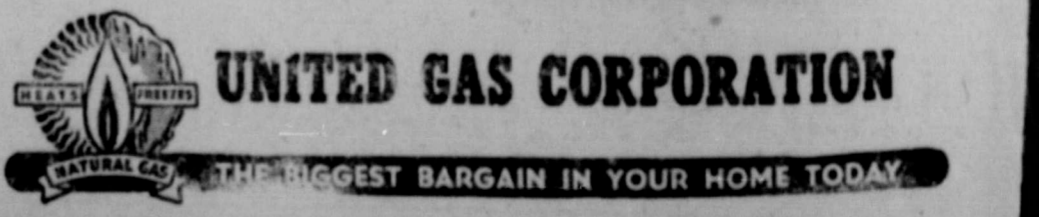

Lost Battalion Members To Be Honored at Wichita Falls



Clustered about a map of Java, three survivors of more than 1200 days of tortuous treatment at the hands of the Japanese swapped stories of their "Lost Battalion" wanderings at a recent reunion in Wichita Falls.

Capt. Clyde C. Fillmore and Lt. Col. Winthrop H. Rogers, both of Wichita Falls, met with Maj. Thomas A. Dodson of Fort Worth, to "catch up" on the whereabouts of their 131st Field Artillery battalion comrades as M. M. Rudd (extreme left) and Henry W. Davis (extreme right), listen with interest. Rudd and Davis, both

Wichitans, formerly were associated with the activities of the famed military organization, which gained the universal title of "Lost Battalion" after its fate, obscured by Jap censorship, remained a mystery for many months.

Rogers, Fillmore and Dodson in late August were liberated from Japanese prison camps where they had suffered through 43 months of filth and torment. Java was overrun by the Japs in March, 1942, the date of these officers' separation and imprisonment. Rudd was executive officer for the headquarters battery of the

battalion in 1940. Davis, who considers each of the men his "boys," was caretaker of the National Guard Armory here where the 131st heroes once trained.

The meeting was but a prelude to a huge reunion and home-coming planned for members of the Lost Battalion to be staged in Wichita Falls on October 28-29. Liberated Lost Battalion members

from 88 Texas towns, their families, and the families of the 130 brave Texans who failed to return will be honored guests at the homecoming.

Hall County Now Has 979 Farms

The number of farms in Hall County, as shown by the preliminary count of returns of the 1945 Census of Agriculture was 979, as compared with 1,118 in 1940, and 1,521 in 1935. This was announced by Weldon L. Boyles, supervisor for the 1945 farm census in the First Texas Census District with headquarters at Panhandle.

The total land in farms in Hall County, according to the preliminary 1945 census count, was 298,261 acres, as compared with 378,723 acres in 1940, and 469,481 acres in 1935. Average size of farms shown in the preliminary census count for Hall County was 407 acres, as compared with 339 acres in 1940, and 309 acres in 1935.

In announcing the 1945 census totals of farms and land in farms in Hall County, Supervisor Boyles pointed out that the figures are preliminary and subject to correction. Final tabulations of Hall County farm census returns will be made by the Bureau of the Census and announced from Washington when completed, Mr. Boyles said.

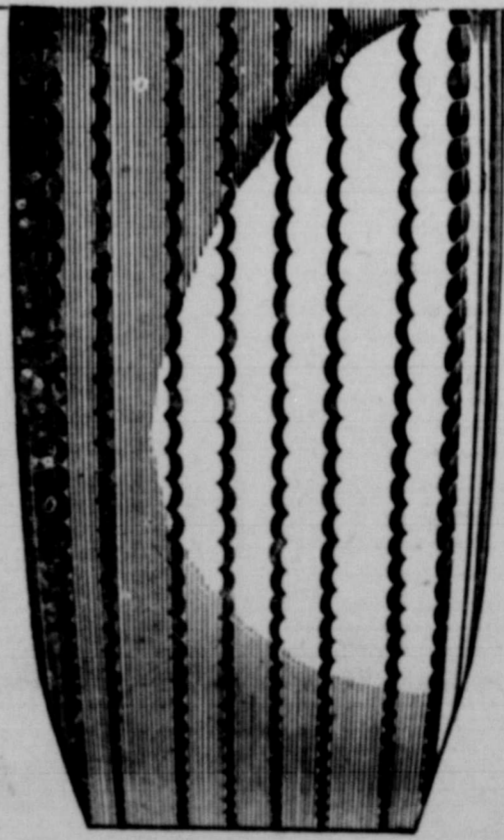

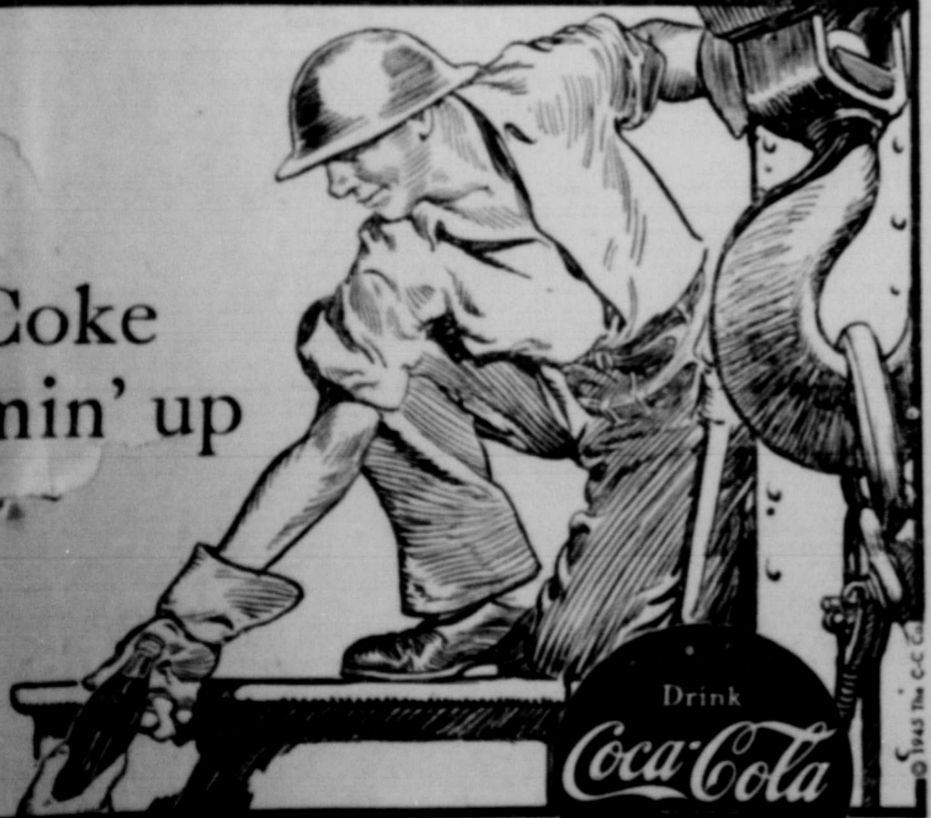

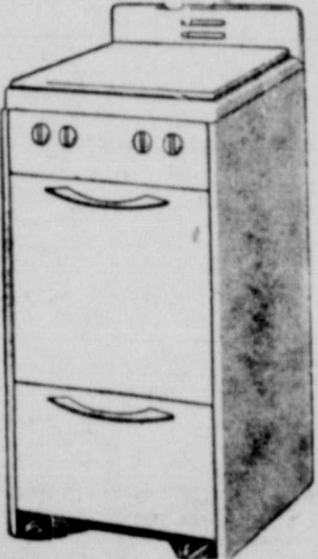

William R. Cofer On Warship With Envious Record

William R. Cofer, 19, seaman, second class, USNR, Memphis, serving aboard the USS San Francisco in Admiral Kincaid's powerful 7th Fleet, helped support the landings of American occupation troops in Korea and helped in the evacuation of prisoners of war from southern Korea.

The San Francisco, heroine of the battle of Guadalcanal and holder of one of the great combat records for warships, stood off shore with her sister ships on the first day of the occupation, ready for any eventuality. On the second day of occupation, after safety was assured, the crew took sunbaths, played volley ball, did calisthenics and participated in other recreational activities.

The San Francisco took part in 17 major actions from Pearl Harbor to Tokyo. She sank or helped sink nine Jap warships and shot down 13 planes. At Guadalcanal, she sustained 45 hits, 15 major caliber, but remained afloat.
