

### AREA SOUTHEAST OF MEMPHIS Damages Farms And Newlin Buildings; **Disrupts Travel And Utility Services**

Rain of cloudburst proportions pounded the Salisbury, Newlin and Harrel Chapel communities Sunday evening, breaking terraces, washing away valuable topsoil, halting highway and rail traffic, disrupting power service and communications, and pouring flood waters into a number of homes and business houses at Newlin. Rainfall of from five to nine inches lashed the affected area within a period of three hours or less. High winds also caused some damage in the Harrel Chapel

Fall in Memphis was much lighter, amounting to only 1.88 inches by Monday morning, according to Weatherman John McMickin. Light showers, which continued through Monday afternoon, brought the total to 2.02 inches.

Fall at other points in the county averaged around 2 inches according to County Agent W. B. Hooser. He said that crops would have to be planted over throughout the county, however.



### Opportunity Still Here

To listen to some quarters, it would appear that young people of today have no future and that opportunity is a thing of the past. It may even be true that all of us feel this way oceasionally, especially when we've had a particularly trying day and are feeling sorry for ourselves.

### Segregation In Schools

Segregation in the nation's schools was declared unorestitutional by the United States Supreme Court last week but it is likely to take some time to put this ruling into effect. As a matter of fact, it may be that this will sever be accomplished examplebels:

Piere in Texas, J. W. Edgar, commissioner of education. has advised public schools to make plans for continued segregation of white and Negro students through next year at least. In letters to all Texas superintendents. Edgar said that distribution of state funds will continue to be based on separation of white and Negro schools and that teachers should be employed on the same basis.


