## Official C-C Week Begins Monday; Directors' Meeting Opens Activity

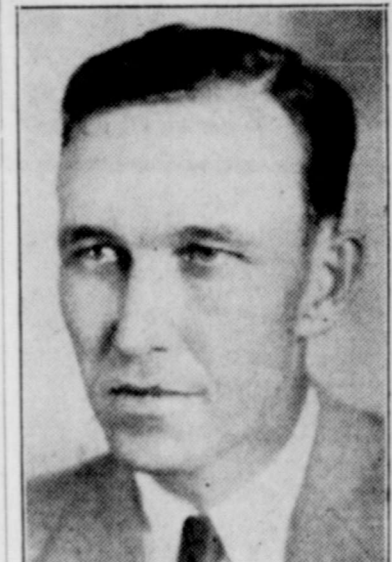

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### Memphians Will Serve On New Highway Board

Another Chamber of Commerce goal was realized Friday, March 31, when the US Highway 287 Association was officially organized in Lamar, Colo.

C-C Manager Clifford Farmer attended the meeting as Memphis representative. Delegates from cities all along the four-state highway were present for this meeting.

A board of directors for the organization was selected. James F. Smith and Farmer were named to this board. Smith is highway committee chairman in the local Chamber of Commerce.

It was pointed out the meeting that Highway 287 is one of the most attractive tourist routes in the nation, Farmer said. The route extended from Port Arthur northwest to Yellowstone National Park, offering ideal winter and summer vacation points on its ends. In addition, the highway

has many tourist attractions along its entire route.

"The value of this highway to Texas can be shown by the fact that tourist dollars make up the state's third largest income source," Farmer said.

The meeting Friday also emphasized the fact that 287 is a valuable highway for commercial uses. It was pointed out that 287 is the fastest route for truck shipments from the Gulf Coast to Denver and other points further west.

In order to publicize the highway and encourage travel over it, a caravan will travel the length of 287 sometime in the near future, Farmer said. This booster trip will be made up of delegates from cities on 287 and the caravan will stop at important points along the route from Yellowstone Park to Port Arthur to give special shows. The most important Texas stops have been slated for Amarillo, Wichita Falls and Ft. Worth.

"This Association will be of direct benefit to Memphis by promoting the use of High 287," Farmer said. "We can certainly expect to benefit from all increased

### Social Security News

Old-age and survivors insurance is a three-way partnership between the employer, his employees, and the Federal Government. "It is a joining of forces and resources in attacking the economic hazards of old-age and death," says John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office.

He points out that this three-way cooperation is often overlooked. He sums this up as follows:

(a) The Federal Government issues social security account numbers, maintains records of wages and pays benefits.

(b) The employer quarterly lists wages paid his employees, their social security account numbers and turns over the employee-employer contributions to the Bureau of Internal Revenue for transmission to the old-age and survivors insurance trust fund.

(c) The employee working on jobs covered by social security shares in the contributions and by advising the employer of his correct social security number insures proper wage credits.

Correct information about benefits may be obtained from the Amarillo social security office

located in Room 324 of the New Post Office Building.

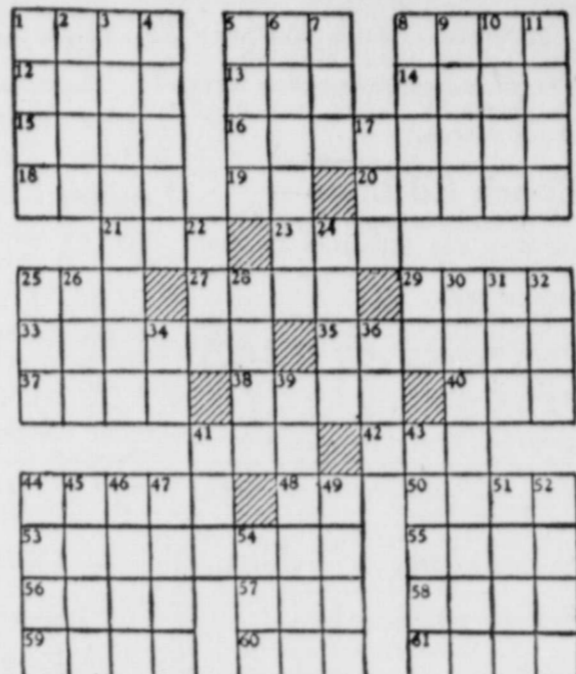

PRESIDENT TRUMAN is scheduled to deliver a major political address in Chicago May 15 at a meeting of the Democratic national committee and Democratic leaders in the windy city.

The speech will be the first in a series of grassroots and "whistle stop" speeches the President will make prior to the congressional elections in November. Just how the President is going to handle this campaign is a question being asked here in Washington.

There is little question that the 81st congress has made just as poor a record as a "do-nothing congress" as the 80th, which the President castigated from coast to coast for not carrying out his Fair Deal program.

The opinion has been expressed that one reason for this early speech of the President may be to stir-up this congress, nominally Democratic, but controlled by a coalition of southern Democrats and Republicans.

Even though this congress under the Truman whip has failed to pass the Fair Deal program, the consensus is that it will do nothing to hurt business, that it is a "safe" congress. On the horizon and likely of enactment are two measures. One would set up a plan whereby small business could get insured loans, up to \$15,000, under much the same plan as FHA housing loans; the other would regulate the sick and ailing coal industry and end the monopolistic control over the industry by John L. Lewis, boss of the united mine workers.

Sen. Clinton Anderson, former secretary of agriculture, in a statement this past week defending the agricultural act of 1949, said the law cures two things about which the farmers complained in the last campaign; (1) it provides plenty of storage space for grain, and (2) it holds up the price support, which under the Aiken law of

First reports from the work of the house appropriations committee on the single appropriation bill indicate a step in the right direction, a slash of \$1,385,377,504 in the President's budget for the same items, or about 5 per cent below the amount requested for the 1951 budget.

The committee approved a cash outlay of \$27,266,403,664 for the fiscal year, plus contract authorities of \$1,778,626,500. These outlays do not include appropriations for debt interest and other perennial items which by law receive automatic approval of the congress. Neither do they include funds for foreign aid which are to be proposed in a later bill.

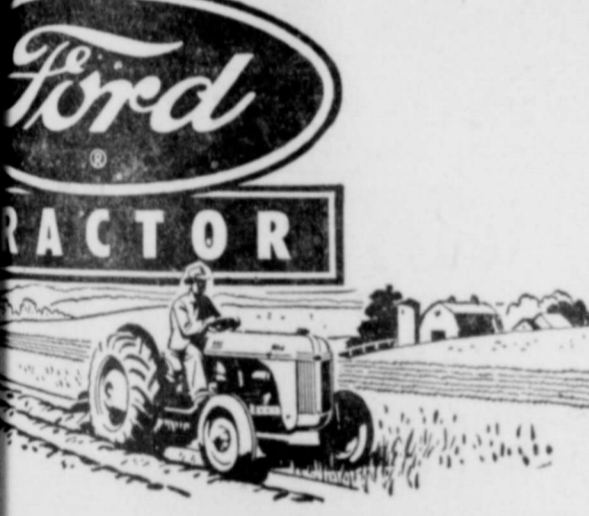
Incidentally, the senate committee on expenditures has issued a report showing that more than 301,000 government workers have been dropped from the federal payroll since January 1, 1947. The number of persons on the federal payroll dropped from a postwar peak of 2,262,625 on that date to 1,961,029 on January 1, 1950, the report said. Independent agencies showed a decrease of 119,000 in personnel.

The report said 56,000 were dropped from war assets, 31,000 from veteran's administration, 19,000 from office of temporary controls, 7,000 from the maritime commission, 7,000 from housing and home finance, 248,000 from the department of defense. Decreases totaling 27,574 were noted from treasury, agriculture and labor.

But the post office department showed an increase of 76,737, and 8,606 were added to the department of commerce.

SPORTS AFIELD By Ted Kestng

Fishing is for fun and the most fun is the actual catching of fish. Yet the reward is likely to be in proportion to the effort involved.

The foundation of a fly-fishing outfit is the rod. It is the most expensive item in your initial outfit; yet it can last a lifetime. It is worth some consideration.

Dan Holland, whose book "Trout Fishing," was released a few months ago, tells us that a fly rod is chosen more for the casting work it must perform than for the size fish it is hoped it will land. For instance, he uses the same rod for black bass as for salt water fish 10 times their strength because bass bugs, feathered minnows and spinner flies are awkward lures which require a strong rod to handle well.

Or a New England trout fisherman who rarely requires a rod larger than eight feet in length and four ounces in weight, might if fishing in the Rockies choose one of nine feet and six ounces.

simply because the larger rivers there require a rod which will handle much more line.

These two sizes, by the way, will take care of most fly-fishing conditions. A dry-fly enthusiast will want a lighter one, and a fisherman who is striving for distance and is after big fish—steelhead, salmon or salt-water fish—may want a larger one. But a fisherman should not select a rod too big and cumbersome for his fishing needs. The rod is in almost continuous operation in fly fishing, so a heavy one will tell on a man.

As for rod action, one still hears talk of dry-fly and wet-fly action. These terms are meaningless today. The so-called wet-fly action was an old-fashioned type rod that bent fairly uniformly from butt to tip. It went out with the Model T.

A good rod of modern design will handle a great variety of conditions. It starts to work primarily in the tip and as more and more pressure is applied it shifts the strain down to the stronger middle and butt sections.

A rod designed with a soft middle or butt section is inefficient because the lower part of the rod takes over before the most benefit has been derived from the tip.

It is dangerous economy to build a steep stairway to save space, especially if they are used frequently. Every stairway should have the protection of a guard rail—low enough for children.

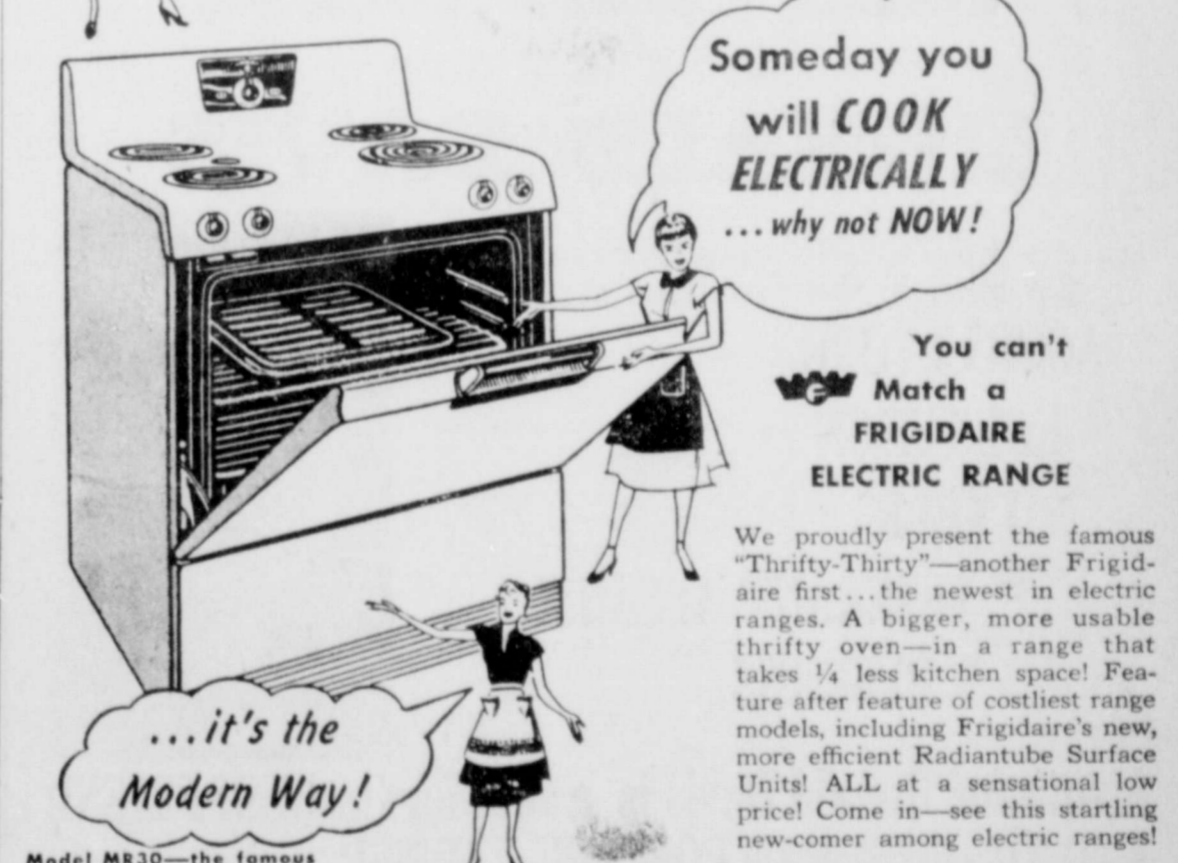
