

Lesson for December 29: Acts

9:15; 19:21; 23:11, 28:28; 28:30-31; Romans 1:13-16; 15:22-24. Memory Selection: Romans 1:

Paul was the first to see Christianity as a world religion, and he claimed the world for Christ. This was in harmony with his great commission at his conversion—he was sent unto Gentiles and kings, and the children of Israel.

in the capital of the world. In the midst of his labors in Ephesus, he purposed, after he had visited Jerusalem, to go to Rome-"I must see SUNDAY-Rome also," he wrote. To preach the gospel in Rome became his consuming desire. In Romans I, written from Corinth, Paul tells of his yearning to preach in Rome, acknowledges his great debt, both to the Greeks and the barbarians, and expresses his willingness to labor among the Romans.

After being rescued from the Pharisees in Jerusalem by the Roman authorities and put in custody, Paul had a vision of God, standing by him and saying: "Be of good cheer: for as thou hast testified concerning me at Jerusalem, so must thou bear witness also in Rome."

He reached Rome, not as he had hoped, but as a prisoner for his Lord. He was soon busy-calling the Jews to him (Acts 28:28) and then for two years in his own hired house preaching to all who came in to him. There is a pathetic touch in Paul's reference in the last chapter of Romans to his plan to visit Spain. This was denied him. His desire to go beyond Rome shows he claimed the world for Christ. And so should we claim it and strive to conquer it for our Lord.

#### L. J. Sheppard, Brother of Local Citizen, Succumbs

L. J. Sheppard, brother of Mrs. Aubrey Henry of Memphis, died in a San Francisco hospital Friday, December 13. He was 51 years old.

Mr. Sheppard was born in Izzard County, Ark. He lived for some time in Oklahoma, and from there he moved to San Francisco, where he lived until his death.

### Slow and Fast Ways to Turn Leaves into Compost

Regularly every fall bonfires of fallen leaves inspire sermons about the folly of destroying material which could be changed into precious humus, to maintain organic matter in garden soils:

Relatively few gardeners heed these suggestions, however, per-haps because the methods of making a compost pile tend to be elaborate, and may seem too much trouble for the quantity of compost they produce.

There is still no good reason for burning leaves. If a neat, orderly and well screened compost pile is too much trouble, the leaves will decay without it; and few home grounds lack a corner where they can be piled or spread and left with out any attention whatever until transformed into precious leaf mould. This takes time, perhaps two years, but once the annual practice is established, then every year a crop of leaves, thoroughly decayed, is available for spreading on your garden.

Methods of management, which may seem elaborate, are justified on two points, first they can speed planting, or a fence; 10 x 10 feet up the rate of decay, so that compost is available in one year instead of two; and second, where







The term "boiled" as concerns these protein foods is a dated phrase that no longer means what t says, according to Edith Lawence, specialist in food preparaion of the Texas A. and M. College extension service. When prepared by cooks using modern methods, these "boiled" foods are actually simmered-cooked in water just below the boiling point, Miss Lawrence says. The high heat of boiling toughens protein, and housewives will get greater tenderness by cooking longer at

ower temperatures. Even "boiled" coffee is a dated phrase, Miss Lawrence points out. Brewing tests have shown that the finest flavor in coffee is obtained by using water that is just below boiling.

The common use of "boiled" for these foods is simply a case of an old term that has lagged behind modern cooking knowledge and methods, the specialist says tention of housewives would be called to better methods of cooking if these dated names and phrases were changed as cooking methods change.





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

#### How to Grow Christmas Flowers in Your Home

Amateurs planning to grow bulbs indoors for winter gardens should obtain them early and grow them slowly. The lovely Paper White narcissus, and its golden cousin, arcissus soliel d'or, will flower for Christmas if started by Nov. 1 and

grown in the proper temperature. Failure is usually due to fast growth stimulated by high temperatures, which result in scanty roots spindly top growth, and no flowers at all, or very poor ones. Whether grown in gravel and water, bulb fibre, or soil, containers several nches deep should be used, so there is plenty of room for roots. Set the bulbs close together, but do not let them touch. There should be two inches of gravel, soil or fibre below them, and water should be kept only high enough to touch the base of the bulbs.

Root formation precedes top growth and should take four weeks. A 'emperature below 60 degrees is essential, and it may be kept bedark, but with these bulbs a sub dued light is permissible. Whe growth will begin, and at this stage the bulbs can be given more light though it is well to keep them out of direct sun until flower stalks begin to develop. T Then give them all

Best flowers will result if a temperature of 65 degrees is never ex-Be careful to keep the plants away from steam pipes and radiators, or living rooms heated above 70 degrees. 

The dairyman that keeps no feeding and production records at all will usually feed all his cows the same amount, which means that the high producing cows are underfed and the low-producing cows are overfed. The Dairy Herd Improvement Association will furnish dairymen with the information necessary to do the right job of feeding cows according to production, the Extension dairymen say, and this method of feeding means more pounds of milk for each pound of grain fed.

If cows are on pasture and getting all the roughage they can clean up each day, grain can be used most economically by feeding one pound to Jerseys and Guernseys for each three pounds of milk they produce, and one pound to Holsteins for each four pounds of milk produced.

As soon as each star accepts an invitation, rehearsals are scheduled for him, allowing for benefits, personal appearances, movies and his own radio show. Seven writers were hired to turn out a script that is from 88 to 90 pages long and fitted to the individual style of the various celebrities. Researsals, which generally start 3 or 4 days before the actual airing, are set up in segments due to the difficulty in getting so many stars together at a time and A Gigantic Undertaking

Fifty hours of musical rehearsal are necessary for such a show . . the orchestra has 40 members, chosen for their versatility in music . they must accompany the operatic arias of Lauritz Melchior, the Latin songs of Lima Romay, the ballads of Ginny Simms and the novelty ditties of Cass Daley. Altogether there are 120 persons involved. A scoreboard, containing the acts in order of appearance, is kept backstage and performers are not allowed outside the studio for a split second lest they miss their cue. A different colored script is used for each half-hour period so that everyne knows by color exactly how far along they are. The shows are broadcast over 159 CBS stations in


