

#### CHANGE IN TACTICS NEEDED

The communists are up to their old tricks again. Once more they are trying to run the international show the way they want it, in order to turn it to their advantage and to further strengthen their position.

We are referring to their action of last week when they requested that the Big Four Foreign ministers' conference be re-set from Jan. 4 to Jan. 25.

Earlier, when the West had requested a meeting of the foreign ministers of the Big Four nations, Russia countered with demands for a five-power meeting, which would include red China, to discuss "lessening of international tension.

The West wanted to limit the Big Four conference to a discussion of matters, relating to Germany and Austria. Clearly, Russia was trying once again to "put the squeeze" on the Western Powers. If the communists could force the West to accept red China as a participant in a Big Five conference, they might be able to use this as a wedge to eventually get China into the United Nations,

The Western Big Three, as was to be expected, balked at Russia's proposal.

When communist leaders continued to be un-cooperative and in addition, reverted to tactics, reminiscent of Stalin, Western diplomats decided it was time for them to get together and reassess the situation. The result was the Big Three conference in Bermuda.

Participants came out of the discussions, hoping that closer and stronger ties had been forged between the three Western Powers and that a new unity of action had been achieved. Only time can tell whether these hopes will come true.

Of course, adds Hooser, the poultryman must do his part by supplying the feed and water.

The Poultryman who does a good job of culling continuously will be well paid for his trouble. Poultry farm management can not be most efficient unless the non-producers are sent to market and this means continuous culling says Hooser.
