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### Let There Be Light

Afraid of the dark? You should be, for your own safety. Paradoxically, during the hours when there are fewer automobiles on the streets more people are killed in traffic accidents. Traffic during the hours of darkness is less than half as heavy as by daylight, traffic and safety experts say, yet 60 per cent of the persons who lose their lives in traffic accidents; are killed at night.

Several factors contribute to this paradox. First, there is the fact that drivers and pedestrains are generally more fatigued at the end of the day and as darkness approaches. Too-and an important point—there is more drinking at night and consequently more drivers under the influence of alcohol and more pedestrians who are less alert when crossing the street.

Then comes a long list of contributing factors brought on by darkness itself-poor vision, glaring headlights, misdirected street lighting, and on and on.

Many of the latter hazardous elements can be eliminated by proper traffic engineering and improved lighting of streets Press Paragraphs and directional signs. Every community in the country should do all within its power to see that its street and surrounding highways are properly lighted and made more safe for its citizens.

But the most important remedy for the tragic annual toll of night accidents, and the responsibility for that remedy, will give all 4-H clubs within the rests with the individual driver and pedestrians. All the improved lighting and engineering in the world will not correct the evil of the driver who persists in driving too fast. Nor will good lighting rid us of the inexcusable peril of the driver who refuses to dim his lights when approaching oncoming traffic, or the would-be killer who drinks too much, or the goon and grave-digger who ignores traffic signals and ordinary courtesy stration Clubs, the Business and of the road.

Likewise, we will not be rid of the candidates for suicide the Teen Age Club. . . . Although who walk along or cross the street deliberately disregarding the rules of safety or with too many hookers under their belts.

So, you see, until every individual responsible becomes more careful, especially at night, we will always suffer the loss of the lives of our friends, our relatives\_or ourselves. Until the entire American public becomes overwhelmingly conscious of the need for safety on our streets and highways, we have every reason to be afraid of the dark.

Oncoming bright headlights can momentarily blind the best of drivers. It requires seven seconds after passing glaring lights for your eyes to dilate again to the darkened road. Even in this brief space of time you may not see the dim figure in the road ahead of you until it is too late.

It's the early hours of darkness, especially in the Fall and Winter when traffic is still heavy, that produce the heaviest fatalities in driver-pedestrian accidents. The three hours after sunset are three times more dangerous than daylight hours.

A safe driver reduces his average speed at night. He looks away from glaring lights, watching the edge of the road on his side. He never "overdrives" his lights and can stop at any time within his headlight range. He is especially careful at intersections and is on the watch for unlighted vehicles, and motorists changing tires at the side of the road.

Pedestrians, for your own safety, walk to the left facing traffic, carry something white. Be extra cautious at night. Never forget, the life you save may be your own.



### **Auto Title And Registration Law Goes Into Effect**

A number of these new laws Since that date, for example, the Texas Highway Department is required to charge a fee of \$1 fee is required for serial num

The growing practice of installing new and rebuilt motors, some bearing no identification number, demands a strict account ing of both motor and serial numbers on vehicles to assure valid titles in the name of rightful owners.

New laws outline a procedure When motors are exchanged, the vehicle owner must apply promptly to the Texas Highway Depart an public spends more than 4 ment for a correction of his certificate of title. Otherwise the title to his vehicle is clouded because its motor number does not correspond to his title, an awkyard situation to handle when he ries to sell his car.

If the new or reconditione motor bears a manufacturer's number, it should be used. If it is blank, as many are nowadays the purchaser must apply direct to the Texas Highway Department at Austin for an assigned number. Forms for this practice nay be obtained from any coun ty tax collector's office. It is illegal to stamp any number on a motor other than a number assigned by the highway depart-

A new service has been provided for Texans who wish to take delivery on a new vehicle at the factory or from a dealer in an other state. Temporary license plates for the exclusive use of buyers while driving their new car back home are now issued under another of the 50th session's nev

Suggested by highway department officials for the convenience of purchasers wishing to drive their new car back from the fac tory, the new law eliminates many thorny legal technicalities formerly incident to the practice.

Temporary plates, good for thirty days, can now be secured without delay at the county tax collector's office, and carried to the factory or other out-of-state delivery point. The owner may secure certificate of title to his new car and regular registration plates after returning to Texas.
