Twenty Miles A Day Being Built Now In Hall Co.

The Hall County ACA office has been issuing approvals for standard and diversion terraces at the rate of 20 miles a day this month. At the present they are being built at that rate, says Secretary Lynn McKown.

Mr. McKown reports "tremendous interest" in building of new terraces since the winter's bad weather broke about February

Nat Bradley, Memphis terracing contractor, has built 50 miles of new terraces in the last 60 days. He can average over three miles a day with his machinery. And he is only one of about 12 such contractors now building terraces on farms in this county.

"In fact, assistance has been given by the ACA for building about 500 miles of new terraces this year already," points out Sec-retary McKown. "This financial assistance amounts to about 11/2 cents a foot. It is what we call the share the cost plan."

Back to Bradley's record. He came out of the Army in 1945 and began terracing work immediately. He had worked with the State highway department before going into the service. He contracted for and built 345,068 feet of terraces in 1945, increased it to 715,791 feet in 1946, then had his big year in 1947 when he built a total of 1,268,065 feet of terraces in Hall County alone, besides doing a lot in Donley and Collingsworth Counties. In 1948, his record shows 965,411 feet built in Hall County.
