





### Serving People Pays Dividends

Our attention has been called to a high honor which has come to a former Memphis minister. The story of the minister and how he came to be honored appears in the July issue of Thte Progressive Farmer. Each year, the farm magazine honors outstanding rural ministers.

The Texas minister chosen this year is Rev. E. C. Cargill, whom old-timers likely will remember served as pastor of the First Presbyterian Church here about 15 years ago. Reverend Cargill lives at Italy, Texas, but serves not only the Park Presbyterian Church there but also the church at Avalon, which is nearby, and has since 1940. This in spite of the fact that he is now 82 years old.

To show the regard his neighbors have for him, Italy held an E. C. Cargill Day in 1949, according to the article in the farm paper. Almost all churches in the community participated in the all-day program, with more than 700 persons attending.

Reverend Cargill gives his wife much of the credit for whatever he has accomplished but the article states that both have encouraged the missionary efforts of small churches.

The article concludes:

"People in Italy think of Mr. Cargill as 'a man who has given his life in pastorial service, in dedication to people, and in concern for the total community

Reverend Cargill very likely is a refutation of the oftrepeated declaration, "But I can't do anything.

The Italy pastor probably would be the first to say that he is very unimportant in this world as far as financial standing or high position is concerned. As a matter of fact, being the kind of man he is, he probably has given these matters little thought, feeling that they are of slight importance.

To him, something else was of infinitely greater importance-serving and working for the good of his fellow man.

More of us probably should have the same kind of de-It may be that each of us cannot do much by himself but there is little question that if enough of us resolved-like Reverend Cargill-to serve others to the best of our ability, it would be a better world.
