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Editorial

CATTLE, COTTON, and PROGRESS

Tribute to the forward-looking citizens of Memphis, and Hall County is paid this month in the February issue of The Shamrock, published by the Shamrock Oil and Gas Corporation of Amarillo which pictures Memphis as the center of an area that has long been an important cattle and cotton producing region.

Quoting from the Shamrock:
"Cotton, cattle and progress . . . these are the principal benefits brought about by the farsighted planning and constructive cooperation of the citizens of Memphis and surrounding community.

"Located 86 miles southeast of Amarillo, in the fabulous Panhandle of Texas, Memphis is the county seat of Hall County and the center of a community that has for years produced fine herds of white-faced beef cattle and abundant crops of cotton, wheat, alfalfa, and other farm produce.

INCOME

"In 1949 alone, the income from cotton production in Hall County amounted to approximately \$7,000,000. And this income was produced by less than one-third of the total farm and ranch land in the county.

"Actually two-thirds of the county's 900,000 acres is devoted to the production of range-fed cattle.

The Shamrock devotes eight pages and nine pictures about Memphis and Hall County. Mention is made concerning all the community activities of the Chamber of Commerce and the Hall County Board of Development in cooperation with the County Extension Service.

INDUSTRY

Explanation is made concerning the county 4-H Club and FFA chapter work.

In the production of farm crops, conserving the soil is an important community responsibility and work with the Soil Conservation Service and Production Marketing Administration is traced in the article.

Quoting again:

"Industry activity in Memphis and other parts of Hall County is closely related to the county's extensive agricultural operations. Cotton production accounts for a large part of this industry.

"In Hall County there are 19 Cotton gins, five of which are in Memphis. A cotton oil plant, operated by the Western Cotton Oil Company, is also located in Memphis and is one of the most modern in the state. Still another Memphis industry engaged in the processing of cotton is the Memphis Compress. Last year this firm handled more than 135,000 bales of cotton.

DAIRIES

"Within the county there are eight Grade-A dairies, an increase of size during the past five years. There is a modern milk plant at Memphis engaged in processing much of the production from these Grade-A dairies.

"Memphis and Hall County residents have made outstanding achievements in developing the industry and agriculture of their community.

"To keep their fields and pastures producing good crops and fat cattle, the citizens of the community have displayed a spirit of cooperation that has steadily resulted in substantial soil conservation achievements, better diversification of crops higher soil productivity, and improved strains of livestock.

"In addition, the development of a healthy industry—closely tied into the agricultural economy—has kept pace with these agricultural achievements."

Visit Your School and See What Is Going on in Them

This advance notice is given that the schools of Texas will hold open house for visitors' day the first of March. While more details will be given at that time we call your attention to the need of sympathetic criticism of the school system.

The local schools—in Memphis or any other town or community—is the most important asset of that community. Perhaps your school costs you more tax money than any other local institution. This is certainly true in Memphis, but after all, if the schools are properly conducted they are worth every cent that they cost.

Not all of us are qualified to be teachers; and certainly very few in any community could qualify as a school administrator. Therefore very few people take the time out to see what is being accomplished in our schools and very, very few more know where or how your tax dollars are being spent.

When the time comes for visitors' days, the schools will present their best front. That is the job they have to do. Visiting day is not the only day in the year when the visitor may see the work that is under way in the public school.

All of us hold in the highest esteem the men and women who devote their lives to the job of teaching. Yet how seldom do we give them a pat on the back and tell them just how much we appreciate their efforts to improve the schools of the community.

Go back to school, and see how things have changed—for the better—since you were a kid and went to school.

The Proposed 22nd Amendment

The reluctance of state legislatures, including that of Texas, to ratify the proposed 22nd amendment to the federal constitution, limiting presidents to two terms, is probably due to a feeling on the part of legislators that the people can be trusted not to make a habit of giving more than two terms and that their hands should not be tied in this respect. Up to now, 27 states have ratified the proposal, with none more needed to give it effectiveness.

Perhaps the amendment would have wider appeal if it applied to Mr. Truman. It does not. There is a clause in it which says that it shall not effect the president who was in office when it was submitted. If it were to be immediately ratified, it would not

violated, has merit and validity. Mr. Truman's age is also a factor to be considered. An announcement from him that he does not choose to seek presidency again would be generally welcomed.—Wichita Daily Times

REPORT FROM WASHINGTON

From the Office of Congressman Walter Rogers

Congressman Walter Rogers (R-Texas) today introduced in the House a bill (H. R. 2576) to amend the Federal Reserve Act to provide for the payment of interest on the deposits of the Federal Reserve banks.

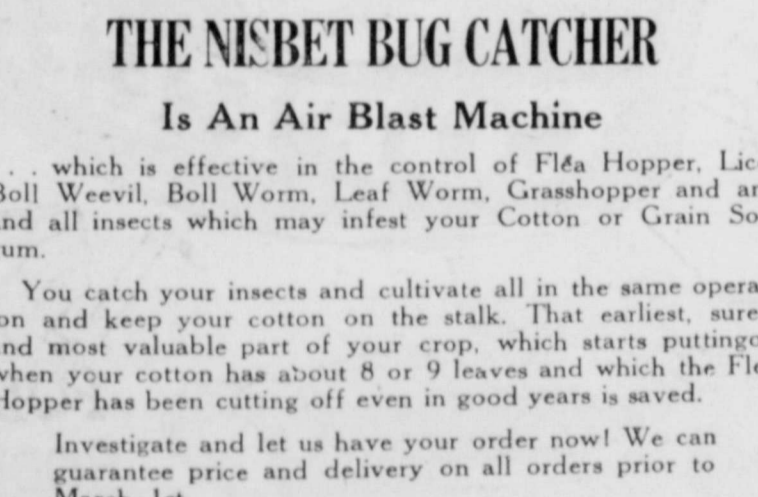
NO. There is more at stake in the present situation than individual gains and satisfaction. This applies to capital and labor alike, to Government and private enterprise alike. The question is not, will the proposed budget be cut, but how much. This will be answered by the result of present concentrated study by the Congress.

PROFITS FROM GOVERNMENT CONTRACTS: The enactment of legislation for renegotiation of contracts leaves no doubt but that Congress does not intend contractors to get rich at the expense of taxpayers. I am not satisfied with the procedure that is permitting prime contractors to let sub-contracts without bids. Something must be done about this.

PRODUCTION: No one doubts the capacity of American industry and agriculture to produce when necessary. The defense program, if not permanent, is certainly semi-permanent. A sound foundation is being laid that will enable this country to go on all-out production with the least amount of waste on the shortest notice. A similar plan is being used in the manpower situation.

THE GREAT DEBATE: The obvious political aspects permeating the great debate were given a severe jolt when General Marshall announced that the force contemplated for Europe was around 100,000 men.

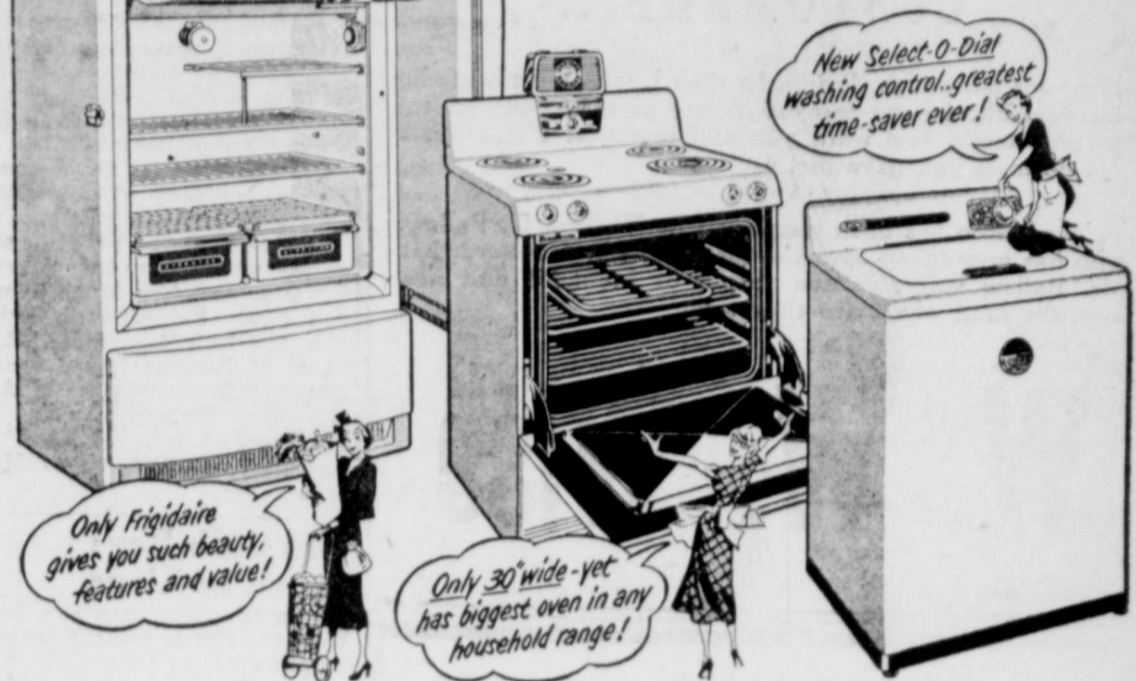

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New Bank Film Now Available At High School

W. C. Davis, Superintendent, announced that the film library at Memphis High School had received a new film entitled "Pay to the Order of—" which will be useful in teaching basic facts about bank checks to business students and other groups. The film was presented to the local school by First State Bank, Memphis.

"Pay to the Order of—" is not an advertising film, but instead is a visual education aid developed by banks as a part of their general public relations program. 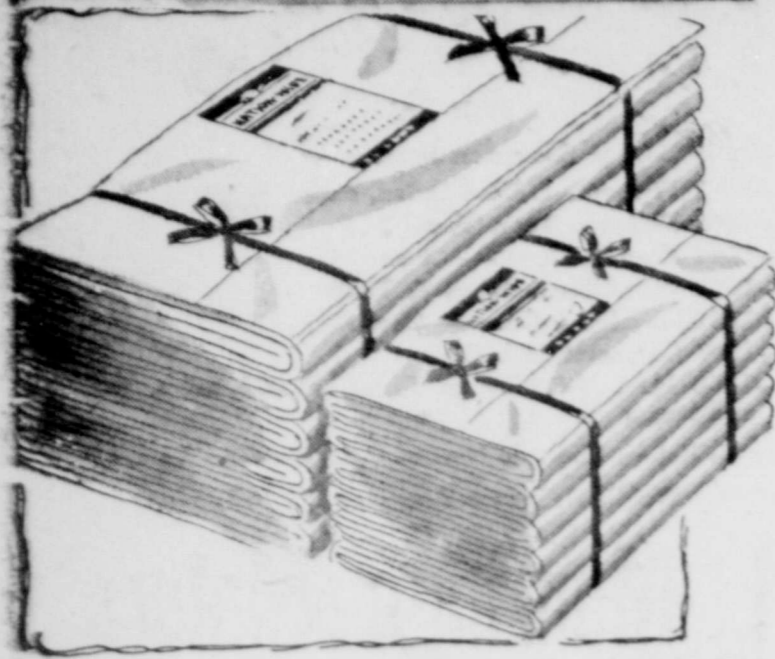

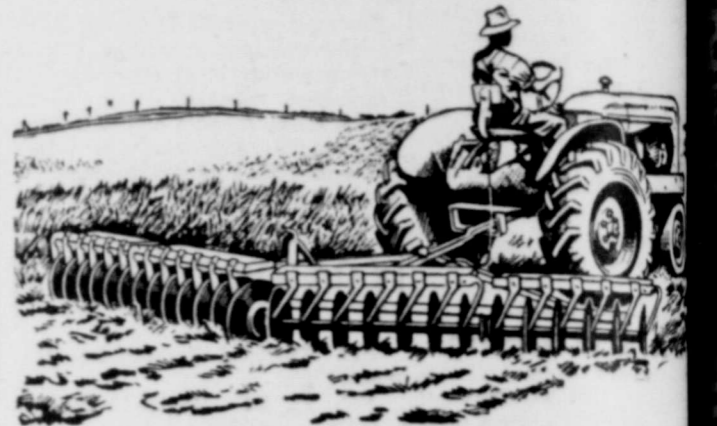

Week I mentioned a bill representative Gallan Graham would abolish most of our Market Road Program as now known it. Actually this would provide for nearly as construction of farm roads now have, but to do so deprive our counties of their of the gasoline tax which now use to retire old road and to build and maintain and dirt roads.

The House also gave unanimous approval to an act ratifying the Canadian River Compact. This compact is an agreement between Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma for the division of waters from the Canadian River.

Many people of West Texas will benefit by the waters which will be impounded upon the Canadian.

same six familiar test words that were used in surveys in 1915 and 1925. They couldn't spell as well in 1925, as they did in 1915, and in 1950 they fell short of the 1925 record.

Dr. Ayer thinks the decline has been caused by decreased emphasis on spelling in the lower grades, plus the average lower mentality of high school students today which has resulted naturally from the much larger percentage of students who progress from elementary to high school.

Incidentally as they study other subjects. This is all wrong, he says, since still other surveys a correlation between vocabulary and academic success.

Maybe the schools ought to put more emphasis upon the old three R's. The effect would be good, not merely for the increased useful knowledge of reading, writing and arithmetic, but for the mental exercise and discipline that comes along with these tangible and exacting studies. Being a good student is an art in itself. Careful study of the three R's is a logical approach to it.

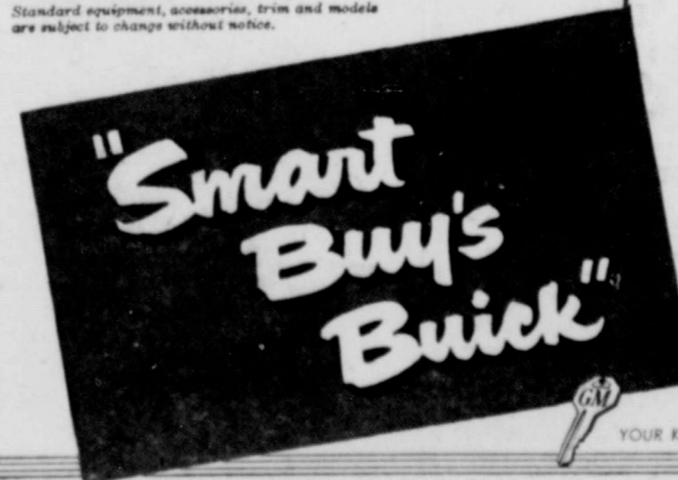

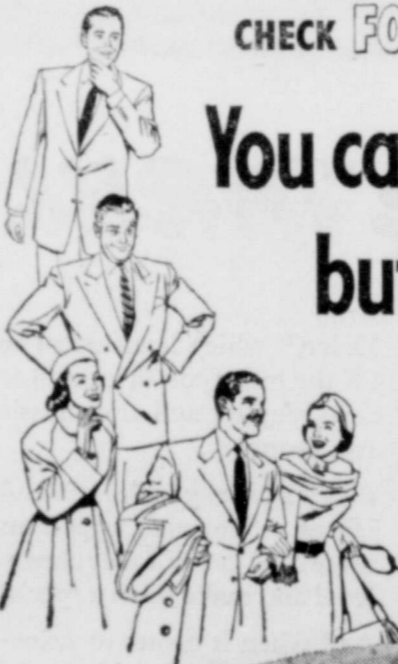
