cold weathers, I increase the size of the fire as quickly as possible. Now one thing sportsmen too often overlook is the importance of food in heating the body. I have seen deer hunters take only a cup of coffee for breakfast and then wonder later why they were so chilly even in moderate weather. The reason was plain: they hadn't stoked the furnace, they had failed to put fuel in the stomach.

To keep moving also means to keep warm. Certainly, no one has ever frozen to death in our temperate zone while moving. Therefore, all winter clothing should be worn with one purpose in mind—keeping warm when not on the go.

Veteran outdoorsman Bill Wolf thinks two things are most essential to have warm cloth next to the body, and an outside shell of

something windproof an, preferably, waterproof. The best materials are wool.

Next most important is dressing in layers. That is, it is warmer to put on two or three light shirts and a light hunting coat than it is to don one heavy shirt and one heavy hunting jacket, even though these weigh more than several light garments.

As for socks, I don't agree with those who advise wearing a pair of silk or cotton under woolen hunting stockings. I much prefer soft wool athletic socks. Wear a clean pair daily if possible; clean wool is warmer. Follow the insulation-by-layers principle here too, by using two or more pairs of socks. As for the outer boot, leather is warmer than rubber. But in wet country or when snow is on the

Our first state college—Texas A. and M. is now in its seventy-fifth year



Believing that every Texas boy of outstanding ability should have a chance to get a college education if he really wants one, former students of the A. and M. College of Texas five years ago made up a fund to finance their first Opportunity Awards. They offered any Texas boy who graduated from high school with an excellent record and who could not go to college without financial assistance a chance to win a scholarship paying \$200 to \$400 a year plus a student job if he needed it, to help him through college. Selections were made on the basis of scholarship, character and need, with a competitive examination as the deciding test. Sixteen boys won Opportunity Awards the first year and have graduated from A. and M. with outstanding records. Many Texas leaders have become interested in the plan and have given scholarships. This year there are 200 Opportunity Award boys in school at A. and M., from all over the state. One of the newest of these scholarships was financed by gifts from the current student body of the college.

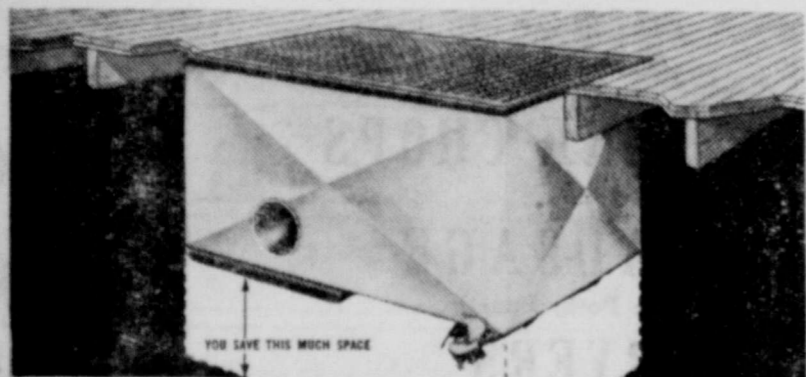

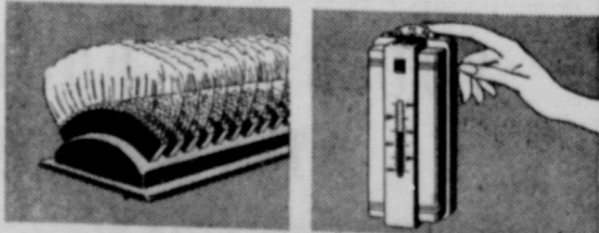

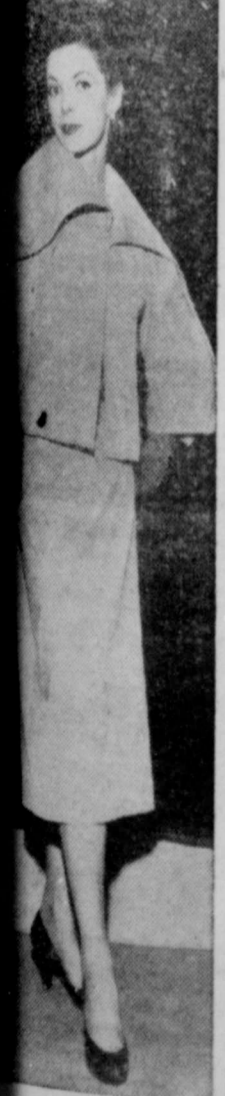

Editorial

Everyone has their own method of forgetting their troubles, some people just disappear, some take their own lives and others go insane with worry and some take to the liquid trouble easer, but the best method yet to be found was discovered by Nancy the little girl in the funny papers.
When she found her troubles unbearable she put on woolen underwear to help her forget her troubles. Maybe the world needs a suit of woolen underwear.

SOVIETS' AMERICA

As a matter of policy, the Soviet government does everything possible to create fear, distrust and hatred of America among its people. Those who would like an insight into some of the techniques would do well to read an article in the November American Mercury by Louis J. Herman, a specialist in Russian propaganda, call "America Through the Kremlin's Eyes."
The tenor of his article is found in this paragraph: "Did you know that Walt Disney was an arch-reactionary? That movie attendance is falling off because of public indignation at Hollywood's vile anti-Soviet propaganda. Or that crime is flourishing because the police are all tracking down progressive-minded Americans? Such cockeyed facts might be news to you, but every one of them is true—at least it says so in the Russian press, which is currently embarked on an extraordinary campaign of popular enlightenment about America and Americans—For Sheer volume, the current campaign to expunge the last trace of war time affection for America from the Russian mind is in a class by itself."
In the field of sweeping generalities, Mr. Herman quotes this picture of America from a piece in the New Times, a Soviet weekley: "A handful of plutocrats wallow in wealth and enjoy unlimited power, while tens of millions of ordinary people suffer privation and oppression. In their crusade against all progressive-minded Americans, the monopolists are out to turn the United States into a land of police bludgeons and torture chambers."

The American press—which, according to the official Soviet view, is almost 100 per cent pro-fascist and anti-democratic—naturally comes in for its full share of attention. The heaviest bombardment fall on publications of wide circulation such as Time and Newsweek, and the New York Times and Herald Tribune. The following view of goings on at the National Press Club in Washington is offered: "Here, over a glass of whiskey, around the card or billiard tables, rumors and insinuations are born, domestic and world news is manufactured, vicious, lying stories are penned at the warmongers' orders."
American business gets the works time and time again, with particular emphasis on the devils of Wall Street. The whole country, says the Russian organs, is run by trusts and monopolies, with the connivance of the labor unions. Thus, it is said, the officers of the CIO and AFL "besides abetting the monopolies on all major domestic issues . . . openly support the imperialists on the international scene." William Green is described as a "lackey of monopoly capitalism, political bandit and provocateur." To list the individuals who come in for Soviet compliments of this nature would take many pages. Walter Lippmann is a "malicious wormonger." Dorothy Thompson is "the well known pro-fascist." And Upton Sinclair, of all people, writes his books on the "assignment of Wall Street."
So it goes, in huge volume. How many Russians believe it no one knows. But the fact is that very few of them access to other point of view.

A recent issue of Life ran two pages of illustrations showing five grownups dressed in approved dude ranch fashion. They went hunting in New Mexico equipped with a "truck, horses, dogs, lariats and high-powered rifles but not a single 155-mm howitzer."
They treed a bear cub, roped its forepaws so it could not fight, took it out on the prairie, and turned it and their dogs loose. After tiring of watching this form of cruelty, they again roped it and as the cub sat on the ground pulling against the lariat attached to the saddle horn of a mounted rider, one of the five advanced to within 12 feet of it, and using a rifle with telescopic sights shot the helpless animal dead.
Life is to be complimented for giving a photographic record of this wanton and uncalled for example of "civilized" cruelty to contrast with its previous illustrations of "uncivilized" cruelty. One related to humans, the other to dumb beasts but the spirit that motivated both shocking exhibitions differed only in degree.

'51 Studebaker Now on Display

The new 1951 line of Studebaker automobiles were shown to the public Wednesday, Nov. 15, with the introduction of a Commander series powered by a compact, V-type, 8-cylinder, valve-in-head engine. The models are now on display in the showroom of W. H. Monzingo in Memphis, 614 Main.

Amarillo and people here have been with the engine from the exhibit. The 50-horsepower, 8-cylinder engine during the 1950 season is 120 at 4000 r.p.m., available horsepower is 36.4, compression ratio as released is 8.5 to 1.

Although the new engine has more power than the 6-cylinder engine formerly used, completely by the company as definitely show that the Commander will maintain its reputation for fuel economy established by preceding models. Moreover, the premium gasoline will not be required, Mr. Monzingo explained.

A new power plant for the Commander model is but one of the many changes in the 1951 Studebaker line. The lines of the 1951 Studebaker not only continue the revolutionary styling introduced a year ago, but give the cars a sleekness as a result of changes at the front and principal front-end styling center around the new "engine," and splash shield completely encloses the support bars. Styling at the rear reflect striking

new trunk deck handles and re-designed tail lamps which give much greater lighting both rearward and laterally.

"We believe the new standards will not only set new standards for beauty, but for safety, performance, and riding comfort as well," says Mr. Monzingo. "One-piece windshields, for example, which have been used on Studebaker's postwar 5-passenger coupes, convertibles, and Land Cruisers, are now standard on all Champions and Commanders. One-piece rear windows are also standard on all but the 5-passenger and business coupes. The increased visibility thus provided will, we feel, make an important contribution to motoring safety."

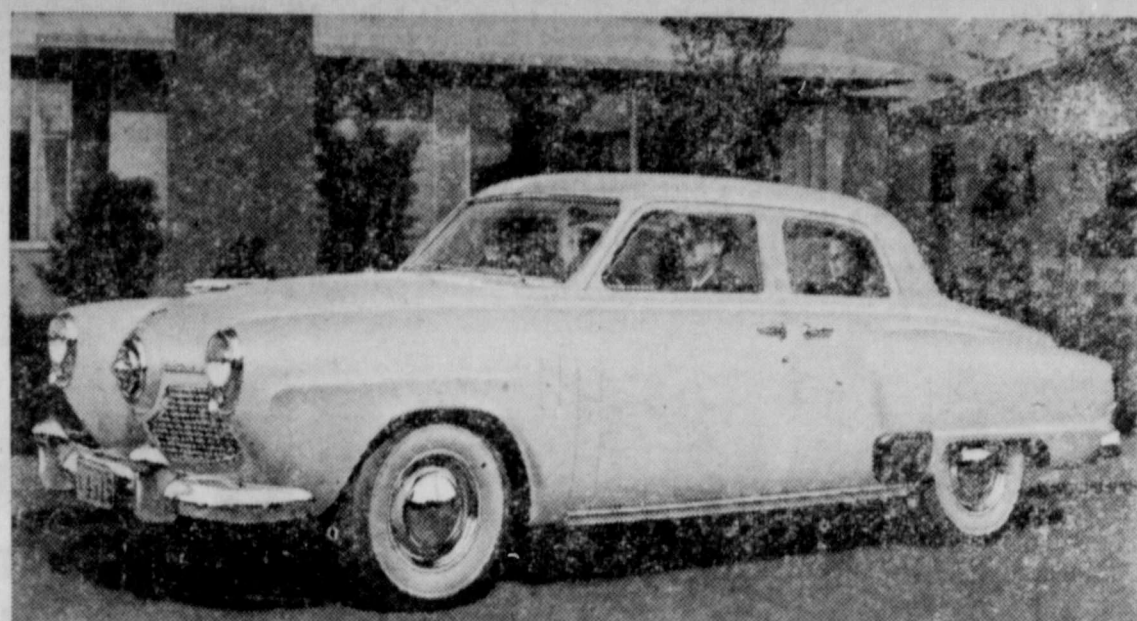
Among the important chassis changes are the wider rear springs which give the car much greater lateral stability. Inserted between the new four-leaf, 2 1/2-inch springs are full length polyethylene inserts to keep out dirt and moisture. Changes in the Champion include the adoption of centerpoint steering, a new instrument panel, and steel jacket-enclosed steering column and gear shift lever on all but the Custom models. Other changes include an increase in radiator frontal cooling area of 22 sq. in., and a boost in the generator output from 35 to 40 amperes.

Parking brake handles on all models have been re-designed and mounted on the instrument panel moulding for greater accessibility. Studebaker's automatic transmission is available on all models as optional equipment at extra cost. Overdrive will likewise continue as extra-cost optional equipment.

- 2 tablespoons of I Samuel 14:25 (honey)
- 2 cups of I Samuel 30:12 (raisins)
- 2 cups of Nahum 3:12 (figs)
- 1 cup of Numbers 17:8 (almonds)
- 1 teaspoon of Leviticus 2:13 (salt)
- 2 teaspoons of Amos 4:5 (baking powder)

1teaspoon of Chronicles 9:9 (spices)

Cream sugar and butter. Mix flour, salt, baking powder, and spices together. Add well beaten yolks to sugar and butter mixture. Next add milk, dry ingredients, honey, raisins (floured), almonds (broken), figs (chopped fine), and spices. Fold in egg whites beaten until frothy. Bake as any other cake.

Miss Adcock, a Memphis Senior, was crowned by the two Cyclone Captains, Tommy Messer and Roddy Stargel.

The game was played in below freezing weather which kept the crowd below par. Half of the 500 spectators watched the game from their cars while the rest sat bundled up in blankets in the stands.

The Bronchos gave the Memphis fans something besides the cold to shiver about when they took the opening kickoff and drove 70 yards for a score without relinquishing control of the ball.

Clarendon covered the 70 yards in ten plays and made three first downs in the drive. Left halfback, Mooring, made the big jump in the drive when he scampered 30 yards before being overhauled.

Trussell, the ripping Broncho fullback, aided Mooring in moving the ball down to the promise land. Mooring scored from the one foot line. Trussell ran the extra point over on a wide swing around right end.

Memphis turned the same trick when Clarendon kicked off to them. Memphis took the kickoff out to the 32, but a clipping penalty set them back to their own 17.

Tommy Messer and Carl Lee ate up the yards with one long run each. Messer went 25 yards on his breakthrough and Lee lugged the leather 15 yards.

Roddy Stargel and Duane Miller punched the ball through the Clarendon line to set up first downs at crucial times.

Stargel capped the scoring drive off by passing to right end Don Rasco for 17 yards and the score. Ronnie Smith kicked the extra point to tie the score at seven all.

On the first play from scrimmage, Trussell broke through the Cyclone line and after shaking off two or three would-be tacklers scurried 88 yards for a touchdown behind good downfield blocking.

Roddy Stargel was fast closing the distance between he and Trussell when he was taken out of the play with a vicious body block on the ten yard line.

Mooring failed to make the extra point and the Bronchos were leading 13-7.

Memphis got the ball again late in the second quarter and filled the air with passes, but time ran out before the Cyclones could put enough of them together for a touchdown.

Memphis scored again the third quarter when Freddie Vinson blocked Trussell's punt and recovered it on the Clarendon 10.

Tommy Messer smashed over right tackle on the first play to score. Ronnie Smith put the "blizzard" ahead with his extra point kick.

Late in the fourth period Memphis scored again when they drove from the Clarendon 32. Max Kennedy gave Memphis the ball by breaking up and recovering a

Clarendon pitch-out. Miller and David Corley moved the ball on drives into the line. Stargel went over from the one on a quarterback sneak. Ronnie Smith missed his extra point try.

VET PROBLEMS AND ANSWERS

Q—Next time I visit my nephew in a VA hospital I would like to give him several hospital canteen coupon books. where can I get them?

A—The coupon books, in denominations of \$1.00, may be purchased directly at the hospital canteen. Patients use the coupons, in lieu of money, in making canteen purchases.

Q—My husband, a World War I veteran, passed away in August leaving me a \$600 commercial life insurance policy which I received in a lump sum. I have no other source of income. May I also obtain death pension payments from VA?

A—Yes, but not this calendar year. Pensions may not be paid if your annual income exceeds \$1,000, if you have no children. Your \$600 is considered as income from August through December, and therefore is proportionately greater than \$1,000 a year.

Q—As an ex-WAC, am I entitled to VA hospital care for the delivery of a child?

A—Generally, no. The only condition under which you could be hospitalized by VA for the birth of a child would be if some danger were involved due to a service-connected disability.

Q—I applied for a second change of course under the GI Bill and I was informed VA must give me advisement and guidance within 45 days or else my application for a change of course is automatically approved. Does the 45-day period start the day I file my application?

A—No. It starts the day your application is received in the VA regional office having your records.

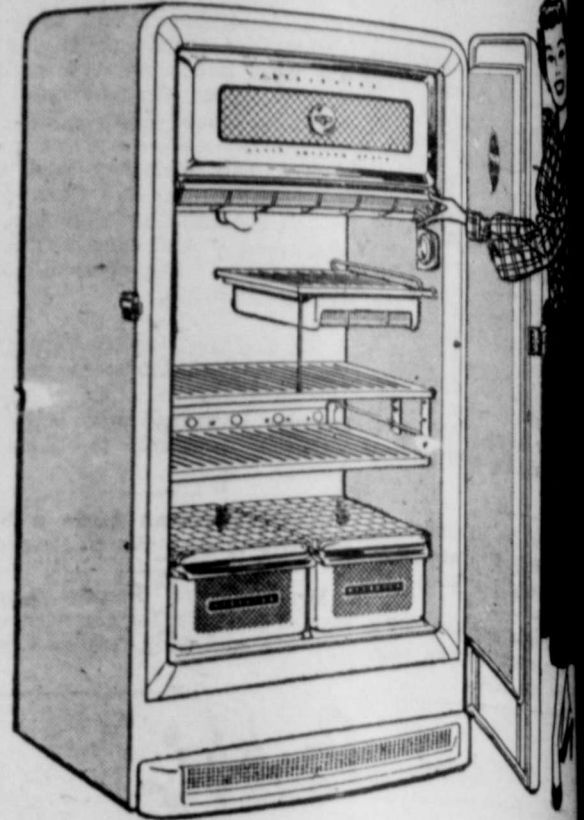

eases which livestock have which can be transmitted to humans. But we still go on eating meat. So the new disclosure that turkeys can carry some disease or other doesn't mean that it is necessarily going to.

And we have heard of no outbreak of parrot fever in a long time. There was a case several months ago in Texas of a person who raises parrots coming down with the disease, but that person got well.

It was unfortunate that the routine announcement by a scientist at a meeting of public health officials was made into a news story that sounded sensational.

More and more success stories of cotton farmers who follow the insect control practices, crop rotation, winter legumes, stalk plow under and other recommendations included in the famous Seven-Step Cotton program for Texas, indicate to us that these recommendations are the real McCoy.

Have you noticed how, in the cotton country, you can stand on a rise and see cotton in several kinds of health?

Back in the twenties all cotton was about the same for miles around. Most of our soil was still productive then, and either the boll weevil had ruined the crop or he hadn't, and one could expect uniform conditions of cotton for a whole area.

But now, with individual growers following different methods of rebuilding their soil, or not doing anything about it, and with different growers poisoning correctly, haphazardly, or not at all, the cotton land becomes a patchwork.

A very satisfying batch of letters has come to us from folks who attended the First Annual Texas Livestock Roundup at Fort Worth on November 2 and 3. They are all complimentary and say they want the one next year to be just as good.

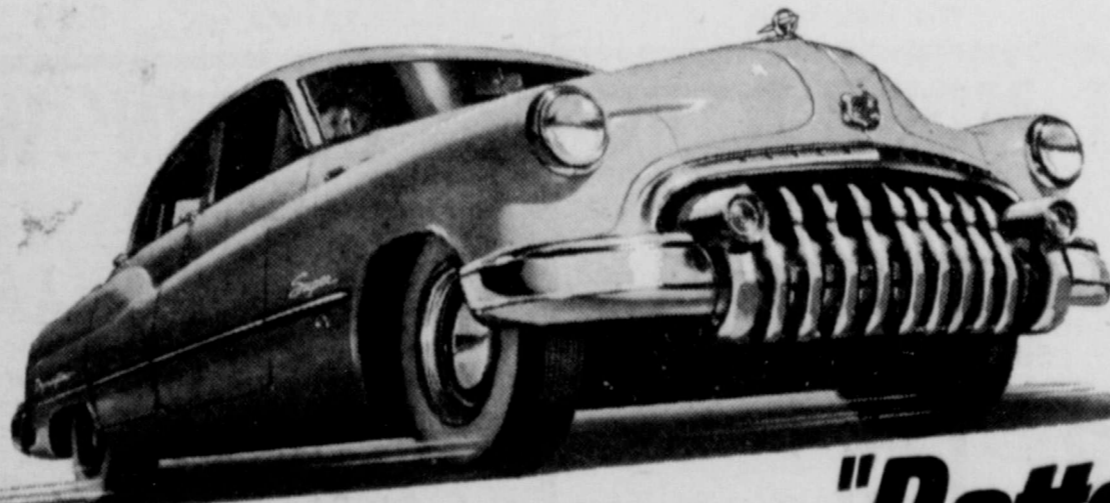
