





Physical therapy may relieve pain, promote early motion of the affected part of the body, prevent deformity, and reduce the recovery period, whether the patient has a disease like arthitis or an injury such as a broken bone. In being used in combination with drugs with good results even be fore the days of ACTH and cortisone. Arthritis does not involve just one joint or one area of the body, it is a general disease. Treatment includes attention to a well balanced program of rest and exercise, diet, and other accepted methods of treatment.

Physical therapy for a broken bone can be started even before the bone is set; sometimes cold is used to keep swelling down and reduce pain. "In the fiscal year 1951, operating subsidies alone are estimated to accrue in the amount of \$63 millions, about five times the average annual level before the war.

Secondly, two years later in the budget message for 1953, the President stated:

"The Federal Maritime Board now has under review the subsidy determinations for postwar years and is developing improved procedures for determining such subsidy rates in the future. As these determinations are brought up to date, operating subsidy expenditures will reflect substantial retroactive payments for past years, as well as a more complete coverage of current obligations. Expenditures for this program are estimated at 60 million dollars for the fiscal year 1952 and 75 million dollars for 1953.'

TROUBLE FOR SPEEDERS

Speeders of the future may be in for a peck of trouble, if a recent report out of Oklahoma City is any indication.

It seems that Oklahoma City police are using a hidden radar device which clocks the speeds of motorists as they pass. Since the machine is portable, drivers never know when they may break the electric-eye beam of the radar apparatus and be given a ticket.

The radar "traffic cop" cost only \$643 but has been "worth a million bucks," for its psychological effect in keeping traffic moving within legal speed limits, according to Capt. John McManus and Sgt. Wayne Lawson of the Oklahoma City police department.

Sergeant Lawson says radar has reduced traffic fatalities, reduced traffic accidents, increased court revenues from speeders more than enough to pay for the machine, and the number of moving traffic violation arrests per motorcycle officer from 75.6 to 101.3 per month.

Lawson said the psychological effect of street signs, warning motorists of the radar speed check, is priceless.

When they see the speeding signs with the word radar, they hit the brakes. It never happened before."

Instead, it stems from a specific guarantee in the U. S. Constitution. The right of freedom of the press is secured by the first The center of a standard base. amendment to the Federal Con-The Constitutions of the several states likewise contain similar guarantees.

> Why did the farmers of New England, the planters of the South and the small storekeepers of Philadelphia, New York, and Boston insist some 160 years ago that the original Constitution be amended so that the people would be specifically guaranteed freedom of the press?

> It was because the founders of our country had an abiding faith that enlightened citizens could be entrusted with the job of gov-erning themselves. If they could have an unfettered opportunity to read the history and to learn the lessons of the past, to underdeas, to read about what forces are alive in the world, to check on their government as to its activities, its successes, its failures and its abuses, and to write and speak unimpeded - then

they could not be made slaves. The framers of the Constitutions believed that freedom of the press would aid in enlightening the people. The competition of ideas would point out the choices of the people. With this freedom they could decide their own problems better, with more resulting happiness to themselves, their families and their communities The men who wrote the Constitution knew intimately of those countries across the seas whose governments controlled thought censored information and made political economic and religious decisions for their subjects. They believed in the principle of competition and the value of permitting every citizen to develop himself to the limits of his abilities and they insisted that this right of freedom of the press be recognized by the fundamental law of the land. Of course, all rights entail cor-

relative obligations and duties.
