The average yield of lint cotton from straight rows was 119 pounds and from closed level terraces 175 pounds. The value of the lint and cottonseed produced with closed level terraces for the 20-year period was \$191.41 per acre more than where rows ran with the slope. Saving all the water resulted in an increased return of \$9.57 per acre per year, or 46 per cent. 





If you can answer no to all of the questions asked above, your home is relatively safe from fire. But think, look and inspect before you make that answer. In the case of heating and lighting equipment, have an expert make a periodic check. Don't guess-remember that the owner of that home which is burning to the ground this minute probably thought it was safe too-and he was horribly wrong.



Jeremiah, native of Anathoth, a suburb of Jerusalem, through the reigns of five kings tried to arrest

When his prophecy, denouncing was read before Jehoiakim, the king who misruled Judah, the monarch cut off and burned a portion as it dawn by strangling the cock.

Jeholakim did not even prevent the writing of a second roll in which Jeremiah predicted the king's death and the nation's ruin. This prophecy was literally fulfilled.

Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon, p. m. made Jehoiakim a vassal. But after three years the wretched king rebelled. Bands of Chaldeans, Syrians, Moabites, and Ammonites were sent against Judah. Some of the Jews were taken captive, as all were destined to be in time. Jeholakim soon died.

As with a nation, so will it be with an individual. One man cannot sin and long "get by." Every man can control his destiny if he starts in time. But let him once begin a wrong course and it will be difficult for him to stop it. Like the widening ripples started when a boy throws a rock into a pond, an evil course will go on and on. 

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
