Last week a petition was presented to the city council, asking consideration of plans for the construction of a civic building. suitable for large and small meetings, with an auditorium, smaller meeting rooms for organizations, and other facilities. A committee was appointed to look into the matter.

This idea has been present in the minds of a great many Memphis citizens for some time. The recent completion of the community building at Wellington, and that town's demonstration of the good to be derived from such a common meeting place, has no doubt given rise to more thought here on the subject.

There is little doubt with most of us about the desirability of the building. There is an economic limit which a town of a given size cannot over-subscribe. If the investigating committee finds the building within reasonable financial reach, there is little doubt of its recommendation.


True, it will cost money. Its benefits will, in many cases be intangible. But most of the things we hold highest are intangibles.

The money spent must be considered an investment. It will not pay the owners a yearly dividend. It will pay a dividend Press Paragraphsday by day, increasing through the years with the growth of the capital stock-the youth of Memphis and the cultural growth of the community.

On the immediate and tangible side, the community center could furnish space and facilities adequate to put many organizational activities on a more paying basis. It would help advertise Memphis—just as the building at Wellington has made that town a little better known over the area. It could be an asset of the Chillicothe Garden Club's anwhich the community could be justly proud.

We do not have to start the building this month; but now that the plan is before us for open discussion, we do need to decide.
