



### Santa Rosa Exposition to Be Held Annually; 2 Memphians Are Directors

Plans for the first annual Santa Rosa Round-up and Livestock Exposition, sponsored and backed financially by E. Paul Waggoner, Vernon rancher and oil man, were outlined in a recent meeting in Vernon of about 70 specially-invited directors from all over Texas and Oklahoma.

Representing Memphis and Hall County as directors were Jim King and Tommie Potts.

The first show, featuring a rodeo produced by Earl Sellers of Del Rio, will be held May 29-June 2 in an arena now under

construction one mile south of the town.

Elaborate plans for the exposition include showgrounds covering 148 acres. There will be a grandstand seating 5,000, a swimming pool, exhibit buildings for livestock, stables, carnival grounds, and two air strips, which may be used for air shows or by flying clubs.

It was pointed out by directors that this is not strictly a Vernon show. The showgrounds are located here because this is the home of its backer, Paul Waggoner.

**5,859 Vets Enroll At State School**

Veterans make up 48 per cent of the spring semester enrollment at the University of Texas, the registrar's office reports, with 5,859 now enrolled out of a total registration of 12,282 students. Men also outnumber women, the records show, with 8,165 men enrolled.

Peak enrollment for any one semester previously was in 1940-41, when 10,300 students were registered.

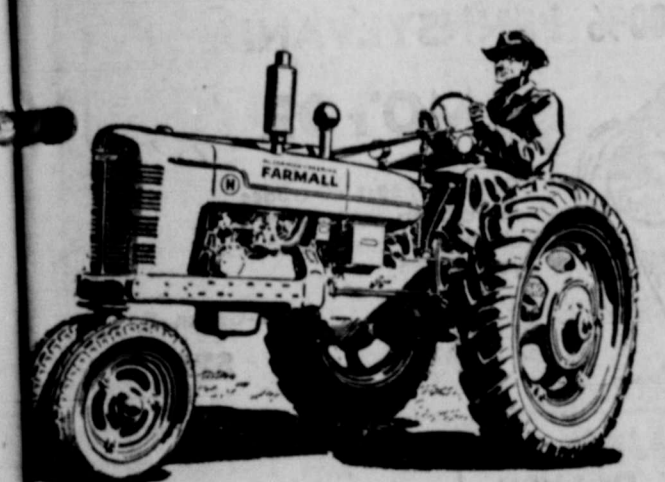

## Animals Transmit Undulant Fever

Undulant (Malta) fever is a disease which is transmitted to human beings by infected animals. Individuals may acquire the disease (1) as the result of direct contact with infected animals or (2) following the use of raw dairy products obtained from infected dairy cows. If the disease is due to contact with infected animals or their waste products, the germ gains entrance to the human body through the skin, stated Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer.

Persons who live on farms are more subject to undulant fever than those who live in cities. On farms, the disease is more apt to affect men due to the fact that men come in contact with hogs and cows to a much greater extent than do farm women. Farmers have direct contact with animals during loading and unloading for market. The handling of infected cows or sows and of the young at time of birth represent hazardous types of contact. The danger of undulant fever may be

reduced greatly by avoiding as much as possible all forms of direct contact with animals which may be infected. The wearing of heavy gloves if contact is unavoidable should aid in protecting the skin against exposure.

Urban residents have little or no occasion to come in direct contact with infected animals. Undulant fever acquired in city or town is due, as a rule, to the use of milk, cream, and butter which lack certain safeguards. Prevention of undulant fever, whether due to contact with infected animals or to ingestion of contaminated dairy products, is dependent to a further extent, upon the eradication of contagious abortion from farm animals and careful pasteurization of dairy products.

  - 3 cups milk
  - 2 tablespoons onion (optional)
  - 1 cup cooked peas
  - 1 cup cooked celery
  - 1 cup cooked carrots
  - 3 1/2 cups mashed potatoes

Shred cod, pulling it apart with forks, or shears. If salt cod is used, freshen by covering with cold water

and heating to boiling point; drain, cover with cold water and repeat process until codfish tastes fresh, about 4 times. If fresh cod is used, simmer fish in water until tender. Melt butter in top of double boiler, add onion and cook over direct heat 5 minutes, do not brown. Blend in flour and pepper; add milk and cook over hot water until thick, stirring occasionally. Add diced cooked vegetables and codfish. Pour into a 1 1/2 quart casserole; top with border of mashed potato, brown in a hot oven, 400° F., for 15 or 20 minutes. Serves 6.

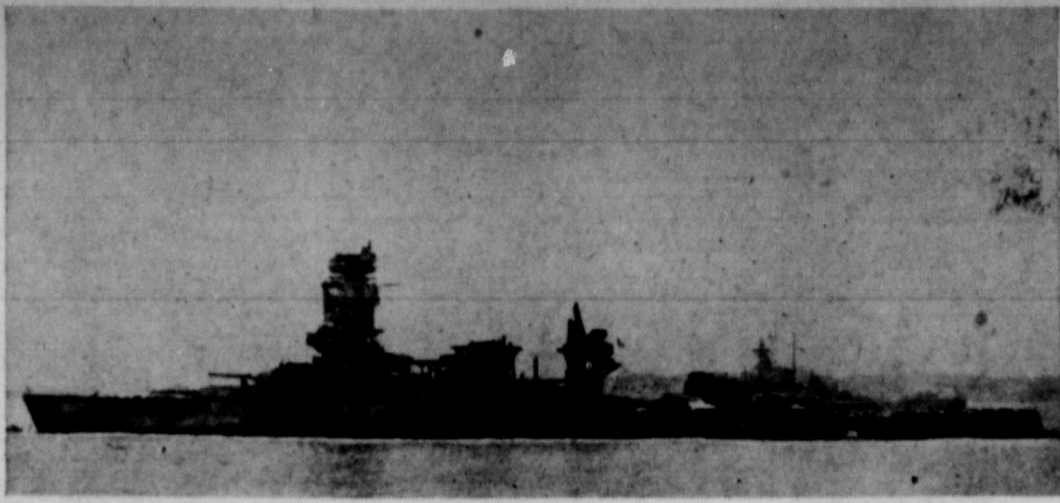
### Veterans Wishing Free Education Should Apply Now

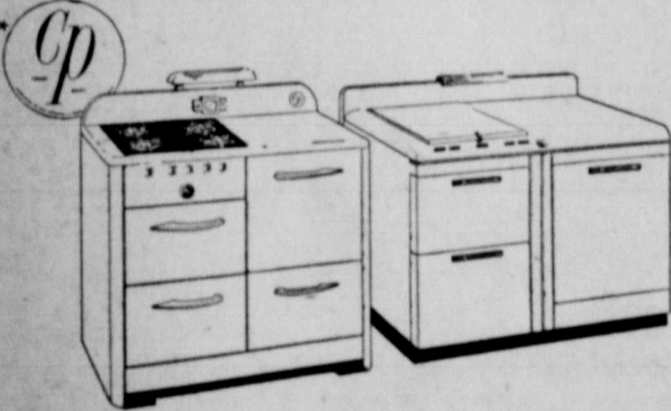
