It's Time To Decide

A glance at the calendar will show anyone that it's to decide which candidate will get the vote. Date of the First Democratic Primary is Saturday, May 7.

The tempo of Texas Politics is speeding up only lightly, although the deadline is fast approaching. Absentee voting over the state is not what it should be, and the average citizen is, apparently, still disinterested.

Traditionally Texas voters go to the polls some time the latter part of July to cast their ballots. But the amendelection laws changed the timing. For the first time, the people must make their decision the first week in May

The state-wide race which is receiving most attention is that for Attorney General. Heading the list of candidates is Will Wilson, the incumbent, who is finding a tough opponent in former State Representative Waggoner Carr. Also in the race is Bob Looney, Austin attorney.

The race for governor is receiving more attention as the days pass. Jack Cox, Breckhenridge oilman, who is opposing Covernor Price Daniel, recently received much publicity when he got the support and political blessing of former governor Allan Shivers.

The campaign of a young Houston attorney for Lieutenant Governor is gathering speed as he presses his attack against the present holder of that office, Ben Ramsey. Ramsey is seeking his sixth term.

Receiving much attention is the race between Bill Allcorn Commissioner of the General Land Office, and veteran Jerry Sadler, who has been serving in the House of Representatives. Several months ago predictions were made that Allcorn would not run for re-election due to illness, but he is making an System," it is designed to reward effort to campaign. Closer to home is the race between Judge James G. Denton and Judge Jesse Owens for chief justice of the Court of Civil Appeals, 7th Supreme Judicial District.

Armed Services Waste Billions While Crying for More Money in this frightening era of the cold war and rival worlds building up their arsenals of atomic weapons, the American people have been told time and again that we must spend billions annually to keep abreast of the enemy. A defense committee staff report pointed to one example when it accused the armed services of failure to complete standardization of its supply systems, an omission which is costing \$450,000,000 a year. As Raymond Moley said in a recent Chronicle article: "While the behemoths in the armed services are telling Congress how they are being starved under the President's budget, the bureaucracy over which they preside goes its way-ward wastful

The seeding of native grasses is still under way in the Hall County Soil Conservation District. There has been approximately 400 acres of grasses seeded this winter and spring, in the District. This grass is being seeded under several programs: Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP), Conservation Reserve or Soil Bank, Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) plus several landowners that have seeded grass on their own.

The grasses have been seeded in pure stands and in mixtures. Some of the grasses are blue grama, King Ranch bluestem, sideoats grama, switchgrass, Indiangrass, buffalograss, weeping lovegrass and sand lovegrass.
