

Texas Tech Makes Nation Wide Study Of College Success

In an effort to see if high school graduation is the best criteria for predicting success in college, a nation-wide study of records of students who entered college without completing high school in comparison with records of students of the same age group who received high school diplomas is being conducted, according to W. P. Clement, Texas Technological College registrar.

The study is made possible on a large scale because many war veterans who did not complete high school are now attending colleges throughout the nation after passing general education development tests, Clement explained.

The Texas Tech registrar, who is chairman of the committee on special projects for the American Association of Collegiate Registrars, is directing the study for the association.

Win Texas 4-H State Honors

TEXAS 4-H State winners in the 1947 Better Methods Electric, Field Crops, Poultry and Dress Revue awards programs, who will each receive a trip to the 26th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, Nov. 30-Dec. 4, and brief outlines of their records follow:



Alvin Davis, 20, of Post, won highest rating in the 1947 state 4-H Field Crops activity, in which International Harvester provides the awards. During seven years of club work, he produced 187 acres of cotton and 136 acres of grain sorghum, with estimated incomes of \$8,700 and \$5,297 respectively, which brought his total 4-H income to \$16,199.99.

Gayle West, 17, of Memphis, received the state award of a Chicago trip provided by Westinghouse Educational Foundation for outstanding achievements in the 1947 4-H Better Methods activity. Gayle has been a 4-H'er for six years. Among his work simplification accomplishments on the farm and in the home are using electricity in place of the farm tractor to grind feed, wiring the poultry house and shop, and fencing pastures with electric fences.

Lois Mills, 16, of Crowley, wins the Chicago trip award provided by Swift & Co. for her top-ranking 1947 4-H Poultry Achievement record in the State. During seven years in club work she raised 445 chickens, mostly white Leghorns.

Joline Dyer, 16, of Houston, receives the Chicago trip award provided by the Simplicity Pattern Co. for making and modeling the top rating outfit in the State 1947 4-H Dress Revue.

Nature Sows Flower Seed Fall; Why Not You?

Nature produces annuals in our gardens from self-seed, she demonstrates that they can be grown from seed in the fall.

Most of annuals which can be sown in the fall may vary in different sections of the country, but it is probable that larkspur and cornflower (centaurea cyanus) will be found almost anywhere. Larkspur, indeed, should be sown in the fall wherever possible.

From fall sowing get started earlier in the spring; and sowing almost as soon as in the spring, besides being larger and more vigorous.

List of subjects may safely be sown in your neighborhood, and other varieties which are hard to get in the spring, are also sown in the fall. A cold frame is an excellent place for fall annuals. A cold frame is a well-protected place in the open garden, where the soil has shown drainage is good. All seeds are sown in rows, and marked, it is easy to find them when they appear.

Conditions in the spring are usually fine for transplanting and plants may be moved from the seed bed to the border about the time one would be sowing seed in the spring. The fall sown plants are not soft like those grown indoors and receive little or no check from transplanting.

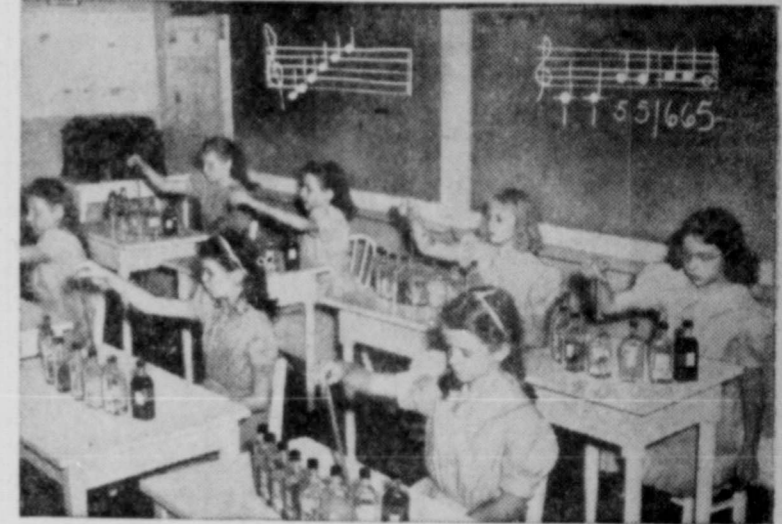

Service Stations Receive Warning About Anti-Freeze

The freezing weather has brought on need of anti-freeze and that has brought a warning against harmful types, local service station operators announced this week.

These letters of warning come from the National Better Business Bureaus of New York City. The letters state that "production of anti-freezes of the chloride type—chiefly calcium chloride and magnesium—were barred during the war to protect the nation's automobiles."

"With wartime restrictions lifted, it has been noted that more than one chloride product is being offered, with the usual claim which counteracts the chloride tendency toward corrosion of engine parts.

"Owners who buy unknown products, may find their cars ruined in a short period of time," the letter says.

Memphis operators say there is a shortage of permanent anti-freeze but that they have "alcohol anti-freeze with a methanol base" which, while not permanent, is being used this year.

Some operators said they had no anti-freeze at all, while one said he had a permanent anti-freeze of a nationally known brand.

Texas Tech Has Enrollment Rise

The number of students at Texas Technological College this fall increased almost 14 per cent over last fall, as compared with a national average increase of 9.62 per cent in universities and professional schools, and an increase of 6.75 per cent in Texas state college enrollments, according to an announcement made in Lubbock.

Texas Tech has the second largest increase in number of students of any state supported college in Texas, according to figures from the state department of education. North Texas State Teacher's College, whose student body rose from 3,795 in 1946 to 4,666 this fall, was first. Texas Tech student body increased from 5,365 in 1946 to 6,114 this fall.

Famous Photographer At Canyon Teachers

William David Bell, one of the foremost color photographers in the United States, recently took pictures at West Texas State College and in nearby Palo Duro Canyon State Park.

His work there was near the end of an assignment to make a color photographic series of Texas to be used in three separate issues of a noted national travel publication.

Bell and his assistant, Earl Claburn, have spent more than three months in Texas working on this one assignment.

A member of the American Society of Photographers, Bell said he had enjoyed his Texas trip because it was a homecoming venture for him. He is a former University of Texas student and is a native of Houston.

Chief interest for Bell at Canyon was the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society's museum on the campus at West Texas State College. The famed building and abundance of material it houses was fascinating subjects for the noted cameraman.

Bell's only regret while in this section was that not enough typical Panhandle weather prevailed. He found cloudy days and rain with the exception of about one hour which he spent frantically photographing in picturesque Palo Duro Canyons.

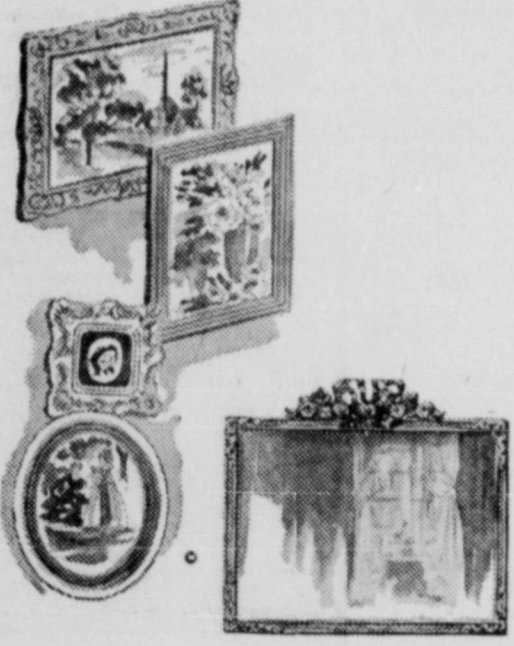

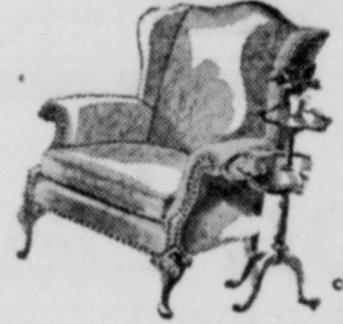

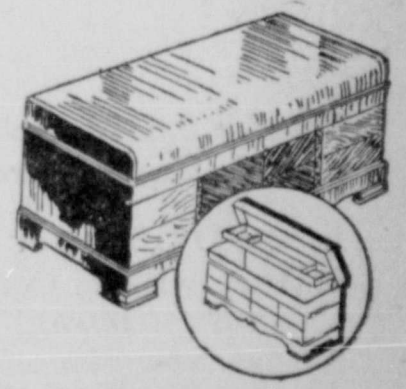
