



Four meetings are to be held in Hall County; here, Turkey. Lakeview and Estelline. The results of these meetings will be compiled and mailed to Washington.

From this and similar meetings throughout the country at which farmers have had opportunities to express their opinions about programs and politics which affect the farm family, further programs and plans of the Department of Agriculture will be made.

Many family farms, which represent an estimated 98 per cent of America's farms, are too small, too poorly equipped or too lacking in essential resources to supply the families who operate them an adequate income.

These family farm meetings are democracy in action. And if democracy is to be a continuing source of hope to rural people elsewhere in the world, democracy must then continue tally needed by our armed forces and its administrators go mad. to advance in rural America. Progress in agriculture must be and to supply civilian demand. continued, and no person is in a better position to make recommendations for this progress than the man or family who op-

This program, sponsored by the Department of Agriculture, is one of the best things to come out of our capital in a long time.lt is a program to which we should give full support. For a long time we have been meeting at the square around town telling each other what is wrong with the Department of Agriculture and how they are running the farm program. Now we have a chance to express some good ideas on how to make 1951 season-the farmer seeking it better.

During the last session of the Legislature Texas Motor Fuel Tax laws were amended and sections referring to refund of motor fuel tax have been changed and will directly effect Consignees as Refund Dealers, effective as of Sept. 1, 1951.

Amendment

" IT SHALL BE UNLAWFUL FOR ANY REFUND DEALER OR ANY EM. PLOYEE THEREOF TO PREPARE OR NOTARIZE ANY CLAIM FOR RE-FUND OF TAX PAID ON MOTOR FUEL PURCHASED FROM SAID RE-FUND DEALER, OR TO ACT IN ANY CAPACITY AS AGENT OR EM. PLOYEE OF ANY CLAIMANT FOR REFUND OF THE TAX PAID ON MO-TOR FUEL PURCHASED FROM SAID REFUND DEALER BY KEEPING HIS BOOKS, RECORDS, REFUND CLAIM FORM OR OTHER DOCUMENTS TO BE USED OR INTENDED FOR USE BY SAID CLAIMANT IN THE PRE-PARATION OF HIS TAX REFUND CLAIM."

The law states that the dealer or seller cannot have in his possession Invoices of Exemption more than seven days from date of delivery. Therefore, the buyer should make provision for suitable container to be placed near his gasoline stor. age tank, in order that seller may leave Invoice of Exemption at the time of each delivery.

All customers should go to Oil Company with whom they are dealing and either have Affidavit of Claims made out, or pick up all Invoices of Exemption, prior to September 1st, 1951.
