





vice headquarters here. Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state director of Selective Service, advised today that "these men no longer have to advise of any change of address or status, as the law under which they registered was terminated by Congress in 1947."

The only men who are obligated to keep local boards advised are those registered under the Selective Service Act of 1948 which became law on June 24, 1948, the state director pointed

"Any man who has registered with Selective Service in 1948, 1949, or 1950 is obligated to advise his local board of address and status changes," General Wakefield said. "Any man regisered with any local board prior o those years is not required by aw to do so."

The state director said that every man should ask himself the question: "Should I be registered under the Selective Service Act of 1947?"

The answer, say General Wake ield, is simple. If the man was born on August 30, 1922, or after he is required to be registered. provided he is not under 18. If he was born prior to August 30, 1922, he is not required by law to be registered under the Selective

Service Act of 1948.

Q-My doctor told me that I should have my tonsils removed, but I can't afford it. As a World War II veteran, can I have this operation performed at a VA hospital, even though my condition is not service-connected?

A-Yes, if VA doctors deem surgery is necessary and if you sign a certificate stating you are not able to pay for the operation. But you will have to wait for a bed to become available, for in VA hospitals first priority goes to emergency cases; second to those with service-connected illnesses and disabilities, and third, to those with non-service-connected ailments.

Q-I am a retired regular Army officer drawing career compensttion retirement from the Army. Is it possible to get disability com. pensation from VA at the same time?

A-Yes. When you apply to VA you will be required to state the amount of your retirement pay After your case is adjudicated, VA will notify the Army of the amount of compensation or pension granted. The Army, then, will deduct an equivalent amount from your retirement pay.





A-He can garnishee the training wages you receive from your mployer-trainer, but he can't gar nishee the subsistence allowance you receive from VA.

Q-I've been in an Army hospital ever sine the end of the war, and I'm scheduled to get out in 1951. At that time, too, I understand I will receive my discharge from the Army. What will be my deadline for starting GI Bill education training?

A-Four years from your date of discharge. But you will have to finish training by July 25, 1956.

F. McCollum. The new structure, as shown in the architect's sketch above, will be three stories and is expected to be completed in the fall of 1951.
