





nber of com will provide facilities for future registration of all boys reaching the age of 18 who are required by the Selective Service law to register. Manager Clifford Farmer of



#### Industry And The Cost Of Living

Few of us think about it, but industries, like families, have a cost of living problem to face these days. And, in both cases, it has its roots in current prices.

The oil industry is a particularly good case in point, because it has had large dollar earnings which have been the subject of criticism in some uninformed quarters. It may seem that if a company makes millions of dollars over and above the cost of carrying on its business in the course of a year, it has nothing to be concerned about. But that isn't the case.

A company can't stand still, "freeze" its plant and facilities, and expect to remain in business for long. It has to move ahead to keep up with the competition, to satisfy its customers, and to replace equipment which gradually wears out just like the family automobile. That's where the rub comes.

A new refinery costs more than twice as much to build today as it did ten years back. New pipe lines cost up to three times as much. The cost of finding new crude oil reserves to replace those which are being used up has more than doubled in the same period. So the story goes, all the way Press Paragraphsthrough the industry. Those profit dollars just won't do the job they once did. As a consequence, more and more of them must be used to buy plants and other physical facilities. And, in many cases, oil companies have to borrow from investors to carry out necessary programs.

So, the cost of living is just as much a problem to industry as it is to farmers, workers, retired people, government employees, or anyone else. Remember that next time you hear 'high profits' denounced as an economic crime against the public

HIDE HUN Sec. AN HISTORICAL EPISODE OF LIFE IN THE GREAT SOUTHWEST

#### BY J. EVETTS HALEY ILLUSTRATED BY H. D. BUGBEE

IN THE ENTIRE story of the chasein all the annals of hunting-there is nothing to compare with the slaughter of the American buffalo. In the scope of territory involved, in the number of men engaged, in the systematic destruction of millions of this shaggy mountain of beef-ranged from the Atlantic tideland into the Rocky Mountains, and from the great Slave Lake in the Arctic clear down into Mexico. Its range had been slowly beaten back by the inroads of the settlers until, at the end of the Civil War, it was fairly restricted to the Great Plains area, reaching from just below the Conchos to well above the Canadian border.

Seasonally, it moved, in keeping with that strange but elemental urge;

individual groups that made up this vast herd, and with guns mounted on their rest-sticks, killed them off in bunches. Meanwhile, they lived high on rich roasts of buffalo hump, boiled tongue, and roasted marrow bones while their outfits skinned their kill by the thousands, pegged the green hides on the ground to dry, baled the flint hides high on their wagons, and freighted them back across the seas of buffalo grass for shipment east from Dodge City.

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

In this period it attracted the active interest of the great fur and hide companies as big, if bloody, business — employing thousands of hunters, skinners, freighters and camp men.

Its rise was sounded by the roar of the Sharps' rifles from the Canadian border to the lower breaks of the Staked Plains. While the robe business had engaged the northwestern Indian traders for decades, the real hunt boomed and practically passed with the decade of the seventies. It was a matter of genuine historic significance. For the passing of the buffalo and the destruction of the Indians' larder meant the passing of the Indian problem on the western plains, and the opening of this vast region to ranching.

At one time this hardy animal-

migrating north with the rise of grass in the spring, and back south with the subtlest suggestion of approaching fall. The building of the transcontinental rail lines in the late sixties and early seventies cut the herd in two. With convenient points of supply and transportation thus provided, the business of hunting buffalo for their hides almost immediately came to life.

In 1872, the village of Dodge City, in western Kansas, became the center of this incipient trade in the Southwest. Below there, clear to the Colorado and the Conchos, grazed the greatest concentration of big game ever witnessed by the eye of man. East, among the settlements, existed a demand for fine and finished robes. Here was the supply; back there the demand. Still hostile Indians, extremely jealous of further inroads upon their wild game, made the hunt a hazardous pursuit.

It did not matter to those with the hardihood to venture! Rugged men made up their outfits along the railroads. With bar lead, kegs of powder and scant supplies - for wild meat was their fare-they headed out in every direction from Dodge City. With genuine knowledge of animal nature, they got their stands on the

Thus harassed by a continual hunt. the main southern herd drifted to the south. The hunters followed in the spring of 1874, and met them on their migration north, on and below the Canadian, in the Panhandle of Texas, in the heart of the Indians' hunting range. And here the Comanches and Kiowas - supposedly held on reserves in The Territory-fell on the hunters in wrath to wreak their terrible vengance. Many scattered hunters were killed, but the fight at the trading post of Adobe Walls, on the Canadian, taught the Indians the power of the Sharps' rifles and the accuracy of the hunters' eyes.

And so the slaughter went on with concentrated fury around Fort Griffin and the foot of the Plains down through 1878, when the bulk of the southern herd, estimated in excess of three million animals, was killed off. Then the Indians, with insufficient food to sustain them, were forced back on the paternalism of the federal government

And thus, at last peace came to the far-flung frontier settler while the good tight turf of the buffalo grassnature's richest cover for these windswept Plains-beckoned to the bowlegged men who made their livings in the dust of cattle.
