





Monroe Karcher, farmer in the Riverside community in Foard county, never had as much alfalfa seed and hay as he harvested this


Karcher baled 7,000 bales of threshed hay and harvested 83,-000 pounds of seed. All from 156 acres of land.

It started last February, Joseph E. Burkett, county agent, says, when Karcher applied 300 pounds of superphosphate per acre on his alfalfa land. He'd never used superphosphate be-

.He cut the hay twice before letting it go to seed.

He told Burkett that the highest seed yield he'd ever had before was 200 pounds per acre. This year, it averaged out to 532 pounds per acre.
