





Sunday Stevenson went to the Derrick home in an effort to persuade her to come back with him and when she refused, he went into the house, got the knife and stabbed and slashed her on the left arm and the left side of the body, according to the Derricks. Derrick and his wife ran out of the house, yelling for help, and Stevenson fled.

Two negroes, Mitchel Golbreath and George Jones, passing by in a pick-up, stopped and carried the woman to Memphis, but she was dead long before reaching a doc-

The two negroes reported the slaying to the sheriff's office and Sheriff Earl Hill, Deputy Grant Evans, highway patrolman Noel D. Caloway, police chief W. P. Baten, Jim Wooten, Gerald Mc-Daniel, along with the negroes who reported the killing, left immediately for the search.

They trailed Stevenson to the home of a negro identified as 'Baldy." Baldy said the fleeing negro had stopped there, telling im what had happened, and that he was threatened. Baldy is reported to have taken a shot at Stevenson after being threatened.

ater for irrigation is cheap, but not if it is wasted. Follow suggestions below and you'll do a better job of watering ur lawn and do it more economically.



USE A CANVAS SOIL SOAKER instead of a spray that throws water high into the air in a fine mist. Water from a soil soaker seeps slowly into the ground and none is wasted through evaporation. Grass roots grow deeper and the grass is better able to withstand hot weather.



WATER IN THE EVENING or early morning instead of during the heat of the day. The sun and hot daytime winds evaporate much of the water that should go into the soil, especially if a fine mist spray is used. Watering in the evening lessens this evaporation and prevents waste.



DO NOT WATER FASTER than soil can soak it up. Water that falls to the ground faster than soil can soak it up simply runs off and is wasted. Do not turn water on full force and do not leave sprinkler or soil soaker too long in one location.



Can a landlord put you out if you don't agree to let him raise No. Except for these reasons: (1) Failure to pay your regular rent; (2) Outlandish action that makes you a bad tenant, like destroying the landlord's property; (3) Committing a nui sance, like using the property for immoral or illegal purposes; (4) Using the property for something else besides living quarters; (5) The landlord himself wants to live in the property. He can't put you out just so some relative or friend can move in; (6) He's arranged (in writing) to sell the property to some one who wants to live in self, not for a relative or friend (7) The landlord wants to make some necessary-note the word necessary-improvements or replace the property with some new building. (And such improvement cannot practicably be done with

Must Go to Court

Those causes just given are the only ones for which a landlord can put you out. But, before he can put you out, he must go to a local court and state his case. Then it's up to the judge-in keeping with state laws-to decide whether you have to get out for the landlord and against you. You can't protest to the zovernment's rent control area diector. 

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A NATIONAL HIGHWAY SAFETY CAMPAIGN

Through the combined efforts of thousands of daily and weekly newspapers throughout the United States, a National Highway Safety Program has been launched throughout the nation. Because of its purpose alone, the campaign is one of the most praiseworthy and beneficial public services in recent

Any effort to reduce or eliminate the tragic toll of traffic accidents which annually account for thousands of needless deaths is worthy of wholehearted support.

Last year 33,500 persons were accidently killed on our streets and highways. The staggering total of 1,150,000 were injured and an economic loss of over two billion dollars resulted.

What makes those lost lives, the pain and suffering, and the economic loss more tragic is the realization that, with proper care and precaution, they could have been avoided.

Now, as a result of the President's Highway Safety Conference last year and the second meeting of the Conference recently, an intensive effort is being made to prevent traffic accidents in the future. Much has already been accomplished in the way of traffic enforcement and engineering. The National Highway Safety Program is the newspapers' contribution to the educational phase of accident prevention.

But it has been significantly pointed out by Maj. Gen. Philip B. Fleming, general chairman of the President's Highway Safety Conference, that brief, spasmodic campaigns will not bring lasting results. There is need for intensive effort on the part of every man, woman and child.

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
