#### SERIOUS DANGER IN CALF DIPHETHERIA If precautions and proper treat-

nent are neglected, calf diphethe ria (or dangerous sore-mouth) may cause serious trouble and heavy death losses among young beef and dairy calves.

The disease is seen most often where dampness and lack of sunlight are coupled with poor sani tation. An outbreak may affect only one or two animals, or it may strike as many as 50 per cent of

the calves on the farm. Entirely different from the germ that causes human diphtheria, the cause of this disease in calves is the rot bacillus called Actinomyces necrophorus. This same germ is also responsible for bull-nose in pigs, footrot in sheep and several other livestock di-

When the germ gains entrance to the calf's tissuses, the first symptoms usually are drooling, slobbering and refusal to eat. Wicked-looking ulcers appear in the calf's mouth, and adherent patches or areas of false membrances on the lips, tongue, or cheek lining. These ulcers may spread to the throat, windpipe or even the lungs and liver. The animal becomes weak and emaciated. Death may occur within a week-or the disease may linger on for several weeks.

The best precaution against calf diphtheria is to provide sum ny, well-bedded quarters, regularly cleaned and disinfected.

Any calf that shows symptoms of the disease should be isolated from the rest of the herd. If the veterinarian's diagnosis and help are obtaned immediately, it increases the chances of recovery, as calves have a much better chance if treatment is begun dur-ing the early stages of the disease.

#### NATIONWIDE ALERT FOR 'X DISEASE'

Properly handled, a ton of manure is about equal to 100 ounds of fertilizer of 10-5-10 analysis .Since a steer or dairy cow usually will produce 1,000 pounds of manure, or more, monthly, this means that the animal is contributing \$10 to \$20 yearly toward improvement of the soil on the farm where it is fed.

In addition to its plant food value, manure provides humus, or organic matter, to increase the water holding capacity of soil, improve soil texture and reduce wind erosion. Acids and bacteria in manure also help to release plant food from insoluble com pounds in the soil.

Feeding of a protein concen trate, such as cottonseed cake or pellets, on the range also is an important conservation practice. Supplemental feeding and moving feeding grounds regularly aids better distribution of grazing,

and helps to prevent overgrazing Manure has a higher value if promptly spread on fields or pas ures. If stored, it should not be allowed to become dry. overheated or leached by rains. Adding 100 pounds of superphosphate to each on of manure increases fertilizing

### **Electric Power** Consumption Up

April electric power consumption in Texas gained 1 per cent from March and rose 8 per cent from a year earlier, the University of Texas Bureau of Research reported.

With the exception of a 2-percent reduction from March in residential power, all types of power users showed gains over both the previous month and a year earlier.

Residential consumption rose 13 per cent during the 12-month period; commercial, 10 per cent; and industrial, 2 per cent.

After adjustment for seasonal variation, the Bureau's index of total power consumption increased fractionally to 338 per cent of the 1935-39 level in April. The Bureau's seasonally adjusted in dex of industrial consumption slid 1 per cent from March to 295 per cent in April 1949.

When they die, their bodies decay and the nitrogen can be used by the corn or cotton crop the nitrogen is made available to
